## Gowns and Surplices.

To the Editor of the Tribune.

I intimated some time ago I would offer, for the consideration of all who take any interest in the subject, some remarks concerning the use of the Surplice in the Pulpits of Episcopal Churches. To-day, if you consent, I propose to commence the fulfilment of that intention. What I shall say to-day, however, will be principally a few historical references to the feuds and martyrdoms of the early church arising out of priestly gowns, including the Surplice, in the three years next preceding the Reformation; trace the final canonical adoption of the Surplice as the habit to be worn by ministers of the church while performing the rites and sacraments of the church; and from the days of the Reformation until Tractarian errors and innovations "crept into the churches unawares," the Surplice was used, and made obligatory by Parliamentary enactment, as the proper vestment during the performance of those services; prove that the Ritualistic presumption that the surplice is any part of those services and should therefore be read by the clergyman in the Surplice is repugnant to the teaching of the Bible and of the Church, and the whole current of ecclesiastical history and evangelical argument; and that the Gown, now-days so often despised and rejected, has the sanction of immemorial usage in the church and of legal decision.

I trust I shall not be met here, as elsewhere, by any references to the modern practices of the Dioceses of Huron and Toronto in Canada, or of Parishes or Dioceses in England. While it must be admitted that any Episcopal order or Synodical direction is very different from the capricious action of one man, whatever his motive or intention, I should be sorry to see enforced upon the Diocese of New Brunswick very many of the strange ceremonial which are performed even in so-called Evangelical Churches in England; much more would I regret the introduction of practices permitted in Huron even within the sound of the Cathedral bells; and it is quite enough to know that, having passed the Surplice stage, the learned Bishop of Toronto and the Church Association in his Diocese are now in public controversy over the introduction of Early Communion, given to the people in the morning fasting, "as becometh the reception of the real body and blood of Christ;" the giving of the offertory standing and bowing, and "presenting" the same devoutly on the "Altar;" the daily use of sacerdotal garments in the streets, &c. All these and similar practices may prove the evangelical states of all these churches—will not judge them; but the motto is not wholly irrelevant,—*Ex parte H. reuim.*

To prevent misunderstandings hereafter, I may say that when I speak of preachers I speak, as the Church speaks, of a distinctive office for while the offices of Minister and Treasurer were officiously—held by one person, the offices were essentially distinct. In fact, strange as it may sound in our ears, in the earlier ages of the Church Ministers were often incapable of preaching, and in some cases were not licensed to preach, and according to Latymer, some of them could not decently deliver the Homilies placed in their hands. This I shall have occasion to show more fully hereafter. It is only necessary now to refer to the fact recorded by Mosheim, and I think by others, that such a deficiency of Protestant clergy had been experienced at the accession of Queen Elizabeth, that, for several years, it was a common practice to appoint laymen to a certain extent in vacant Churches. But apart from this authority, I shall be able to show from the Documentary Annals of the Reformed Church that the offices of Priest and Preacher in many particulars were as distinguishable from each other as the offices of Priest and Deacon. I should, do that the carrying a Biretta in the hand in the church was not positively unlawful, if the clergyman did not wear it, because the "carrying it in the hand" was not prohibited by words to that effect.

This letter, sir, has already occupied too much space. I think, however, that
