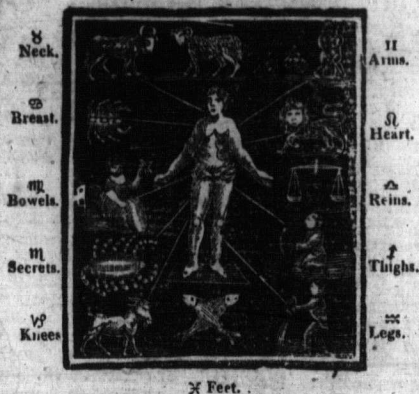

The times in the above table are to be added to or subtracted from the time of high water at Halifax, according to the directions there given. Example—To find the time of high water at Quebec, July 5, 1832. The time of high water at Halifax, July 5, by the calendar is 0 hours 23 minutes; to this add 30 minutes (time set against Quebec in the table) and you have the time of high water at Quebec, 0 hours 53 minutes.

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A small breed of Cattle is the best where the summer pasture is poor.—Never raise the Calf of a Cow that is always poor; ill health is often communicated to the offspring. The cow that yields the most butter should be preferred as a breeder, to the one that gives the most milk.

A considerable quantity of manure may be made by keeping pigs always shut up, and throwing plenty of weeds, ferns, and litter into their pens. Where they are allowed to run abroad, they generally do a great deal of actual damage, besides breeding many quarrels among neighbours.

Japan Blacking.—3 oz. ivory black, 2 oz. coarse sugar, 1 oz. sulphuric acid, 1 oz. muriatic acid, juice of 1 lemon, 1 spoonful sweet oil, 1 pint vinegar, mix the black and oil, then add the lemon and sugar, then vinegar, last, the acids.

Cheap Blacking.—4 oz. ivory black, 4 oz. brown sugar, a spoonful of flour, tallow size of a walnut, a little gum arabic, make a paste with the flour, whilst hot mix the tallow with it, then the sugar, then mix all in a quart of water.

A hedge is easily formed upon new-cleared woodland, by allowing the beech shoots (which always spring up) to stand for the breadth of two or three feet from the log-fence; when they are about an inch thick, they should be cut (near the ground) about half through and bent down, very early in the Spring, before the bark is loose. In the course of a few years they will make a good fence.

Considerable damage is done to pastures by the white Grubs, with yellow heads. These are produced by the large brown beetle or June-bug, they continue for three years in the state of grubs, living on the roots of clover, grass and other plants. The nighthawk lives upon these beetles, and ought for that reason to be protected. For many years the Society of Arts offered a reward of Fifty Guineas to any one who should discover some method of destroying the white grub, which in many Parishes destroyed nearly all the hay, and it became necessary finally to employ persons who paid children a certain price per hundred for the beetles; thus getting rid of a considerable expence, of a nuisance with which they probably would never have been troubled had they not destroyed the nighthawks.

Lady-bugs should never be disturbed by the Gardener, their young feed upon the lice produced by the small green-winged fly.

Tulips.—A tulip, planted and reared in a box in front of a window at Haarlem, has been sold for fourteen thousand francs, or upwards of five hundred and fifty pounds sterling! The owner had sterling reason for naming it "My daughter's dowry." We are very sceptical on the subject of this paragraph; and if there be any truth in it, we suspect it ought to have been dated about a couple of centuries back, when the tulip mania of the Dutch was at its very zenith. The roots were the subject of speculation to an incredible amount, and were transferred from one to another like so much stock. Instances are on record of twelve acres of land having been given for a single root. Professor Beechmann relates that a single root of the species called the Viceroy was exchanged for the following articles: 2 lasts of wheat, 4 of rye, 4 fat oxen, 5 fat swine, 12 fat sheep, 2 hogheads of wine, 4 tons of beer, 2 tons of butter, 1000lb. cheese, a complete bed, a suit of clothes, and a silver beaker. We have been given to understand that this species of incredible foolery was on the decline in modern times, although in consulting one of our manuscript scrap books, we

And the following instance of modern Dutch infatuation related by a well-known traveller:—

"I was witness to a circumstance I could not otherwise have believed respecting the price of flowers in Holland. I saw four hundred and seventy-five guineas offered, and refused, for a hyacinth. It was, to be sure, the most charming flower that ever was seen." The writer, on whose authority this circumstance rests, is Sir James Carr, in whose Travels through Holland the anecdote may be found, page 172.

"Love wisdom and you will attain it."—thus Selden writes. "The difference of men is very great; you would scarce think them of the same species; and yet, it consists more in the affection than the intellect. For, as in the strength of the body two men shall be of equal strength, yet one shall appear stronger than the other, because he exercises and puts out his strength, the other will not stir nor strain himself:—so 'tis in the strength of the brain; the one endeavours, and labours, and studies; the other sits still and is idle and takes no pains, and therefore he appears so much the inferior. What an encouragement to him that takes pains!"

Directions for coming into Halifax Harbour, taken from the printed Directions in the Custom-House at Halifax.

SAMBRO Island and Light House is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W. From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E.; if it bears more easterly stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please. Note—The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two miles, the other W. S. W. about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water; the outer most one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E. N. E. When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chebucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger. When a-breast of Chebucto Head, run N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. for the south point of George's Island. When within half a mile of George's Island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15. In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's beach, run nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off S. W. from the beach. There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point. Coming from the eastward, run for the light, and you cannot fail seeing Chebucto Head as you open Halifax harbour; the light being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

New Light House.—As the Light House on the Tower at the west end of Manger's Beach, at the entrance of Halifax Harbour, is intended only to lead vessels up the harbour, the greater part of the eastern side will be darkened, viz—*from N. E. by N. to S. half E.*—The following directions published by the Commissioners of Light Houses should be attended to:—"Vessels coming from the Eastward must keep Sambro Light open to the southward of Chebucto Head and until the Light opens on Manger's beach, which will then bear N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W—they will then be to the westward of Thrum Cap Shoals, and may shape a course up the harbour, always keeping the Light on the Beach open, and on the starboard bow. Vessels coming from the westward will see this Light when they are as far to the eastward as Chebucto Head, by keeping it open, and on the starboard bow, it will lead them up to the beach. This Light will appear of a red colour, which will distinguish it from any other on the coast. It is fifty eight feet high from the level of the sea."
