Approaching the planting season the farmers are in the most unusual state of uncertainty they have been for many years and indeed it is doubtful if anyone can remember a time when he felt less sure of the proper course to take than he does now. This is due to the present low price of farm produce and particularly the low price of potatoes compared with the extremely high price of a year ago.

At times like these farmers receive advice and warning from many sources. Up to the first of March there was a general feeling that the "Fordney Bill" which had been introduced into the U. S. Senate would practically shut off the U. S. market to the Canadian farmer. This bill, however, was not passed and the U. S. market is entirely open and while at the present the prices there are no better than the local prices, nevertheless an open market at any price is better than a closed one.

Two years ago in the spring of 1919, the potato growers were advised to hold back, not to buy fertilizer and not to plant as a reaction from the war conditions was expected to follow immediately and if they held off prices on fertilizer would be lower and it was not a season to plant the usual amount as crops would not bring good prices the following fall.

This resulted in a decreased acreage and a year ago when the 1919 crop was in the market, potatoes went to their very nighest level, in some cases up to \$10.00 a barrel and even higher. This resulted from a decreased acreage, making the supply slightly under the demand with the prices that go with that condition.

It is the opinion of those who follow the course of events that a recurrence of two years ago can be expected. There is a general feeling among the farmers, less acreage will be planted this year, and there is a general feeling that next fall business conditions will be greatly improved and these two will surely make higher prices the same as two years ago.

The Canadian farmers are fortunate in being able to know what course other farmers are taking, their planting season coming the latest of any, and reports from the Southern States indicate a reduced acreage, and this in itself is enough to make the farmers here realize that a reduced acreage anywhere will mean shortage of crops, and a shortage of crops means better prices. Everything is taking the same course as that of two years ago, as our records show that at that time Southern farmers decreased their acreage of our general agents listed below:

However, the potato growers must always consider a tplanting time, not what conditions are then but what he expects them to be when he harvests his crop and it is for sale nearly a year later. It is the general impression that business conditions are now at their lowest ebb and an upward swing is expected to start at any time and some think it has already started. Even the most pessimistic agree that next summer or fall will see business going along at a good safe rate and at the latest before the end of the year.

The importance of the use of fertilizer for increased production even now is not realized by many farmers. Dr. A. D. Hall, director of the Rothamstead Experiment Station in England says: "The great factor has been the introduction of fertilizers and purchased feeding stuffs. As soon as you can introduce on a farm some extraneous source of plant food elements, you can raise the standard of production." The Mimster of Agriculture, Paris, France, says that of the greatly increased yield of crops, seventy per cent. is due to the use of fertilizers. The Royal Agricultural Experiment Station, Germany, makes the same comment and the Deputy Director General, Holland, says, "I can only say that the largest proportion in the acreage of different crops in the Netherlands, I would attribute to the proper use of commercial fertilizer."

To these can be added the testimony of Experimental Farms everywhere, a twenty-five year series of experiments in Ohio, a three year test in West Virginia, and experiments now being carried out by the dian Department of Agriculture, and even a report from China. All give the same result-

The best advice to the farmers is for them to go along following their usual methods, planting their usual crop and to remember they are planting for conditions nearly a year from now instead of

Finally, every man must decide for himself and the decision should be based on whether or not you will be better off a year from now if you have a large crop to sell or a small one




