London, April 12. The Times says England will deliver its counter case at Geneva on 15th, but will not regard this act as prejudicing the position taken in opposition to the American claim for indirect damages.

New York, April 13. Gold ranges from 110 3/4 to 110 1/2 Exchange quiet. The Car Depot, stables, paint and repair shops of the Third Street horse railroad, Philadelphia, was burned this morning; also, a large number of harnesses. The horses and all the cars, but seven, were saved. Loss \$100,000.

London, April 13. Admiral Stewart has been appointed Comptroller of the Navy. The Spanish military authorities report that the Carlist demonstrations are unimportant. Ample precautions have been taken to prevent a rising.

Ottawa, April 13. An order in Council, published in to-day's Gazette, places three, four and six ply white and colored unfinished cotton thread, in banks, not under number twenty yarn, on free list.

London, April 15. The London journals continue the discussion of the Alabama Question, the majority expressing a decided opinion that the ministry must adhere to the position taken against the admission of indirect claims.

Paris, April 15. Reports are current that troubles have grown out of the recent diplomatic negotiations between France and Germany and grave complications are apprehended.

New York, April 15. On Saturday night the business portion of Ayer, Mass., was burned. Loss \$150,000. The Lake Shore Railroad elevator, with 200,000 bushels of grain, burned. Loss \$150,000.

The Halifax Chronicle of Thursday gives some further particulars of the wreck of the "Dacian" It says:—The "Dacian" left London on the 24th Mar. for Halifax and St. John, N. B., with general cargo and four passengers.

The Flint Ledge being a bad place, there is reason to fear that the "Dacian" will be a total wreck, and that unless the weather should be very favorable her cargo will be lost—There being no telegraph line on the Eastern shore no news was received from the vessel later than that was brought by the prize, who left soon after she struck.

AN UNSINKABLE SHIP.—Capt M. The Sessions.

The Justices were busy at work during the past week, with the County business. On Friday last the Licence Question came up for discussion, with a full attendance of Magistrates, some of whom were recently appointed, and acquitted themselves with much ability, evincing an acquaintance with parliamentary usages.

It was decided that no new licenses should be granted in the Parish of St. Andrews, and none in Milltown, Grand Manan or St. David.

The apportionment of County Assessment for Schools was fully debated and the following scale agreed upon and passed:

The reports of the Committees on Parish and County Accounts were approved and passed; and a large amount of business transacted. The Sessions were adjourned until Saturday, when the business will be closed.

IMPROVEMENTS.—Mr. Mulligan's new store and residence is nearly finished and will be ready for occupation by the 1st of May. The work of enlargement and renovation is highly creditable to the contractor, Mr. Robert Bell, who was also principal workman.

The Minister of Customs Villa is nearly finished on the outside. The new Mansard roof affords a magnificent view of the surrounding country. The contractor, Mr. David McRoberts, has pushed along the work, notwithstanding several weeks of bad weather.

Several other improvements are being carried on of which due notice will be given.

The Legislature was prorogued on the 11th inst. During the Session seventy-five Acts were passed. The only local Act in which this County is interested is one incorporating "certain districts of the Parish of St. Stephen to be known as the Town of St. Stephen," and to authorize the Town Council to borrow money to pay off a debt due by the Fire Department of that Town.

A Sackville contemporary remarks—"somebody must pay for school houses and teachers. Each one cannot have a school at his own door." He also says what is a positive fact, that, "there are many difficulties in the way of suiting everybody in taxation for and location of schools."

MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS.—Several Councils in the Province are applying for Municipal Acts; the Parish of St. James in this County is about taking the proper steps for the incorporation of that Parish into a Municipality. There is also a desire expressed that the County should apply for an Act of Incorporation at an early day. The Parish would then have a fair representation, the business would be done according to law by councillors who would be directly responsible to the electors, and whose term of office would expire annually, unless re-elected.

The Steamer "City of St. John," arrived here on Sunday morning last, being her first trip for the season. She has been refitted during the winter, her machinery overhauled and is in capital order. The only change in officers is the new clerk, Mr. Corbett. The new tariff has several reductions in rates of freight; this will be satisfactory to shippers and consignees.

The Small Pox, we are pleased to learn from the "Courier," has been stamped out of St. Stephen. The few cases in the hospital, and those in Mr. Donald's family are recovering. Nevertheless those who have not been vaccinated should attend to it without delay.

The Country roads are represented as being in a fearful state; some parts are bare, and others are covered with several feet of soft snow and slush, rendering travelling dangerous as well as difficult.

From telegrams to the St. John Press, we learn that in the Dominion Parliament on the 18th inst.—Mr. Bolton gave notice of enquiry whether it is the intention of the Government to introduce, during the present session, any measure to provide for more equitable financial terms for the Province of New Brunswick.

Mr. Connell gave notice of an address for copies of all correspondence between the Government of New Brunswick and the Government of the Dominion respecting any claims by the Province for a more equitable arrangement with the Dominion; also of any orders in Council, or other documents touching the above or connected with the mission of delegates from New Brunswick on this subject, together with detailed statement of account between the Dominion and Province to 1st April, 1872.

The new Custom House at Portland, Maine, was shown open a few days ago, and inspected by the City government, members of the press. Among the guests were the Governor, the Mayor, the Captain of the English steamship in port, consular agents, &c. The increase of business of the port, demanded more room for custom's business. The first custom house of the port was opened in 1730, under a naval officer named Moses Pears N. The collection of customs was at that time under Great Britain, and the customs authorities held the office in a dwelling house. The imports in 1871 amounted to \$2,946,992, the exports \$5,896,320. After inspection the company adjourned to the basement, and partook of viands prepared for the occasion.

PURCHASE.—Mr. Clarke has purchased the "Railroad Hotel" property from Mr. Pleasant, and will continue to conduct it as heretofore. The property is centrally situated, and the hotel under Mr. Clarke's management has enjoyed a large patronage. We understand that he intends enlarging the house, and making other improvements. The sale of his furniture, &c., is consequently withdrawn.

SUMMARY.

HAY.—Fifty two bundles of pressed hay brought from Fredericton over the E. & N. Railway, were sold at auction by R. S. Prescott yesterday forenoon, at \$27.50 to \$29. Considering the season and the small hay crop of last year, the prices paid for hay are remarkably low, owing to the ease with which it is brought by rail from Avostook and the Provinces.—Bangor Whig.

John Bright, replying to an address from some Republicans declaring that he was destined to be the first President of the Republic of Great Britain, writes that he hopes it will be a long time before the English are called upon to decide between a Republic and a monarchy. Bright expressed doubt as to whether Republicans are his real friends.

The Berlin correspondent of the London Times says that specimens of the new rifle used for the German army will shortly be distributed among the various regiments to test their powers more completely. The expense of equipping the troops with the new weapon, and manufacturing the necessary supply in reserve is calculated at nearly 50,000,000 thalers. It will be defrayed out of the war indemnity.

At a wedding in Williamson County, Tennessee, February 15, the bride was married in the shoes which her mother wore on the occasion of her marriage on the 8th of February, 1808—a period of sixty-four years and a week, to day. The venerable mother, now past her four score years, was present, and witnessed the ceremony.

A lady in Aberdeen, Scotland, is more advanced in woman's rights than any other woman in Great Britain. She goes regularly to the barber to get shaved.

About twenty five years since San Francisco contained but one hundred inhabitants. The snow blockade it is said cost the Pacific Railroad company \$25,000. This is not as much as some short lines have paid for similar obstructions.

S. fatal has mining become in the coal districts of England, that one person in every three who is engaged in it, is said to die annually. This is a fearful percentage.

In Boston, recently, two women stopped a street car not for the purpose of getting in, but to ask the conductor where a certain house was. They did not get the information.

Pianissimo, the astronomer, informs a frightened world that he has not discovered any comet that will knock the earth to pieces next August. The story was manufactured from whole cloth by a sensational Swiss journalist.

In the war with the Ultramontanes, the direction of Prince Bismarck to the Bishop of Ermland to withdraw an excommunication inflicted on a school teacher, and a penalty of losing his State salary, is a distinct attempt to prohibit spiritual action by secular means. In Baden, the State, under directions from Berlin, has gone even further, having prohibited all

monks and non German priests from preaching in the State Churches and suspended the law of compulsory attendance at school whenever the teacher is an infidelist.

The first through train from Woodstock, since the great snow blockade about six weeks ago, arrived in Carleton shortly after 6 o'clock last evening (the Isaugor train was detained two hours at McAdam, waiting for the connection) and as the road is now open again, the accumulation of freight for that section of the Province will be sent forward this morning.—[Telegraph, 13th.]

George W. Ross, a lad aged 16 years, residing with John Perre, Esq., Wallace Bay, Cumberland Co., N. S., committed suicide on Sunday, 13th ult., by hanging himself in the barn.

A BEAUTIFUL CARPET, manufactured for Dr. Bayard, and damaged by water on the passage from England, was sold at auction on the Market Square on Saturday, to Mr. McCullough, for \$211. Its original cost was nearly ninety pounds sterling.—[T.]

St. Francis Ronalds, now in ninety years of age, and a member of the recently instituted Society of Telegraph Engineers, proposed a system of electric telegraphy so early as 1816. He erected miles of experimental wires in the private grounds about his house, and in 1823 published a book, now very scarce, in which he said the day would come when the King at Brighton might communicate with the Ministers in London as quickly as if he were himself in the metropolis. In those days many of his acquaintances had serious doubts about his sanity.

MEDICAL DEGREES.—The examination by a committee of the Pennsylvania legislature into the practice of some Philadelphia colleges of selling medical diplomas has already bro't out some astonishing facts.
