With the Chances Against His Recovery.

Full Particulars of the Thrilling Affair.

That two men, in broad daylight, on the principal business street and in the central portion of the peaceful city of London should deliberately shoot down an old and experienced police officer, attempt the life of another, discharge their weapons at their pursuers, regardless of life, fire on a passing hackman and threaten the lives of several citizens at the point of the revolver, is a chapter of occurrences that seems incredible. STHEAMING WITH BLOOD.

The lighter one of the two was unconscious for some time. He gave his name as John Burk, of Guelph, and his companion, who is of heavier build, gave his as Thos. Wilson, of Toronto. Both are doubtless fictitious. Their wounds were washed and dressed, several stitches being put in Wilson's scalp. Burk's weapon was a five-chambered self-cocking 38-caliber revolver. Every bullet had been discharged, as the five remaining shells testified. Wilson's shooting iron was of the six-chambered variety, solf-cocking and of 32-caliber. There were three empty shells in its chambers; the other three were all loaded. DETECTIVE PHAIR AFTER THE SHOT.

But to return to Detective Phair, who was left with a bullet in his breast. This part of the story is perhaps best told in the words of Mr. M. L. Poole. "I had gone into Mr. Lewis' place to see him about some business," he said to a reporter "when I heard a shot. I ran out and saw Detective Phair apparently in the act of rising from the ground where he had been struggling with one of the rascals. A BRIEF BIOGRAPHY.

Detective Harry Phair is a native of Armagh, Ireland, and came to Canada when a boy, settling in Brantford. He followed the occupation of a shoemaker there and worked at the trade when he removed to London. He joined the city police force over 30 years ago, and next to P. C. Wallace is its oldest member. He did some good detective work when the couple of decades since, and he also came into prominent notice in connection with the murder by Phabe Campbell of her husband, twenty or more years ago in Nissouri. His services also proved effective in the Findley murder in Sombra 16 or 17 years ago, and the Monaghan tragedy in Lambton county. Detective Phair, though he has never been shot before, has had many narrow escapes. He was with ex-Sergt. J. Crawford, now county constable, in the tollgate robbery at Harmony near Stratford some eight or ten years back, when the latter was forced to shoot a man dead to save himself. Detective Phair has always been looked upon as a faitfull and efficient officer, and such his record would prove him to be. His friends and acquaintances in the city and vicinity are without number, and the sad and startling affair in which the principal is so well known has naturally created the greatest excitement. He is a man of strong religious convictions and is a leading member of the Talbot Street Baptist Church.

THE LATEST DEVELOPMENTS.

The Police Court was packed this morning with an expectant crowd, hoping to get a glimpse of the two prisoners. But they were disappointed. Chief Williams announced that they would not appear in open court, and the majority of the spectators filed sorrowfully out. The magistrate remanded both men for a week. Burk at first gave his age as 28, and afterwards

nudged the detective and went to a safer place. Phair wouldn't let go; he grabbed the barrel of the revolver and shoved it up. Then the villain clutched at Phair, shoving him back. The man who was down shouted to his pal, 'You've got your gun; use it.'' The other did as he was told and shot Phair, who was not two paces away. He was just getting up, and he fell back on the pavement. The shooting was deliberate. The man who fired the shot took the weapon irom his hip pocket and coolly unwrapped it from the cloth in which it was bound.

INCIDENTS OF THE PURSUIT.

There were some lively, and, but for the seriousness of the occasion, ludierque incidents in the pursuit in the rear of the Bishop's Palace. The crowd gave chace with all manner of weapons. At last reports the patient was resting quietly. Whether he will recover or not is more a matter of chance than of knowledge. The danger lies more in the possibility of inflammation than of hemorrhage. "If inflammation sets in," said one of the physicians who attended him, "the results will soon be fatal. Were Detective Phair a young man his chances of recovery would be much better. He is 62 years old, and though his constitution is unusually vigorous, his advanced age is against him. It is an awful fact that upon his life depends that of one of the two men now in the cells."

Mr. Phair's two brothers have arrived from Brantford. His son, John, of San Francisco, Cal., and his daughter, Mrs. Bush, of Moline, Ill., have been notified. His other two children reside in the city—Thomas, of London West, letter carrier, and his widowed daughter, Mrs. Hudson, who keeps house for her father. Mrs. Phair died some years since.

London, Friday, Oct. 14.

The desperate assault on Detective Phair, while in the execution of his duty as an officer of the law, gives much point to the presentment of the grand jury at the recent Middlesex assizes. The grand jury commented upon the frequency of attacks on the person in this county, and called for more severe punishment for the delinquents. These strictures were no doubt brought forth by the outrage on two young women of this city at Dreaney's Corners. There cannot be a doubt that through pleading guilty mands, as we believe the London constabut the accused managed to get off lary is, but if the force is to be conwith a much less severe sentence than would have been meted out to them had the full details of the attack the matter of pay and hours. They been brought out in evidence before the court. But a ten years' term for mere lads, -novices in crime, too-will probably be -novices in crime, too-will probably be as effective in its influence on them as a severer penalty would have been on hardened sinners. This was the view taken by Judge Rose, for the sentence was by no means the full extent of the possible penalty.

The laws for the protection of the person

are severe enough if judgés see fit to carry them out with the utmost rigor. Punish-ment of crime is not established by society as an agency for revenge, but is meant as a deterrent to those who are tempted to do wrong. And thus it is that there are from time to time modifications in the penalties imposed by judges.

But there is a class of men who should be locked up and kept apart from society altogether. They are far more dangerous to the public than the unfortunates who have lost their reason. Two such men, we believe, are the individuals now in custody for the attack on Detective Phair. Men who go around the country with no visible means of support, and armed with deadly weapons, mean murder in their hearts, and rarely fail to attempt it if any one comes between them and their ends.
When in addition, as in this case, the coundrels go around inflaming their brains with intoxicating liquors, they are rendered doubly dangerous to society. These men will in due course be given a fair trial, as is their right be their previous record ever so bad. But no matter what their antecedents or their fate, the general principle of the necessity of dealing most vigo rously with all offenders against the person cannot too soon be maintained by every administrator of the law in the land. It is of far nore importance that those who value human life lightly, or who go about with human his ignity, or who go about with loaded frearms menacing its safety, should be combatted and punished, than that theft or even burglary should be put down with a high hand. A burglar or a crock caught with a loaded revolver or other dangerous weapon in his possession should be deemed dangerous to be at large and sent to the penitentiary for life. Such a he means murder if he cannot have his own way. Society has a right to demand that it be protected from him.

The Richmond Guardian is a Conservative newspaper of a higher type than is to be found in this locality. 

THE END.

A Complicated Will Case.

SIMCOE, Oct. 13.—A sensational will case is on trial here at an adjourned special sitting of the Court of Chancery before Hon. Justice Robertson. The plaintif, Benedict Dertinger, a farmer, brings the action to establish as the will of his late father a document dated Nov. 8, 1890. The deceased was Valentine Dertinger, a farmer of Windham township, worth about \$20,000 at his death, aged 80, in September, 1891. The evidence resisting the will is to the effect that it was not in reality executed by the deceased, but by some one who personated him in the office of Wm. E. Kelly, barrister. A will executed in 1886 was submitted, giving his son 50 acres of land and dividing the bulk of his property between his wife and four daughters. The general and continued preference of the deceased, the evidence showed, was for his family other than his son. Drs. Housberger and Tisdale, who attended, stated, when they found death imminent, knowing the desire among Roman Catholtes to be made aware of the fact in order that the benefits of the sacraments may be secured before death, informed the deceased of his near demise, and were told in reply that he had made a will a long time ago, acquainting them with some of its provisions similar to these in the will of 1886. At the same time he emphasized his bitterness or hostility to his son Benedict by saying that he was no good. Evidence was given of similar support, showing a determination, continued till his death, not to benefit his son further than he had already done in giving him 50 acres of land. The case is still in progress.
