Lord Chelmsford at one time appeared to be destined to rise to the highest position in his profession. The disastrous Zuin campaign succeeded, lowever, in blighting his hopes. It speaks well for his personal qualities that every officer and man who served under him officer and man who served under him talks of him in the highest terms. There was a great mistake made in Zululand, and Lord Chelmsford was not free from blame for many things which occurred, but in some respects he was badly treated.

Lawyers on Strike.

MADRID, June 15. - Litigants in the cities of Spain have been left in a peculiar position by a most peculiar strike, the first, it is believed, of its kind recorded. Among the several schemes proposed by the Government to effect retrenchment in the State expenditures is one to abolish the district criminal courts. This proposition met with the hearty disapproval of all the Spanish barristers, and they have gone on strike to impress the Government with the fact that the abolition of this source of revenue to the lawyers would not be accepted without a struggle. All the barristers practicing in Avila, Toledo, Valencia, Guadaljara and Huelva removed their names from the cause lists yesterday, and to-day litigants found that their cases pending before the courts were undefended. VICTORIOUS SOCIALISTS!

Their Success in German Election a Sensation.

Berl'n Speaks in Emphatic Tones-The Army Bill Apparently Done For-The Government No Doubt Defeated.

BERLIN, June 16 .- The police last night closed up Socialist mass meetings at t Germania Hall, the Bock brewery, the Co cordia and the Eiyaum. The crowds poured cheering into the streets, where they were quickly dispersed by mounted police. During the day the Socialists distributed 500,000 hand-bills here. They spent 14,000 marks in the fifth division alone—the

marks in the fifth division alone—the largest sum ever expended by a single party in a Berlin constituency. The Conservatives and anti-Semites also worked hard. The Socialists' vote in Berlin foots up 20,000 over the vote of 1890. The Socialists have been equally successful in Hamburg and Altoona. Altogether the vote promises to be heavy. The women rendered great assistance in the Socialist cause. Many university students canvassed for dany university students canvassed Conservative candidates. In spite tremendous exertions the United C servatives and anti-Semities have 3,000 votes, as compared with 1890, and the Radicals have lost nearly 20,000 votes It is stated that the Socialists are likely to

It is stated that the Socialists are likely to win three out of four of the re-ballots against the Kadicala.

In Berlin not a candidate pledged to support the Army Bill has gained even the barren honor of a reballot. The prospects of a Government majority appears to be vanishing. The Socialists' vote shows a great increase everywhere. The Radical vote has diminished heavily, chiefly because the better class of the Radicals' party voted for the anti-Semitic candidates. Not 10 per cent. of the votes cast in Berlin were given in favor of the Army Bill. Soldom has the city spoken in such emphatic tones. The Provincialists appear to be equally placed in the same direction. The great success of the Social Democrats has caused a sensation.

WINDSOR, Ont., June 15.—Capt. Jas. Hickey was buried this morning in the Catholic Cemetery. The body was inclosed in a plain cak easket, surmounted with a floral broken wheel in a bed of lilies. Two young men from Detroit called on a prominent Windsor lawyer yesterday and stated that Vrooman told him a week ago he thought Hickey intended to give him it thickey as much as raised his hand. The young men jo not wish to appear as

Hickey as much as raised his hand. The young men do not wish to appear as witnesses, but will do so if Vrooman says he shot Hickey to save his life.

The inquest on the death of Jas. Hickey, who was shot by John Vrooman Monday evening, resulted in a verdiet that "Deceased came to his death from the effects of a bullet fired from a revolver in the hands of John Vrooman." The prisoner will be held for trial at Sandwich at the Fall Assizes.

HON. CLARKE WALLACE has the mis fortune when he goes on the platform to invariably make statements that are contradicted as soon as they are printed. His latest assault on the McCarthy Conservatives is exposed by Mr. Creelman, barrister, Toronto, in the absence of Mr. McCarthy, who has gone to England on business. Mr. Creelman shows that Mr. Clarke Wallace has once more misrepresented Mr. Mc-Carthy. It is a family quarrel, but it reveals a good deal of dirty linen, the greater portion of which is in the possession of Mr. Wallace and his associates.

THE Curran bridge at Montreal, a Dominion Government structure, which was contracted for at \$170,000, cost the country \$400,000, and there are numerous scandals connected with the payments. A Govern-ment commission is now investigating these. The commissioners say they will investi-gate everything, but the gravest suspicion of their intentions has been raised, for they are proceeding without having the original plans before them. By the way, Solicitor-General Curran steers clear of the investigation. Why? If this is not a job that should come under his management, will anyone tell us what is? No one answered the query recently propounded in these columns, "What is the Solicitor-General doing for his salary ?"

A Sixth ward mother writes to ask if it is the intention of the school trustees to compel the children to walk to and from the Queen's Park on July 1, no matter how warm the weather may be? She says that if that is the intention the Humane Society should indict the School Board in advance for needless cruelty. We understand that it is the intention of the school trustees to carry out the programme indicated by our correspondent. Our correspondent must think that the trustees are as flush of funds as the City Council, which is able, by a turn of the wheel to postpone many payments till next year, while at the same time erecting Dominion Government buildings at the expense of the city. The school trustees not being in that position, cannot hire conveyances to take the children to the Queen's Park. Besides, many taxpayers would object to public money being expended in that manner, seeing it is clearly illegal. The little ones will, therefore, have to take the three miles walk, however dangerous or unpleasant it may be, unless the suggestion of our correspondent is adopted. It is quite a departure from the original arrangement, but then we live in an age of change, and in this matter the school trustees are the arbiters.

THE EDGE OF THE FUTURE. We move fast in these closing years of exclaimed: "But what is to preven the nimeteenth century, and it is always interesting to know where the leaders in the use of the chief revolutionary agent of the day—electricity—are to be found.

Of course I refer to magnetic for I have been able by my methods to extract this magnetic over at comparatively small cost, and deliver from my mills pure iron bricklets. . "As soon as the ore-concentrating busi-ess is developed and can take care of itself, I think I shall turn my attention to one of the greatest problems that I have excited by the vibrations communicated ever thought of solving, and that is, the direct control of the energy which is stored up in coal, so that it may be employed

n converting it into power.

Now, that is an awful waste, and even a child can see that if this wastage can be saved it will result in vastly cheapening and would doubtless be disposed to take the inevitable risk. the cost of everything which is manufactured by electric or steam power. In fact, it will vastly cheapen the cost of all the necessaries and luxuries of life; and I suppose the results will be of mightier influence upon civilization than the development of the steam engine and electricity

steam engines and boilers, and make the use of steam power as much of a tradition as the stage coach now is." Mr. Edisen looks further ahead than this campaign, for he said: "I think it quite likely that I may try to develop a plan for marine signaling. . . I should use the signaling. . . I should use the well known principle that water is a more perfect medium for carrying vibrations than air, and should develop instruments which may be carried upon sea-going vessels, by which they can transmit or receive, through an international code of signals, reports within a radius of say ten miles." Though Mr. Edison has his chief interests and his home in New York and neighborhood, he volunteers the opinion that Chicago is to become the London of America early in the ensuing century, while New York will be its Liverpool, and he is of opinion that very likely a ship-canal may connect Chicago with tide-water, so that it will itself become a great seaport. There is nothing very mprobable about this prognostication. Not very many millions, comparatively speaking, would secure the making of Chicago into the head of navigation for the Northwestern States lying at its back. All that has to be done is to deepen the channel in the rivers above and below Detroit, secure the enlargement of the Welland Canalor the construction of a duplicate canal (to our mind unnecessary), and the enlargement of the canals that connect the grea chain of lakes with the majestic St. Law-rence. When the Chicago people get through with their fair they should take the question into their serious consideration. In any such undertaking, we in Western Ontario should insist on having Port Stanley regarded as a port of call.

Prof. Graham Bell, who, by the way, is a Canadian, is not a pedant, and he does not talk as if the end of knowledge in his particular line had been reached merely because he has achieved phenomenal success. "I have not the shadow of a doubt"—these are his own words—"that the problem of aerial navi-gation will be solved within ten years. I am able to speak with more

authority on this subject from the fact of being actively associated with Prof. Langley, of the Smithsonian Institution, in his researches and experiments. . . The calculations of scientific men in regard

to the amount of power necessary to maintain an air ship above the earth have been strangely erroneous; I may say ridiculously so. . . Indeed Prof. Langley concludes that when the air ship has once been lifted above the earth to the proper height, it will be possible to maintain it there with proportionately no greater effort than that expended by hawks greater effort than that expended by hawks and eagles in sailing about with extended wings. . . It may be some time before the art of managing an air ship is discovered, but the final result, I am convinced, will allow men to sail about in the

ir as easily and as safely as the birds do. "Electricity in one form or another will doubtless be the motive power for air ships, and every advance in electrical knowledge brings us one step nearer to the day when we shall fly. It would be perfectly possible to day to direct a flying machine by means of pendant electric wires which would transmit the necessary current with-out increasing the load to be borne."

The mention of electricity brought up new possibilities for future discovery, so of them so amazing as almost to pass the bounds of credibility. He said:

"Scientists are now agreed that there is no theoretical reason why the well-known principles of light should not be applied in the same way that the principles of sound have been applied in the telephone, and thus allow us to see at a distance by electricity. Of course, while the principle is the same as that applied in the telephone, it will be very much more difficult to construct such an apparatus owing to the immensely greater rapidity with which the vibrations of light take place, as compared with the vibrations of sound. It is merely a question, however, of finding a diaphragm which will be sufficiently sensitive to receive chose vibrations and produce the corresponding electrical variations."

GOOD ADVICE FROM MR. LAURIER. Speaking at a public meeting in L'Assumption on Wednesday, Hon, Wilfrid Laurier advised the French-Canadians to learn English as well as the language of their forefathers. The Liberal leader takes the very proper stand that in this age no man can make the most of his talents on this continent unless he is thoroughly conversant with the English lan guage, which is the language of trade, and is even fast displacing French as the The average French-Canadian as dearly loves French

as does the average Highlander Gaelie or the average German the language of the fatherland. But it is a serious obstacle to the success in life of anyone on this continent to know but one language, unless that language be English, which seems bound to increase its influence and use among the 70,000,000 of people that inhabit these northern latitudes of America, as it has increased its use and prestige in all the civilizations of the new world. While we hold this view, we decidedly believe that every Canadian should study and become proficient in the French lan-guage as well as in German. Now that educational facilities are so general, it is a little humiliating for a western man to attend Parliament at Ottawa and find every French-speaking member of the House of Commons able to read, write and fluently speak English, while scarcely an Englishspeaking member has even a smattering of a knowledge of French. The average educated French-Canadian, indeed, is a much better linguist than the avarage English-speaking Canadian. This arises doubtless from the necessities of the case, but it would be a credit to our public nen if they knew more of the beautiful language that is spoken by so many of their fellow-citizens. The same remark holds good of German. Both languages are spoken and written over so wide a section of this continent that the man who understands them is far better qualified to do business than the individual who simply understands English. Indeed, there are many establishments in the large cities of the west where a knowledge of these languages commands considerably higher emuneration than is given to the man who is contented with one language. It would be better if our young men and women were to devote more attention to the modern languages and less to subjects that are no longer of very practical moment.

EMPEROR WILLIAM'S proposals to increase the German army seem to have got a bad blow in the eye from the German electorate. Now if the taxpayers in other parts of Europe would follow suit, they could compel the professional warriors to take off a large portion of their military burdens. It is the boss warriors, not the common people, who are always spoiling for a fight.

"3. That if it be found to be within the jurisdiction of the Ontario Legislature, and a majority of the people ask for it; then he, Sir Oliver Mowat, pledged bimself to do all in his power to give such a law to the Province of Ontario; and whereas, the Overnment has granted said plebiscite;

herefore be it "Resolved, that we, as a denomination, "Resolved, that we, as a denomination, pledge ornselves to leave no stone unturned to make the vote in favor of prohibition as large as possible; and it is excreatly recommended that we, as delegates, on our return home, shall immediately proceed to organize municipally, irrespective of party or politics, to carry the work before us to a successful issue."


