

JEWS IN THE UNITED STATES.

In only two other countries of the country about 1,600,000. Here in the city of New York alone they are more by a hundred and fifty thousand than in all Germany, and nearly five hundred thousand more than in the whole British Empire. They make up nearly one-fifth of the population of the town and are the greatest aggregation of Jews in a single community in the history of the world. In many departments of business they have the mastery. The professions are crowded with them. Of all the foreign races here they are most numerous in the public schools and the colleges.

The great immigration of Jews to the United States, however, has been in the last fifty years, and more especially in the last twenty-five years. One hundred years ago there were only about 2,000 Jews in the whole Union, of whom 800 were in Charleston, 500 in New York and 150 in Philadelphia. In 1905 their number is about 1,600,000. During the last twenty-five years toward a million of them have arrived as immigrants at American ports, about nine-tenths of the number at New York alone. Nearly four-fifths of the whole Jewish population is centered in New York and the adjoining States of Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Jersey and Pennsylvania, but there are representatives of the race in every state and territory. Of those who came over in the last twenty years four-fifths were from Russia, and their arrival introduced new and grave elements into the Jewish problem in this country. Moreover, unless the Jews of Russia shall soon be relieved of their disabilities and the massacres of them shall cease this Jewish immigration from Russia will continue in great volume.



Receipts of wheat during the past three lishes a communication from Odessa days were 456,000 centals, including 154,000 which was conveyed by boat to Pod-Receipts of American corn during the woloczyska, Galicia, and thence telegraphed, saying that travelers arriving at Odesso from Kieff report that a serious fight occurred there last Friday between engineers and Cossacks. The fight occurred in front of the arsenal and many hundreds were killed or wounded.

The Neue Frie Presse publishes dispatch evidently referring to the same occurrence, saying that the engineers refused to work as telegraphers, whereupon the trouble began. Five hundred armed men left their barracks and paraded the streets, where they were joined by a number of infantrymen and followed by crowd of workmen.

Near the railroad station the mutineers engaged three hundred Cossacks and dove them off. Later, in the Jewish quarter, the mutineers faced an infantry regiment which fired two volleys, killing 165 persons and wounding many. The remainder of

the mutineers surrendered. Tension at St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, via East Prussia Dec. 4. - The city remains quiet, but extreme tension prevails. Armed patrols of cavalry and infantry are in the streets, especially in the neighbor-


