FULL WEIGHT OF AMERICA **NEEDED, SAYS LORD DERBY**

Only Then Will It Be Possible To Predict End.

BLOWS MUST BE MIGHTY

British War Secretary Declares Long and Terrible Fight Is Ahead.

BY LOWELL MELLETT. [Special Cable to The Advertiser.] London, May 18 .- "This war will not be over until the full weight of the United States has been thrown into the scales, not until America begins making war as though she alone was fighting Germany, will there be a possibility of prediction when the end will come."

Must Hit Hard. So spoke Lord Derby, England's secretary of state for war, Kitchen-er's successor today, and then added emphatically: "The bigger blow the United States is able to deliver, the sooner she delivers it, the quicker will the war end, and the new order of things

The United Press correspondent went to Lord Derby for some ex-pression of belief on the duration of the war, and of what part America should take in the fighting. He found the war secretary firmly of the belief that the end is not yet in sight.

A Big Part To Play.
"The United States," he said, "has a big part to play in this struggle to abolish the world menace of mi tarism. United States must strike hard. We hope she will strike quickly. Don't let the United States misled. Germany's active propa ganda right now is being direct ed to that purpose. In every way possible Germany is throwing out the idea that the war's end is sight. Germany would like this to be so.

"Germany has reached, if not passed, the crest of her military strength. She knows every day she is weaker by so many men. She is ready to quit, on her own terms. She is ready to fight a long, long time yet before accepting the terms that the world's democracy demands to safeguard the future. "It has been and still will be a terrible fight. THE WAR SITUATION

Queant Fortress Doomed to Fall-The Italian Drive Succeeds-Calm in Russia-Japan Takes Hand.

BILL GOES THROUGH **CONGRESS A-SAILING**

Vice-President and Speaker Will Sign Today.

WASHINGTON, May 17. — Final action was taken by Congress today on the war army bill, the second of the major measures of the war.

The Senate, by a vote of 65 to 8, adopted the conference report accepted yesterday by the House. Vice-President Marshall and Speaker Clark will sign the bill tomorrow, and send it to the White House for President Wilson's approval. It probably will be law before tomorrow night.

As finally approved the bill provides for raising by selective conscription a war army in increments of 500,000 men from 21 to 30 years of age. It also authorizes without directing the president to raise volunteer forces, which Col. Roosevelt desires to take to France, and greatly increases the pay France, and greatly increases the pay of all enlisted men.

whether Col. Rooseveit shall be permitted to ralse an expedition now rests with President Wilson, His views have not been disclosed, but it is believed that he probably will postpone decision while the draft system is being put into operation.

LONDON, May 17.—Premier Lloyd George announced today in the House of Commons that at the conclusion of the war a special conference will be held to readjust constitutional relations of the Empire. The annual imperial war council will be composed of the premier of the Imperial Parliament, such of his colleagues as deal especially with imperial affairs, the premiers of each of the dominions and some specially accredited representative of India, with equal authority.

The fresh minds and new view points which the Government's colleagues from overseas had brought to bear on the problems with which they had been so long engrossed, said Lloyd George, had been an immense help to all of them. So far as the Government was concerned, they could state with confidence that the experiment had been a complete success.

OVERNMEN TAKES HAND IN OMNIBUS STRIKE


LONDON, May 17 .- The London om ibus strike, which has been going on for some days, has been settled as a result of intervention by the Govern-The men will return to work tomorrow.

People of the city and Western Ontario are wakening up at last to the lousness of the world's food shortage. Nothing like being faced with a possibility of being obliged to "tighten your own belt" to do that!

All very well to be immensely sympathetic with the Serbians, Belgians and Montenegrins, not to mention the Armenians, even to going so far as to contribute money for them. All very well to admire the good management of the British Empire at home in the way of conservation through careful distribution of supplies! When a loaf of bread jumps two cents in price in one day and almost doubles in a week, the time has arrived to sit down and wonder, ponder, think what it is all about. The hour has also arrived for some exceedingly quick action to make up for the dilatoriness of months, and even of years.

Crying over spilt milk won't do any good, and it doesn't improve the situation to protest against a governing body that a year ago, and months more, should have been making big preparations for continuance of the war for an indefinite period by providing definitely for greater production. The past is past. and whatever people think in the backs of their heads, the pressing emergency is one of the present.

The majority of housewives have been gradually coming round to a recognition of the importance of thrift in the management of their own homes. From question of conservation of income, it has come to be one of conservation of

But with all conservation within their power, it is scarcely possible for some cople to make ends meet and get enough to eat. What about the laborer on my \$15 a week with a wife and family to provide with shelter, fuel, clothing and food? Undoubtedly, on the other hand, in many homes of Canada much more food is still purchased than is required to meet actual needs. Doubtless, also, there are homes to be found where there is still considerable waste in one way and another through over-stocking. Then there are the restaurants and hotels, where "you pays your money and you takes your choice." With certain individual orders, almost enough is brought in for two people to eat. Again, where three, four, or even five courses are served, in the varied assortment of food, there is more than it is good for any one person to eat. The leftovers at each cover would be enough to almost double the possibilities of service.

To be sure, this bountiful service is not true of all eating places. There are some where the rolls have diminished in size with every advance in price of

flour until they are almost microscopic, and the state of the consumer after partaking of a meal is of the variety that waits upon health, appetite still

The greater the demand for food in relation to the supply, the higher it is necessary to shove up the price. Waste in the kitchens of those who can afford to buy lavishly, and in hotels and other leating-houses means greater hardship those who can ill afford the necessities of life. Food regulations are imperatively needed for the protection a few months

hence of people of good circumstances, as well as those who are already keenly feeling the pinch of high prices.

Food regulations are demanded, that Canada may still continue to do her part in the way of forwarding supplies for the British Empire at home, the Allies

and the fighting men. GETTING THE MOST FOOD VALUE FROM WHEAT.

Three reasons are assigned for the marked advance in the price of wheat and flour. One reason advanced by a number who should be in a position to know something of the situation is that for once the rise in price is strictly that of supply and demand. A second reason given is that western farmers are holding back their supplies, looking to higher prices. The third reason to which the advance is attributed is speculation.

Whichever reason is the correct one, immediate nation-wide measures are required to cope with the situation, to regulate prices and distribution. If the advance is due, as has been stated, to the fact that the Allies' wheat numission has been purchasing all the available wheat for the past three nonths, then isn't it high time that something was being done to conserve every particle of the food value of wheat through insisting upon the milling of only

whole wheat flour for the present? In the United States it is estimated that such a measure would increase the output of flour by 18,000,000 barrels a year, and this very compulsory measis being given serious consideration.

In Canada the milling of whole wheat flour as a war measure would also

largely increase the output and the food resources.

Probably fastidious people wouldn't like it quite so well. But this isn't a for consideration of these kind of preferences. It is war time and Canaian people can accustom themselves to darker, coarser bread just as well as

the people of England and other countries have done. For their future well being, the sooner they come to it the better. As the Bishop of Huron stated in his Rogationtide pastoral letter, "We have arrived at a very critical time in the history of the war and of the world. Two factors now are of supreme importance—men and food; men to keep the ranks full on the battlefront, and food for the old land and ourselves. The submarine blockade has destroyed millions of tons of shipping and millions of bushels of grain that should have gone to the motherland, which, in consequence, is suffering great scarcity. Moreover, there is, owing to failure of crops in many coun-

tries, a great scarcity of food all over the world, which will be face to face with famine conditions, unless we on this continent and in Canada enormously increase our production this year. In this country it is infinitely more important for us now to produce more food than more munitions." If the aviation of flour and bread prices is due to a hold-up on the part of western farmers or speculation, the duty of the Government to step in

peremptorily is obvious. "THIS WASTE OF SEED."

No matter whatever the movement in question, there are always objectors for the simple reason that they are chronic objectors. Even the "greater production plan through cultivation of backyards and vacant lots," is being frowned upon by critics who insist, that isn't the point; the Important thing is to increase the farm acreage under cultivation." Both are important.

But, back to the critics. They could feel mildly indulgent towards this gardening mania if it wasn't for the terrible waste of seed. They have known gardening fads and faddists before. They are perfectly sure that the majority of London's gardens will come to nothing and that the gardeners will grow weary in well doing after the seed is planted and leave the harvest to Providence.

Of course, all soil will not yield equally well, and possibly in some cases a
good deal of energy will be expended for small returns. But there isn't a doubt that the vegetable supply is going to be largely increased and that gardening s being taken up with a seriousness of intention and preparation in the way of study hitherto unknown in the recent annals of the city. It is up to the gar-deners to show the critics, and for once cheat these pessimists out of the pleasure of saying, "I told you so."

By the way, a considerable amount of the planting time is still ahead. In

view of the need of increasing the food supply, isn't it an important point to choose the varieties of vegetables for the garden which will yield the greatest amount of nourishment?

Discussing with the temporary government the serious condition of affairs at the front, the commanders declared that the unfortunate phrase "peace without annexations" had found its way to the army and was there translated into an argument against offensive warfare. This and other harmful doctrines pervading the army and the inability of the officers ruined discipline and destroyed the authority and prestige of the officers. The discord in Petrograd had naturally found an echo everywhere at the front, but the spirit of the soldiers was slowly recovering, and the power of the Rusrecovering, and the power of the Rus-sian army was by no means lost.

Slam for Peace Shouters.
General Alexieff, commander-in-chief of the Russian armies, during the course of an interview, said:

"The whole gist of the 'new idea reforms' cannot be properly understood by the army, and this has brought about dangerous results. We can overcome the consequent loss of authority if irresponsible persons and organizations will cease further to interfere with our work. I feel assured that under the new coalition government it will be possible to conduct military affairs in a more energetic manner. It is time to wake up and stop shouting 'peace without annexations.' Let us leave peace negotiations to the Government."



RUSS CHIEFS TAKE BACK RESIGNATIONS

Alexieff Intimates That Army Will at Once Become Active.

PETROGRAD, May 17.—via London.
—As a result of a meeting in Petrograd Brussiloff and Gurko have withdrawn their resignations, and reports of further resignations are refuted by the definite announcement that all the commanders have decided to remain at their posts. Thus the crisis in the army, which formed an alarming accompaniment to the political crisis, has ompaniment to the political crisis, has

Discussing with the temporary government the serious condition of affairs at the front, the commanders declared that the unfortunate phrase "peace without annexations" had found its way to the army and was there translated into an argument against offensive warfare. This and other harmful doctrines pervading the army and the inability of the officers ruined discipline and destroyed the authority and prestige of the officers. The discord in Petrograd had naturally found an echo everywhere at the front, but the spirit of the soldiers was slowly recovering, and the power of the Russian army was by no means lost. sian army was by no means lost.

Siam for Peace Shouters. eral Alexieff, commander-in-chief the Russian armies, during the course of the Russian armies, during the course of an interview, said:

"The whole gist of the 'new idea reforms' cannot be properly understood by the army, and this has brought about dangerous results. We can overcome the consequent loss of authority if irresponsible persons and organizations will cease further to interfere with our work. I feel assured that under the new coalition government it will be possible to conduct military affairs a more energetic manner. It is time o wake up and stop shouting 'peace vithout annexations.' Let us leave eace negotiations to the Government."



Any Line of Work To Which He Is Adapted.

"Any returned man who finds that his injuries have disabled him for the work in which he was previously engaged can obtain training in any line of work for which he is adapted by application either to Principal Beal at the Technical School, or to the authorities at the Military Convalescent Hospital," was the statement made today by W. W. Nichol, vocation officer for returned soldiers for Ontario, just previous to leaving for Toronto after a few days spent in the city for the inspection of the vocational training being done here. Further in regard to the training of men for occupations whereby to earn a livelihood, he pations whereby to earn a livelihood said: "While in the city I have bee amining men so disabled they cannot go back to their old jobs. In such cases, we hold a board to arrange for courses of instruction to be given these men to fit them for careers. During their term of instruction, they will receive ample pay and adequate provision will be made for their families. I regard this as the most important phase of work for the returned sodiers."



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
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
