London, Feb. 10 .- Egypt is "bursting with wealth" accumulated from cotton, says a correspondent of the Daily Express in Cairo.

"Illiterate natives living in mud huts have made 20,000 pounds sterling out of cotton deals," he continues; "some have made 100,000 pounds. RIDOUT ST. BRIDGE MUST BE KEPT UP, SOLICITOR STATES

Appeal to Legislature Now the Only Way.

USE LONDON CITY BILL

If Ratified, Construction Can Be Carried Out Despite Vote.

Appeal to the Legislature to permit the building of Ridout street bridge in spite of the adverse vote of the people is the only course open to the city. This was the information gained by a committee consisting of Mayor Little and Ald. Moorhead, which interviewed the city solicitor. They will report to this effect at the meeting of No. 2 committee tonight. Owing to illness in his family, Ald. Moorhead will not be able to attend the meeting.

Is Public Highway.

It is understood that the city solicitor advised the committee that Ridout street, being a public highway, must be maintained in a safe condition. This was the contention of several aldermen before the election. They maintained that the project should never have been submitted to a vote.

At present the bridge is not safe for heavy traffic and until considerable results. heavy traffic and until considerable re-pairs have been made, City Engineer Brazier will not declare it safe for traffic of even four tons' weight. Signs stating the condition of the bridge have







LONDON HAS FEWEST UNCOLLECTED TAXES, IS OFFICIALS' CLAIM

Percentage Better Than in Any Other City.

London has the smallest percentage of uncollected taxes of any city in Ontario, in the opinion of city officials. Evidence to this effect was given by a report from Hamilton today. That city lists as current assets uncollected taxes from 1914. Of taxes due in 1914 Hamilton has still to collect \$12,255; from 1915 there is \$37,195 to be collected; 1916, \$5,652; 1917, \$12,902; 1918. \$2,766.

Comparisons.

Compared to this London falled to collect only \$4,591 of its 1915 taxes; \$2,752 of its 1916 taxes; \$1,809 of its 1917 taxes, and \$1,529 of its 1918 taxes

This showing is due largely to the

1917 taxes, and \$1,529 of its 1918 taxes. This showing is due largely to the system used here and the energy with which the work is carried out. Accounts for taxes are left in the hands of the tax collector for one year only. After that the city treasurer becomes responsible for their collection. In other cities the rolls are left in the hands of the collectors for several years.

Not Bad Debts.

The amount owing to the city is not a "bad debt" by any means. There are many instances in which the deeds are many instances in which the deeds to property in the city are not clear. The owners of these properties refrain from paying taxes on their land until the city selzes it. They then buy the land for the taxes and the costs, and have a clear title to the land. This accounts for much of the uncollected amount City Clerk Baker states.



LODGE IS WRONG. Senator Lodge is determined that the United States shall stand aloof from old world affairs. That is the meaning of his treaty reservations. Just now with a great setback to their foreign trade facing the Americans as a result of the exchange crisis it will appear strange if Lodge and his aides are not convinced that the United States cannot remain isolated as in the pre-war period. If the markets of Europe are closed to the United States even for a brief time, there will be a crash in prices that will hit American trade and industry a heavy blow. The prosperity of the American people is bound up with the prosperity of the old world. If America had promptly and whole-heartedly accepted the treaty as it stands, taking its share of the burdens, the League of Nations might have been able to head off the present serious situation. By a bitter experience Americans are now likely to realize the impossibility of standing outside the league to their own benefit. The exchange crisis demonstrates it cannot be done.

THE R. N. M. P. PASSES.

A few days ago a brief news dispatch from | world. the capital carried the information that the Royal Northwest Mounted Police had been merged with the Dominion Police, disappearing as a separate organization. Thus passes a famous body of men, whose activities, covering a period of close to half a century, played a vital and thrilling part in the history of the country. For years it was the medium, and practically the only one, through which the law was administered and upheld from Lake Superior to the Rocky Mountains, and from the American frontier to the Arctic. These gallant "Riders of the North," as somebody has called them, a few hundred strong, punished the law-breaker and kept the peace in a territory stupendous in area, and crowded with peril, human and natural. No obstacle of nature could shield for long the outlaw, thief or murderer from pursuit and Stories of the courage and bulldog tenacity of the Mounted Police would be taken as fiction but for the cold facts of the records. It has been a common event in the lives of these men to penetrate the sub-arctic wilderness for 2,000 miles in the middle of winter in order to bring evildoers to justice and enforce respect for the authority of the land. They were men, too, of excellent judgment and unquestioned honesty. Their isolation from civilization made It necessary that at times they act with some thing of the authority of judge and court. But never did they abuse this privilege. The lawabiding white man and redskin had nothing to fear from the Mounted Police. For the bad man of whatever color the police meant a fearless and relentless chase, inevitable capture. Early in its career the organization won the reputation of bringing back anybody it went after, and this reputation was a marvelously efficient deterrent to law breaking at a period when this was highly necessary to the successful opening up of the country to settlers. Loyal, vigilant, matchlessly brave were the officers and men of the Mounted Police. With the coming of the railways, telegraphs and rapidly multiplying cities and towns of the northwest they are no longer required in their former capacity, but their record furnishes a vivid, thrilling chapter in this nation's progress that will always make

inspiring reading. VISCOUNT HALDANE AGAIN.

With Parliament opening today at Westminster, an election campaign raging in Paisley and British labor talking again of general strike to enforce nationalization of mines, the political pot is boiling in Great Britain, so that you can g fore it is won? hear it. Labor is feeling its strength, rejoices to see its leaders now all detached from the Coalition Government, and welcomes the accession of powerful Liberals like Viscount Haldane, scholars such as Professor Keynes, and conspicuous men of action like Lord Fisher.

The feeling grows in all quarters that while weak in the number of its parliamentary representatives, Labor is the great and coming party in the country. Joined by Liberals and others dissatisfied with old party lines, Labor is becoming also more than the party of a class. It is the new national party of hope, comparable to the Liberals in 1905 for its optimism and positive program of reform. Premier Ba four had declared to deputations of workers as late as 1905 that nothing more could be done for their distresses, under the supposed' laws of political economy. As Lord Chancellor, from 1912 to 1915, Viscount Haldane brought to bear on his office a vigorous legal learning and one of the most philosophical minds of the time, with democratic leanings. The present lord chancellor is a whipper-snapper compared with him. An interesting phase of his democracy is his concern for education. He has written on university ideals and other educational subjects, has been rector of Edinburgh University and chancellor of Bristol University, and just before the war was sounding the trumpet for a grand educational reconstruction which would have been well under way by now but for the calamity of 1914. The war was a disaster to Haldane in a personal way. His close relations with Germany. his very knowledge of German literature, philosophy and education counted against him, stirring vulgar minds to suspicions of pro-Germanism in him. Doubtless he had thought as well as he could of his German friends and acquaintances, had refused to believe that they meditated an assault on civilization, and yet if one man seriously, quietly and carefully prepared England against all contingencies for years before the war, it was Haldane.

His old solid democratic character shows again in his determination to assist Labor. It is predicted that if a Labor cabinet is formed in the near future. Viscount Haldane will be its! lord chancellor. This great democratic scholarstatesman cannot be long eclipsed from British public life. A personality so rugged and massive as his cannot be hid by either slanderous abuse or party politics.

THE NEED OF A FORWARD MOVEMENT. Is a Forward Movement necessary?

Consider the conditions around us today. The war has left us face to face with critical problems, local, national and world-wide. If all that we can give is in the shape of our material wealth, it must be a gift worthy of the cause that, as Christians, we profess to believe is the greatest cause in the world, and the only salvation and safety of all causes.

That is the challenge of this campaign. Can we refuse it, and remain Christians?

I am coming for some help this time. Could any of the readers supply me with some patches in silks and velvets of all colors, suitable for a crazy quilt? REMOVAL OF STAINS—PRECAUTIONS. A stain on a good garment is a very discouraging thing and is apt to fill the owner with dismay. In all things that we undertake to do there are some general underlying principles, which if mastered, seem to simplify the work. If we are considering the removal of stains of various kinds, such as are common to the experience of most people, some general precautions may help us to avoid failure. With a strong acid, then did the cloth in an alkali, and rinse at once through several waters to rid it thoroughly of the chemicals used. Examples will illustrate: Blood contains protein and the method of removal are as follows: (1) Wash in cold water until the stain turns brown, then warm water, or (2) rub with common soap in cold water to which a teaspoonful of turpentine has been added, or (3) if the goods is thick, apply a paste of raw starch to the stain.



The call, which is signed by Mr. Fred. Cook, president, and Dr. C. A. Hodgetts, honorary secretary, urges upon all home nursing graduates to immediately organize for volunteer service, wherever

ganize for volunteer service wherever they may be Nving. It is urged upon all those qualified, where there are sufficient numbers, to at once organize a brigade work, and to others to notify their local health authorities of their preparedness for voluntery services. preparedness for voluntary service.

Vaushan, health commissioner, said tonight he expected the outbook of the contract. the outbreak to reach its peak in a number of cases about Wednesday. He asserted that the situation was well in hand, presenting no cause for alarm.

The grand total of influenza cases re-ported up to Sunday night, the seventing day of the outbreak, was 3,119, with 170 cases of pneumonia.

Wayne County morgue is filled to its capacity with bodies, and Coroner Parker says if bodies continue coming in like they have in the last two days, extra arrangements for their care will have to be made.

Chatham doctors are expecting the epidemic to strike the Maple City any time now in its march westward. A few cases are already diagnosed as "flu" there. The town and nelghborhood of Essex has an epidemic of scarlet fever along with a number of "flu" cases. Brantford is preparing to use the old postoffice building as an emergency hospital, and Stratford has an 'solation hospital ready for influenza patients.

Dr. Hastings Gives Advice As To First Action To Be Taken.

CHICAGO OPENS FIGHT

Disease in Western City Reported To Be of Milder

Toronto, Jan. 19 .- A renewal of the dread epidemic of influenza in Toronto is predicted by the medical health authorities if reports that Chicago is now nursing 1,200 cases are correct. Dr C. J. Hastings, M. O. H., said this morning that since it is not a reportable disease an increase in the number of cases would not be known until deaths had occurred.

QUARANTINE AGAINST MICHIGAN WILL NOT LIKELY BE ENFORCED

Toronto, Jan. 20 .- Dr. J. W. S. Mc-Cullough this morning, in answer to the question of whether, in view of the outbreak of influenza in Michigan, a quarantine would be established by the Province of Ontario, said influenza, under the act, was not quarantinable. He said it would be practically impossible to close the Michigan frontier. The whole life of the southwestern part of the province would be interrupted

Report of Bacteriolog cal Department of the Guelph Agricultural College

A solution was made of one ounce of Hypozone to five gallons of water. Six milk bottles were used, and before the test was made each bottle contained an average of one million bacteria. Three bottles were immersed in the solution for 21/2 minutes, after which the highest count in any bottle was 50 bacteria. One bottle contained none at all.

The other three bottles were immersed for five minutes, after which the highest count was 20 bacteria. One bottle contained none at all.

Doctor Luney of the Public Health Department of this city is now conducting a series of tests with Hypozone. He made a solution of one part of Hypozone in 150 parts of water, and found that this solution would kill Typhoid germs in 2 minutes. Fuller reports of these tests will be announced later.

Health Commissioner Copeland announced tonight. This was an increase of 494 over the number of cases reported the previous day. Deaths from the disease numbered 30, a decrease of three from yesterday, while 75 persons succumbed to pneumonia. monia.
Since January 1 there have been a total of 8.799 influenza and 3,187 pneumonia cases reported.

In the same period there have been 159 influenza and 1,039 pneumonia deaths.

Dr. Copeland said that today's figures correspond with those of October 6, 1918, of the last epidemic, on which date there were 159 deaths from influenza and pneumonia.



On Thursday a final cargo was placed on the steam drifter Dan O'Connell, but, owing to the stormy weather, the vessel had to remain moored at Kynoch's wharf, supervision of which is confined to watchmen.






