Salary Increases From Several Points of View-Premier Whitney Declares Cost of Living Double What It Was 20 Years Ago-Government Found Work Roster In Awful Mess After Taking Up Reins of Power.

Toronto, March 7.—In the Legislature yesterday, Col. Matheson moved the House into supply with Mr. Little in the chair. The Premier defended the general increase in salaries to officials. The Government had to meet the condition of affairs as found. Nevertheless, Mr. Ross declined to withdraw what he had said as to The Globe culogy. Mr. Ross knew that there was a sort of masonry among journalists. It was a nice thing for The Globe to say what it did. But would a bank go outside for a manager? He did not believe in the doctrine that experts should be set aside.

Mr. Whitney declared that he never said experts should be set aside, but in respect to the control of a department it was not necessary to have an expert. How did it come that the leader of the Opposition had not appointed an engineer or a contractor Minister of Public Works?

Mr. Dunlop said the application was for the land. It would have been quite regular to give the man the timber with the land.

Mr. Gamey: "That's what would happen under the old Government.

Mr. Smith (Soo) thought the price was a good one. Very likely the man wanted to buy the land and got the timber free. That had been done in his constituency. constituency.

Mr. Cochrane promised to make an

investigation of this instance. Mr. Auld referred to applications for land in the Township of Chesley, where large quantities of timber had been secured.

Mr. Cochrane said he heard about the timber and held an investigation with the result that the men were charged \$4.25 a thousand for the tim-

Mr. Auld replied that there men who were prepared to pay \$8 a

Mr. Smith of the Soo said no doubt large quantities of timber were stolen every year in this manner.

Mr. Ross said that while these were small parcels the manner of disposing of them did not agree with the policy of the Government to sell nothing ex-cept by auction or tender.

The Point of View.

The Premier said it all depended on the point of view. These were transactions in land, but the Government discovered there was timber on the land and sent experts out to ascertain how much. The Government then said to the purchasers: "You can have the land, but you will have to pay for the timber on it." Mr. Whitney was able to show where 100 millions of feet of pine timber had been given away by the late Government without anything in return, and if he chose Mr. Ross could have the details. Some of the details were on record, and some of them were left out of the record, but the fact was plain that this amount had been filched from the people and given to men who had declared publicly that they would carry three or four counties for the late Government. Mr. Graham said it did not matter what the old Government had done, the fact was that the present Government had declared against the prac-The Premier said it all depended on

ment had declared against the prac-

tice.

Mr. Clarke (Northumberland) talked a long time in an effort to find an analogy between this deal and the Cap. Sullivan \$9,000 rake-off. He was followed by his namesake from Centre Bruce. Mr. Cochrane's Bill.

He said the Government had deemed it advisable to appoint a deputy minister to take charge of mines and water powers. There would be plenty for the deputy minister of lands and forests to do in opening up the lands adjacent to the T. & N. O. Rall-way and the Grand Trunk Pacific. Hon, Mr. Ross had no objection to the appointment of a deputy minister of mines, although he reminded the Government of its promise to appoint a specting the department of lands, for-

of mines, although he reminded the Government of its promise to appoint a separate minister of mines. Under the old Government there was a director of mines, who gave splendid service to the province. He found in looking over the bill that the deputies were invested with the power of the Minister in case a vacancy should occur, or of the absence of the minister. He questioned if this was not giving the deputies too much power.

ties too much power. Hon. Mr. Cochrane also explained his bill to preserve the forests from destruction by fire. The terms have already been outlined.

Inspection of Loan Companies. The inspection of insurance and loan companies doing business in Ontario by the insurance branch of the Attorney-General's Department came in for warm criticism in the Legislature yesterday during the discussion of the esterday during the discussion of the estimates. There is an item calling for \$9,550 for this work, and Mr. Gamey questioned whether the department charged with this duty had the confidence of the people. Mr. Downey and others took part in the debate, urging Government action towards mending or ending the present state of affairs.

The Attorney-General replied that most of the insurance and loan com-panies had Dominion charters, and few doing business in Ontario came under its jurisdiction. As to what Mr. Gamey had said, it was true that public attention was now directed towards these companies. In view of the stand taken companies. In view of the stand taken at Ottawa re insurance companies, it was a question whether, it was necessary for the province to act, and how much of the cost the province should bear. It would have to go into the supplementary estimates. Whether an investigation should be made and an additional officer added were matters that would be dealt with at an early date. Mr. Foy would welcome communications touching these companies.

Hon Mr. Harcourt suggested that

Hon, Mr. Harcourt suggested that even where Dominion charters had been granted when companies operated in Ontario, the province should have power to deal with them.

Mr. Foy answered that the province had partial rights. He pointed out that there had been no complaint made in a particular case. It would be enorously costly to undertake an investi-

A long batch of private and public bills was introduced in the Legislature at yesterday's sitting. Dairy Inspection.

A joint deputation representing the Eastern and Western Dalrymen's Associations waited on Hon. Mr. Monteith yesterday merning and asked for the appointment of inspectors who shall inspect and supervise Ontario cheese factories, creamerles and dairies. Hon. Mr. Monteith said he would do what he could to forward their request.

Premier Rouvier Defeated on a Motion of Approval

THE

RESIGNATIONS ACCEPTED

Paris, March 8.—Like a bolt from a clear sky the Rouvier Ministry was defeated in the Chamber of Deputies last night and immediately resigned.

last night and immediately resigned.

The Cabinet crisis comes at a most dramatic moment, when the French-German contest has reached a decisive stage, and may exert an important adverse influence on the Algedras conference and European affairs.

The defeat of the Government came on a comparatively minor debate over the church disorders. The Government succeeded in holding only 234 votes, while the various elements in opposition. Clericals, Socialists and Nationaltion, Clericals, Socialists and Nationalists united and policies and Nationalists

ists united and polled 287 votes, thus placing the Ministry in a minority of 33.



HOSPITAL RELICS. Odd Things to Be Seen In a Great

If the reader can imagine the cure of every one of the 5,000,000 to 6,000,000 persons living in London of some ailment or disease he holds in his mind's eye a true picture of the vast work done by Guy's hospital since its founda-tion. The south sea bubble, like many another financial catastrophe, ruined thousands of citizens, but it enabled Thomas Guy, who sold his investments in the stock to the great advantage of other people as well as himself to

Among the many curiosities exhibited in the famous museum at Guy's is a large piece of cardboard bearing the remnants of thirty-five pocketknives, which were swallowed by an American sailor. His name was John Cummings, and he was admitted to the hospital in 1822. A small book, containing also the manuscript of the printed copy, narrates the particulars of this remarkable case, and it may be perused by the privileged visitor to Guy's.

It appears that Cummings during a spree ashore challenged the feats of a conjuror who had made a pretense of swallowing knives. Eucouraged by his drunken comrades, the sailor actually swallowed an opened pocketknife, to the amazement of the conjuror. Feeling no immediate pain, he put five other knives out of sight in the same way. In two years' time he had, in the course of his drunken bouts, shown sufficient bravado to enlarge his internal armory by twenty-nine additional knives. When, after his foolishness had brought him to the hospital and subsequently to his grave, a postmortem examination was made the thirty-five knives were removed from his stomach by the amaz-

ed surgeons. These interesting relics are exhibited among others in the surgical classroom, whither the students return from the dissecting room to correct their impressions. Close by is another interesting object, a glass case containing a num ber of what appear to be illuminated parchments. The grewsome nature of these exhibits grows upon the visitor when he learns that they are simply patches of tattooed human skin preserved in spirits. The inscription upon each enables one to trace the occupation and character of the unfortunate patient from whom it was taken. One was a colored sailor, a native of Africa. On some twelve square inches of his skin is worked an artistic representation of the most brilliant plumaged birds known in the tropics.

Guy's anatomical wax models are said to be the finest in the world. One of these is extremely valuable, the hospital authorities having refused the sum of £5,000 offered for it by a foreign medical celebrity. It is an absolutely perfect model of the upper extremity of the body, showing every muscle, gland, vein, nerve and artery. It took Joseph Towne, a clever demastrator at Guy's, fully two years to make it, but with him in 1879 also died the secret of the process by which the wonderful construction of the human body was reproduced in wax with such marvelous fidelity.-London Standard.

Burma is the land of pagodas. From the summit of every mountain, of every hill or hillock, from above the cliffs and rocks and from among the woods of the islands of the broad Irawadi rise the graceful forms and gilded pinnacles of numberlass pagodas. Often they are crowned by a golden htee or umbrella: Pagodas are rarely temples in the true sense. They are usually solid, tapering buildings placed over real or imitation relics. Close by, among groves of palms and bananas, are generally to be seen the carved and seven storied roofs of the kloungs, or Buddhist monasteries. Gay and light hearted as are the Burmans, they realize another and future existence as vividly as they do the present life, and the teachings of the great Buddha are ever present to their minds and influence them profoundly.

The plant from which the well known perfume patchouli is obtained is a native of India and of China. It is also grown in Ceylon, Paraguay and the French island of Reunion. It first became generally known in Europe about 1850. At that time India shawls commanded immense prices, and dealers were accustomed to identify the gen-uine articles by their odor, as they were perfumed with patchouli. French manufacturers, acting upon this hint, imported the patchouli plant for the purpose of perfuming their imitation India shawls. Afterward perfumers took up the cultivation of the plant on their own account.

Dust For the Poultry House. The dust box ought to stand in the sunshine out of all drafts. Under the front window is a good place. Road dust is excellent. We have found dry sifted coal ashes good. A large shallow box is best. Do not fill it too full so the hens will kick the dust over the floor. In some cases a small quantity of lime is added to the dust, but we do not like it, as it takes the gloss from the feathers. Do not let the dust remain too long. It must not become damp or caked. In freezing weather the dust box should be emptied frequently so as to keep the dust dry.—The Business


