



INTRODUCTORY.

The desire of the Y. M. C. A. is to lend a helping hand in this great work, and accordingly there has been organized in connection with many of the principal associations a "Boy's Branch."

The form of organization and method of working differs in almost every Association, but all are united in making the salvation of the Boys to be the great end ever to be kept in view.

The Boy's work in connection with our Association was commenced in the month of May, 1873, and at the Annual Meeting held in October of the same year, a Boy's Committee was added to the list of regular committees. The first Chairman was Mr. (now Rev.) Dyson Hague. The chairmanship was assigned to different persons each year until 1879 when Mr. Charles (more familiarly known to the boys as Charlie) Edwards, took charge and was retained in office until his departure for New York in 1882. Under his direction the work was well sustained, and his departure was regretted by all, The work is now under the charge of Mr. J. J. Findlay, and is progressing as favorably as could well be expected. We hope that in the proposed alterations iu our building the claims of the Boy's Branch will not be be forgotten.
