PREMIER BORDEN

After his usual manner, Mr. Borden is handling matters as wa in a calm and common sense. He is not a man who is stampeded, and the angry and ranting Laurierites are commended to realize that they are up against a Gibraltar.

Outside of his own Province the legal profession, it took time for the people of Canada to realize the commanding abilities of the man. For years he enjoyed one of the most lucrative law practices in Dominion, and he gave up yearly income when his friends admirers persuaded him to enter the public service.

Once in the Commons he became a commanding figure in the eyes of the nation. He is a courteous, yet firm, and his boldness and outspokenness are conceded political opponents just as heartily by his supporters.

On two important occasions, a few months ago, he showed splendid calibre and must be at the basis of true manhood.

The first was when on an election tour out West, he told deputations that it is by the espousal of Reciprocity he could attain of he would absolutely refuse.

Western likes plain talk, and Borden's clear stand, challenged approval of even those clamoring of the treaty.

The second great episode took in the Old Land, when the Premier frankly told the authorities there that what she intended was to maintain her status as a nation within the Empire, and to rank as a co-partner in the greatest Empire established in the world has ever seen.

John Bull also likes frankness, with him likewise the unequivocal language of Mr. Borden took well. Under the guidance of the Premier, the Conservative party avoided the issue, and then triumphed in most signal manner over the Liberal scheme (so admitted by him) to make Canada "an appendage of the United States."

It is equally certain that public opinion is just as strongly in the background of the Government plan regarding the British navy, and that the measure will be put through.

And through all the turmoil, Borden remains cool and sure, the complete master of the situation.

THE GRAND RIVER QUESTION The Galt Reporter continues to urge Government action in connection with the Grand River. In a recent article it said in part—

"It is but a truth to say that the Grand is in a class by itself because of the territory it traverses—the most important industrial section in Ontario. It has been made what it is, a stagnant stream in summer and a torrential river in the spring, by the methods employed to make the most of the drainage legislation of the Legislature. Under present conditions it is impossible to provide in Galt, Paris and Brantford, especially in this town, a safe outlet for the annual discharge. Here the river runs through the heart of the town flanked for a distance of a mile by large stone buildings, the levels of which were adapted to the needs of the day.

The Toronto Globe makes formal announcement on behalf of the Liberal party:

"It is understood that an interim supply bill sufficient to carry on all the ordinary business of government, pay salaries of civil servants, etc., will be passed without objection. This will enable the Government to carry on the administration at least until the end of May, and give time for the passing of a redistribution bill and the holding of an election if Premier Borden so decides."

As to that, there won't be any early election, and the Conservatives at Ottawa will pass a closure bill such as Gladstone, when head of a Liberal Government, put through in the British House. Such a rule would make the closing of any discussion possible at any time if the chair deems that the minority have had a fair show in any debate.

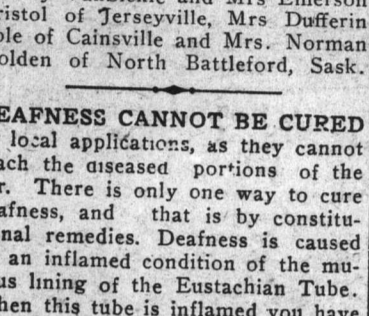

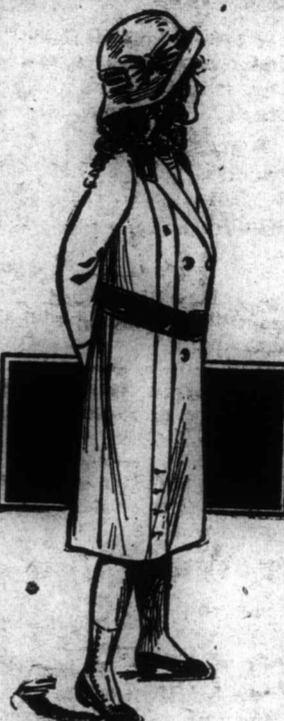

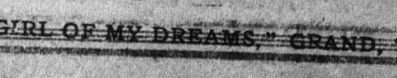

VANITY is a vice, or perhaps I should say a failing, that shows itself in a great many ways. Sometimes it appears frankly in its own proper form, and then again it puts on some more successful disguise. False humility is one of these disguises; jealousy is sometimes another. Self-consciousness is another. But the disguise I want to speak about to-day is an unwillingness to appear in any part in which one cannot hold the centre of the stage.

Perhaps I should hardly call it a disguise, at all, because to the eye that understands it is such a palpable form of vanity.

A friend of mine was at a summer resort last year where tennis was the favorite game. Every one played, and especially the double game. My friend played a fair beginner's game, and was promising herself a good deal of pleasure playing doubles during the week her fiance should be with her. She knew he had not played much, but a good many of the players were beginners, and she felt sure he would pick it up easily. When her fiance came, he played one game and then refused to play again. Not because he didn't like it or wasn't progressing well, but simply because he couldn't at once play so well as the crack players.

He couldn't bear to be surpassed, even by men who had been playing for years, and so he refused to enter the lists at all.

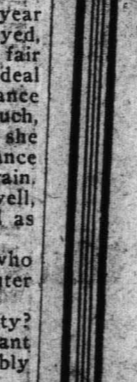
Can you beat that for absurd and childish vanity? And yet I don't doubt that he would be most indignant if anyone accused him of vanity. He would probably regard his act as a proof of humility.

Incidentally this man is an expert swimmer. He has spent years perfecting himself in this sport, and could easily outswim any of the men who outplayed him at tennis. One might think that he would have contented him, and that he would have been willing to show play unless he can have his way all the time.

I hope few of us are so childishly vain as this, but I know that many of us have some touch of this weakness.

We hate beginnings, we are loath to try to acquire skill in any new direction. If we have a talent in any one line we are apt to cultivate that exclusively and let our other gifts grow narrow in other ways. We want to be always complacently doing that which we do best, and we don't want to be hard on ourselves.

All this is not good for the soul; we need to do the thing that comes hard; we need to rub up against men and women who know more than we do. We need to join in the sports in which we are surpassed. Only so can we grow, and only so can we keep a proper idea of our relative unimportance.

By HOWARD L. RANN

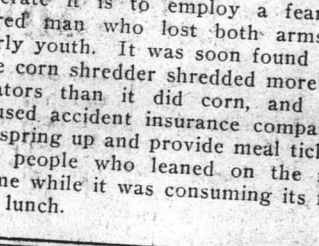

LOVE MUST GO TO THE GALLOWES

Sentenced to be Hanged on Tuesday May 27 for Murder of Wife.

QWEN SOUND, March 24—Judge Lennox Saturday morning passed the sentence of death on Charles Henry Love for the murder of his wife on Tuesday, May 27.

Shortly after 10 o'clock Love was brought from his cell to the prisoners' dock. He was haggard and worn, and deep lines had appeared over night on his face, but his bearing was cool and collected. Only the involuntary twitching of the hand that rested on the rail of the dock when he stood up indicated the breaking down of the nerve that he had displayed throughout the case.

"Have you anything to say to the sentence of the court passed upon you for the crime of which you stand convicted?" asked the court.

The prisoner looked at the floor and remained silent. He looked up and stared the judge in the eye quite steadily, and Judge Lennox continued: "I am pleased in the way that you have decided not to say anything now. It would probably come better after you have had time to think over and realize the position in which you are placed.

"The sentence of this court is that you will be taken back from here to the common jail of the County of Grey, there to remain until the 27th day of May next, and you will then be hanged by the neck until you are dead. God have mercy on your soul!"

The prisoner then passed out in charge of two guards. With him went Rev. H. S. Mallowney, the Baptist minister, who has been a frequent visitor to Love.

Love passed a very restless night. He lay down on his cot repeatedly and arose and strode around his cell, talking to the guards almost continually.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District, Entry by proxy may be made if the agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain a pre-emption right, may purchase a homestead in certain districts at a price of \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to clear homesteaded portion), and cultivate 50 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain a pre-emption right, may purchase a homestead in certain districts at a price of \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon in each of three years, cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
