Germans Ask Armistice to Bury Dead.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] BRUSSELS, Aug. 8.-Via London, 6 a.m.—The war office has issued an official statement saying that 125,-000 Germans participated in the assault on the forts at Liege, but that they completely faied to make any impression on the fortifications. Three army corps engaged in the attack were cut up and rendered useless it is declared. "For many days," read the statement, "our little army by tenacity and courage rendered very valuable service to the French army which for some days under forced marches has been hurrying to our assistance and now occupies a considerable portion of our territory.

"Hundreds of German priso have been captured. These are chiefly eavalrymen. The spirit of the German soldier lacks enthusiasm. They appear to be fighting lethargically, while their endeavor to pass themselves

WIPED THEM OUT LONDON, Aug. 8.—5 a.m.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Brussels says that a division of German cavalry which had succeeding in fording the Meuse to the north of Liege, was surprised and practically annihilated by Belgian cavalry and infantry, supported by a battery of light artillery. The German rout was complete. Seven German regiments surrendered.

FRENCH ARE AT IT LONDON, Aug. &-7 a.m-According to late despatches this morning quite an important engagement between French and Germans occurred in Belgian Luxemburg. The Etoile Belge of Brussels learns from an official source that no decision has been reached on the question of an arm-

THANKED POINCAIRE BRUSSELS, Aug. 8 .- (via Paris)-King Albert appealed to France for aid in repulsing the Germans, according to the Exchange Telegraph Company. The King in a message to President Poincare, thanked him for his promptness in responding to the Belgian appeal.

President Poincaires responded that the French troops were proud to secconferred the Cross of the Legion of Honor on the city of Liege.

STILL HOLD OUT .PARIS, Aug. 8.—It is officially an nounced that the forts at Liege continue holding out. The Germans who entered the city evacuated Friday before the arrival of the Belgian division, which had come to the erescue. Action of the Daughters of the The evacuation was without military significance as the forts command the routes and railroads. The withdrawal of the Germans, however, was an unquestional moral defeat.

ENGLISH REACH FRANCE PARIS, Aug. 8.-It is officially announced to-day that English troops under under the direction of French officers are disembarking on French soil, The point of disembarkation is not revealed. The disembarkation was made under the direction of French officers who spoke English fluently and was witnessed by a crowd that cheered the Englishmen.

Germany's first move toward the invasion of France was the seizure of the Luxemburg railway lines by German troops. The hypsion of Luxemburg is a course of action in which all the ordinary conventions of international conduct were to be swept aside. The neutrality of Luxemburg was guaranteed by the Treaty of London, signed in 1867. Possession of Luxemburg gives Germany opportunity to strike at France on her own border, or to move quickly toward Brussels. In selzing the Grand Duchy therefore, Emperor William has improved his strategic position in that there is no bar to his movement toward France directly on the west or on England and France together, through Belgium

Altogether there will be twenty-five thousand men mobilized at Quebes, and of these twenty-one thousand will be sent across the Atlantic as soon as word comes from the Imperial Gov-ernment. Problem of Pay and Pension, One of the problems which has met the recruiting officers, and which has been referred to Ottawa for consideration is that of pay, pension, insurance and the care of the families dependent upon those who go to the

war. Active service pay will apply as soon as the troops are under arms. For privates it is one dollar per day, There is now a pension act upon the books and there is no question but that pensions will be granted to the families of those who are killed and to those who are incapacitated, and that there will be some form of remuneration to compensate for wounds received. There will probably be special legislation in this respect when parliament meets.

Probably Insurance Provision. It is understood that there will also be some action taken in regard to in-surance. At the time of the South African war, Lord Strathcona became personally responsible for the insuring of one of the contingents. The stipulation in regard to death in war, which appears in the ordinary policies, was waived by many of the insurance companies

All Offers Accepted. The offers received from New Brunswick Manitoba, Calgary, and from Mr. Hamilton Gault, the Montreal millionaire, to raise and equip supplementary regiments at their own expense, as well as all other proffers of assistance from public or private sources, have all been accepted. Any additional regiments that are raised by such means will be supplementary to the main force of 21,000 men to be raised by the Federal au-

It is expected that the transport ing of the troops to Quebec will be carried through without a hitch, and within two or three days after the enrollment lists are approved next week by headquarters here. 

British Cruisers Watch For German Raiders

The adventures of the Kronprinzessin Cecile, which saved its \$10,000,000 in gold and its own skin by putting into Bar Harbor on the Maine coast, gives a clue to the whereabouts of the warships of the warring powers which are off the Atlantic Coast.

Captain Pollack of the Cecile says he just escaped capture by the British cruiser Essex and the French cruiser Friant while dodging his way up the coast in a dense for

coast in a dense fog.

The details have been given of the three third-class German cruisers Karlsruhe, Strasburg and Dresden, which were known to have left the West Indies and were supposed to be in the North Atlantic. It will be remembered each had a speed of 27 knots and carried 12 four-inch gums.

Since Germany has no coaling station in the North Atlantic, the activity of these cruisers will be limited unless they can secure coal from such sources as the Kronprinz Wilhelm, which left New York Monday on a mysterious mission. In North Atlantic waters Great Britain has four first-class armored cruisers and one third-class cruiser. The big warships are part of the cruiser squadron which was stationed in the West Indies a year ago. According to Washington advices, the Lancaster was last heard of from off Tampico, in company with the Essex, while the Berwick, the Suffolk and the Bristol had left for an unknown destination.

Strength and interest of quiet lives in the New England of three-quarters of a century ago provide the frameworkhuman beings, living and loving in a world of their own that is a miniature picture of the greater world outside, are also there.

The story is a cross-section of life as seen and described by a woman who has been well called "America's greatest living woman novelist."







Conditions are no better in St. Louis, where Schwab, after a study made among 7,000 garment workers, found that 25 to 30 per cent suffer from aeurasthenia. According to his view the nerve weakness is due largely to overfatigue, speeding up on piecework during the rush season, and the lack of work during the prolonged slack season and the worry incident thereto.

In the same city the Jewish Alliance Exchange found that a very large majority of demands upon the society for relief were due to sickness, and whether the sickness was the cause of lack of employment or not, the two conditions were so intimately related that permanent cure was not thought possible without adjusting the employment at living wage.

When a substantial part of any community is working on a level much below a hygienic minimum there will be an increasing demand upon the charity organization, especially on account of sickness.







Bible Says World Needs Strong Monarchy.

The Pastor began with the declaration that the only proper content-ment is that which is combined with godliness and which sees from the standpoint of Scripture the Divine Power able to correct the difficulties which assail mankind. > Next was shown that this class seem to forget also that human justice has been the same for several thousand years past, and that Divine Wisdom has not yet seen fit to estab lish Divine Justice amongs, men. If they think that this is neglect on the part of the Almighty which they are wise enough to rectify, their thought is evidently an erroneous one. If, on to contrary, they believe that the time for the establishment of justice has now come, they should be able to find a Divine revelation to this effect and point it out to us—one practically authorizing them to take their stand for Socialism, and explaining that the due time for the prosperity of justice has now come, and telling how they shall proceed and what will be the outcome.

> The Pastor then discussed the world from the Bible standpoint. According to the Word of God, the world is not properly ready for its own control under any form of government. It is a rebellious province in the Divine Empire-one in which sin, selfishness and death constitute the ruling elements. The Bible de-clares that what the world needs is a monarchy — a strong, centralized government, in which the masses must not be allowed to have a voice at all, because in their fallen condi tion they do not know what is for heir own highest good.

Furthermore, the Bible tells us that present institutions, under the power of selfishness driving the wealthy in one direction and the masses in the opposite direction, are about to bring a universal crashanarchy. This and atheistic Socialism and Christian Socialism, and in a larger sense general selfishness and discontent, are urging on the two great combatants, both of whom will fall in the struggle, never to rise again. However, according to Scripture, they will be succeeded by the Kingdom of God's dear Son. That strong Government, that The-

ocracy to which every knee must how and every tongue confess, to the glory of God, is the Kingdom that the

which material emancipation will but render more apparent. But for Christianity, as toe often now, to profess desire to free men from spiritual bondage, while repudiating any call or need to strike fearless blows at their material prison bars, is to lay itself open to justifiable charges of hypoerisy. This must yield to braver counsels, though the striving be unto blood against the sin of slavery which still defles modern industrialism.

"With widest meaning, then—inclusive of all that the most ardent and uncompromising Socialist lover

and uncompromising Socialist lover of liberty has demanded, and em-bracing besides all that the Christian means when he proclaims the story of spiritual freedom, Christianity must now take up the challenge and cry with world-wide voice and a mighty thunder — 'Amen! even so; unite, ye workers; you have but your chains to lose, and you have a world

It was then pointed out that the writer of this extract and all who writer of this extract and all who sympathize with his views should be willing to concede that if now is the proper time to get Labor out of "the slavery of modern industrialism," then surely God is as much interested in that release as they or any others could possibly be—yea, and more so. If, then, this Christian minister and others have received some special commission authorizing them to preach a new Gospel or a new addipreach a new Gospel or a new addi-tion to the old Gospel, they should produce the proofs of this authorizaon. Until we see the proofs we must doubt their existence.

Next the Pastor showed that, on the contrary, the Scriptures declare that there is but one Hope set before us in the Gospel, even as there "is but one Lord, one Faith and one Baptism." No one will ever succeed in making the world happy by preaching the Gospel of Discontent. Labor to-day is a hundredfold better fed better clothed and better housed than in the days of our forefathers and, it is safe to say, a hundredfold more discontented. And the author of the above extract, with doubtless the very best intentions, is really doing harm by his gospel of Socialism; for he has neglected to consult the Word of God on this important sub-

ject. Our Dord, it was pointed out, was prow, poverty, etc., so that He could properly declare, "The poor ye have with you always." The Apostles were similarly situated. Yet have we any evidence whatever that any of these attempted to "break the chains of the slavery of Labor?" Assuredly

Many instances were cited from the life of Jesus, as recorded in the Gospels, to demonstrate that He did not set an example for these well-meaning but mistaken Christians. While the Master went about doing good and healing many sick folk. He by no means healed all the sick or comforted all that mourned. His favors were specialized; for instance, take the case of the impotent man at the Pool of Bethesda. The record is that "there were multitudes of impotent folk there:" But only one was miraculously healed by our Lord.

Again, many widows were bereft of their sons; but only the widow of Nain had her son restored to her by the all-powerful word of our Redee er. Our Lord came into the world not to heal the sick, but to die for the race of Adam. The great work, the important work, of healing all the sick-the mentally, morally and physically sick — and of awakening all the dead, He left until the establishment of His Kingdom.

It was then pointed out that Christians likewise may do good to all men as they have opportunity, but that they must likewise wait for God's time and manner for the general healing of the world's sorrows and woes. When the prayer which our Master taught His disciples to pray, "Thy Kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth, as it is done in Heaven," shall have had fulfilment, then all the blessing, all the helpfulness, necessary to the full recovery of our race will be brought into operation. Meantime, it is not possible for any man or for any set of men, Christians or otherwise, either to improve upon God's great Plan of the Ages or to hasten that Plan.

Frequently reference is made to the fact that at its beginning the early Church established a communistic society. The Pastor demonstrated that this was not a worldly organization nor was it made by those who recognized worldly principles, but that it was merely a social arrange-ment whereby the Church at Jerusalem sought to deal with its members as one family. The project was not successful; it did not persist; it did not have Apostolic commendation to other ecclesias. The conclusion therefore, is that the arrangement was Divinely permitted in order to show the Lord's people throughout this Gospel Age the impracticability of such an arrangement at the pres-

ent time.

Then the Pastor turned from the false conceptions of the Dark Ages to the Gospel presented by our Lord and His Apostles. The Truth is so much more reasonable, so much more just, loving and wise, he declared, that whoever hears it experiences a satisfaction which error can never produce. He declared that the Scriptures clearly teach that ours is a convict race, condemned to death because of Father Adam's disobedience; for as his children we have inherited a share in his death sentence—not

their Creator and be recovered from sin and death conditions, has made a provision for them. Our Lord Jesus by His death has purchased the lives and liberties of Adam and

It was next shown why the Mes sianic Kingdom was not set up im-nediately after our Lord's ascension. Scriptures were cited to demonstrate that before the Kingdom is established amongst men the Kingdom class must first be found—the Little Flock, to whom it is the Father's good pleasure to give the Kingdom, as Jesus declared. This class is to be composed of the saintly few who form positive characters for right-eousness by faithfully following in the footsteps of their Redeemer. the footsteps of their Redeemer. The Kingdom will not be established until this class is completed-very

soon, the speaker believes. In conclusion, the Pastor called attention to the prophecy which de-clares that the desire of all peoples shall come, and expressed his belief that all the world would desire the coming of the glorious Messianic Kingdom if they only knew about it. All ministers of God should hold up before the people the glorious Gos-pel of Christ. This will bring joy and peace to all hearts, notwithstanding the incidental trials, difficulties and weaknesses of this present time of distress. Socialism, he believes, stirs up the minds of men to dissatisfaction, worry, fear, strife and is leading them on into the great time of an-archistic trouble. The Gospel Message, on the contrary, is helpful, comforting, sustaining.

So then, the work of Christian ministers, as Divinely appointed, is to let the world alone to be dealt with in God's due time, and to comfort, sustain and instruct merely those whom they find to have the hearing ear of faith. These are to know the Truth, and the Truth will make them free from error and superstition, and also bring them to the place of full consecration to God—sanctification. Such are to be informed respecting the Kingdom of which they are invited to become members, by becoming members of the Body of Christ through faith, consecration

and obedience unto death. The Pastor believes that Socialism will be the Divine arrangement amongst men in the ages following the Messianic Age during which the race will be lifted to perfection by the great King of Glory. Then Socialism will be a grand success; for all unworthy of life will have been cut off in the Second Death.

has borne no fruit since she rejected Christ, the time is coming when "Israel shall blossom and bud and fill the face of the world with fruit" (Isa. xxvii, 6). He came to Jerusalem and went Into the temple and began to cleanse it, as He had done at the beginning of His ministry (John ii, 13-17). Jerusalem was the national center, and the temple was the spiritual center, as the heart is the vital center of our being, and true cleansing must be from the center outward. His thoughts and ways are so far above ours that in our low and unworthy way of looking at things we cannot seem to welcome Him as we should. In the morning as they returned to the city the disciples marveled to see the fig tree withered away. Then came His great word about a mountain be ing removed if we only had faith (verse 23; Matt. xxi, 21). Compare Matt. xvii. 20. Notice His "Have faith in God" and the "Have faith and foubt not" of Matthew and His "Whatsoever he saith" and "What things soever ye desire" of lesson verses 23, 24.

WHITE WOMEN RAMONG DREADED YELLOW BRIGANDS

Wife of American Missionary in China Writes of Thrilling Adventure.

BANDITS PLUNDERED HOME AND BURNED IT

Party Took Refuge in Large Wood and Was Rescued by a Young

(Special Dispatch.)

LONDON, August 8. N a letter published in the North China Hereid, Mrs. Christie, wife of an American missionary at Minchow, tells of an adventure of mission women with the dreaded White Wolf bandits, who captured the town of Minchow and sacked it. "We women folk," says Mrs. Christie, went upstairs and watched from the bedroom windows. Our horses were taken-

three in all-and we believed all was over. but the brigands came again demanding watches, stockings, &c. We gave them what they wanted, but they soon came back. A young evangelist rushed upstairs and put us three ladies in a closet and we waited. The young native women ran away. This enraged the brigands and six times Mr. Christie had a gun at his breast, with the trigger ready to snap if he did

"Mr. Christie then rushed upstairs and said we had better try to escape. taking little Hazel out of bed-she had gone to sleep-also taking four pieces of bedding with us, we jumped over a low wall out of the compound (enclosure). We did not wait to take one cash (small) coin) or a bite of bread. It was a case

of 'flee for your lives.' "We waited a little and prayed and consulted what would be best to do. We found our faithful coolie outside the wall, trembling with fear, having been threatened with death if he did not produce his wife, a pretty girl of seventeen years. Two of our evangelists came along and said we could escape by the north gate, and so we started out. This was the last I saw of our home. As I now write, our house is in ashes and all our household stuff, great and small, plundered and burned.

"We returned to the city last evening, having been chased from one place to another for three days. We walked on to a large wood. At dark they came again, and we heard shots near us. Most of us thought the hour for our death had come and the suspense was terrible.

"A young man crept up to us in the dark and told us he could escort us to a place of safety, so we got together and crawled down the hill. Our party now consisted of the guide, Miss Hanpberg, and Miss McKinnon, the wife of an evangelist, and two children, the cook and his wife, ourselves and little Hazel. After getting down the hill we got safely to a lonely

"Miss McKinnon became so ill and weak that she had to be carried. We travhut at night, going up to the mountain all day. When Miss McKinnon got stronger we returned to the city, walking all
