EXPERIMENTAL STATION'S EXHIBIT

(Yarmouth Post)
The experimental station at Kentville, which is in charge of Prof. W. S. Blair, is occupying one of the most attractive booths in the building. The exhibit is in charge of R. D. L. Bligh. Its object is to draw attention to the work being done at this and other experimental stations of the Experimental Farm Division. One of the main features it is trying to place before the farmers is the value of lime stone in producing a good crop of clover. Attention is also drawn to the value of saving seed grain from smut which can be controlled by treating the seed with a solution of formalin and water. Special attention in the live stock line is directed to keeping more sheep on the farm. Demonstration charts showing the importance of weighing the milk to detect the best cows in the herd are shown, and photos showing the different phases of farm work are in themselves an education. The Franconia was a vessel of 18,160 tons gross, and was built in 1910.

**SPIRIT OF THE GERMAN
SOLDIER BREAKING
SAYS SIR SAM HUGHES**

(Halifax Chronicle, Oct. 6th)

Sir Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia and Defence, arrived at Halifax from England yesterday afternoon and proceeded immediately to Ottawa. Sir Sam was absent for nearly three months. The newly created Lieutenant-General appeared to be in excellent health, although somewhat less jaunty than usual. He disembarked at the King's Wharf at five o'clock and was received by a guard of honor from the 63rd Regiment under command of Captain Steepe. Sir Sam, accompanied by his aides, Colonel Murphy and Major John Bassett, his secretaries and orderlies, motored immediately to North Street Station, where he entrained for Ottawa on a special train.

Arriving by the same boat were Premier Hearst, of Ontario, and party, who had apartments at the Queen Hotel; Sir William MacKenzie, and Mr. D. B. Hanna, of the Canadian Northern Railway, who have been in England for nine weeks. The latter two gentlemen accompanied the Minister of Militia on the western journey.

A large number of invalided officers and men also arrived here, but the majority will not disembark until this morning.

The War Minister refused to be interviewed when approached by a reporter of The Morning Chronicle, as to his future plans and intentions, but before leaving for Ottawa he handed out the following statement:

"I am not a prophet but I can say that the spirit of the German soldier is being broken. The British alone have captured, since the 1st of July, upwards of 30,000 prisoners with much war material. One officer told me that within a small compass—a few hundred yards of trenches—upwards of two thousand German dead, and several hundred wounded, unable to escape, covered the ground. Another example: one regiment of Germans, which was wiped out by the Canadians the other day, had been formed only two weeks previously from remnants of ten crack German regiments; and yet they disappeared."

"This war will be won by pounding, and it is a long road to Berlin. The German people, however, are becoming very restless. I believe before very many months a rebellion must break out against Kaiserism throughout the length and breadth of the German Empire."

"The urgent reforms in England particularly which I had planned last spring, and which were held in abeyance on my return to Canada at that time, have been carried out. Owing to the great growth in the service, the prolongation of the war and the desire for practical system important changes have been effected, with much saving in cost."

"In addition to the reforms referred to, the chief are those relating to the securing of more rest for our troops at the front, and at the same time to effect improvements in the training."

"Also with regard to the question of training, the result has been a greater co-ordination of the various departments of training between Canada and England and England and the front. I have had many conferences with the War Office; the Secretary of State for War, the Right Hon. David Lloyd George, Sir William Robertson, General Whigham and other leading War Office officers together with the Commander-in-Chief, Sir Douglas Haig, and our own Corps, Divisional and Brigade Commanders at the front."

"Britain is stronger on the sea now than at the beginning of the war. The Kaiser's

submarines may reach British waters and do some slight damage, but they seldom return home. Her Zeppelins have proven to be vulnerable. I myself have seen two of them brought down. At the front, we have the mastery in artillery; we have always had it in manhood. The result is that foot by foot, mile by mile, the Allied bulldog pluck and doggedness have proven too much for the famous German Imperial Guards. I have been over mile on mile of German fortifications surpassing in strength any fortress we constructed. Today, however, the Allies have to face breech loading rifles, bombs machine guns, and all classes of artillery firing high explosives; yet everything goes down before the onrush of the soldiers of Britain, of France, of Canada, of Australia, New Zealand and South Africa and Newfoundland, in fact of all the Allies. I have seen German dugouts thirty and forty feet deep, each capable of holding hundreds of men; yet these have been taken for miles upon miles. Such heroism and manhood have never been experienced. Nothing can keep our boys from the firing line. The full story of gallant deeds and the success of the Canadians on the Somme will be made public in detail in due time but they stand out, as the Right Hon. David Lloyd George and all under him state, as second to none and rivalled only by the historic British Guards."

The men at the front expect much from the people of Canada. They are giving up their lives and those at home must live up to the noble ideal set them by the gallant Canadian lads who are fighting for right on the soil of France. Canada must in the future, therefore, as in the past continue to do her duty."

**THE "KULTURE" GERMS
OF THE GERMANS**

Perhaps the most horrible of the many crimes laid to Germany's door is that of deliberately spreading infectious and deadly diseases among the prisoners of the Allies who have fallen into her hands. That German doctors have inoculated thousands of French prisoners with the germs of tuberculosis is the charge made by Mme Karen French military medical note, in a communication handed out to the press of the United States. It is said that the French censor would not permit the facts to be known because of the infuriating effect it would have upon the French populace, but that he consented to the dissemination of the news in the United States. Mme Branson's statement was published in the New York Times and was followed by a statement by Gertrude Atherton, who has visited the Western battle front, and who asserts that the matter was common talk among French military and medical authorities months ago.

Horrible and unprecedented as is the crime, there is no particular reason for doubting that Germany committed it. Her soldiers have murdered men, ravished women and butchered children in Belgium and in

France. They have

poisoned wells in South Africa,

the crowning act of horror to

the soldier's mind; they have

slaughtered neutrals on the

high seas. They executed Irish

soldiers because they refused to

follow Casement. Why should

they not poison and inoculate

other prisoners? It is no new de-

parture of their campaign since

the beginning of this war; it is

merely going in for frightfulness and devilishness on a

wholesome scale. According to

Mme. Branson, Germany inocu-

lates prisoners with tubercu-

losis, not only to kill them, but

in order that they may infect

their own countrymen, for when

they have advanced to the last

stages of the disease they are

sent home to die, and as Ger-

many hopes to spread the dis-

ease among others before they

succumb.

HE REDEEMED HIS GOOD NAME

A British officer, Lieut. Colonel Elkinton, was dismissed from the service because of flagrant violation of orders. Feeling keenly the disgrace he determined to regain if possible his place and rank, and he has done so. He joined the Foreign Legion of France, as a private and by gallant service won first the Croix de Guerre, then the Medaille Militaire. The facts being brought to the attention of the British Officers, he has been restored to his previous rank in the army. "His story is such as we read of in romance. 

LESSARD PRAISES THE HIGHLAND BRIGADE

Canada's Foremost Soldier Says

They Are a Splendid Body of Men

(Morning Chronicle)

Major General Lessard, C. B., Inspector General of the Canadian Forces, arrived at Aldershot last night, where he had been inspecting the Highland Brigade. Seen at the Halifax Hotel last evening by a reporter General Lessard spoke very highly of the brigade, strongly commanding the Nova Scotians for their general appearance and efficiency.

"A splendid body of men in every respect," said the General One or two of the battalions are above the average in General Lessard's opinion, and the unit of men of which to be material throughout the whole brigade was a quality to insure success when they finish their training for the front.

Although he did not want to make any invidious comparisons, General Lessard did, however, speak of the 85th as representative of the Nova Scotia Brigade, as a battalion exceedingly efficient and setting a high standard. This same standard will be attained by the whole brigade.

General Lessard is admitted to be Canada's foremost professional soldier. He has made a life study of the art of war, and served with great credit and high distinction during the South African campaign. Recently it has been reported that General Lessard was about to retire. Asked last night by The Morning Chronicle reporter if that report was true, General Lessard said: "I have not yet retired, but I have advised the Government that when they wish to dispense with my services I am ready to retire." Further than that General Lessard said that he was in no position to discuss the matter.

Referring to the present serious condition of recruiting, and the prosecution of the war generally by the Canadian Government, General Lessard was asked, "Do you think that we should have registration—would it help?"

"My opinion is," replied General Lessard, "that it would be a good thing. It would protect industries, and send to the front men who are free to go."

"What is it you hear about territorial organization?" asked the reporter.

"Personally," said General Lessard, "I am sorry to see splendid service rendered by units or by different battalions lost to their Counties, because by being indiscriminately broken up their identity is lost, therefore, reacting on the Counties in which they were raised, with the result of lack of enthusiasm in recruiting therefrom."

"As to the Province of Quebec I believe," said General Lessard, "that eighty or ninety per cent, would be willing to have registration. I believe that there would be a general enlistment in that Province if helped along by some such method."

BRITISH CAPTURED LARGE NUMBER OF GUNS

London, Oct. 6.—The British official communication, issued at midnight, says:

"There is little to report from the battlefield, except of the enemy shelling Gueudcourt and its neighborhood and of the enemy counter attacks in the Thiepval area, which we severely handled and repulsed."

"Between July 1 and September 30, besides large quantities of other war material, we captured from the Somme battlefield 29 heavy guns and heavy howitzers, 92 field guns and field howitzers, 103 trench artillery pieces and 397 machine guns."

CANADIAN FARMS FOR SOLDIERS

1000 To Be Set Aside For Use After War

One thousand farms will be set aside in Western Canada by the Canadian Pacific Railways for the use of soldiers disbanded after the European war, according to an announcement made today by Lord Shaughnessy. The farms will be ready for occupation in the spring of next year. They will be grouped in colonies, with appropriate military names. A general instruction farm, under a competent agriculturist, is part of the scheme.

The general principle of preparation will be similar to Lord Shaughnessy's previous schemes of ready made farms, which has been adopted in Australia and New Zealand and has been recommended by Mr. Elwood Mead for the settlement of areas rechristened in the Western United States.
