"(4) To devise and apply ways and means so that the full duty of Canada be generously performed toward our returned soldiers and their dependents, the wealth of Canada compelled to contribute its just and proper share of our burdens; and the mass of the people efficiently safeguarded from the greed of the war profiteers."

This spring he sheared an average of eight pounds of wool from his ewes and he had a amb crop that averaged 15-6 lambs Wool sold for 60c that is per ewe each ewe gave a wool crop valued at \$4.80 Lambs are easily worth \$10 piece this fall, that is equivalent to \$18.30 from each ewe for lambs thus he received a total of \$23.10 from each ewe for wool and lambs. 




