



The Evening Chit-Chat

Despite the cry of hard times, which we are hearing on every side, a dressmaker declared the other day that never in all her life had she so much work as this season. When asked why that was, she answered: "I think it is because people have to have so many gowns now-a-days. They want something different for every separate occasion."

Then she went on to explain that the time had passed when a woman of moderate means in possession of two or three inexpensive house gowns, an afternoon dress, a tailored suit and an evening gown had reason to think that her wardrobe was competent for every occasion. This is the age of differentiation in clothes. Every year fashion narrows down the number of functions at which any particular gown can be worn. For instance, a few years ago a young woman in moderate circumstances was satisfied if she had a stylish and attractive evening gown, and considered herself prepared for any evening function. To-day she must have at least two: one reception gown with long train, and one shorter dress for a dancing frock.

Again, the middle class woman's afternoon gown of a few years ago did service for home wear, for any afternoon function, for church and for the less dressy evening function. To-day this dress has been subdivided into at least two frocks. One is called a house gown and is supposed to be worn at home, or to very informal gatherings. The other is a much more elaborate affair and is worn to teas, afternoon receptions, concerts, bridges, etc.

Mind you, clothes differentiation

such as this is not simply for the wealthy. If I were to try to chronicle the occasions for which the real society woman must have separate frocks, I should use the rest of this column. But the frocks I have mentioned must be in the wardrobe of the distinctly middle-class woman. If she wants to be properly dressed at the functions which middle-class society offers to her.

Do you remember your mother's dress of twenty years ago? Do you remember the innumerable occasions for which it did duty—the church supper, the high school graduation, the afternoon tea, the ladies' aid social, the concert, the formal call, the woman's club meeting? Again I could fill this column if I were to chronicle the occasions for which that gown was considered perfectly proper. Compare that with to-day, and then prophesy what we shall have twenty years from to-day—if you dare.

While I am on this subject, I can't forbear to pass on to you a method which the dressmaker whom I quoted above has invented to eliminate one extra gown. It may help some young woman who wishes to keep up with the times but finds herself breathless, or rather penniless, in her efforts to do so. This dressmaker made a combination dancing frock and reception gown for one of her customers in the following way: She made a dancing frock with the tunic effect, which is so popular, and hanging about four inches from the floor. Under the tunic, where it wouldn't show, she put a broad tuck and she also fashioned a train which was to fall from the waist. When her customer wants to go to a reception she lets down the tuck and sews on the train, and behold a reception gown!

Perhaps by telling you this I am helping on the cause of this outrageous clothes differentiation, but I guess I am willing to risk it.

Household Notes.

Cleaning a spiral bed-spring has always been a trial for the house-keeper. It may, however, be easily accomplished if she uses a dish-mop and keeps one just for that purpose. Get the dust out of the springs first with the dry mop, then dampen the mop and go over the metal a second time.

A seed apron will be useful to the woman who works in a garden. Seed packets are liable to be mislaid or overturned, but an apron designed especially for them will keep them safe. Make it of strong gingham, adding little pockets in rows. Leave a margin of eight inches all around.

A hole in granite ware may be mended temporarily in this way: Insert a nail or something else in the opening and turn it round and round until the hole is perfectly round, then pound a cork in tight, and with a sharp knife cut off most of it, leaving only an eighth of an inch on each side of the metal.

To keep feather dusters in good condition, wash them first, into the leg of an old stocking. When wanted for use, pull it out of the cover by the handle, grasping the stocking in the other hand. This not only saves space when the dusters are not

in use, but lengthens their life and serviceableness.

Oil your castors once in a while and see how much more easily large pieces of furniture may be moved. Do this at any rate at housecleaning time, and take care to wipe off any superfluous oil, not only because it would collect dirt if allowed to remain, but also because it might drip a little and stain the carpets or rugs.

To economize on soap, either put the broken pieces in a small cloth bag and use for washing dishes and scrubbing, or chip them fine and melt in a little water on the stove. In the latter case, by allowing the soft soap to come to a decided boil adding a little borax, you can fashion a solid cake of soap by pouring it into an old cup or dish to cool.

To remove feathers from one tick to another without having them fly all over the place, rip open about eight or ten inches of the old pillow tick and when making the new one leave open the same amount of space; sew both ticks together, hang the full tick on the clothesline and work the feathers downward or leave hanging in the wind for several hours.

Take a piece of hay or a stiff wire about twelve inches long and bend up one end two inches, like a hairpin. This device will remove corks which have slipped down into bottles. Drop the bent wire inside the empty bottle, turn all upside down and shake until the small end of cork settles in neck of bottle, when it can be withdrawn easily by pulling the wire.

For cleaning silver use about a tablespoonful of good washing powder to a quart of boiling water. Either an aluminum kettle or a bright tin dish which has never been washed with other dishes is necessary. Keep the water at boiling point. Put in the silver, allowing it to remain two or three minutes. Rinse thoroughly, and the results will be found all that could be desired.

For cleaning furniture, a mixture of three parts linseed oil and one of turpentine, well shaken, is recom-



In the Assembly

Labrador Arrives

The S. S. Labrador, Capt. D. Martin, arrived from the Gulf sealfishery at 8 a.m. yesterday, reporting for 1,400 seals.

After leaving Chatham on the 10th of March the ship reached Byron Island two days after. On April 2nd the Labrador struck the seals between St. Paul's Island and Cape St. Lawrence in company with the Seal. The work of killing was difficult and tedious owing to the stormy weather that prevailed. On Easter Sunday while steaming through loose ice a "growler" got underneath the stern of the ship damaging the rudder and unshipping the propeller. The propeller was hoisted on board the ship and temporary repairs effected, but as prospects looked gloomy the captain decided to abandon the voyage and arrived at Chatham on Thursday last, as already noted. Coming out of Chatham the ship met with further mishap by going aground near the Bruce wharf. The seals were taken out of the ship and put aboard of a schooner and after ten hours she was refloated. The ship sustained no damage and continued on the way to St. John's making an excellent run.

MINARD'S LINTMENT CURES GARGET IN COWS.

THE WORST Ocean Tragedy EVER RECORDED

The Titanic Believed to Be Lost With 3,000 Passengers, Besides Over One Thousand of a Crew--Wireless Received by Bruce.

Many anxiously awaited the arrival of the s.s. Bruce at 12.30 to-day to learn if possible some tidings of the reported sinking of the mammoth liner Titanic, which was making her maiden voyage from Liverpool to New York. As the Bruce was passing Cape Race at 8 o'clock this morning her operator, Mr. March, was shocked to receive this marconigram from the Cape: "Titanic lost last night in 41.56 north lat., 50.14 west long. Is the largest ship afloat and ran into iceberg. From the time she struck until last we heard of her was 45 minutes. About 3,000 passengers on board. We were working with him from the time she struck until her signals went up." This means that she then lost the power from her dynamo to send messages. The Cape first asked the Bruce did they hear the Titanic was sinking, and the Bruce answered "No." She was asked by the Cape if she had signals from the ship, and again a negative answer was sent back from the Bruce.

The Fogota Here.

The s.s. Fogota, Capt. B. Barbour, arrived here from the north at 6.30 a.m. to-day. The ship went as far as Tilt Cove after leaving here Tuesday last and made all the ports of call from Bay de Verde down. She had fine weather all through going and coming, but it was very frosty and scattered skirts of ice were met on the way. All the runs and harbors north are yet frozen over, and at Herring Neck, Pool's Island and other places they had to land mails and freight on the ice, and these were removed on slides. There was 22 inches of made ice in the harbor of Change Islands. She brought 37 packages of cargo and her passengers were J. Moore, Mrs. Linfield, Mrs. W. V. Meadus, Rev. Fr. Donnelly, J. Blundon, Dr. Leslie, W. Lockyer and 22 steerage. The ship sails north again on Wednesday.

Theatre Party.

Quite an innovation in local circles was the Theatre party tendered a number of our prominent society people by Mr. Harry J. Crowe on Saturday night. It entertained some twenty people in the private box at the performance of "The Light that Failed" at the Casino Theatre, and afterwards refreshments were served by the caterer and a very pleasant time was spent up to midnight.

Accident on Steamer.

Mr. LeDrew, mate of the S. S. Othar, while the ship was being brought to a wharf in Conception Bay had his right leg caught in the bight of a rope while the vessel was being hoisted. The member was twisted completely round, the bones broken and the sinews affected. The steamer was rushed to Bell Island, where the injured man was attended to by the Companies doctor.

Trouble is Increasing.

The five stokers, who held up the Adventure, are still absenting themselves from the ship. This morning the owners had warrants issued for the stokers charging them with desertion. It is likely that non-union men will have to be engaged in order to get the ship away. There will be an emergency meeting of the Firemen's Union this evening dealing with the deserters.

Patients by Fogota.

Mrs. Alfred Linfield arrived here by the Fogota to-day from Twillingate, suffering from an affection of the leg. She is seriously ill. Ice on Topsails.

No. 1 Rotary which is clearing the track on the Gulf Topsails, met much ice on the rails yesterday. It being five feet thick in certain sections. It was next to impossible to cut it off the rails and in 5 hours only about thirty feet of line was cleared. Never before in the history of the road were such conditions met and it cannot yet be determined when the road to Port aux Basques will be opened. The work of clearing the line is being continued to-day.

Feed Scarce.

People from that section say that at Heart's Content, Old Perlican and other places there is a great scarcity of feed for cattle, such as hay, oats, &c., and as a result cattle are starving, and some have been driven to the extremity of killing their horned cattle, while horses are being fed on lambs and rolled oats. Sheep and lambs are starving and many animals have perished for lack of food, which could not be secured owing to the ice embargo in the bay and the impassable roads.

Will Not Take Out Licenses

At the last meeting of the Council Board the Cabmen's Union, through their solicitor, requested that the regulations governing cab fares be come into effect until May 1st, owing to the impassable condition of the country roads. This is gratifying news from the baby of the fleet and it can be assumed that she will have at least a saving trip. Skipper Tom also said that she had less than 50 hands aboard all told, so that if she gets 5,000 seals her crew will make a good bill.

Died at Hospital.

Jeremiah Halleran passed away at the Signal Hill Hospital on Saturday morning last after a prolonged illness. The deceased was the nineteen-year-old son of Mr. M. Halleran, Treasurer of the L. S. P. U. He had been suffering from consumption for a considerable time past and was sent to the Consumptive Hospital to try and recuperate but could not survive the grasp that the dread disease had upon him and finally succumbed. His funeral took place from his father's residence, King's Road, yesterday afternoon, and was attended by a large number of mourners including the officers of the Longshoremen's Union of which the deceased was a member.

Worst Spring in His Career.

Capt. Martin, of the Labrador reports that this spring was a trying one in the Gulf and out of the twenty years he has prosecuted the sealfishery there he never experienced such terrific weather as that which prevailed this spring. Snow storms were continuous and the incessant frost was too intense for human flesh to withstand. On many occasions the weather was so rough and frosty that the crew could not get about deck much less than getting out on the ice. A few sealers suffered with frostbitten ears and hands but nothing serious. It is a coincidence to note also that this is comparatively the poorest catch he ever had. For nineteen consecutive seasons in a sailing vessel he got successful trips.

Want to Give Them a Rest.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—We are still waiting to see what action the Governor will take in the Morison scandal. According to those letters "everybody wanted to sign the petitions," members and non-members of the F. P. U. alike. The hon. gentleman caused a smile to play on every face by remarking that perhaps the petitioners, aware of the hard work that has been done by the Government, wish to be given an opportunity to retire them early and giving them a rest.

That the people are anxious to give the Premier a rest is quite plain but that desire is not born of sympathy for the Premier, but of concern for the country. They want to give the country a rest.

Their Defender.

Dear Sir,—In recent controversies on current political topics one feature in my opinion has been glaringly prominent, and that is the effort of the latest created member of the Legislative Council, P. T. McGrath, to thrust himself forward as the defender or the champion of the Messrs. Reid. It is only McGrath who would undertake such a task in the light of past events and it is only a Morris who would honour the person who would hurl at him the lan-

McGrath did so persistently in bygone years, when the paper he edited, the Herald, regularly appeared telling Sir Edward that he was "reared on Poor House scraps." No doubt Sir Edward adds to his other qualities the virtue of forgiveness. But that the Messrs. They, with many others, remember how the Reids admitted Mr. McGrath to their confidence and he knifed them. The story of his duplicity, hypocrisy and faithlessness was evidenced in the Chicago "Record," and the honorable Patrick's excuse was that he was a writer for the fees that were in it, and like Judas of old he betrayed his benefactor for 25 shekels. These worthy traits are so evident in him that our Premier whom he reviled and insulted must needs show his gratitude to him.

SPELLING.

Spelling is a disease which was first introduced to this continent by Noah Webster, and has been handed down to the third and fourth generations of stenographers. When once this disease secures a firm hold upon the system, there is no cure for it except a dose of phonetic spelling after each meal. Phonetic spelling is an offspring of the Morse telegraph code, and makes fully as fascinating reading as the terse remarks of a shorthand reporter. It is used mainly by billing clerks and newspapers which have run low on body type. Women generally spell better than men, for they have more time to chase a difficult word through the jungles of an unabridged dictionary. College professors and ministers of the gospel never have any trouble with their spelling, as the editor straightens it out so that people don't take it for a Chinese laundry ticket. Spelling used to be taught in our public schools with considerable success, but it is now put on the classical course, along with the other dead languages, and has been supplanted by basket ball and the 100-yard dash. Reformed spelling was invented by the poet Chaucer, who succeeded in getting a lot of unprintable matter through the mails by adopting 'his disguise.' Some of our latter-day novelists have improved on Chaucer's spelling to some extent, but have retained most of his style. A spelling match is a place where people meet for the purpose of assaulting the English language, and retire with a sly smile. If there were more of these matches, there would be less sour spelling in circulation. Spelling's very useful in correspondence which leads up to an offer of marriage, and has discouraged many a young woman who couldn't see anything but a fuzzy hat and a home run in the ninth inning.

This letter would lead you to believe that the settlements from Bonaventure Head to the Horse Chops contain no business places except those at Trinity. As a matter of fact, Mr. Editor, both English Harbor, Champneys, Port Rexton and Trinity East can boast of business places quite as up to date as those of Trinity, and the people patronize them liberally. I doubt very much if you would get either an anchor or a beaver at Trinity except it may be a second-hand one! As regards spur line the only place the spur line will benefit is Trinity. Why should Trinity with its population of 439 get a spur line any more than English Harbor and Champneys with a population of 1017? Three parts of the four thousand fishermen Trinitarians speak of live between Trinity and the Horse Chops and are already enjoying the benefit of a railroad. The people between Trinity and Bonaventure Head are served much better by the present station (Trinity Junction) than they would be by one at the end of the spur line.

Had Trinitarians been at Trinity East and Port Rexton stations on several days of the last few weeks they would have found it easy to convince themselves that Trinity is not headquarters for everything. Mr. Coaker has a better knowledge of present day conditions around Trinity than Trinitarians have.

Shot Dead as He Hugged His Fiancee.

Macon, Ga., April 3.—The death of Charles Hall Taylor, the son of one of the wealthiest families of Georgia, as the result of his shooting by Franklyn Tindall, a bookkeeper, today resulted in the latter's commitment to the county jail on the charge of murder, although a coroner's inquest held that the homicide was justifiable. Taylor's father swore out the warrant.

Almost on the eve of his wedding to Miss Lulu Isabella Carter, a poor and pretty girl, with the marriage license in his pocket, Taylor was shot down and killed by Tindall.

Saturday the Carter family had planned to go to Smithville, Ga., to live. Friday night they were to stay at the home of Tindall, who married one of the Carter girls. Taylor met his promised wife down town and walked out to the Tindall home. They were sitting on the steps, arms around each other affectionately, when Tindall returned from his office. It was dark, and he but dimly recognized the forms of a man and woman. He says he thought it was his wife and that she was resisting unwelcome attentions. At any rate he pulled his pistol. Taylor arose and advanced. Tindall fired and Taylor dropped with a bullet through his brain.

Miss Carter testified she was not resisting Taylor's caresses. Taylor was the grandson of the late Dr. Charles Hall. His mother's sister is Mrs. S. R. Jaques, the wealthiest woman in Macon and the leader of local societies. Charles Hall and Dr. Tom Hall are his uncles. He was well known and prominently connected throughout the State. In 1904 he married a hospital nurse who attended him during an illness. Last year she divorced him. Lately he had been very attentive to Miss Carter. Although his family opposed the match, her family also objected, believing that he was trifling with her.

Discouraging.

So far the reports from the Gulf sealing ships are none too encouraging and from present indications it looks as if the voyage in that section will be a failure, almost unparalleled. The total number of seals accounted for to date does not exceed an approximate catch of 10,000, which includes the catches of the Seal and Labrador and a conjectured number for the Kite, which has been favourably reported. The Viking was spoken to a few days ago by the Labrador with practically no seals, while the Southern Cross, Bloodhound, and Lloydson have been reported jammed and unless recent developments occurred their catches only run into the hundreds. The news of the Neptune taking seals in the vicinity of Bay of Islands may yet be considered favorably. The weather in the history of the oldest sealer this spring has been the severest and consequently greatly hindered the work of the ship and the crews.

Missionary Meeting.

The annual missionary service was held at George St. Methodist Church last evening. The deputation consisted of the Rev. T. B. Darcy, B.A., of St. John's, Mr. A. W. Mewa, and Mr. John Leamon, who acted as Chairman. The addresses were practical and calculated to arouse a greater interest in giving towards foreign missions. Newfoundland Methodism had done well in the past, but past efforts will not suffice; the present need is urgent and a larger sum must be sent this year to the missionary fund than ever sent before. Rev. J. W. Bartlett, pastor of the church, read the report, and the choir rendered music suitable to the occasion.

No Authority to Sign.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I notice a note of thanks published in the Twillingate Sun on Saturday, 6th inst, and I presume has been sent to city dailies, purporting to be an expression of thanks from the citizens of Twillingate to the Reid Bros. for the Sanitaria gift. That note was signed by eight or ten individuals only, who would like the outside world to think they were authorized by the citizens so to do on their behalf. Such is not the case, and such actions on the part of a few individuals places this town in a false light, and is widely condemned here, as it would be in any well conducted community.

Magistrate Scott issued a notice calling a meeting of the citizens to pass a vote of thanks to the Reid Bros. Only about 40 attended out of a population of 3,600. Of the 40 present only 29 voted for the motion of thanks, and 15 voted against the motion. So you see those who signed the vote of thanks had no authority from the 15 that voted against the vote of thanks, and certainly no authority from those who did not attend the meeting. They may have authority from the 20 that voted for the motion and not a soul besides. And yet those eight or ten individuals would have outsiders believe that they signed on behalf of the whole citizens of Twillingate. Oh the ways of some men are dark and crooked.

The citizens of Twillingate did not show enough interest in the Sanitaria movement to attend the meeting. The overwhelming majority of our citizens favor the opinion that they will not have very much to be thankful for in the Reid-Morris method of treating consumptives. The desire would seem stronger for the constituencies than for the sick. If not, why build five in Conception Bay and only one in Notre Dame Bay and one in Bonavista Bay?


