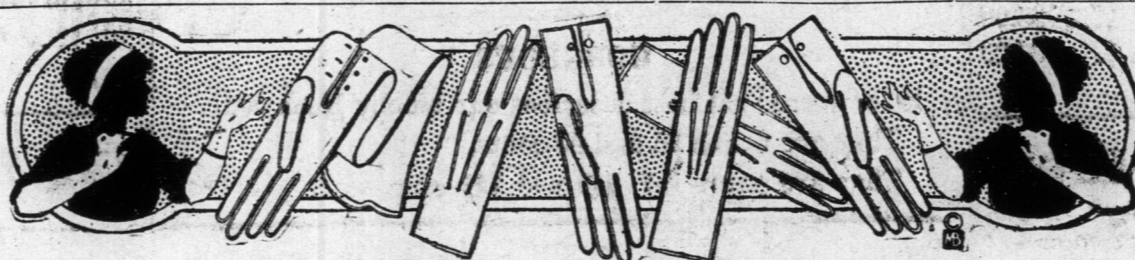

LONDON, Dec. 19.
The Belgrade correspondent of the Daily Mail sends the following:—I learn that the Austro-Serbian dispute has been solved. Serbia will recognize an autonomous Albania, receiving the use of a commercial port on the Albanian coast, connected with Serbia by a neutral railway. The Serbian Minister of Railways is leaving Belgrade for London for the purpose of giving technical advice to the Serbian Peace delegates.

LONDON, Dec. 19.
In diplomatic circles it is expected that the question of peace-continued warfare, will be decided within the next forty-eight hours. Here is the opinion that if the thorny questions which must occupy the sessions of to-day and to-morrow can be surmounted or circumvented peace is assured. The re-occupying of the fortress of Adrianople, which the Turks are reported to insist on as the condition of waiving the demand that Greece should sign the armistice, is

the most troublesome point, and if the Turks maintain their attitude it will indicate that they are still firm in their determination to retain Adrianople after the war.

ATHENS, Dec. 19.
A violent cannonade occurred yesterday afternoon between the Greeks attacking and the Turks defending the Bizani (Vissani) Fort. A Greek aviator flew over Bizani and Janina. Turkish fire slightly damaged his aeroplane, but he replied by dropping bombs, and eventually landed safely.

ATHENS, Dec. 20.
Vice-Admiral Halli Pasha, formerly Minister of Marine in the Turkish Cabinet, was killed in the naval engagement between the Turks and the Greeks off the Dardanelles, Dec. 16. Halli Pasha was aboard the flagship which, according to the same report, was seriously damaged. Four other officers aboard the flagship were killed, and a large number of Tartars were killed and wounded. Three other Turkish ships engaged in the battle sustained severe damage. Three Turkish destroyers were hit.

BERLIN, Dec. 19.
Dr. Hermann Friedmann, who says he has discovered a preventive and cure for Tuberculosis, has opened his first institute for demonstration. He personally inoculated with his serum several patients, women, children and men, in the presence of eminent physicians and scientists from Berlin, London, Paris and other cities in Europe and America. Dr. Friedmann still refuses to give out any of his serum, saying that from a tiny drop of it a bacteriologist could propagate enough bacilli to supply the world. Friedmann's small quarters were

swamped by patients whilst the physicians numbered more than fifty. The Doctor told his patients and their physicians that results from this serum began to show in most cases within five weeks.

LONDON, Dec. 20.
According to a Port Said despatch received by wireless from the Greek Government vessel Macedonia, the Turks have massacred Christians in Mitylene. The number is not known. The message adds that part of the Turkish fleet was forced to run on shore near the Dardanelles owing to damage done it by the Greek fleet in a recent engagement.

LONDON, Dec. 20.
The Ottoman Government's authorized delegates to the Peace Conference will propose at the next session that Turkish towns shall be re-occupied if the proposal be not accepted by the delegates of the Balkan Allies, negotiations are to be broken off forthwith according to a News Agency despatch received here from Constantinople.

DENVER, COL., Dec. 19.
A plot to dynamite the Denver Mint, where \$500,000,000 are stored, was frustrated by the finding of the plans on the floors of the public Comfort station, near the Federal building. The plans have been turned over to the police, and the guards have been doubled at the Mint.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 19.
John Rinell, a local pugilist, who is known as Billy Smith, was shot and killed by William Jubb, formerly lightweight promoter. Jubb claims that he shot in self-defence.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.
President Taft has made up his mind to accept the proffered Kent professorship at Yale University. He will take up his duties at New Haven early in the Spring.

LONDON, Dec. 19.
Replying to a question put by Kerr Hardie in the Commons to-day, Premier Asquith gave an assurance that before the country committed itself to the acceptance of Mr. Borden's naval proposals a full opportunity for discussing them would be afforded.

LONDON, Dec. 19.
A revolution is announced in the British newspaper world. Heretofore the great dailies have been published every day in the year, with the exception of Sundays. Now the majority of the morning and evening papers in London and the provinces have decid-

ed not to publish on Christmas day, and it is said that the others will follow suit.

PORTSMOUTH, Dec. 19.
The British armoured cruiser Natal moored this morning alongside the jetty at the dock yards in readiness to convey the body of the late Ambassador Reid from England to America. After the great memorial service has been held at Westminster Abbey, on Friday a host of carpenters and decorators will immediately on the vessel's arrival, start on the construction of a mortuary chapel on the quarter deck, in which the coffin will rest during the voyage. The warship will sail on Saturday. Naval honors will be paid the dead Ambassador, as the cruiser puts to sea. She will fly her colors at half mast throughout the voyage.

BOY RUN OVER—While passing Beck's Cove, at 4 p.m. yesterday, a lad named Redmond, was run over by a team and hurt, but not seriously. The wheels of the vehicle passed over

the boy's legs. He was picked up by the S.P.C.A. Inspector and brought to Dr. Cowperthwaite's surgery on Duckworth Street and after being attended was driven to his home on Theatre Hill. No bones were broken.

ROBT. TEMPLETON.

Explosions.

Indianapolis, Dec. 14.—Riots and assaults in labor disputes in Cleveland, Ohio, out of which the government charges here, explosions against employers of non-union men, were inquired into at the "dynamite conspiracy" trial to-day.

In hearing the testimony of Peter J. Smith, former president and business agent of a local iron workers union in Cleveland, federal Judge Albert B. Anderson, who is conducting the trial of the forty-one union officials said, in reference to local assaults in labor disputes. "Had the local authorities done their duty there wouldn't have been any need of a trial here." District Attorney Chas. W. Miller had stated that there were fifteen explosions in and near Cleveland that those explosions, for which no one had been prosecuted, were the basis of the present prosecution by the government for illegal transportation of explosives. The district attorney said a "reign of terror" had existed in Cleveland "second only to that at Los Angeles." Smith was charged with complicity in causing explosions at North Randall and Akron Ohio, near Cleveland.

"Sixteen witnesses have appeared against you," said Mr. Miller. "Among them were two little girls who said they saw you and George Anderson carrying a box near North Randall the site of the explosion. Do you say all these witnesses did not tell the truth?"

"Some of them told the truth, but I didn't know anything about the explosion until the next day."

Lured Man To His Death.

Moose Jaw, Sask., Dec. 13.—Cunningly planned and cleverly carried into execution was the murder of Ralph Warwick, on a homestead near Iverman, on the night of Nov. 18.

Last night his wife, on the witness stand at the coroner's inquiry, told how she and Stan. Price planned the details. Mrs. Warwick is a Newcastle, England, girl, pretty and barely out of her teens. Looking the Crown prosecutor squarely in the eye, she told of having met Stanley Price nearly a year ago. She fell in love with him and six months later went to live at his homestead as housekeeper and common law wife.

She had been there a month when Price proposed she should marry Ralph Warwick, get him to turn all his belongings over to her, and make a will in her favor. To this she consented, and laid her snares for Warwick. After wooing him two months he proposed marriage. She lived with her husband until he was beaten to death, but all the time kept up relations with Price.

35 Years' Sentence On Sidna Allen.

Wytheville, Virginia, Dec. 12.—Thirty-five years in the Penitentiary is the penalty Sidna Allen will pay for his part in the shooting-up of Carroll County court house at Hillsville last March, when five persons, including the presiding judge, the sheriff, and the commonwealth attorney, were killed by members of the Allan clan, and a number of others wounded. Allen's nephew, Wesley Edwards, will spend twenty-seven years in the penitentiary. Governor Mann granted a respite until January 17, for the execution of Floyd Allen and his son Claude, who were sentenced to die this week.

Three Powder Mills Are Blown Up.

Acton, Mass., Dec. 12.—Three mills of the American Powder Mills Company, blew up to-night one after another, when sparks from a burning barn set them on fire. No one was hurt, and the loss, it is believed, will not exceed twenty thousand dollars.

For a time houses in the village were threatened with destruction, but with the help of fire apparatus from Concord and Maynard the damage was confined to the powder mills.

Woman Judge Ascends Bench.

Inaugurated in Chicago to Seat in Juvenile Court.

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 13.—Miss Mary M. Bartelme, for eighteen years public guardian of Cook County, was inaugurated yesterday as Chicago's first woman judge. She will assist Judge Pinekey in the Juvenile Court and will direct most of her attention to girls. In her position as public guardian thousands of young girls came under her attention, and she is referred to by them as "Mother Bartelme." "My idea of being a judge," said Miss Bartelme last night, "is not so much to pass judgment as to assist unfortunates."



Seamen's Institute Opened.

The new King George the Fifth Seamen's Institute was formally opened to the public yesterday afternoon, in the presence of hundreds of spectators. The building was nicely decorated for the event, the Union Jack and Stars and Stripes floating over the building. The former in honor of the Patron, His Majesty the King, and the latter as a compliment to those in America who contributed to the funds of the institution. Arriving at four o'clock His Excellency the Governor and suite were conducted through the building by Mr. J. W. Withers, Chairman of the House Committee, after which His Excellency took his seat on the platform, accompanied by Hons. Jno. Harvey, M. G. Winter and Knowling, Dr. Macpherson, Mayor Ellis and W. G. Gosling. Among the audience were Rt. Hon. Sir E. P. Morris, J. R. Bennett, M.H.A., Rev. Canon Bolt, J. Outerbridge, Esq., G. C. Fearn, President of the Board of Trade and many other prominent citizens.

Mr. Withers was the first speaker, outlining the business of the institution. He paid a high tribute to Mr. Jones, the new manager, whose ability was widely known abroad and then referred to Mr. Sheard, Secretary of the Mission, after which he read the following messages:

"Feeling confident the Institute is worth to your community far more than its cost and will be of great benefit to thousands of fishermen, therefore hereby guarantee personally to raise one twelfth of net operating cost during 1913, esteeming it a privilege to have a hand in the good work. Heartly congratulations upon your opening—(Sgd.) W. R. STIRLING."

"Ottawa:
 "Congratulations and all good wishes for greatest success from Machado for Ottawa Association, Professor Daily and myself, we wish we could be present.—(Sgd.) CECIL S. ASHDOWN."

The name signed to the first message is a prominent financier and Mr. Ashdown, is a Director of the Grenfell Association of America.

His Excellency the Governor, in his address, regretted that more people were not present, hoped the fishermen would avail of the building to enjoy its comforts and also observed that though intended primarily for these, the general public and especially the working people would be welcomed there. He was surprised that there were not more coffee houses and kindred places of resort in the city for our young workmen, and hoped that the institute would prove a remedy for this condition of affairs. He had heard that in lectures to be given in the building, and that in these no religious sentiment might prevail. He hoped not for this would keep those who would not conform with such away. He wished that subjects other than religious, would be treated of. He dwelt on the formation of the Mission, its good work on Labrador and was surprised to hear that it was rumored that the institute would be used as a proselytizing medium. This should not be, and the idea should be quickly removed. The building was intended for all irrespective of religious affiliation. Eaters would not deem that they were being patronized, a small charge would be made for the privileges of the place. In conclusion he wished the institute every success and believed it will be a benefit to our fishermen and workers generally. John Harvey then thanked His Excellency for his good wishes after which all present partook of tea in the restaurant and the function came to a close.

The workers are contemplating a crowded building. Let every father and mother and lover of the children be present. All friends throughout the city are invited. Seats provided for them.—Com.

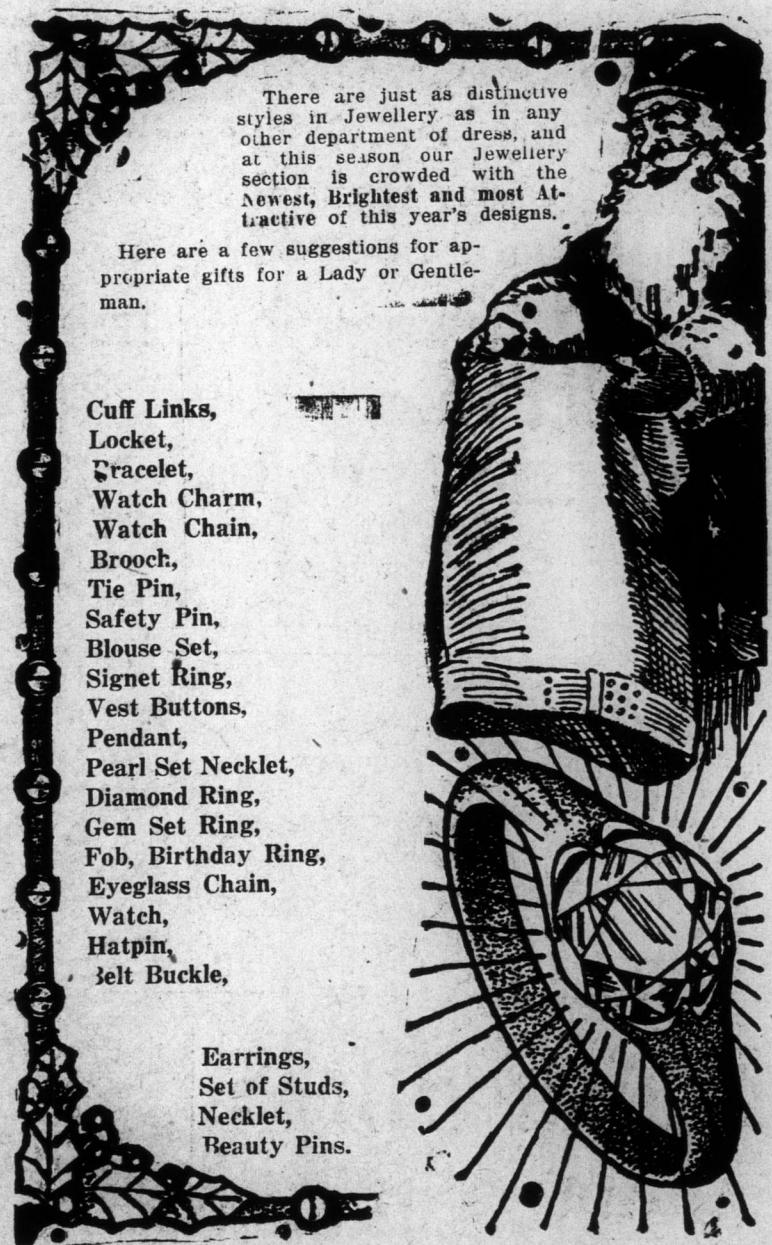

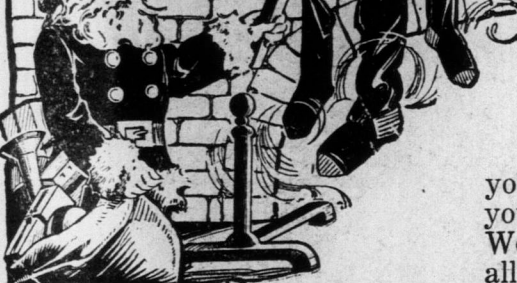

From the Jaws of Death.

Crew Rescued From Sinking Schooner by the S. S. Solway.

The S. S. Solway brought to port yesterday afternoon Capt. Michael Davis, Mate Bernard Burritt and seamen Samuel Anthony, Samuel Hollett, Edward Farrell and Michael Drake of the schooner Minnie Pearl which met her doom Wednesday while on a voyage from Twillingate to Halifax.

The vessel left Twillingate the latter part of November with 2,130 qts. fish on board, and from the start met bad weather, for as she crossed Trinity Bay all her head gear was carried away and she had to run into St. John's for repairs. She left here on Monday, the 2nd inst., to continue her voyage but was overtaken by a terrific snow storm and had to shelter in Truapsey on Tuesday the 3rd. She left on Thursday the 5th and crossing St. Mary's Bay three of her crew narrowly escaped.

A Watery Grave.

A southerly gale with snow prevailed and a mountainous sea ran and that night one wave broke on board and took every thing moveable off the deck. Edward Farrell was swept over the quarter but he managed, though immersed to the shoulders, to grasp the peak halliards and after a desperate struggle swung himself over the rail in on the deck. Burritt who was up to his neck in water managed to hold on to the fore sheet, and a third seaman owes his life to holding to the lashings of the boat on deck. During all this time Captain Davis was lashed to the helm, and

to stand the deck was to run the risk of being swept into the ocean. The vessel received a terrible drubbing until Saturday morning, the 7th, when she made Lamaline, but a N. W. wind with thick snow springing up she had to run back to St. Lawrence and harboured there until Wednesday, the 11th. After leaving the vessel was five hours out when again through stress of weather she had to return. Three times she attempted to run in but owing to the storm which prevailed

She Had to Heave Off

and only made the harbour under great difficulty. The frost was so intense that over 6 inches of ice made on the hull and decks and they had to chop this off the anchors and chains before they could let them go. In this weather the jumbo was torn into shreds and they had to get a new one there. The vessel left St. Lawrence for Halifax on Monday last, the 16th, and was off St. Pierre at dusk; it looked threatening and the captain for a while thought of running in there but as the wind served he tried to get out over St. Pierre Bank as quickly as possible. Tuesday morning at 8 the schooner was 101 miles off St. Pierre and about 40 from Flint Island on the Cape Breton Coast when a gale from the N. N. W. with thick snow set in. The vessel was holed under a double reefed foresail but soon this was split in twain by the hurricane, the gaff was whipped off the foremast, and a tremendous sea running caused the vessel to labour badly while sea after sea broke on board. The schooner was now in

danger of foundering and orders were given to

Jettison the Cargo

to lighten her. Driving full before the blast, with her canvas virtually all gone the boat was smashed and became unserviceable. Matters looked gloomy indeed for the devoted mariners. Opening the hatches being out of the question the men set to work and cut into the hold through the bulkheads from the forecabin and passed up 200 qts. of fish through the companion way, tossing it overboard thus eventually lightening her by the head and putting her in better trim. While this was being done seaman Hollett was sent to take a spell at the pumps when a sea came on board he was washed aft to the quarter deck, and by clinging to the monkey rail saved himself from being

Hurled Into the Foaming Waters.

The mate assisted him to his feet. The vessel rolled so heavily that she often went into the sheer ports. When the men were jettisoning the skipper stood on the deck watching the mountainous waves as they advanced, and when he saw that one was about to break on board he would jump down the companion way and close the scuttle to keep the forecabin and hold from being inundated and possibly sending all quickly to bottom. Time and again while at this hazardous duty the captain narrowly escaped being washed overboard. Once he was swept off his feet and was going over the side but saved himself by clinging to the halliards. He, however, was badly hurt about the arms by striking the rail. Tuesday night was a terrible one and none on the vessel will ever forget it. She was completely at the mercy of the elements, the seas rushing on board smashed the cabin door and poured tons of water into the cabin, saturating everything and trunks, clothing and everything there floated about the compartment; no fire could be lit nor food cooked and the men

Saturated and Frozen

with the cold, hungry and in awful suspense as to the doom which threatened them suffered agonies of both body and mind. Early Tuesday evening it was found to be impossible to stand the deck with any degree of safety and all had to take refuge in the cabin while two men in turn took watches together standing in the companionway to view the sea and weather. Each sea which boarded her found them on the alert and the companion was quickly closed to bar its ingress. All night long this continued and to add to the alarm of the unfortunate seamen at an early hour Wednesday morning it was found that

the vessel was making water at an alarming rate. When the pumps were sounded there were four feet of water in the hold, and from 3 a.m. until the crew were rescued they worked incessantly, and at great risk at the pumps but could not keep her free. Shortly after 7 a.m. when daylight had dawned it was plainly to be seen that the ship was foundering. She was

Sinking Under Their Feet.

and the order from the captain was "pump for your lives." From 7 till near 9 the men laboured with the energy imparted by despair, when about 8.30 the hull of a steamer was seen coming straight towards the ill-fated schooner and bearing W. by N. from them. The Union Jack upside down was put to the peak and the steamer was seen to pull on all speed and make for the sinking schooner. About 10 o'clock the steamer which proved to be the Solway, Capt. Parsons, ranged alongside and prepared to get the men off the vessel which had now settled to the rail in the water. It looked as if no boat could live in the sea running, but the Capt. of the Solway and his brave crew made the attempt. A lifeboat was lowered away and scaman Power and a fireman volunteered to go in it and Mate Bunge, of the Solway, in trying to get into it

Narrowly Escaped Drowning.

He lowered himself away but could not reach the boat, and as the ship rolled in the sea he was buried in it but held on to the tackle and eventually gained the deck. It took two hours to transfer the mariners to the Solway; once the boat went a half mile adrift, and in another attempt to get the men on board the ship rolled over on the boat, almost filled her with water and nearly capsized her. The men's clothing was swept out of her and each lost to the value of \$50, while Capt. Davis lost all his nautical instruments and clothing and effects to the value of \$100. It was touch and go to get on board the Solway, and the crew of that ship stood by with life belts for the men fearing they would get overboard. The side ports were opened and the vessel's crew had to jump into them, seizing ropes which the Solway's crew threw to them to do so. Before Capt. Davis left the vessel he saturated the cabin and forecabin with kerosene oil and set fire to the ship which a few minutes after his departure sank into the waves. Capt. Davis had an interest in the vessel, and the hull and cargo were insured. She was a schooner of 96 tons, built in Mahone Bay. Capt. Davis is a Newfoundland and re-



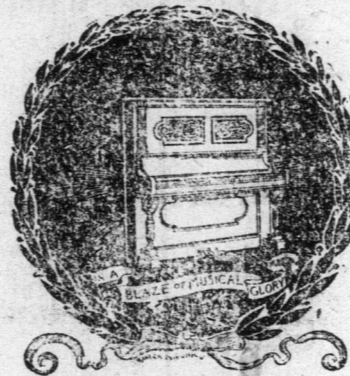

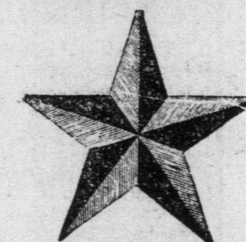
