Russian Prohibition

On June 28th last, the London Times published a Russian Supplement, and in it is a Ministerial Report on the Financial and Economic which has been drawn up by the Chancery of the Council of Ministers, and it deals with the position up to May 28th, 1915, of our time (May 18th Russian reckoning), and among other matters it contains also two articles on the effects of the prohibition of the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages.
