Sees the Boy Scout a Force for Peace.

Lieut, Gen. Sir Robert S. S. Baden-Powell, who has come to this country to stimulate interest in the organization of the Girl Scouts of America, said recently that he believed one of the best guarantees of the idea of the League of Nations would be universal interest in the boy and girl scout movement. in all countries. General Baden-Powell originated the scout movement in England in 1908, after he had retired from active service in the English army.

"If peoples throughout the world were in real accord, and a real personal sympathy, based upon knowledge of peoples and problems, existed among them, the possibilities of wars would be greatly reduced," said Sir Robert

"There has been no way of bringing peoples and nations together, and nuch of the lack of sympathy and inderstanding has been due to lack of knowledge. The success of the League of Nations, of the co-operation of countries of civilization and the preservation of peace, in the future, will depend largely upon the ideas inculcated in the younger gen-

"The boy and girl scout organizadons stimulate interest in the ideals and ideas of other peoples, and we have boys in England and in this country writing letters to boys in China, Japan and other countries, and, in that way, becoming acquainted with them, their customs and deals. That is one of the fundamentals of the success of the League

of Nations." Although General Baden-Powell, one of the originators of the boy scout movement does not contemplate the organization of an international society now, he considers that such a movement probably will follow in the allied countries within few years. Speaking of the ideals of the movement, he said it was the ntention of the leaders to stimulate ber so that he would be anxious to learn and to train himself, in opposition to the German method of thrusting ideas and systems upon the children despite their natural in-

During the war the English Boy Scouts and the girls' organization called the Girl Guides, contributed greatly to the defence of the country and to the comfort of the soldiers and sailors, General Baden-Powell said. Within two days after the beginning of the war they had taken the places of 30,000 members of the Coast Guard and throughout the war and submarines Their activities resulted n the capture and destruction of at Baden-Powell said, and timely warn Members of the crews of watchers received rewards for sighting sub-

marines and hostile craft. Members of the organizations also were detailed to duty on all the ships fleets as signallers, cooks and odderlies. As soon as the boys passed 18 they enlisted in the Royal Navy or the Army. They served also as messengers in the Admiralty and War Offices, collected magazines for the soldiers, made bandages and did many other tasks so that men of military age might be released for service. They maintained several huts at the front and frequently aid ed the ambulance service.

General Baden-Powell will confer with scout officials here this week and a rally will be held for him in the Sheep Meadow, in Central Park, on Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock. He is accompanied by Lady Baden-Powell, leader of the British Girl Guides .- N. Y. Times.

This apparently novel method of duelling is not so new as it seems. Just over a hundred years ago our forefathers were agog with excitement over a similar happening.

Two Frenchmen, named respectively Le Pique and Granpree, quarrelled over an opera dancer, and agreed to fight a duel in mid-air. They ascended in two balloons from a field near the Tuileries, with a second in either car, and armed with blunderbusses.

The watching crowds below imagined that it was a balloon race. But at a height of one thousand feet both fired; M. Le Pique's balloon was torn to shreds, and he and his second was dashed to pieces.

A duel with deadly germs was seriously proposed by a Chicago physician in 1916. The preliminaries were arranged, but at the last moment the challenged party shrank from the cr-

Bringing Dead Heroes Home.

(Pearson's Weekly.)

The body of the heroic Nurse Cavell, executed in Belgium by the Huns in the early days of the war, is to be brought to England. A similar course has been adopted in the case of many of Britain's fallen heroes.

When, for instance, Livingstone died near Lake Bangweolo, in Central Afri ca, in May, 1873, his body was carried all the way to the coast by his faithful black servants, to be finally laid to rest in Westminster Abbey.

One of the saddest incidents of the Zulu War of 1879 was the death of the youthful Prince Imperial of France, who was ambushed and speared by the enemy while on a reconnoitering expedition. His body, too, was brought to England, and laid to rest beside that of his father at Chislehurst, both being afterwards removed to the magnificent mausoleum erected at Farnborough by the Empress Eugenie

Nearly forty years earlier the body of the Prince Imperial's great ancestor, Napoleon I., had been removed from St. Helena-where it had lain mfor some twenty years-to France, reinterred with great pomp in Paris in the presence of more than a million spectators.

Napoleon's remains were taken France by permission of the British Government, a courtesy which the American Government had previously extended to us, as far back as 1821, in onnection with the body of Major Andre, an officer of high rank in the Andre, an officer of high rank in the British Army, who was hanged as a spy by Washington during the revolutionary war. Andre's remains we're conveyed to England in a magnificent onveyed to England in a magnificent sarcophagus, and interred in Westminster Abbey, and few Americans ever come to London without paying
