

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:-

1. There shall be a Codfish Exportation Board (hereinafter called the Board) which shall consist of seven members, namely the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, who shall be Chairman, four members appointed by the Governor-in-Council, who shall be licensed exporters of Codfish, and two members appointed by a majority of the exporters of Codfish holding licenses thereunder. Three members shall constitute a quorum of the Board any meeting thereof for the transaction of business. The Mi ister of Marine and Fisheries shall have power to appoint substitute to act in his place as Chairman at any time during habsence. A vacancy in the Board shall be filled in the same maner as the original appointment was made, and in the tempora absence, through any unavoidable cause, of a member, the Governor-in-Council or the licensed exporters, as the case make, may appoint a substitute to act in his place during such at sence. Failure on the part of the said exporters to nominate or appoint any members of the Board shall not prejudice or invalidate any acts or proceedings of the Board.

2. It shall be the duty of the Board to advise the Governor in-Council generally as to the exportation and marketing of salt Codfish; and more particularly to recommend to the Governor in-Council rules to regulate:-

The issue, holding, suspension and cancellation of licenses to export salt codfish.

(2) The conditions and terms of - abroad.

(3) The minimum prices for the sale of salt codfish in particular markets at particular times

(4) The maximum quantity of salt codfish which may be sold for or exported to any particular market at any particular

(5) The Board may also from time to time recommend th modification, suspension, or repeal of any rule already approved and published in the Royal Gazette

3. Any rule recommended by the Board, approved by the ernor-in-Council and published in the Royal Gazette shall the same force of law as if included in this Act. Such rule be modified, suspended or repealed by a new rule, recomme by the Board, approved by the Governor-in-Council and pu in the Royal Gazette. Immediate notics by telegram of rule or the amendment of any existing rule shall be the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to all licensed of codish. In recommending any rule respecting the fixing prices the Board shall not have power to interfere with any company to the state of the st tract lawfully made under Rules and Regulations existing the time of the finalizing of such contract.

4. (1) No salt codfish shall hereafter be exported except u der license. Such license shall be granted to any plicant who undertakes to comply with the rules ma under this Act. A fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) sh be payable by the applicant on the issue of every cense, and in addition a fee of ten cents per quintal every quintal of cured salt codfish, and five cents quintal on all green codfish; provided that the i fee of Fifty Dollars shall not be payable by any fi man exporter who exports codfish in shipments of les than one hundred quintals each. The Board shall have an absolute discretion to determine whether or not any applicant is a fisherman exporter.

(2) Such license shall be in force until the thirty-first day of December of the year in which it is issued.

(3) Such license may be suspended or cancelled by the Governor-in-Council for non-compliance with o breach of, the provisions of this Act, or the rules is sued under the authority of this Act.

5. A meeting of all exporters of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries during the firs September in each year to consider and discuss with the Exportation Board all matters relating to the exportation fish for the ensuing season. Such meeting shall be held at S

6. It shall be the duty of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to carry out the provisions of this Act; to forward Governor-in-Council the advice and recommendations Governor-in-Council the advice and recommendations of the Board; and to report to the Governor-in-Council the non-compliance with and breaches of the provisions of this Act or the Rules issued under the authority of this Act.

7. The Governor-in-Council shall have power to appoint Trade Commissioners or Government Agents, to act in any place in the interest of this Colony and its trade, and shall har powers to prescribe their duties and fix their salaries, whi shall be payable out of the revenue of the Colony. The Mi of Marine and Fisheries shall have power to authorize, and direct the carrying on of research work in connection with the fisheries of the Colony, the cost and expense of which shall be payable out of the revenue of the Colony. All fees paid under the provisions of section four of this Act shall be collected by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and paid by him into the public

8. Sections 3 and 4 of this Act shall have effect as though they were included in Chapter 22 of the Consolidated Statutes (Third Series), entitled "Of the Customs"; and the provision of that Chapter, and of any Act amending or extending that Chapter shall apply accordingly; and if any person ships Chapter shall apply accordingly, and it any person ships, or at-tempts to ship, codfish in contravention of any rules made under this Act with respect to exportation, he shall be liable to a penalty equal to the value of such codfish including the duty thereon. aug17.21.24.28.31.sep4.7.11





SARREGUE, France, Sept. 10. An automobile, containing nine hundred pounds of silver ingots in false bottom, en route from Germany to Strassburg, was stopped by customs guards at the frontier last night, it became known to lay t became known to-day.

LONDON, Sept. 10. Stubborn fighting is proceeding be-Stubborn fighting is proceeding be-tween Russian Soviet forces and troops of General Wrangel, in Oriek-hov, region of the Crimean sector, says an official statement issued in Moscow, Thursday, and received here to-day by express. On other sections of the front, the statement claims successes for the Soviet army.

BOLSHEVIK ATTACK REPULSED. WARSAW, Sept. 10. Polish troops have advanced their lines, occupying Eusnics, just south of Grodno, and five other towns. Bolshevik counter attack was repulsed and Poles again advanced, dispersing seven Soviet infantry regiments. A communique from Polish headquar-ters, in which these operations are reported, says there was no change the situation in the Sumalki sec-

MORE QUAKE SHOCKS.

ROME, Sept. 10. Earthquake shocks continue causng more victims among rescuers owing to falling masonry. To-day there were shocks as far south as Cassano, near Naples. Apparently there was no serious damage or victims, but the shocks produced great panic among the population which recalled its experience in earthquakes of 1915.

BUS COLLIDES WITH TROLLEY CAR.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10. To-day, Friday, and the 13th day of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit walk-out, was marked by the first serious accident since the strike began. Approximately 35 persons were injured. 5 seriously, when a Coney Island sight-seeing bus, with 70 men, women and children aboard, was in collision with a trolley car at Fifth Avenue and Sixty-eighth street, Brooklyn. 





How the Czar Was Murdered.

DRAMATIC NEW STORY - THE TRAIL OF JEWELS.

The first connected and authoritaex-Czar of Russia and his family begins in the Times to-day and will be continued daily. The following are extracts from to-day's chapter: The true story of the martyrdom of Nicholas II., the ex-Czar of Rus-

sia, and of his wife and family is based upon evidence obtained by a properly-constituted legal investigation. The signed depositions of eyewitnesses are in the writer's pos-At Ekaterinburg, on the night of

July 16, 1918, the Imperial family and their faithful attendants-eleven persons in all-were led into a small room in the house where they had been imprisoned and shot to death with revolvers.

There had been no trial of any kind. Before their death the captives were subjected to ill-treatment, amounting to horrible torture, mental if not physical. After death the completely destroyed. These acts had been premeditated and the murders elaborately prepared.

It is established beyond doubt that tact, a set of false teeth. the ex-Czar fell a victim to his loyalty. He had refused offers from the enemies of Russia's Allies proposing Brest-Litovsk. Attempts to inveigle iron pit. him into an unholy alliance undoubtedly preceded the murder. All the Romanoffs who died violent deaths after the Ekaterinburg shooting, and were, like the Czar, inconvenient to all theories of the miraculous sur-German as well as to Internationalist vival of the Romanoff children should

At Ekaterinburg in April, 1919, met the investigating magistrate who had been specially appointed by the Supreme Ruler (Koltchak) to conduct the inquiry into the Czar case-Nicholas Alexeievich Sokolov. I was for many months in constant touch with the course of the inquiry, and personally took part in the search for the remains of the victims.

When the fall of Omsk appeared to be imminent, Sokolov departed eastward, taking with him all the documents, material clues, etc., which by right could be in no other hands save his. At Harbin Sokolov's life being in danger, he hid the rossier in my car, which had the protection of the British flag, and, with his approval I took charge of the dossier, it being understood that, given certain contingencies, I should be free at my own discretion to make it public in whole or in part. 





It is possible that an entertainment suitable for children may be presented at matinees only, but the regular pantomime will be suspended until the following year. The very heavy expenses attached to a Drury Lane pantomime in these days carry off most of the profits. An additional reason for carrying on The Garden of Allah" is that this play appeals to and attracts an entirely new audience, the vast theatre being filled less with regular playgoers than with readers of books and magazines who like to see their heroes and heroines on the stage. The Drury Lane management always felt that i was a mistake to have taken off "The Whip" in favour of a pantomime be fore the war. Though "The Whip" was filling the house and bringing in large profits, it was taken off in favour of the traditional pantomime, which, in spite of its success, made only a small profit. SOME CURIOUS DECEPTIONS.

The two brothers were so much alike in appearance that they were able alternately to convince a wife that they were married to her; that was the defence put forward recently in a bigamy charge, says Pearson's Weekly.

It sounds extraordinary that such a thing should be possible, but it has certainly occurred more than once in the past.

There is the amazing instance of Arnold du Tilb, a Frenchman, who or three years passed himself off as bogus husband, the woman's real usband having left the country.

Du Tilb, who resembled him in age and appearance, made himself familiar with his habits and peculiarities, and when one day he presented himself as the long-absent spouse, he was received with tremendous joy. The neighbors even welcomed him with a special song and dance! But an old uncle persisted that du

Tilb was a fraud. For a long time the wife protested with tears in her eves that he was her lawful husband. At last, however, she consented to a prosecution.

Twenty-One Years a "Man." Large numbers of witnesses supported the old uncle, but the imposter was not without friends, for the court was astonished to hear four sisters of the real husband solemnly declare by all the stars that du Tilb was "their dear brother."

That sounded fairly convincing, but, unfortunately for him, someone succeeded in discovering the real husband.

Many people will hardly credit the possibility of such deception. Yet it is no more remarkable than the well authenticated cases in which women have successfully posed as husbands. An individual who was under the name of James Allen was married for twenty-one years before a fatal accident happened, and the wife learnt for the first time that "he" was a woman. The marriage took place at Camberwell Church, and was the result of the bride's attachment to a 'smart, well-groomed young man" who was employed by the same master as herself.

Afterwards, "he took great pains to ive up to the part. When the two were separated for a time "he" wrote her long, passionate, love-letters, ending by describing "himself" as her "most loving and affectionate husband

An Amazing Man-Woman. Neither did "be" forget to be duly jealous, upbraiding the wife soundly if "he" caught her casting glances at man, and even at times chastising

Even more remarkable is the case of a Sheffield woman who posed as a husband for twenty-five years. At the end of that time she began to get in arrears with the housekeeping allowance, and her "wife" in complaining to a Manchester solicitor named Thomas said she had just begun to suspect that her "spouse" was a woman. The latter then admitted the

soft impeachment. This remarkable person had disguised herself as a boy at an early age, and rather liking the role, she decided to continue it. She was apprenticed to a Mr. Peacock, a builder, of Bawtry, Yorkshire, and her deportment and manners soon made her popular among the "flappers" of that



Bishop Field in the year 1866 when he was appealing for \$30.000 for the Endowment Fund of the College, half of which he raised within the next two years in this country, used these words: "The support of our Theological College is the most certain or most likely means of obtaining a sup-ply of men for the work of the Ministry of this Diocese; and it ought to be generally known that it is vair look to other Colonies or to Eng land for clergy; as not only in the Colonies, but in England it is found impossible at present to meet the pressing and increasing demand for them. The College presents an in-ducement and affords an opportunity to young men in the Colony to devote and prepare themselves for the service of the Church, who might other wise want the mind or the means of seeking and obtaining the necessar education and training elsewhere.

It is urgently felt that the Church in Newfoundland must link herself or to this vitally important movement and endeavour to keep pace with it The first thing to be done is to in crease the efficiency of the Diocesa Theological College."

But the time has come in the his tory of our Diocese when a great forward movement is necessary in onnection with this Institution, We have arrived at an age when a demand is being made for greater efficiency in the training of our clergy. Nothing short of both a Theological College and a University training will suffice for those who are going to be lead-ers of their fellow-men in this new

Our funds will not permit us, even if it were thought desirable, to send our men to an English College to re-ceive their theological training. Even were we able to double them they would not be sufficient for this; but if our Endowments could be increased to such a figure as would give the to \$4,000 per year we coul keep at least twelve men at Queen's under the special supervision of two Honours graduates of Oxford or Cambridge University, who would see that at the end of their course here the greater number of them would pass on to an English University to com-

plete their training. We are still ready to welcome all the recruits we can get from other hurch in other Colonial and Missionary Dioceses are so urgent that we cannot hope in the future to receive the same consideration that we have enjoyed in the past. Happily we have the material in our own Diocese to be trained, and we could fill our Colege to-morrow if the funds were

The buildings have just received thorough renovation and are now in a first-class condition. This has all been paid for so that the Institution is out of debt. Our main problem then to-day is to find funds for curexpenses. Very careful con sideration has been given to the whole question of the College maintenance and efficiency, and it is estimated that the Diocese must raise a capital sum of not less than \$70,000 to put the Institution on a sound financial basis.

The appeal for this sum has met The appeal for this sum has met with a generous response from various parts of the Diocese; but so far we are a good way off from the objective which it is desired to reach, viz., \$1 per head of our Church population. The Story of "Safety First."

American phraseology is generally uminous and picturesque, but always forceful. To the prosaic British mind it is sometimes bewildering by reason of its remote allusiveness. At times it is quite misleading, as in the phrase "Safety first." "Safety first" is the rallying cry of the accidentprevention movement which has swept like a tornado over the American continent, and spread to countries as remote as Japan and China. "Safety first" is the watchword, not of timorous selfishness, as its name mighth apply, but of a great humanitarian movement. How the phrase came to be adopted is an interesting little story.

A few years ago there was fierce rivalry and competition between American railway companies. Many inducements were offered by competing lines to draw passenger traffic from their rivals. The chief of these was speed. The American railroad man is a "live wire," and has a full knowledge of the temperamental weaknesses of his countrymen. He offered them quicker and quicker journeys, so that the business man who had saved seven minutes in journeying to his suburban home was enabled to waste three-quarters of an hour at the vil- Stop! Look! Listen! lage store in boasting about the achievement. The rivalry between competing companies grew more and more intense, Larger engines and more powerful brakes were installed. until gains were recknoed in seconds. and speed became an obsession. The end came with dramatic suddenness.

Speed and Death.

A series of terrible railway accidents, followed by inquiries, at which these accidents were found to be due almost entirely to the mania for speed, shocked the public mind. A railway conference was held, attended by representatives of all the rival companies, to confer on the situation At this conference it was decided that henceforth the first consideration that would be taken into account in relation to the travelling public would not be speed, or comfort, or fares, but safety. Hence the phrase "Safety

Safety Inspectors.

Since those far-off days "Safety first" has become the watchword of the accident-prevention movement. In America-if we are to believe the Home Office inspectors who have recently visited that country-it has obtained the sanction of a religion More than four thousand factories and railroads have installed safety inspectors, who are aided by committees chosen from among the representatives of employers and workers. "Safety first" is organized to deal with that large class of accidents which factory legislation or machinery guarding are powerless to affect-those due to carelessness, negligence or ignorance. As these form ninety per cent. of the whole number, there is a large field for such an terprise.

The Importation of Flour.

The Newfoundland Food Control Board announce that as the agreement made with the Canadian Wheat Board expired on August 31st. at which date also the Canadian Wheat Board went out of existence, PERMITS TO IMPORT FLOUR FROM ANY COUNTRY ARE NO LONGER NECESSARY.

The public may be interested in knowing that during the period of this agreement (Janu ary to August, 1920,) between the Food Contr Board and the Canadian Wheat Board, Ne foundland shared with Canada and the West Indies the fortunate position in which she was getting all her flour fully \$1.50 (one dollar an a half) per barrel cheaper than the Unite States or any other part of the World, makin quite a large save to our people.

The agreement referred to above gave New foundland the privilege of importing White Flour (while Canada was using flour not white), gave Newfoundland assurance of fu supplies, and rescinded the tax of two dollars which had been placed on Flour exported from

of the golf ball was liquid which was contained in a rubber pouch with a small tubular opening which was tied with a piece of rubber tape. This pouch was enclosed by a thick rubber jacket. Most of the liquid had leaked out, but what was remaining on the side had a strong alkaline reaction. The basic principle present was silicate of soda, and it was probable that the pouch had been filled with a sodium silicate jelly mixture.




