ARGENTINES MUST SURRENDER.
LONDON, Sept. 13. A report was circulated in Dublin today that De Valera had had a conference with General Mulcahy, commander of the Free State army, according to Dublin advices to the Evening Standard. Mulcahy is understood to have told De Valera that there would be no peace until the Argentines had surrendered their arms.

RAILWAY SETTLEMENT.

CHICAGO, Sept. 13. M. M. Jewell, head of the railway shop craft, announced tonight that the Union's Policy Committee of ninety, had authorized him to negotiate individual peace agreements with the railroads of the country based on the terms of the general settlement, yielding wherever possible and standing firm where there are no other avenues honourable to their beliefs. All men are to return to work in positions of glass original held on June 30th, according to a statement by the policy committee.

THE BILL AGAINST BANK MANAGER.

WILL VENIZELLOS RETURN?

Lithopone: Product of Infant Industry.

Lithopone is an artificially prepared compound composed of 70 per cent zinc sulphide, precipitated together. It is a recognized standard pigment and filler used by paint and rubber manufacturers and today the normal amount manufactured in the United States is above 130,000 tons, which at the price of 7 cents a pound represents a total of \$18,900,000, which is pretty good for an "infant" industry only a few years old. About 80 per cent of the lithopone is manufactured in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, and the remaining 20 per cent, in the states of Illinois, Missouri and California.

RETURNS TO ARCTIC.

WISCASSETT, Maine, Sept. 13. Donald B. MacMillan, explorer, plans to return to the Arctic in July of next year. He said today that his recent trip, having been so successful, another would be undertaken.

WILL STAND BY GREECE.

LONDON, Sept. 13. The Central News in a despatch from Athens, says it is reliably informed that the Yugoslav and Roumanian Governments have evidenced without equivocation their intention of aiding Greece in the event of a Balkan conflict.

BIG SHIPPING LOSS.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13. The Government's fleet of 225 war built wooden ships were sold yesterday at private competitive sale by the Shipping Board's Emergency Fleet Corporation to George D. Perry San Francisco for \$750,000 the original cost of a single ship.

NEW MODERATOR ELECTED.

HALIFAX, N.S., Sept. 13. Doctor Thomas Stewart of Halifax was elected moderator of the Presbyterian Synod of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland at the opening session here yesterday. Preaching the gospel was emphasized as the supreme work of the Church in the course of a sermon delivered by retiring moderator, Rev. Christopher Munroe, which proved the feature of the opening proceedings.

Road Improvement.

Dear Sir.—It is very pleasing to note that the Torbay Road, the most popular country road in the East End, is now being put in first-class condition. The grading is remarkably good and the men employed on the job deserve a meed of praise, as their work would compare favourably with that of experts. Coaker's Hill has been widened and the old bridge at the foot of the hill replaced with one of concrete. The same should be done with Parson's Bridge, a little further on. A "blind corner" here should also be attended to, as two accidents have occurred there already. I am not an alarmist, but I believe in "safety first." Widen this bridge and remove the trees that obstruct the view of the road. These improvements will be much appreciated by the people of the outlying settlements, and those who go out to enjoy the beautiful scenery along the open country enroute to the picturesque village of Torbay. While on this subject I would like to suggest that the short road leading from the Torbay Road to the Cove Road, near Stott's Bridge, be extended from the Logy Bay Road, near the Golf Links, to the old Cove Road. This would be an advantage to motorists and others and would cut out the roundabout way of the King's Bridge for those whose business call them to the upper part of the city. I am not afflicted with cacophonous scribbling, but realizing the benefit the extension of this road would be to the public induced me to refer to it here to bring it under the notice of those interested in road making.



Stone-Eaters.

Stones are commonly found in the stomachs of the crab-eating seal of the Antarctic seas; and it is believed that they, with a certain amount of grit, are scooped up with the crustacea from the bottom of the sea. The emperor penguin, on the other hand, shows an instinctive craving for stones for gizzard-grinding purposes; for these stones must be assiduously sought, since these birds never rest upon dry land, but only upon ice. The fate of stones swallowed by birds is not easy to determine.

Another unexpected name in this list of stone-swallowers is that of the Lesser Borqual. This is a "baleen" whale, feeding upon minute crustacea, and fish. From the peculiar method of feeding, which is, so to speak, forced upon this animal, it is unlikely that any portion of the food is scooped up from the sea-floor; hence the pebbles found in its stomach must be deliberately swallowed, and it is supposed, for the purpose of digestion, or, rather, of trituration. They are hardly likely to be derived from the fish which are engulfed, for these are mostly herring. — San Francisco Chronicle.

SIDE TALKS.

HOW TO CHOOSE A CONFIDANTE.

A man whom many people seem to like to confide in, told me this illuminating little story the other day.

"Another man I opened up his heart to one night when we were sitting together and told me a whole lot of things. He wasn't the kind of man who usually gets confidential right in the middle of it. He stopped and said: 'Damn it all, I know I ought not to be telling you this but all the years I've known you you've never told me anything that anybody else told you. I guess that's safer than enough.'"

His Best Compliment.

"I never had a compliment," said he, "that pleased me more and never one that I had occasion to remember of when the temptation not to do it came to me."

"Then you do find it a temptation?" he asked, for he has the reputation of being exceedingly discreet.

"Has there ever anyone who has said to me, 'When you do things that would make people's eyes stick out, isn't it always a temptation to make them stick out? Or when you don't do it?'"

"Not at all of us could say 'Of course' so calmly!"

The Commonest Temptation.

"All the temptations," I think the relation connected with "that little number that kindeth a great fire" is the most universal, the most subtle and the most irresistible. The temptation to betray a confidence, the temptation to hint that you have a confidence that you can't betray (and which you half betray it), the temptation to make fun of people even when you like them (the sweetest, the most human), the temptation to be clever at the expense of other things than cleverness, these are some of the many forms of tongue temptations to which most of us yield the time or another.

The Best Test.

The test by which man chooses his confidante is an excellent test. The man or woman who tells us other people's secrets: "Of course you mustn't tell a soul, I ought not to tell you but I know you would be interested," will tell out secrets to others.

That ought to be so obvious that it would be ridiculous to say it but apparently it isn't. We always think that we are to have special exemption for some obscure reason. Perhaps because our secrets are so much more important than other people's.

Fast Bowling.

The ambition of amateur bowlers is speed, and a vast amount of energy is expended in attempting to deliver "scorchers."

Science comes into bowling just as it does into everything else, and lots of unnecessary effort might be saved if bowlers would remember a few mechanical facts about the proper delivery of a ball. The speed of the ball is precisely that of the bowler's hand at the moment he lets go; and it does not depend on the length of run; after a run of fifty yards it will not travel a jot faster than after one of six yards.

Some bowlers take a long run and change step just before sending the ball; at the moment they change step most of the energy gained in the first part of their run is lost so far as giving speed to the ball is concerned.

Strange to say, the speed of the ball depends largely on how quickly the bowler can stop himself at the end of his run.

If he could run six yards and come to a dead stop at the precise moment that his arm was just below the highest point of its swing, he could send down the ball at a speed that would bewilder any batsman.

But since the effect of coming to a dead stop would be equivalent to running into a brick wall, bowlers will have to content themselves with moderate speeds.

Phrases We Use Every Day.

How many people know the origin of our common phrases, "mind your P's and Q's"?

In the old days it was the custom at the taverns and alehouses to chalk up on a board or wall each customer's account and these lists were divided up under the initial letters of pints and quarts. Thus, when old Farmer Jones was overcharging his drinks a friend would tap him on the shoulder, and tell him to "mind your P's and Q's."

Another explanation of this queer expression is that it was a warning to printers who were liable to confuse the two letters in setting type. Printers are also said to have originated the expression "out of sorts," meaning they had certain "sorts" of letters missing.

"To scrape an acquaintance" is said to have originated from the Roman Emperor Hadrian. Going to the baths one day he saw an old soldier scraping himself with a tile. Feeling sorry at the man's reduced state he ordered washing materials and some money to be given to him.

Founded on Fiction.

Soon after, on another visit to the baths, he found several other soldiers repeating the tile experiment in the hope of receiving something from their emperor.

Hadrian, however, guessed what they were after, and told them: "You had better scrape yourselves, my good fellows; you shall certainly not scrape acquaintance with me."

The word "antastasia" is said to have come down to us from the mythical story of Tantalus, who was condemned to suffer the eternal punishment of a burning thirst. He was up to his chin in water, but every time he bent to drink it flowed away. Above his head was a luscious bunch of grapes, which blew out of his reach each time he stretched out for the fruit. Thus our expression "antastasia" was originated.

Our expression "hobnob" probably comes from the days when beer was warmed on the "hob" of the hearth, and the cold beer placed on a small table called a "nob." Visitors were asked in consequence: "Will you hob or nob?"

Hence the meeting of people to drink beer became known as "hobnobbing," and our present meaning of the word can be easily traced from this.


