





WHEN SHIPPING GOLD. EW YORK, Dec. 16.—(A.P.(—Balted by a ton of gold, over which tly soldiers stood guard day and ight, the steamship American Legion as arrived here with its precious sure of \$5,000,000 in bullion from enos Aires. It is the first gold ally to be exported from Argentina ce the wartime embargo and, acding to Munson Line officials, the argest consignment ever to pass beeen the two continents.

The gold, in 20 oaken chests bound ith metal and sealed, when shipped ere by the Argentina National Bank r deposit against London drafts to the coupons on part of the Argenexternal debt. Since the debt is able in sterling, the gold probably be exhanged for British pounds, which it will go into storage to nain until it is minted or rejoins stream of bullion constantly flowbetween the United States and eign countries.

Because of the difference in the s of exchange the government of rgentina expects to profit to the exent of about 3,500,000 paper pesos in New York when the gold is exchanged r pounds sterling.

Handling large shipments of gold nd silver bullion has become comonplace with trans-Atlantic steamcompanies and the bullion is andled as so much "merchandise." ut the shipment of a few millions rom a South American country beomes a national event, and the teamship chosen for its transport is reighted with responsibility.

The removal of the \$5,000,000 from he Argentina National Bank to the hip was attended by the greatest of precaution. It was rushed through he streets of Buenos Aires accompanied by guards armed with pistols, rifles and swords and hustled into the burglar-proof vaults of the American Legion. The precious cargo was under strict watch throughout the voyage. Jon arrival here similar procautions were taken, the regular police being augmented by armed guards, while the armored trucks that carried the gold o a government sub-treasury were rotected by armed men.

Handling gold has become so com nonplace with the largest trans-Atantic steamship companies and the gents of the lines and even the dock ands have become blase about handinging millions of the metal. The rocess of loading, storing and unoading gold in inetrnational shipments has become so systematized that the factors of responsibility and risk are considered hardly more than in the transportation of toys. An official of the International Mercantile Marine explained that the companies dell perfectly at ease when the gold s placed in a ship's vault. In transporting the gold to and from ships, guards are usually provided by the consignor and consignee.

Hugh Contracts. Now Being Made

TO SHIP OUR PULPWOOD TO U.S.A. MONTREAL.—The deadly effect of the government's dilly-dallying with the pulpwood question is getting graphic demonstration in the new contracts that are being arranged alnost daily for the exportation of Canadian pulpwood to the United States. Such a contract was reported by the Campbellton Graphic the other day in

the following news item: "An announcement of considerable interest came from the local office of the O. J. Klein Transportation Co. recently. During an extended trip to New York and through Eastern States, Mr. Klein signed huge contracts with American mills in the vicinity of Watertown and Carthage for their supply of wood. These handsome contracts stretch over a period of ten years and call for the shipment of

36,000 cords per annum. "It is understood that this wood will be cut on lands acquired by Mr. Klein on the Matane Coast, and also by purchase from settlers in that territory and along the Gaspe and Northen New Brunswick Coasts."

In the case of this contract, provision is made for the export to the United States of 360,000 cords of Canadian pulpwood which will bring the country around \$3,000,000. Made up into paper, the revenue to Canada would be closer to \$18,000,000. Canada loses the difference by permitting the export of the pulpwood in its raw

state. True it is an embargo may be put into effect if the pulpwood commission ever finishes its meetings, but all practical effects of the embargo have been removed by the order-incouncil of last August that permitted the export for a period of ten years of pulpwood under contracts dated before June, 1923. American firms now arranging contracts for supplies of pulpwood are seeing that the contracts are dated before January, 1923, and it is anticipated that a large supply of the pulpwood available for export will be contracted for very shortly. The only remedy for the denuding of the freehold forests under these contracts will be the rescinding of the order-in-council, the origin of which

has never yet been explained by Premier King.-Financial Post.

London to Near East Air Service to be Extended

Munich, Dec. 14 (A. P.)-Plans for comprehensive air service from London to Persia were outlined by Major von Tschudi in a recent lecture at the Munich Museum before a meeting of representatives of various companies operating airplanes commercially in Europe. A trans-European union was established which Professor Junkers and many other men prominent in the world of aircraft joined. Bavaria. Switzerland. Austria, Hungary, and the leading airplane companies of all these coun tries are represented in the union.

It contemplates the extension of the London-Cologne-Fuerth service by night flights along the Danube to Budapest in hydroplanes which will he guided by reflectors along the river. Before 1926 this union hopes to extend this service to Brails on the Black Sea, to Russia, Persia, Greece, Turkey and spain.

Some of the ancient windjammers are destined to reach Davy Jones' locker in a way their builders never dreamed of. While the cameras stand by, they will be wrecked by "terrific storms" or scuttled by pirates. Handto-hand fights will be waged on their decks. From some of them high flames may shoot at the signal of a director.

The movie companies recently have bought many of these archaic craft. for which commerce has no further use. The vessels will be aftered to fit the "script," thus becoming Chinese junks, vikings' ships, historic men-ofwar or what-not.

Bogus Royalty Finds it Easy to - Fool Germans

Berlin, Dec. 14 (A. P.)-Democratic Germany has not ceased to worship at the throne of royalty and because of this bogus princes with hyphenated and unpronounceable names often flimflam the German public.

A make-believe prince with a sense of humor and taste for expensive automobiles and high living recently lived high in a number of German cities at the expense of exclusive hotels and garages which cater to the high-born by assuming the title Prince Hanshorst von Isenburg-Bierstein. His name varied from time to

In North Germany he posed as Count von Ohr, or Count of the Ear. Sometimes he paid his bills in bad checks when proprietors of hotels became too insistent, but generally he moved along before they got tired of extending credit to royalty.

Berlin police officials have run down the man's record and say he is a twenty-four-year-old salesman who has been known in police circles of North Germany for several years. In some cases where he was not able to obtain an automobile he engaged chauffeurs and explained to hotelkeeper's that his auto was coming in a few


