range of the secondary tuning. If the dead spot occurs above 59 legrees on the tuning condenser insert a very small condenser in series with the antenna and the antenna binding post of the receiver. This condenser should have a capacity around 100 micro micro farads (.00901 MFD.). This will shift the dead spot below the minimum wave-length to which the secondary will be tuned in he breadcast wavelengths. If the spot appears below 50 degrees on your tuning dial place a small loading coil in series with the antenna and the antenna binding post of the receiver. This coil should be abour 3 to 4 inches in diameter and should consist of some 30 turns of No. 22 to No. 26 B. & S. gauge magnet wire. The loading coil will raise the wavelength of the dead spot section above he maximum tuning range of the secondary. After this is done it will probably be advisable to reduce the number of turns on the tickler. The tickler should have just enough turns to cause the tube to oscillate when the tuning condenser is set at its maximum capacity. Reduce the tickler turns until this condition exists and rour set will be much easier to handle and you will get rid of the cranky operation on certain waves
