A Talk About Some New Issues-The writer has been favored with a Levantine surcharges of this country sight of some brand new issues, there being over two hundred in the lot. Some are the same in design, coming in new U. P. U. colors, while others are of eniirely new make. The issues of Chile look neat but are on paper of rather poor quality. People will probably differ as to the issues from Crete and French Congo. Those from Crete have for designs the faces of Prince George and mythical individuals, and I can't agree as to the beauty of the designs always as expressed by others. The values go as high as 5 drachmas, surcharges occurring in the larger ones. French Congo has 15 new stamps. They are bi-colored, being handsome enough in that respect. Otherwise they seem ugly. A panther at bay figures on six of them, watermarked with the thistle; a Bakalois female does duty for six others, with a rose tree branch for watermark; the alley in Libreville, with an olive tree watermark. The Kisengarh (India) stamps are suggestive of many others already in vogue trom that well known for their beauty. A in design to the former ones. The meeting house.

Stamps on the Wall-When I, made- the assertion in the June-Alleghany Philatelist that "40,000 stamps would paper the wall of a good-sized room" I knew what I was talking about. I made my calculations also from the present issue of Uncle Sam's stamps, which are not large, but can be classed as of ordinary size. My "stamp room" is ten feet square, eight and a half feet high. After taking out two doors, one window and mop boards, I found that 40,000 stamps would be sufficient to cover the wall paper surface by using the ordinary U.S. stamps for the body of it, with a six inch border at the top of Columbians and Omahas. If all was papered with the regular issue 42, 100 stamps would be enough. Philatelic Oddities. Some

Oddities in stamps are closely related to errors, nevertheless there is a distinction between them. Errors are very popular with the majority of collectors; oddities are saved and collected by only a small minority. The reason for the above condition may be that as most errors are catalogued collectors know of their existence, and therefore collect them while, on the contrary, oddities are not catalogued, therefore less known and collected. It is my intention to give ignorant collectors a litt'e knowledge on oddities and descriptions of some of them, which are as follows: Albino envelopes are generally termed as oddities. the design and die impressed in color lacking. and these have a very odd appearance. The 1898 1c green envelope of Canada has been discovered by Starnaman Bros., publishers of the "Advocate" as an Albino.
