AT NIAGARA FALLS.

Canadian Factory Across the Border

—General Notes.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Nov. 17.—(Special.)—The tariff enquiry has stirred up consider able talk among the fruit-growers and manu facturers in this vicinity. Several fruit growers of Stamford Township interviewed stated their entire satisfaction with the tariff as it now stands. Many favored a higher tariff, especially on pears and plums, and a duty on Southern fruit. It was a noticeable fact among these were several who were in favor of lowering the duty when the tariff enquiry was made by the late Government a few years ago. The manufacturers fear a reduction, claiming it to be as fatal as free trade. The web factory, which is closing up preparatory to removal to the United States, is straight evidence of this. The manager stated that when the tariff was 25 per cent. on elastic web the Canadian branch flourished, but when it was reduced to 20 per cent. he found the American factory could pay the duty and place it on the market at the same price as the Canadian factories. Another proof that the American manufacturer is trying to freeze out the Canadian producer is shown by a fact which has just leaked out through a railway man. The incident occurred some two years ago, but, nevertheless, it will be news to many. A Cincinnati firm were quoting goods 25 per cent. cheaper to their Canadian partons than to their own countrymen. 



WOOL IS GOING UP.

Restored Confidence and a Shortage Supply Will Lift Up Prices—A Talk With Ald. John Hallam.

Ald. John Hallen was interviewed yes-rday with reference to the condition of thy alderman takes a deep interest in all he is identified, and is a keen observer of dence. The different woolen and worsted industries throughout the country have commenced working full time, and tens of thousands of hands that were previously unemployed are now working. This has been brought about by the defeat of Bryan, whose election would have kept wool and other articles of raw material on the free list, with a fluctuating currency and a consequent uncertainty in its value. This has been happily averted. Wool has gone up in the United States from one to three cents per pound. Combling wools of the Lelcester. Lincoln and Cotswold type have gone up the most, being fully three cents more than they were some 10 weeks ago. The manufacturers of the United States, while they are pleased at the result, are not in favor of any radical change in the tarriff, not even on the higher grades. Any diteration in the tarriff must be made gradually and thoroughly, so that present arrangements may not be upset. It is thought by men who understand the wool business that there will really be a shortage of wool in the United States, owing to the hurdreds of thousands of sheep that have been slaughtered during the past two years, because it did not pay the ranchmen to keep them. The shortage is estimated at many million pounds, and, if that be the case, wool must go up in the United States. It remains to see how this shortage will affect the wool markets of the world. Prices in Marsellles, Australia and River Platte are decidedry stiffer, and holders of wool and sheepskins are asking higher prices, and are not desirous of making sales, unless they can do so at higher values than present market prices warrant.

TARIFF CAN'T BE LOWERED. With respect to the Canadian trade, the woolen manufacturers have been waiting to see what would be done by the tariff commission, which is now sitting at the Board of Trade building. A great deal depends upon how the tariff is dealt with. It is evident to anyone who understands the woolen business that it will never do to change the specific duty on woolens, as all tweeds, blankets and other articles of like manufacture are just about as low in price now and much better, in my opinion, than those imported at equal price. Any change in the specific duty will have a tendency to displace these goods, and every pound of tweed that is imported from England would displace just so much that can and would be manufacturers will be able to put their case fairly and squarely before the commission, and whatever is best for the public will be done.

THE INDUSTRY NEEDS NURSING.

The worst of the business in Canada is that it is in its infancy. There are some very good and desirable worsted goods being manufactured. Considerable worsted yarns are imported that are necessary to give Canadian tweeds a character for style and wearing qualities. That part of the tariff that affects worsted yarns will be the most difficult to deal with, as some tweed manufacturers want to get this class of yarns in free or at nominal duty, while the worsted manufacturers want to compete with the imported yarns. On the whole, I think the tariff as it now stands on this article may be a little modified, but I think that it is satisfactory to those manufacturers who use these yarns.

Blankets to-day of Canadian manufactures are sold just as cheap as, and of better quality than, those imported from England. In the matter of quality, the imported article is not in it at all. It is thought that some of the manufacturers will ask the Government for higher protective duties. This I do not agree with at all. be manufactured in this country, I our woolen manufacturers can get fairly well and hold their own.

Turning to another phase of the tariff question, Mr. Hallam, whose great affection for books is well known, expressed his strong opposition to a specific duty of six cents per pound being retained upon books. Thousands and tens of, thousands of books are imported into Canada that cannot and will not be for a great many years published in Canada, and unless the Government needs the amount of duty now imposed for revenue purposes, I think the duty should be removed. At best, it is a piece of barbarism to collect a specific duty upon second-hand books. Canada, with two or three exceptions, is the only country that taxes knowledge, and I hope the present Government will take the duty of second-hand books.
