THE TORONTO WORLD ONE CENT MORNING PAPER.

It is highly satisfactory to observe that this idea of making the Empire self-contained in the matter of her food supplies is rapidly taking possession of the thinking of Englishmen. The present European wheat crisis has brought to the people of Great Britain as it has never before brought. The Minneapolis Journal has hit the nail on the head and driven it home perhaps further than it intended. It is to be hoped the present disclosure of Britain's dependence upon the United States will be the first of a series of last arousing Englishmen from their lethargy. As long as Britain depends upon foreign countries for her wheat just so long will she be living in a fool's paradise. The Minneapolis Journal points out this truth in a way that will appeal very forcibly to Englishmen. It says: "England cannot dare not fight us in any emergency. Without our food supplies England must starve; without them her great battlements would be useless, her manufacturing centres would be idle, her people would die for want of food. Even though we fight with another power, England must keep the American food routes open; for an effective blockade of our coasts would be infinitely more harmful to her than to us."

Great Britain must not place too much reliance in a deathbed repentance. She ought to look matters squarely in the face. In any event, it is her duty to remedy the weakness which has been so forcibly disclosed by her commercial, if not political, rival. The British Empire ought to be dependent neither on the United States nor any other foreign country for its food supplies.

IS IT A WAR OF HUMANITY OR OF CONQUEST? A large number of Americans are puzzling their brains just now to discover a way to overcome the effect of the clause in the war resolution which declared with very great definiteness that the United States did not intend to wage a war of conquest and had no intention of annexing Cuba. When the Americans began this war they posed before the world as humanitarians, ready to spend their money and spill their blood for the sake of the poor down-trodden Cubans, without hope of any other reward than that which comes from the sense of having performed a disagreeable duty. But now there seems to be little doubt that a majority of the American people are determined that Cuba and Porto Rico must become the property of the United States sooner or later, and a very large number are in favor of permanently annexing the Philippine Islands and other Spanish groups in the Pacific. One newspaper says that Congress did promise the world at large not to annex Cuba, but it fortunately did not say anything about Porto Rico and the Philippines. It thinks Congress is bound to keep its promise about Cuba and the Philippines, but it is necessary for the United States to annex all the other Spanish islands in order to pay the cost of the war. By imposing high customs duties on imports into these islands it thinks they can in a few years recover the money spent on the war and have the islands besides. In other words, they would make the people of Porto Rico and the Philippines part of liberating their fellow-sufferers in Cuba. It looks a little as if the Americans had asked the world to stand off and allow them to thrash a fourth-rate power without interference on false pretences, but probably there was no intention of doing that. The resolution was passed. The events of the war are creating the lust for empire.

THE WATCHDOG OF THE PEOPLE. Almost ever since the Laurier Government got control of Dominion expenditures the Ministers have been quarrelling with the Auditor-General because he insists upon properly auditing the accounts of the various departments. The Liberals of the present day seem to think that the Auditor-General should be a mere clerk, ready to endorse any payment directed by Minister without asking questions, but that old-fashioned Liberal, Alexander Mackenzie, had a very different idea when he established the office and appointed Mr. J. L. McDougall to the position, and fortunately the powers and duties of the Auditor-General are so carefully defined that no Government can make a tool of him. He is appointed to act as the watchdog of the people over the Dominion Treasury, and is removable only by the Governor-General on address of the Senate and House of Commons. He is expected to see that no cheque issues for the payment of any public money for which there is no direct Parliamentary appropriation, or in excess of any portion of such appropriation, the expenditure of which has been authorized by the Governor-in-Council. If he objects to any account, payment must be suspended until the matter is referred to the Treasury Board, which may overrule his decision. The Treasury Board is a committee of six members of the Dominion Cabinet, but it is specially authorized by Act of Parliament and has separate functions as the Board of accountants for the Government. It is four of the six members of the Treasury Board who appear from his decision that he is in error, he is bound to act according to their view even if all the remaining members of Council think that he is right, save on the other hand if four of the Board agree with him, the Cabinet have no right to overrule his decision. It will be seen that while the Auditor-General cannot block the Government in making any payment if they unthinkingly approve of it, he is to a great extent able to prevent individual members of the Cabinet from making

misappropriations of public money without the knowledge of their associates and of Parliament. Mr. J. L. McDougall as Auditor-General, since his appointment, has performed his duties with painstaking care, and although he was a Liberal, appointed by a Liberal Government, Sir John Macdonald fully recognized the value of his work, and more than once publicly expressed satisfaction with his rigid performance of his duties. Sir John, like the present Premier, often had to deal with unscrupulous men whom he did not wish to offend, and he found it a great advantage to be able to say to them with a twinkle in his eye, "I cannot do that or I'll have old watchdog McDougall down on me." But Laurier prefers to refer such men to Sifton, Tarte or Blair and it annoys him to find that the Auditor-General will not allow them to do anything in the dark. One of the complaints that the Liberals make against the Auditor-General is that he asks for too many papers. They say that it imposes too much extra labor upon the clerical staffs of the different departments to furnish him copies of reports and other papers which he requires for the performance of his duties. But the chief cause of quarrel between the Government and the Auditor-General is over an item of eight thousand dollars, which Mr. Sifton, the Minister of the Interior, ordered paid to the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway "as an amount of efforts made by that company within the last two years in opening up to colonization the vacant lands in the vicinity of the large district served by the railway," as the Order-in-Council expressed it. The money for this purpose was taken by Mr. Sifton from an amount voted by Parliament for immigration purposes, and the Auditor-General rightly objected to the diversion of this money from the uses for which it was voted. He argued that the railway company went into this expenditure on its own account because there was no money that would make a profit by the outlay. He said that while the Conservatives were in power he interpreted the authority of Parliament as being confined to the paying of expenditure which was made after instructions were given to go on with the work, and his ruling was accepted by the Conservative Government. He contended that Mr. Sifton opened a wide door when he showed his readiness to consider an application for even partial reimbursement of any expenditure which was made without the knowledge of the Government and purely as a business speculation. The Auditor-General advised that the matter be referred to the Treasury Board before paying the money, but in spite of his objections the money was paid to the railway without reference to the Treasury Board, and it was not until the Auditor-General made strenuous objections to this irregular proceeding that the matter was finally referred to the committee of the Cabinet, which then endorsed Sifton's deed. All these things have made the Government much displeased with the Auditor-General. They cannot get rid of him without the consent of both Houses of Parliament, and they have endeavored to make his position as uncomfortable as possible for him by reducing his staff of clerks, refusing to allow the regular statutory increases of salary to the clerks that he is allowed to retain, and annoying him in many ways. There is no doubt that the Auditor-General was right. Sifton was never authorized to manage his own Department of the Interior, but always wanted to negotiate deals with railways. He engineered the outrageous Yukon Railway deal, and he was largely responsible for the Crown's Nest Railway bargain by which leading Liberals got possession of valuable lands, and the Canadian Pacific Railway got all it wanted. It was quite in order for him to give some little one without much influence, he thought that his own department was the one to finance for the extension of the railway, and he took it out of the immigration fund. Then there was that shady-looking transaction by which Col. Dumville collected \$300 from the Militia Department while Sir Richard Cartwright was in charge, in spite of the protest of the Auditor-General. The fact that the amount was small in this case does not make the arrangement less discreditable. The people of this country and especially those of Toronto have had some experience of the aliphod work done by auditors in connection with such concerns as the Farmers' Loan Association who were under the control of directors, and they can appreciate the advantage of having a conscientious, hardworking, independent official like Auditor-General McDougall to watch over the Dominion Treasury.

power, she should harvest her wheat from her own fields, and from those of her loyal children beyond the seas." It is highly satisfactory to observe that this idea of making the Empire self-contained in the matter of her food supplies is rapidly taking possession of the thinking of Englishmen. The present European wheat crisis has brought to the people of Great Britain as it has never before brought. The Minneapolis Journal has hit the nail on the head and driven it home perhaps further than it intended. It is to be hoped the present disclosure of Britain's dependence upon the United States will be the first of a series of last arousing Englishmen from their lethargy. As long as Britain depends upon foreign countries for her wheat just so long will she be living in a fool's paradise. The Minneapolis Journal points out this truth in a way that will appeal very forcibly to Englishmen. It says: "England cannot dare not fight us in any emergency. Without our food supplies England must starve; without them her great battlements would be useless, her manufacturing centres would be idle, her people would die for want of food. Even though we fight with another power, England must keep the American food routes open; for an effective blockade of our coasts would be infinitely more harmful to her than to us."

Great Britain must not place too much reliance in a deathbed repentance. She ought to look matters squarely in the face. In any event, it is her duty to remedy the weakness which has been so forcibly disclosed by her commercial, if not political, rival. The British Empire ought to be dependent neither on the United States nor any other foreign country for its food supplies.

IS IT A WAR OF HUMANITY OR OF CONQUEST? A large number of Americans are puzzling their brains just now to discover a way to overcome the effect of the clause in the war resolution which declared with very great definiteness that the United States did not intend to wage a war of conquest and had no intention of annexing Cuba. When the Americans began this war they posed before the world as humanitarians, ready to spend their money and spill their blood for the sake of the poor down-trodden Cubans, without hope of any other reward than that which comes from the sense of having performed a disagreeable duty. But now there seems to be little doubt that a majority of the American people are determined that Cuba and Porto Rico must become the property of the United States sooner or later, and a very large number are in favor of permanently annexing the Philippine Islands and other Spanish groups in the Pacific. One newspaper says that Congress did promise the world at large not to annex Cuba, but it fortunately did not say anything about Porto Rico and the Philippines. It thinks Congress is bound to keep its promise about Cuba and the Philippines, but it is necessary for the United States to annex all the other Spanish islands in order to pay the cost of the war. By imposing high customs duties on imports into these islands it thinks they can in a few years recover the money spent on the war and have the islands besides. THE VICTORY OF ADMIRAL DEWEY. All the Reports of the Spanish Defeat Officially Confirmed.

The Americans in Complete Command of the Situation—Details of the ships of the Spanish Squadron that were destroyed—The President congratulates and Promotes the Victorious Commander and Promotes the Thanks of Congress.

Washington, May 7.—Notwithstanding that every day for several days past has been in momentary expectation of cable advices from Commodore Dewey, the town was thrown into the wildest excitement at breakfast time this morning by the issue of extra papers, announcing the arrival of the McCulloch at Hong Kong with dispatches of the engagement from Commodore Dewey. The State Department has at last received its first news. It came in the shape of a cablegram of three words from U. S. Consul Widman at Hong Kong, and was as follows: "Hong Kong—McCulloch. Widman."

Manila, May 7.—Squadron arrived at daybreak this morning. Immediately engaged the Spanish vessels: Reina Christina, Castilla, Don Antonio de Ulloa, Isla de Cuba, Marques de Duro, Correa, Velasco, Isla de Mindanao, a transport, and water vessel Carita. The following were captured, and only a few men were left. Only means of telegraphing is to American Consul at Hong Kong. I shall communicate with him. "Dewey." (Signed)

Admiral Dewey's Report. Shortly before noon Secretary Long left the Navy Department for the White House and an official confirmation was made that a second despatch from Commodore Dewey had been received at the White House. This with him to the White House; pending the conference with the President there was intense eagerness among the waiting crowd to learn the contents of the second despatch. Senators who saw the President secured brief intimations that Dewey's victory was overwhelming, and that he had a large number of Spanish prisoners in his possession.

At 12.30 Secretary Long came from the President's private room carrying the copy of the second despatch from Dewey, but in order to give equal facilities to the great crowd of people waiting to gain admittance he held it until he reached his private office. Then his secretary, Mr. Finney, brought the message to the President's room, where a hundred or more anxious correspondents and curious observers took the despatch at Mr. Finney's read it. It was as follows: "Cavite, May 4, 1898. 'I have taken possession of the navy station at Cavite on the Philippine Islands; have destroyed the fortifications and entrance paralling garrison. I control the bay completely, and can take any city at any time. Dewey's health and spirits. Spanish loss not fully known, but very heavy, 150 killed, including captain of Reina Christina, and 250 wounded; 250 sick and wounded in hospital. Our lines of communication at Manila, will protect foreign residents." (Signed) Dewey."

Honors for Dewey. By direction of the President Secretary Long sent the following cable despatch to Commodore Dewey: "Washington, May 7. 'Dewey, Manila: The President, in the name of the American people, thanks you and your officers and men for your splendid achievement and overwhelming victory. In recognition he has appointed you acting admiral, and will recommend a vote of thanks from Congress.' (Signed) Long."

The Ships Destroyed. As soon as the Navy Department had the complete official report of the Spanish ships destroyed by Commodore Dewey, they turned to their data showing the character of the ships destroyed, as it gave a full idea of the extent of the devastation caused by the American fleet. Taking the list in the order reported by Commodore Dewey, the ships destroyed are as follows: The Reina Christina, cruiser, a single screw, barque-rigged, length 230 feet, beam 45, mean draught 15 feet, armament 19 Bluntons 8 and 4-inch guns, 2 machine guns and five torpedo tubes; complement 810 men.

Castilla, built at Cadix in 1877; single screw, barque-rigged, one funnel, cruiser, displacement 3342 tons, length 246 feet, armament 19 Krupp guns and four revolving cannon, two torpedo tubes; complement 300 men.

Don Antonio de Ulloa, built at Barcelona in 1877; iron cruiser, single screw, barque-rigged, one funnel, displacement 1152 tons, length 310 feet, armament eight Bluntons guns, one machine gun, two torpedo tubes; complement 173 men.

Isla de Cuba, built at Elswick in 1866, steel cruiser, double screw, two-masted, with military tops, length 230 feet, displacement 1040 tons, armament 12 guns, 3 torpedo tubes; complement 104 men.

General Lezo, built at Carthagena, in 1855, iron gunboat, double screw, schooner-rigged, length 108 feet, displacement 625 tons, armament 3 guns, 3 machine guns and one torpedo tube; complement 98 men.

Marques de Duro, built at La Seyne in 1875, iron gunboat, double screw, schooner-rigged, displacement 500 tons, armament 8 guns, 1 machine gun, complement 85 men.

The El Correo is supposed to be the El Cano, that being the name given in the data of the Navy Department. She is an iron gunboat, double screw, schooner-rigged, displacement 525 tons, double screw, schooner-rigged, with 3 guns, 3 machine guns and 1 torpedo tube; complement 104 men.
