B.C. MINING CASES IN COURT

Centre Star Appeal, Asking Leave to Do Development Work, Further Refused.

SHEEP CREEK STAR CLAIM VOIDED. LeNot Appeal Allowed and a New Trial Refused—Appeal in an Alimony Case Dismissed.

Victoria, B.C., Jan. 9.—The regular January sitting of the full court commenced this morning.

In Centre Star v. Iron Mask the court last month refused the Centre Star appeal asking leave to do development work as a vein they claim under the Iron Mask claim. The court this morning refused leave to appeal to the Privy Council, which has already been adjourned.

In Goodwin v. Macdonald, the full court dismissed the appeal from the judgment of Justice Walker, who held that the location of the Sheep Creek Star Mineral claim was void, as the initial post was planted in violation of the provisions of the Act.

The opinion of the full court is as follows: I agree with the learned trial judge that the initial post of the Sheep Creek Star "claim," having been planted in the United States of America, instead of within the British Empire, is void ab initio, or, to put it in another way, there never was in law such a claim as Sheep Creek Star. The appeal must be dismissed with costs.

In Davies v. LeNot, the court allowed the defendants' appeal, and induced a new trial. The action was brought under the Employers' Liability Act, and the plaintiff claimed damages for a personal injury sustained by her while employed by the defendant.

In Hadden v. Hadden, the appeal was dismissed. The action was brought on a judgment for alimony, obtained in Ontario, and Judge Boile gave judgment in favor of the plaintiff. The defendant appealed on the ground that a foreign judgment for alimony is not enforceable in this country.

STRATHCONA'S LAST WORD

Everything Indicates a Prosperous Condition of Affairs, Commercially and Financially,

SAYS CANADA'S COMMISSIONER.

His Lordship Would Not Say Whether He Would Ever Return to This Country or Not.

Montreal, Jan. 9.—(Special.)—"The banking institutions of the country are in a good condition, and everything indicates, as far as I have been able to judge, that Canada is now in an exceedingly prosperous and satisfactory state, both commercially and financially." Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal gave to the business people of Montreal and the Dominion about an hour before the Canadian High Commissioner left the city. It having been stated that His Lordship's visit to Canada had come to an end, and that he would leave New York this evening, your correspondent interviewed the Dominion's representative in London at a late hour this afternoon. "I am far from being well, yet a great deal better," were his words. "Continuing to walk with a day's rest in New York, the peculiar of Canada's greatest banking institution, and being in constant touch since his arrival in Canada with the commercial and financial interests of the Dominion, he would be able to give a very valuable opinion regarding the country at large. Montreal's great benefactor said he could not concentrate his thoughts sufficiently well, but after a little he spoke as above.

They have ordered the Chicago City Council to pass a resolution to prepare the necessary legal papers that will carry into effect the complete submission to the recent decision of the Supreme Court of the United States, that the Pullman Company could make palace cars and coaches, but could not make trucks or government mail cars. MORE AMALGAMATION.

Alexander & Anderson Unit Their Interests With S. F. McKinnon & Co.—A Big Deal.

S. F. McKinnon & Co. and Alexander & Anderson, cloak manufacturers, have decided to unite their interests, and S. F. McKinnon & Co. have taken over the stock of the other firm. Mr. Alexander will be a director of the new company, which will be known as the S. F. McKinnon & Co. The amalgamation was held to make final arrangements for the new company.

HE WAS WEAK FOR YOUTH.

Count Franz Karolyi Believed to Have Succeeded Because He Was Ill.

London, Jan. 9.—It appears that Count Franz Karolyi, late attaché of the Austro-Hungarian Embassy in London, who committed suicide by shooting himself with a revolver in his apartments in Piccadilly on Friday night, wrote a letter to the consul of the Austro-Hungarian Legation on Friday, intimating his intention of committing suicide, but giving no reason. His colleagues believe that neither monetary difficulties nor disappointment in love, but his health, led him to the deed. He had been weak from infancy and suffered from spinal disease. Count Franz was the nephew, not the son, as originally claimed, of the former Austro-Hungarian Ambassador Berlin, the late Count Alois Karolyi. His father is Count Tibor Karolyi, the Hungarian Chamberlain of Magyars. The young man was attached to the Austro-Hungarian Legation before he was transferred to London.

MASSACHUSETTS STORY DENIED.

Philippines Say the Story Was Invented by Spanish Priests.

Hong Kong, Jan. 9.—According to the statements of people who have just arrived here from the island of Balabac, south of Luzon, a story of a massacre of Spaniards in the report that the Spaniards have been massacred by the Philippines. They say that the Spaniards were massacred in order to prevent the Filipino cause, declaring also that there are 100,000 Spaniards in Luzon, Spanish in the island, and that all who have been killed fell in warfare.

BRITISH TRADE RETURNS.

Increases Shown For December in Both Imports and Exports.

London, Jan. 9.—The Board of Trade report of Great Britain's foreign trade for the month of December shows an increase of £1,507,000 in imports and £1,200,000 in exports. The total value of the goods amounted to £2,707,000, as compared with £2,500,000 in 1897. The corresponding periods the exports were £283,200, 702, as against £234,216,708.



BISHOP SULLIVAN AT REST

The imposing obsequies attended out of loving respect by crowds of mourning citizens.

THE SUN DID SHINE AMID THE GLOOM

The Solemn Church Services—Musical Pathetic Strains—All Denominations Paid Their Tributes.

The crowds, composed of all conditions of citizens, who thronged St. James' Cathedral yesterday, on the occasion of the obsequies of the late Bishop Sullivan, gave a wonderful testimony to the affection the deceased had won during the brief space he spent as pastor. For three hours in the morning, and for two hours in the afternoon, the place was thronged out of esteem for the memory of the deceased.

THE FAMILY SERVICE

In the morning a short service, conducted by Bishop Du Moulin, was held at the late pastor's family residence, 38 Gerrard-street east, at half-past 8 o'clock, after which the casket containing the remains of the late Bishop was quietly conveyed to the Cathedral, accompanied by Rev. Canon Sweeney, Rev. J. F. Renaud of Montreal, Mr. Allan Renaud, A. H. Campbell, Jr., Mr. Mayne Campbell, Mr. A. Whitehead, Mr. George Drummond, Mr. P. G. C. Smith and Mr. A. H. Campbell. The two latter attended as representatives of St. George's Church, Montreal, where Bishop Sullivan officiated as pastor for some years.

Living in State

The casket was placed in the chancel with uncovered lid. The remains of the late Bishop were laid out in full bishop's robes, with hood of Trinity University degree. The floral tributes were very beautiful, and the casket was hidden amid a profusion of roses and lilies. At the head of the coffin was a magnificent floral arrangement, the tribute of the Cathedral choir, a floral cross from St. John of Port Arthur, and wreaths from the Anglican Women's Auxiliary and from the Sunday school in roses and other flowers made a tasteful display.

The Solemn Watch

From half-past 10 o'clock until nearly 2 o'clock the stream of visitors was constant and did not appear to be the same crowd that thronged the capacious church later in the day.

The Pathetic Strains

The opening sentences of the burial service were recited by Rev. R. Ashcroft, one of the curates of the church. Then came "Glorious Bells," a beautiful hymn, "O God, My Father, Who art ever with us," a wondrously sung with subdued organ accompaniment, and many were the tear-drenched faces as the plaintive verse was reached.
