When the bans for this singular political marriage are called, the Nonconformists may find just cause and impediment in the Duke of Devonshire's identification with the education acts, which they insist must be repealed.

The rancor with which free traders like Winston Churchill, Lord Hugh Cecil, Lord George Hamilton and Mr. Ritchie are attacked in their home constituencies has not been equalled since Mr. Gladstone and his home rule followers were denounced fourteen years ago as apostates and enemies of the empire. Mr. Balfour's denial a few months ago that individual opinion on economic subjects could be made a test of party loyalty, now has a hollow sound when the free traders are the victims of a secret intrigue and are openly blacklisted. Winston Churchill and Lord George Hamilton have been turned down by local Conservative organizations.

Mr. Chamberlain's followers know what they want and are fighting for the single issue. This is a great advantage, for the free traders are hopelessly divided on the education question, labor measures, the taxation of land values, temperance and a dozen other issues.

# SUGGESTS FISCAL TEST JOSEPH TO DEVONSHIRE

The Duke, who is president of the Liberal-Union Liberal party split on the home rule question, wrote to Mr. Chamberlain suggesting that the association should dissolve owing to the difficulty of allecating funds now that the party has become divided by the fiscal control

Mr. Chamberlain in a long rejoinder said he thought it best to "let sleeping dogs ite," but that if the Duke wanted to make a fiscal test question,he "had best take a vote of the members of the association and let the defeated party

association and let the deteated party retire."

The Duke replied, objecting to such a violent disruption of the association, and asking for a friendly discussion of the arrangements for dissolution.

Mr. Chamberlain closes the correspondence by announcing that as the Duke will not accept his views he is determined to call a meeting on his own responsibility, and that the course to be pursued will be decided at this meeting. The correspondence between the Duke of Devonshire and Mr. Chamberlain is considered as completing the disruption of the Unionist party.

It is expected the Duke of Devonshire will resign, and that either Mr. Chamberlain or Lord Lansdowne will be elected president of the association.

A seismic upheaval is threatened in niversity circles over the matter of Greek Letter Societies, of which there re fire, namely: Kappa Alpha, Deita Kappa Epsilon, Alpha Delta Phi, Delta psilon and Zeta Psi-

Two years ago a site was granted to the Kappa Alpha fraternity for the 4 Phones ection of a chapter house, which no stands on the corner of Hoskin-avenue BREADTH and FULLNESS and Devonshire-place. The other socie ties sought equal privileges, but only are features of the PRE. ties sought equal privileges, but only four sites being available it was impossible to satisfy five claimants. Zeta Psi, as the oldest club, and having first choice, withdrew its claim, and has acquired a fine property on Isabellastreet. Its members disclaim any thought of a dog-in-the-manger policy, but very strong opposition has arisen to the proposed granting of building sites by the university authorities.

It is argued that the university has nothing like enough land for its own immediate and prospective requirements, and that the folly of giving away its land when it is within measureable distance of the necessity of buying more, is apparent. The lot on which the Kappa Alpha chapter house is built has a fromtage of 75 feet, and is said to be worth \$120 per foot. A body which feels itself able to dispose of thirty or forty thousand dollars worth of property is unlikely to elicit sympathy when its next makes appeal to the public purse.

No adequate return-for the privileges

No adequate return-for the privileges to be granted is derived directly or indirectly by the university. The Greek Letter Societies, which are admirable bodies in their way, are necessarily exclusive, and the benefits they confer are confined to a limited constituency. Not more than thirty men in each year partake of the advantages of each society, and as the expense of membership debars the largest proportion of students from becoming Greek Letter men, the feeling is very strong that the whole movement is class legislation of the most pernicious kind.

It is understood that the requests of three societies for grants of land on the same terms asthose given to the Kappa Alpha have been before the university trustees for some time past. Rumors and reports have circulated freely, but the authorities of the university have positively declined to make any pronouncement on the subject.

The Alumni Association has been credited with a prominent part in the antagonism to the disposal of the university resources, and The World last night saw the secretary of the association, Prof. McLennan, but as on previous accusions he declined to discuss the subject. On being pressed as to whether the Alumni Association was concerned with the proposed grants, he said:




