Russia Moves 37,000 Men to Manchuria

Both Sides Assume Strategic Positions While Skirmishing for Delay.

VIRTUALLY AT WAR RIGHT NOW

New York, Jan. 10.—The Herald's St. Petersburg correspondent cables: It is difficult today to discover a trace or sign of the possible maintenance of peace, whereas those of war are easily visible.

Foremost in seriousness is the fact, as yet scarcely known, that the entire Russian Army Corps, at Kharkoff, commanded by General Bludnevsky, consisting of the Ninth Division of the Infantry of Poltava, the Thirty-first Division of Cavalry of Kharkoff and the Fifty-first Brigade of Reserve Infantry (including artillery), has been ordered to be transported with the least possible delay to Manchuria.

The corps consists of 37,000 men. It is said that the estimated cost per man for the journey is 150 rubles, and more than 5,000,000 rubles (\$2,500,000) has been appropriated for the purpose.

Simultaneously government agents are making inquiries for suitable transport accommodation, and leading shipping firms are adding for freight rates for the time when the ice clears, but such well-known houses as Messrs. Wilson and Messrs. Borchardt have refused to give advance quotations.

Virtually at War Now.

SUGGESTS FISCAL TEST

JOSEPH T. DEVONSHIRE

Acrimonious Correspondence Which Doubtless Means Complete Disruption of Unionist Party.

London, Jan. 11.—An acrimonious correspondence between the Duke of Devonshire and Joseph Chamberlain is published this morning. The Duke, who is president of the Liberal Unionist Association, formed at the time of the party split on the home rule question, wrote to Mr. Chamberlain suggesting that the association should dissolve owing to the difficulty of raising funds now that the cause has become divided by the fiscal controversy.

Mr. Chamberlain in a long rejoinder said he thought it best to "let sleeping dogs lie," but that if the Duke wanted to make a fiscal test, the course he has taken would be followed by the members of the association and the defeated party.

The Duke replied, objecting to such a violent disruption of the association, and suggesting for consideration of the arrangements for dissolution.

Mr. Chamberlain closes the correspondence by saying that he is determined to call a meeting on his own responsibility, and that whether Mr. Chamberlain or Lord Lansdowne will be elected president of the association is considered as completing the disruption of the Unionist party.

FREE TRADERS DIVIDED.

New York, Jan. 10.—The Tribune's London correspondent cables: The persistent rumors that the Duke of Devonshire and Lord Rosebery have advised their different friends to work together are a natural consequence of the bitter attacks made by the Chamberlain press upon the free traders and the Unionist side. When the ban for this singular political marriage are called, the Nonconformists may feel that cause an impression in the Duke of Devonshire's identification with the education acts, which they insist must be repealed.

The rumor with which free traders like Winston Churchill, Lord Hugh Cecil, Lord George Hamilton and Mr. Ritchie are attacked in their home constituencies has not been equalled since Mr. Gladstone and his home rule followers were denounced fourteen years ago as apostates and enemies of the empire. Mr. Balfour's denial a few months ago that individual opinion on economic subjects could be made a test of party loyalty, now has a hollow sound when the free traders are the victims of a secret intrigue and are openly blacklisted. Winston Churchill and Lord George Hamilton have been turned down by local Conservative organizations.

Chamberlain's followers know what they want and are fighting for the single issue. This is a great advantage, for the free traders are hopelessly divided on the education question, labor measures, the taxation of land values, temperance and a dozen other issues.

churches. The intervention by the English and French governments arose in the following manner:

Russia's last reply intimated plainly that the Japanese ultimatum in Manchuria was identical with those of Great Britain, France, the United States and the other powers and that she was entitled to make any special claims.

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CREW OF N.B. SCHOONER SAVED IN WICK OF TIME

Vessel Sinking 400 Miles From Land and Men Starved for Two Days.

Boston, Jan. 9.—The steamer Provost, which arrived from Galveston late last night, brought in the captain and crew of the schooner G. A. Smith of Richfield, N. B., who were found on a dismantled and sinking vessel about 400 miles off the coast.
