The latest enumeration of the vehicles circulating in the French capital shows an increase in horse-drawn carriages for public hire alone of 33 1-3 per cent. in eight years. In 17 years omnibuses and street cars have increased almost two and a half times in number.

BISLEY, Eng., July 4.-The full arrangements have been completed for great gathering of marksmen which will be held by the National Rifle Association in Surrey, beginning next week; and it is now possible to appreciate the extent and character of the assembly by the light of the later entries.
