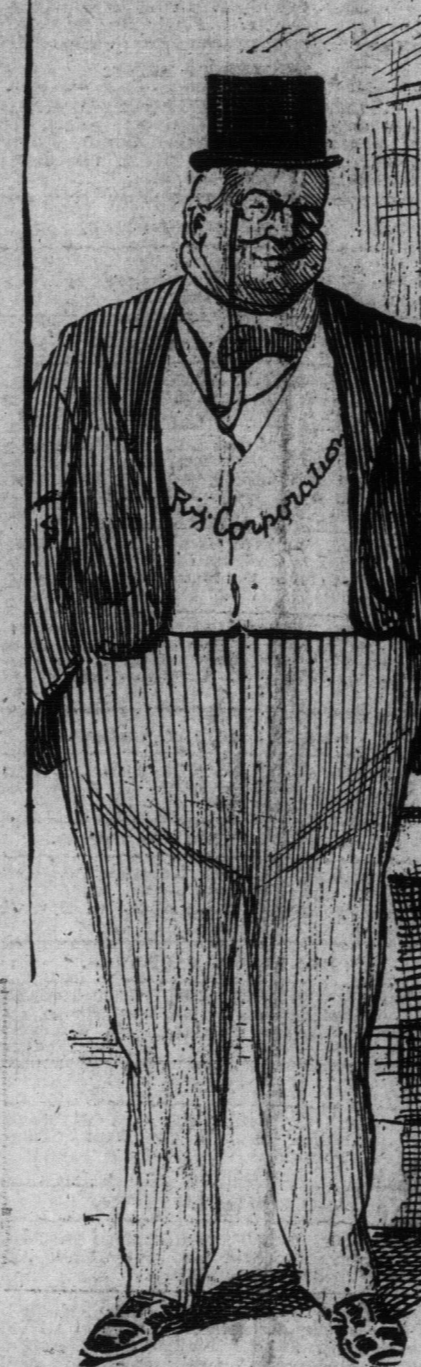

## AEROPLANE AS WAR FACTOR

Baldwin Says Nations Can't Afford to Ignore Flying Machines—Toronto's Experiments.

**"It is a matter of great encouragement to the art of aviation that a great Canadian university should thus devote its time to the discussion of flying machines,"** were the opening words of the lecture delivered on Saturday evening before a large audience in the theatre of the physics building by Casey Baldwin, a young graduate of the School of Science, who has been assisting Prof. Graham Bell in his experiments at Baddeck, C.B.

**"The flying machine is here, and no great nation can afford to neglect it,"** said Mr. Baldwin, who in speaking of the military aspect, declared that even in the present state of aviation Count von Zeppelin's dirigible balloon was a greater menace to England than two German navies. London could be destroyed and not all the navies of the world could prevent it. Our bulwarks must be extended upwards and maintained upon a two-power basis.

**Scouting was another military use** for the aeroplane. Two instances mentioned where they might have been of incalculable service were in the destruction of Cervera's fleet and in obviating the necessity for the Japanese capture of 208-Metre Hill.

**Mr. Baldwin gave an interesting review** of the history of aviation. While flight, he said, had actually been accomplished, and machines one thousand times heavier than man had been carried on successful flights, it must be remembered that these were only experimental machines.

MISSING THE POINT OF WATER POWER.

No very pronounced sentiment in favor of the waterways treaty has been exhibited in Canada. The efforts of its friends across the border to get it thru the senate have aroused, outside certain obvious circles, only the faintest interest. On the other hand those who have damned it with faint praise have many more active allies.

Mr. Gibbons in his address to the Canadian Club took a lofty and magnificent view of the question, and was willing to give away anything Canada had to make things pleasant with the United States. He even regretted that Canada, which is entitled to nine-eighths of the power passing over Niagara, by some providential arrangement secured nine parts to the five allotted to the United States.

FOREST CONSERVATION.

What Ontario may, indeed will, become as a lumber producing district unless proper measures are taken to protect its forest resources is strikingly shown by the present position of the State of Minnesota, as noted in a recent special communication contributed from Minneapolis to The San Jose Mercury.

The decline of Minnesota's lumber industry is, of course, the direct result of a wasteful forest policy, if that can be called in any true sense a policy that leaves natural resources to be depleted for private profit.

ence of The San Jose Mercury, he said: "Since 1885, 248 firms, representing an aggregate annual output of pine lumber of 4,500,000,000 feet have retired from business, due to exhaustion of their timber supply.

At one time there were 100 saw mills on the Mississippi River between Minneapolis and St. Louis; to-day there are not more than two or three mills in that whole distance, "and they will soon close forever. Once there were 120 steamboats employed in towing logs; to-day there are only five or six."

This last representation illustrates the danger to Ontario forest resources which will undoubtedly arise should the United States tariff rate on Canadian lumber be removed. Having made havoc among their own forests, United States lumbermen are looking to Canada to supply the raw material they require to satisfy the growing United States demand, and unless our forests are placed under proper regulation Canada will, before many years have passed, be in similar straits.

JUDICIAL PROMOTIONS.

Some discussion is taking place over the matter of the promotion of judges and it seems to be assumed that it is unknown in British practice. While this may be so in a general way, there have always been exceptions not by any means infrequent. Thus, for example, the late Lord Robertson was transferred from the office of Lord President of the Court of Session in Scotland to the office of Lord of Appeal in Ordinary in the house of lords, and in 1907 Sir Herbert H. Cozens-Hardy, then one of the lord justices of the supreme court, was made master of the rolls, in both cases with a considerable increase of salary.
