### ANNUAL MEETING.

THE Annual General Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society was held at the School Room, on Tuesday, 25th January, and was numerously attended.

The Chair was taken by the Rev. Dr. Read, E. C., and after the Meeting was opened with singing and prayer, and the Report read by the Secretary, the following Resolutions were unanimously agreed to, having been moved and seconded as follows:—

1. Moved by John Longworth, Esq., seconded by Rev. W. Meek —

Resolved, That the Report now read be adopted, and printed under the direction of the Committee.

3. Moved by Rev. D. Fitz Gerald, seconded by Capt. Hancock, R.N.—

Resolved, That this Meeting desires to express its thankfulness to the great Head of the Church, for the blessing attending the missionary effort of the Church throughout the world.

3. Moved by the Hon. J. Hensley, seconded by Rev. J. S. Smith —

Resolved, That this Meeting acknowledge with gratitude, the untiring liberality of the Church Societies in Great Britain towards this and the other Colonies of the Empire.

4. Moved by Rev. R. T. Roach, seconded by Captain Orlebar, R. N. —

Resolved. That the thanks of this Meeting be given to the Ladies and other Collectors, for their very efficient assistance.

5. Moved by W. Cundall, Esq., seconded by F. Brecken, Esq. —

Resolved, That the Rector of Charlottetown be a Vice-President-

of this Society; and that the following gentlemen be the Executive Committee for the ensuing year, viz.:

In conclusion, the Rev. Chairman congratulated the meeting on the encouraging prospects of the Society, and thanked the speakers for their able and useful addresses, and exhorted all present on the duty of united prayer, and untiring effort, that the cause of God and His church may prosper.

A collection was taken up, and the benediction pronounced by Dr. Read.

## REPORT.

Again your Committee present you with a summary of their proceedings during the past year, and a record of what has been done by both clergy and laity to advance the interests of the Church in this Island.

Your Committee believe that in no respect have the clergy remitted their efforts for the general good, and they observe, with much satisfaction, that in some localities there has been a decided advance in congregational attachment to the Church, and much sympathy and respect evinced to the officiating clergymen.

There has been, during the past year, much awakening and revival in the Church generally; and your Committee trust that their own branch of Christ's church has not been without corresponding tokens of the Lord's blessing upon faithful preaching, and upon the weekly

meetings for prayer and reading the Scriptures.

Your Committee have confidence in the perfect adaptation of the Church of England's ministry and services for the growth of true religion in any community; but to effect progress as a Church, holiness and devotion must be the characteristic of ministers and people; and they cannot forbear pressing upon all, the necessity of united effort and united prayer. Your Committee know that ritual worship is according to God's will, and that our church does lift up amongst men the cross of Christ, and does faithfully open up God's word; and they are persuaded that a pious and earnest exhibition of its doctrines in the lives and hearts of its members, will disarm

prejudice, and will not fail to be attended with great results,—such results as we rejoice to hear are daily witnessed under the preaching and teaching of the evangelical bishops and clergy of our church everywhere.

It is to be feared there is much ignorance amongst the people respecting the missionary work of the church. It should be made known far and wide that the Church of England has long been identified with the cause of Missions, and, of late years, the annual sum devoted by its members to the cause of Missions has exceeded half a million sterling. In these colonies, and throughout the whole world, the Church of England is sending forth its missionaries, and spending its strength in proclaiming the Gospel of Christ. Its various agencies are found in every land and in every clime, some seeking out the lost sheep of the House of Israel, - some lifting up the cross amongst the millions of Hindostan, - some building up the church amongst the many thousand converts of New Zealand, - and some carrying to the remotest verge of the habitable globe, the civilizing and ennobling doctrines of the cross, - so that the Esquimaux and the North American Indian, the Chinese and the Terra del Fuegian may alike receive the message of Him, who is the great Head of the Church.

In this Island, the very existence of the church still seems mainly dependent upon the liberality of the church societies in England. The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel and Colonial Church and School Society, continue their generous aid to the salaries of the ministers; but the people, who are daily becoming more alive to the duty of paying their ministers, assist to some extent, and afford some noble examples of generosity and self-devotion.

Your Committee regret, that notwithstanding the liberal provision made for an Assistant Minister for Charlottetown, the Colonial Church and School Society has

not succeeded in procuring one. They also regret that no missionary has yet been provided for the church at Kildare. The collections received this year, amount to about £90.

### CHARLOTTETOWN.

. The Rev. Mr. Fitz Gerald reports, that during the past year he has officiated at 66 baptisms, 17 marriages, and 47 funerals; that he has held 233 religious services, and preached or lectured three and four, and sometimes five and six times a week; and has paid upwards of 580 pastoral and other visits.

The congregations, both on Sundays and Week days, have increased, and the services are generally well attended. A weekly prayer meeting has been established for upwards of nine months, and has been found a valuable means of grace, and a season of spiritual edification and improvement. The number of communicants has increased.

The Sunday School continues to maintain its numbers, and the lessons are better and more carefully learned, and rewards have been given to the most diligent and attentive of the children.

The Sacramental and other collections have increased, and the contributions to the Diocesan Society are above those of last year.

The Library numbers 990 volumes, being an addition of 107 last year.

The Rev. gentleman states, that though the duties of the parish are very onerous, and a severe tax on his health, the accustomed weekly services have not been interrupted; and, though unable to present much that is new to the people, the congregations and the communicants have both increased, and he trusts that the desire manifested by many to attend the valuable services

of their own church, may still further increase, to the glory of God and the good of souls.

### ST. ELEANOR'S.

The Rev. Dr. READ reports, that during the past year, he has kept up a close pastoral supervision of his parishioners, and administered the consolations of religion to the sick and the dying, directing them to that blessed Saviour through whom alone their sins can be pardoned and their souls prepared for the society of the perfected in heaven. The Bible Class has been well attended, and there appears an earnest desire among the young people to understand the Holy Scriptures. The congregations, five in number, attend well and regularly. Three full services are held on the Sabbath, which, with the supervision of the Schools, and travelling, impose much mental and bodily fatigue. Dr. Read has delivered 183 sermons and addresses during the year, which he prays may be as bread cast upon the waters - seed sown for that glorious harvest which angel reapers shall gather at the coming of the Lord.

### NEW LONDON.

The Rev. Wm. Meek reports, that the interior fittings of the new church have been completed, at an expense of £30, only part of which has yet been paid. The church has still to be ceiled and plastered, and a porch, or probably a tower to be erected.

The services have been regularly conducted during the year, at both churches, and at five other stations. At Irish Town, the congregations have usually averaged 200, and at the Third Pond they have been more than the School room could comfortably accommodate. At other stations, they have been tolerably large, but fluctuating with the seasons and occupations of the people.

An unknown friend, in Jersey, has generously presented a silver Communion Service, with hangings for the pulpit, cloth for the table, and linen and books, — for which the thanks of the congregation are especially due to her.

### PORT HILL AND LOT 11.

Rev. H. B. Swaeev reports, that the interior of the church at Lot 11 has been painted during the last summer, and presents a very creditable appearance. It is now complete, with the exception of hangings to the pulpit, reading desk, &c. A very handsome communion cloth has been presented by Lady Westmorland. The people have the will to give, but lack the power.

### GEORGETOWN.

Rev. R. T. Roach reports encouragingly. Divine Service has been regularly performed, and the attendance at the various stations evinces a steady appreciation of our beloved church's evangelical teaching.

At Georgetown, £20 9s. 11d. has been expended in necessary repairs upon the church, and improving the grounds.

At Hant's, on the Cardigan Road, a neat Building has been erected for Divine worship, and nearly finished externally, without as yet having received any aid from this Committee. A frame has also been got out, for a similar purpose, on the Union Road; and half an acre in each place giren for the purposes of the church.

At Mount Stewart, the frame of a handsome church has been put up, and liberal subscriptions entered into by the people towards its completion.

At Morell, another congregation is forming, and a substantial frame was got out, in a single day, by the united

exertions of the inhabitants, of all creeds.—At the two last places, eligible sites have been generously given by Lady Littler and J. B. Cox, Esq., and plans of the same furnished gratuitously by the Surveyor General.

Murray Harbor Church is now saved from rapid decay, but a small debt remains on it.

In this mission, there have been 29 baptisms, 5 marriages, and 7 burials. Communicants, 47. Catechetical instruction in the Church and Sunday School has been regularly attended.

### CRAPAUD AND SPRINGFIELD.

Rev. D. Parnther reports, that repairs and additions, tending much to the comfort of the congregations, have been made in Crapaud Church. The Springfield church presents a proof of the interest taken in it by the members living there, and the church services are always well attended. The congregations in Crapaud Church vary considerably; in summer, the average attendance is 100—in winter, 30; but the Prayer Meetings, held on Sunday in the School room, are crowded. Weekly services are held at Crapaud and Westmorland, and are well attended. 197 services and meetings have been held during the year.

The Sunday Schools at Crapaud and Westmorland are in a flourishing condition. The one at Springfield, conducted by Messrs. Haslam, numbers about 40 children, and is doing a good work.

On the whole, the aspect of the mission is encouraging. The sum of £84 4s. 3d. has been raised in this mission during the year, for local purposes.

#### CHERRY VALLEY.

Rev. Wm. Stewart reports, that his congregations are as large as they have been at any period since he came to the parish. The services have been regularly performed, except twice, when prevented by illness; and after his recovery, for a month, his strength permitted only one service each Sunday. Two-thirds of his time is given to Cherry Valley, and the adjoining settlements of Barrens, Georgetown Road, and Squaw Bay, Lot 49; the third Sunday is given to the Stratford Church, Lot 48.

At Cherry Valley and Stratford, he has endeavored to keep up a Sunday School, the teaching devolving entirely upon himself. At Cherry Valley, considering the limited time at his disposal for instruction, the children have made laudable progress in understanding and learning the Scriptures.

The small amount of subscriptions is owing more to the inability of the people, than to their unwillingness.

### MILTON AND RUSTICO.

Owing to the removal of the Rev. M. Swabey to another diocese, late in the autumn, and the very recent appointment of the Rev. J. Smith to the charge of this mission, your Committee are without any detailed report. They are enabled to state, however, that the people have received Mr. Smith's appointment with much satisfaction, and have subscribed with more than usual liberality to the funds of your Society. Their subscriptions amount to £9 5s. 7d.

### IN CONCLUSION,

Your Committee wish that every member of the church would take a hearty interest in the working of this Society. It has before it, objects that should be dear to every member of our congregations,—the strengthening the hands of the clergy, the building up of the church of our fathers, and the bringing its ministrations within the reach of all its scattered people, throughout the Island.

The small funds entrusted to their hands, have permitted your Committee at present to do but little. Your Committee are aware that other objects demand attention and require support, and that the liberality of the churchmen in Charlottetown is not to be measured by the funds of this Society; but, whilst permitted to express thankfulness for the increase of subscription this year, they cannot avoid urging upon church members, in town and country, the necessity of devising still more liberal things, so that more help may be afforded to the destitute, and provision made for the decent maintenance of public worship amongst our poor and neglected people.


