Sentence of Timothy Kennedy.—On Saturday last, this prisoner, who is about 18 years of age, was brought up to receive sentence; he having been previously convicted at the Assizes, now sitting, of Manslaughter, in causing the death of one Gillespie, by stabbing him in the abdomen will a clasp kinife. His Honor Judge Parker adverted to the fact, that within a very recent period, no less than five convictions had taken place before him, for stabbing with the clasp kmife, and commented severely on the use of the kmife in brawls, as being most base, and likely to lead in all cases to the most dangerous results. His Honor said, that in this case the Court had taken into consideration the very great provocation the prisoner had afready sustained—and the sentence of the Court therefore was, that he be imprisoned in the Provincial Penitentary for twelve months, and during that time be kept at hard labour.—
