REV. MR. HAND'S CAMP WAS BURNED DOWN

Former St. John Minister's Vacation Interrupted—Will Try the Restigouche Salmon Fishing

Calais, Aug. 22—Rev. J. Edward Hand and Rev. R. A. Macdonald returned home Monday evening, rather sooner than they anticipated from their fishing trip to the headwaters of the Miramichi river, the building known as Residence 18, which they occupied, having been destroyed by fire on Friday, Aug. 6—Rev. Messrs. Hand, Macdonald and Howell left the residency at six o'clock on Friday morning for McKeel brook, five miles away, leaving everything safe and shipshape, and when they returned in the evening a heap of ashes marked the site of their temporary residence. They lost all of their personal belongings, which were valued at \$250. It is thought that parties looted the residence and then burned the buildings, believing that the general impression would be that the property was destroyed through carelessness. The property was safe at noon, according to the account given by the Grand Trunk Pacific road who passed there about that hour. Rev. Mr. Hand was not discouraged by the misfortune, but will follow out his original plan and will spend the remaining days of his vacation at the famed Restigouche salmon fishing grounds. Rev. R. A. Macdonald left Tuesday evening for Harvey, N. B., where Mrs. Macdonald is now visiting relatives.

PLAIN WORDS FROM BELGIUM

King's County Soldier Appeals For Reinforcements

ARE OUR YOUNG MEN AFRAID?

G. W. H. Hayes Tells of Life on the Firing Line—Men Who Bear the Brunt Cannot Understand Why Others Hold Back

George Hayes, a former resident at Jeffrey Corner writing from Belgium to John H. Morrison, of Sussex, makes a strong plea to the young men of Canada to enlist and do their bit for King and Country: Belgium, July 14, 1915.

Dear Friend: I have been thinking for some time of writing to you to let you know how I am getting along. Well, I am still alive and well and hope this will find you at the same. We have been out here in France going on six months now, and I don't see that the war is any nearer over than when we came. And we are all looking forward to another winter campaign. As you have seen by the papers we have had some pretty hard fighting since we came out here. Ypres, you may say, was our first real baptism of fire. Our artillery was in action at Neuve Chapelle, but our infantry was in reserve, so Ypres was our first big fight that the whole Canadian division was in action. And you have seen by the papers how the good contingent came out. But we have been in some warm places since then and have lost nearly as many men as at Ypres. That is taking the number of men that were engaged; so you see we are not very strong now. They say there was a thousand came out to reinforce us, but we want a lot more to bring us up to strength again. It makes one feel sad to see the boys going by on their way to the trenches. Battalions that were once over eleven hundred strong, now only have two or three hundred. But are we down-hearted? No. If you could hear them sing as they go you would not think so. Men Wanted. But what everyone of us over here is asking is why they don't get up the ranks of the first contingent. I know Canada has done well, but she can do better. We want more men in what we want to beat the Huns and lots of them. People at home don't know how hard a proposition we are up against if they did they would soon enlist. There are thousands of young men in Canada today who ought to enlist. Why don't they? Are they afraid or what are they waiting for. And I say right now that the young man who has no one at home to depend on him for support, and is physically fit, if he does not enlist today to help us in this great hour

MORNING WAR CABLES

London, Aug. 12.—The situation in Poland and the Baltic provinces is changing but little from day to day, and public interest is being turned to the Near East, where the diplomats of the quadruple Entente powers are endeavoring to revive the Balkan League and bring all the Balkan states over to their side, and to the armies of the Allies, which are battling against the Turks on the Gallipoli peninsula and in the Caucasus.

The diplomats of all the belligerents for the moment are concentrating their attention on Sofia, for Bulgaria holds the key to the situation. It is said she is being smothered upon and offered territorial concessions as an inducement for her to join one side or the other, or to remain neutral. Both the German and Entente ministers are declared to be finding their endeavors hindered by their friends. Greece and Serbia are unwilling to concede to Bulgaria the parts of Macedonia which are her prize for joining the Allies, while Turkey is opposing concessions which Austria and Germany desire her to make to insure the continued neutrality of the Sofia government.

Bulgaria, too, it is asserted, is weighing the victory the Austro-Germans have gained in Poland against the renewed efforts of the Allies in the Dardanelles, and the reported signal victory which the Russians are said to have won over the Turks in the Caucasus, and which the military experts here believe will keep the Turks quiet on that frontier for some time.

There is no news from the armies on the Gallipoli peninsula tonight, but the British admiralty reports on the operations of a British submarine in the Sea of Marmora, one of the fleet which is interfering with the Turkish communications by sea. This underwater boat, which recently sank the Turkish battleship Kleyed-Din Barbarossa, also has sent to the bottom the Turkish torpedo boat Berk-Satvet and an empty transport. Nothing was said in the admiralty's communication of the former German cruisers Breslau and Goeben, now owned by the Turks, both of which are unofficially reported to have been sunk.

The Russians continue their retirement in Poland, but all the while they are retarding the German advance, which is now regaining momentum, by repeated counter attacks and stubborn resistance wherever the conditions are favorable. There is still considerable distance between the German armies to the southeast and northeast of Warsaw, so that seemingly the Russians will be able to make good their retreat, only, however, to be called upon to oppose a German attempt to outflank them at Kovno and further north.

The public here is prepared to hear of something of greater importance than the sinking of the British auxiliary cruiser India, which was announced tonight by the admiralty, as steamers arriving from Holland reported having heard again today heavy firing to the north.

Turks Lose 20,000 The Turks lost 300 prisoners at Duzce. Their total losses in the three weeks' campaign are estimated at from 15,000 to 20,000 men besides a large quantity of provisions and ammunition. The Russians are continuing the pursuit southwards.

In an address at West Hartlepool, England, last night, the Dean of Durham said that universal military training would be certain to result in England after the war, he thought. It would never do again to rely upon purely voluntary effort in war times.

A British air raid on Zangak, near Smyrna on the Turkish coast, took place this week with considerable success. A militia barracks, telephone office and eight houses were destroyed.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES It has been decided that the puttees worn by Canadian soldiers will be done away with and long boots worn instead. In wet weather the puttees shrink and bind the leg interfering with the circulation of the blood.

The body of John Langroux of Sydney, who disappeared Sunday night, was found yesterday in the harbor. An inquest was held and a verdict of accidental death returned. He was a native of Rotterdam, Holland, and thirty-eight years of age.

H. A. Porter of St. John and W. H. Soper of Halifax, were chosen provincial grand jurors by the thirty-second assembly of the Sovereign Great Priory of Canada assembled in Montreal yesterday.

To Conduct Book Shop A partnership has been arranged between Laurence J. Gomme, bookseller and publisher, 2 East 29th street, New York, and John J. Marshall, to conduct the Little Book Shop Around the Corner. In future the firm name will be Gomme & Marshall. Mr. Marshall, who formerly did newspaper work in St. John (N. B.), has been associated with Mr. Gomme since the early part of the year. Gomme & Marshall will issue in October The Anthology of Magazine Verse and Year Book of American Poetry, 1915, compiled by William Stanley Braithwaite, of the Boston Transcript.

HALIFAX GIVES HER BEST

(Halifax Echo, Wednesday)

Frank R. Wallace enlisted Tuesday in the 64th Battalion for overseas service and was accepted. Mr. Wallace was formerly advertising manager for J. C. Mackintosh & Co., and for the past four months has been in the Wallace Advertising Agency of this city. J. S. Wallace, who has been associated with his brother in the work of the Wallace Advertising Agency, now takes full charge. A younger brother, Howard V. Wallace, formerly reporter on the Herald, is now at East Sandling Camp, England, with the 25th Battalion.

The enlistment of nine young men of Halifax, holding responsible and lucrative positions was a feature of yesterday's recruiting that should give a very material impetus to recruiting in Halifax. They walked to the Armouries together and joining their ranks today will be three others and together will form a Stretcher Bearer Corps of which W. G. McKinnon, ex-Y. M. C. A. physical instructor, is a member. Mr. McKinnon enlisted for the 40th Battalion, but received transference to the 64th and was requested to recruit a Stretcher Bearer Corps. Notable among the men is Gerald McMillaney, a native of Windsor, one of the best vocal singers in Halifax and one who has added materially in the musical and social life of the city for several years. Mr. McMillaney gave up a responsible position with Mahons, Limited, indeed that firm contributed four of the men who enlisted yesterday.

Among the applicants at the Parade recruiting station today was J. Joseph Bradbury of 86 Argyle street, one of the expert mine sweepers on the S. S. Deliverance, who has thrown up his position in that branch in order to serve in the field of action.

Among the material offering for enlistment at the Armouries today was 8 feet 1 inch of the Halifax Fire Department in the person of William Clements, the well known husky lieutenant of No. 5 Division, H. F. D. The lieutenant and H. B. Allison both expert lieutenants in the Telephone Co. service, have thrown up their positions to enlist for overseas service.

MILKING RECORDS OF PURE-BRED COWS

Nine years ago the live stock branch of the federal department of agriculture, in co-operation with certain record associations representing breeds of dairy cattle, began to record the performance of pure bred milking cows. Each record association agreed upon a standard of yield for cows of its respective breed to qualify for registration, while the live stock commissioner formulated regulations under which the tests were to be carried out. At the end of each year a report of the work has been issued, containing a list of the animals that qualified for registration during the year, their breed, age, ownership, milking period, production of milk and fat, and such other information as might reasonably be looked for in an official report. Each year the work has increased until the seventh report, just issued, contained no less than 192 pages of information. During the year 413 cows qualified for registration, including 190 Holsteins, 123 Ayrshires, 35 Jerseys, 9 Guernseys, 11 French Canadians and 38 Shorthorns. The highest records made were—Short-horn, 14,537 lbs. milk, 440 lbs. fat; French Canadian, 10,767 lbs. milk, 453 lbs. fat; Guernsey, 11,445 lbs. milk, 520 lbs. fat; Jersey, 15,211 lbs. milk, 754 lbs. fat; Ayrshire, 16,695 lbs. milk, 729 lbs. fat.

This report for the second time contains an appendix containing the records of cows which produced sufficient milk and fat to qualify for registration, but failed to calve within fifteen months after the commencement of the test, as required by the regulations. This report is of special interest to dairy farmers who are anxious to build up the milking qualities of their herds. Copies will be sent to those who apply for them to the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

Private Sam Jones Killed Private Samuel Jones, of Fredericton, was killed in action on May 8 while fighting with the Princess Patricia Light Infantry in Belgium.

"Sam" Jones was a veteran of the South African war, having served through that campaign with credit to himself and the regiment of which he was a member. Later he became a veritable soldier of fortune and served for some years in the United States army. "Was he almost dead when you sold him?" "Well, pretty well onto it." "What did you sell him for?" "I sold him for \$5 to Daniels." "Cash?" "No, sir, I took two ducks and a drake instead." The horse was twenty-four years old when he sold him to Mr. McKay at Kingston for \$150.

LACK OF TEETH NOW NO BAR TO RECRUITS.
Work of Dental Corps Extended to Enable Them to Remedy Defects Which Formerly Kept Some Good Men Out of Rank.

There are probably some men about St. John or the province who have been holding back from the colors in the fear that their teeth, on examination, would prevent their being accepted for service. Such men today need have no fear. The lack of a few molars will not prohibit their donning the king's uniform, for the scope of the Army Dental Corps is to be extended and to remedy, or to sound, need not worry as to the possi-bility of being refused, whether he has soon teeth, good teeth, or fact no teeth at all.

It was said today by Doctor S. Skinner, medical examining officer in the local recruiting offices, that few re-jections had been made here because of bad teeth. He had had as yet no ap-plicants from headquarters, however, in-structing him that lack of masticating machinery would not be a bar to acceptance as a vol-unteer. The reason for the almost en-tire abandonment of dental examinations, however, with recruits in Canada is that major dentistry is to be practised in fu-ture in the training camps, and Valen-tier is to be the scene of much ac-tivity along this line.

In the early stages of recruiting many otherwise good men were rejected be-cause they had bad teeth, too generous a quantity of perfect molars, or too small a supply of real ones. The officers of the Dental Corps are to be instructed to go beyond the ordinary scope which has thus far occupied their time, in fillings and extractions, and will even supply such novelties of dental archi-tecture as army plates and sets of army teeth to enable the men to properly masticate the soldier's rations.

DR. MACFARLAND WILL RETURN TO FAIRVILLE.
Dr. Macfarland, who has been residing in Clifton, Kings county, expects to return to Fairville soon and there re-sume his practice. For several years Dr. Macfarland's health has not been satis-factory and last fall he went to Clifton to recuperate. Fortunately the change has proved beneficial and he is now fully recovered. As soon as he can obtain suitable quarters he will again take up his residence in Fairville. During the many years of his practice in that dis-trict he won an enviable reputation both as a physician and a citizen and his re-turn will be welcomed heartily.

Court Confirms Agreement Made on Dissolution of Donohue Brothers Partnership

This was a few months ago, and since that time the defendant has again been driv-ing a coach.
