

Reported They Are Giving Up Antwerp

Evacuation by Enemy, Says London News Paper; French Only Seven Miles From Ghent; Allies Across The Scheldt and German Resistance Weakening

A despatch to J. M. Robinson & Sons from New York states that London Daily Express says the Germans have evacuated Antwerp. London, Oct. 21-The French troops on the Allied centre in Belgin gained a bridgehead across the Lys Canal at Nevelle, Ghent.

S., Oct. 21—At today's meeting of the city board of health, the chairman, Dr. N. E. McKay, expressed the belief that of the 249 cases of in-fluenza reported last week at least one-third and probably one-half would prove to be only heavy colds. Victory Crowns Allied Arms on Every Battlefront

New York, Oct. 20-The Associate ed Press tonight issued the following: Victory crowns the Allied arms on every battlefront. Northern Belgium is being rapidly cleared of the enemy by British and Belgian forces. Belgians have occupied Zeebrugge and Heyst; have crossed the Ghent-Bruges Canal, and on their left have reached the Dutch front, where 15,000 Germans, cut off from their retreat by the advance northward from Eecloo, are reported to have withdrawn into Holland, where they were interned.

Ghent, it is predicted from British headquarters, will fall at an early date and the French by a swift stroke along an extended line have put their forces within two miles of Tournai. Thielt is in the hands of the French despite stubborn enemy resistance, as well as the high ground round about.

British troops have crossed the Selle River, have reconquered Solesmes and have had hard fighting not only in the section around that town, but at St. Python to the east. Here the British have captured more than 2,000 prisoners. Since the beginning of the operations in Flanders, the Allies have made an

advance of more than ten miles over a thirty-six-mile front, clearing all of western Flanders, as well as the coast of the enemy.

Germans Massed to Meet Assault.


