Fight Austrians, 400,000 Strong

London, Aug. 15—A despatch to the Reuter Telegram Company from Nish, dated August 13, and sent by way of Athens, gives the Servian official account of recent fighting on the frontier.

Four hundred thousand Austrians, says the War Office, attacked the Servians last night. A fierce battle extended all along the line. Finally the Austrians were repulsed with heavy casualties, towards Tekia on the Roumanian frontier, and also repulsed from Belgrade where they had attempted to cross the Danube, but through numerical superiority the enemy succeeded in crossing the Save."

The Servians are concentrating for a big engagement, which is expected this evening. The chief of the Servians general staff considers the fall of Sabac of no serious importance.

ed tables and trays, make a time pote of salad-oil and salt, leave it on the marks for an hour, then polish with a dry cloth.

When the summer plague of flies is upon the larder, directly they appear the cook should sponge the panes of glass with a very weak solution of carbolic acid and water.

A simple way of preserving eggs is to immerse them in lime-water soon after they have been laid and then to put the vessel containing the lime-water in a cellar or cool outhouse.

Paraffin oil greatly assists in the cleansing of linen and calico garments. It should be added in the proportion of two tablespoonfuls of paraffin to ten gallons of boiling water.

When brown boots and shoes become dark looking, wash them well in warm water and soft soap, using a hard nailbrush. This will remove all the old and dirty polish. When dry and polished they should look like new.

Dents in furniture can be got rid of quite easily. Damp the dent with warm water, then make a pad of brown paper; damp that thoroughly, lay it on the dent, and hold over all a hot iron. The warmth makes the wood swell up and fill the dent. In some woods the process is slow, but it is sure.

The colors of a blouse may be "set" by soaking it in a quart of water in which a teaspoonful of alum is dissolved before washing it. Colors can be revived by rinsing in a quart of water containing a teaspoonful of vinegar. It is very important to dry colored blouses or dresses in the shade.

To prevent a bruise from becoming discolored, apply to it a cloth which has been wrung out of water as hot as can be borne comfortably, and change it as it becomes cold. Supposing hot water cannot be procured, the next best thing is to moisten some dry starch with cold water and to cover the bruised part with it.

To improve the flavor of currants and water which are to be used for cakes,

To improve the flavor of currants and sultanas which are to be used for cakes, place them in a bowl, pour boiling water over them, and leave to soak all night. The fruit swells to twice its former size, but should be drained from the water and dried in the oven before being added to the other ingredients.

After using a bowl of starch do not throw away what remains of the mixture. Place it on one side, and when the starch has settled, pour off the clear water. Place the basin in an oven for



Tihs will allow practically a weekly service from this country to Canada. Instead of having about sixty steamers now employed in that route, the route could be worked with, say, eleven, one as a stand-by.

By such a service you supply the needs of the Islands and Canada, and judging by the amount of freight and passengers now carried, one cannot but say a handsome dividend could be earned.

Your committee must be prepared for these ideas to be pooh-pooh'd by the present shipping companies, and naturally so; but ask the Royal Mail Company to show you their carnings of freight and passengers on that route,—and this is only one of the companies.

I think you will be bound, gentlemen, for the combine of merchants and shippers to approach an outside company, say, for instance, the Canadian Lines, Ltd., and place the facts before them. Let them know what the islands are prepared to do, and do it.

I think that a service between Canada and the islands can become an established fact, and no subsidy required, besides doing away with all ideas of transhipping, the greatest drawback to this gentleman's "all red route."
