Ottawa, Mar. 15—"One way in which to keep our country on its high level is to make a firm resolution that it shall be Canada first, Canada last, and Canada all the time," declared Sir Wifrid Laurier, leader of the opposition, in an address at an Irish concert last night.

The principle that "each industry should carry its own burden, so that every human life which is jeopardized in the process of creating should be paid by the industry affected," is now universally accepted. In framing legislation it is necessary to consider the ratio of hazard in different industries, and rate the industries accordingly. It is also wise to fix the maximum to be paid to any one employe or his dependents. There is then the necessity for such regulations as will ensure prompt action and a full measure of justice in every case.

The commission strongly recommends that the government pay the administrative expenses in carrying out the terms of the act, and submits proof that this is the cheaper and more satisfactory way. 

### QUEENSLAND'S SUGAR CENTRE IS WIPED OUT

Tidal Wave Following Cyclene and Rainsterm Floods

Queensland, was practically wiped out of existence by a tidal wave January 25. following a cyclone and rainstorm which raged over northern Queensland, flooded large areas of country and washed away several towns. Situated midway between Townsville and Rockhampton, the coastal termini of two great railway lines running due west into the heart of Queensland, the sugar city has a population of about 12,000 souls. The whole of the district is given over to the sugar tion of about 12,000 souls. The whole of the district is given over to the sugar industry, the value of the annual output from its twelve mills being estimated at nearly £1,000,000 (\$5,000,000).

Mackay, which is situated on the Pioneer river near the coast, was named after the discoverer, Capt. John Mackay, who left New South Wales in 1861, with five whites and 1,000 head of cattle, and the first sugar cane grown in the district was planted four years later from a Java consignment. A report from Mackay before the hurricane started that there were about \$,000 tons of raw sugar on the wharves and 24,000 tons at sugar on the wharves and 24,000 tons at the mills, valued at £610,000 (\$3,200,000), all of which appears to have been lost, for the wharves have been swept away, the town is submerged and almost everything in it is destroyed.

Many lives were lost and hundreds were rendered homeless and starving Large numbers of cattle were drowned, telegraphic and telephonic communication was cut off and so many places were isolated that the greatest difficulty is experienced in sending relief. An attempt was at once made to cope with the disaster, the commonwealth government voted £5,000 (\$25,000), the state government another £1,000 (\$5,000) and tons of provisions were forwarded with as little delay as possible to relieve the distress. ugar on the wharves and 24,000 tons at





Alex. M. Scott, Liberal, Glasgow, contended that the danger to the stores at Vladivostok was insignificant in comparison with the menace with which the whole Allied campaign and strategy in the east were threatened.

"If there was the slightest foundation for Mr. Lees-Smith's contention that whenever foreign troops invade a country they inevitably stay there and annexation results," said Mr. Balfour, "it was a very bad lookout for Northern France."







### FOR HEALTH ACT IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Address Last Night by Dr. G. G. Melvin

### DEPARTMENT NEEDED

Says Practical Results Sure to Fellow - Organization of St. Andrew's Church Men Piedge Their Support

Before a get-together of the men's organization in the school room of St. Andrew's church last evening at 6.15 o'clock, when the members of the Ladies' Aid of the church supplier luncheon. Dr. G. G. Melvin, medical health officer, delivered a timely and highly interesting address on Public Health. Dr. Melvin treated his subject informally, but dealt with it in an able, direct and undestandable manner, driving his points home and quoting figures and statistics, to prove his arguments for the need of this great work that was being done, and what remains to be done, in the interests what remains to be done, in the interests of public health.

The most important features of the theme developed by Dr. Melvin was that contagious diseases are spread only by personal contact with the person who is ill and that the contagious ailment is never transmitted through the air to distant bodies; also dealing with what the public health officials have done in various cities within recent years including the city of St. John and lastly Dr. Melvin urged his hearers to lend their sympathies and their efforts to bring about a final adoption of the Public Health Act to come before the local lic Health Act to come before the local legislature, and made a strong plea for all present to help the sponsors for the

tween preventive and curative medicine was explained.

"Public health has come down through the ages. In 1665 when the terrible plogue was in England public health activities were extensively carried on and were the chief means for driving the plague away; even Napoleon, the greatest man in Europe, had to subject himself to quarantine in his return from Egypt in 1798 as he came from a land where there was cholera. His clothes were fumigated and quarantine was ordered. Therefore you see public health is something to be proud of and something venerable."

By the discovery of bacteriology scientists were given much to aid public health. It gave the people relief from the idea that contagious diseases shot through the air like arrows; it brought then to the helief that it was contaging

through the air like arrows; it brought them to the belief that it was contagious only when one came in contact with the person affected.

Speaking of quarantine, Dr. Melvin said, that it was one of the main lines of sanitation, but it was not the chief one. The theory of bacteriology had been perfected by the introduction of vaccination, to prevent the spread of smallpox. "The dangers of sewer gas almost crazed the public at one time, but it brought about the trade of plumbing and the better plumbing you have the betting housing conditions, other things being equal."

Germs Useful in Place. With the introducing of bacteriology there followed much talk of germs, and this had produced the thought that all germs were bad. "Ninety-nine per cent of germs are harmless, without which we could not live, animals could not live. Germs aid the growth of animal life, but still in some instances it destroys and decays life. Disease producing germs are dangerous and should be avoided."

Coming to our town times, Dr. Mel-

Coming to our town times, Dr. Melvin cited the city of New York to show what had been done by public health, and showed how lives had been saved and yearly being saved. Dr. Melvin said that the best health administration of the world outside of, perhaps, London, was in New York. In 1900 the death toll was twenty in every thousand in a year, but in 1916 it had been reduced to fourteen deaths per thousand in a year, but in 1916 it had been reduced to fourteen deaths per thousand in a year. Sanitary scientists in New York save yearly 80,000 lives. "They have no patent or special way of living, they are susceptible to disease like us, but through the exercise and activity of their public health they save life."

Coming to St. John, Dr. Melvin said in the last four years the death rate was reduced from 17½ to 15½ deaths per thousand a year which means in a population as large as St. John that 100 lives are saved yearly. Referring to the infantile mortality, four years ago, he said, there were 200 deaths among infants under one year of age and last year there was 153; therefore fifty lives of infants under one year have been saved in that time. "Contaglous diseases in St. John have also been considerably reduced," he said, "there have been within the last year three deaths from typhold; two from dyptheria and nine from scarlet fever. If such utility can be derived from public health by our modest system here what more vast accomplishments can be the result if we are given better facilities; we get measurable results now and if the new Public Health Act goes through, how much greater results can be attained."

Dr. Melvin said that if better public health laws were enforced in the rural districts, better results be obtained in the cities of the province for, as it is, there is "an importation or disease so to speak, which calls for







## The Income War Tax Act

Section 4 of the Act provides that all persons resident or ordinarily resident in Canada, shall pay a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of those single and widows and widowers without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$3000 in the case of all other persons. It also provides that all Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, no matter how created, shall pay the normal tax upon income exceeding \$3000.



## SAYS THE RESULT DEPENDS ON U. S.

Congressman's Observations From The Front

MUST DO MORE

Expect No Discussion Until 1919 or 1920-Greatest Need At Present is General Supplies Fer Army And Feed For

The need of America and America's war peril was the subject of a thoughtful speech, based on his own observations on the various fronts, which was delivered in the United States house of representatives recently by Congressman George Halden Tinkham of Massachusetts. Mr. Tinkham said:

Mr. Chairman, it seems to be my duty Mr. Chairman, it seems to be my duty Mr. Chairman, it seems to be my dury to address the house upon my return from war-torn Europe and to submit to it some conclusions and impart information which I hope will be of some value. I have spent most of the last two months there, and during that time visited the American headquarters and in France. some of the American camps in France.

I traveled along the English front from Calais nearly to St. Quentin, and along the French front from St. Quentin to Verdun. I traveled along the Italian front from Venice and the mouth of the Piave to the Asiago plateau. I also visited Paris and Rome. Many of the places to which I went I had visited often before this great war.

My information has been gathered from many sources; from personal observations and from conversations with men of various nationalities in military,

by the submarines, and the number of submarines and from conversations with men of various nationalities in military, naval, diplomatic, political, and other employment.

America wants the truth, and it is vital that America have the truth. The pleture of the military situation in Europe as reproduced in America is often not true, particularly in relation to America's military efforts there and the enditions in Germany. The truth in Europe, where America is to play her great and victorious part, is that today the central powers have achieved all of their greater military objectives, with the exception of the taking of Paris, the attempt to take Verdun being part or that purpose.

I found England's war efforts splendidly organized and her equipment complete. The English army is cheerful and confident. Large losses, such as 200,000 men in the last two months, I have heard criticized as unnecessary. The number of men there is much smaller than the American public believes, and, although food and clothing were good in amount and quality, the lack of general supplies has a most demoralizing effect upon all preparations and efforts. I am not speaking of American artillery, aeroplanes, machine guns, and ammunition, about which the American public now knows, but of all other general supplies so necessary for making war-such supplies as auto trucks, machinery, tools, wood, nails, camp kitchens, and many other absolutely essential things. Neither France nor England has these supplies in sufficient quantities to spare them to America, and unless, with any new troops that are sent across, general supplies accompany them in sufficient amount, their presence in France will be a burden rather than a help. France and England have furnished to Italy men, guns, ammunition, and general supplies,

guns, ammunition, and general supplies, so that a further drain upon them will be a source of much weakness.

I saw some of the finest trees in France being cut for lumber. It is my fixed opinion that the sending of more American troops without adequate general supplies will be a disastrous blun-

The situation in Italy on the economic side is very perilous. All of the people north of Rome live on wheat and corn meal, and on the 1st of December there hand. Unless America is able to supply wheat and corn meal to Italy in suffi-cient quantities before it is too late, a revolution such as occurred in Russia will not be unlikely. The Italian soldiers are fighting with great valor and skill, but their supplies, hospital service and food are not such as a modern army absolutely requires.



Delicate and momentous questions of Allied diplomacy charged with the gravest military possibilities are raised by the proposal that Japanese troops intervene in Siberia to save from Germany's clutches the great military stores accumulated at Vladivostok and along the Trans-Siberian railroad,

and to forestall the German penetration of Asia. 
