BORDEN AND AUTONOMY. "Of one thing you may rest assured, Mr. Borden will do nothing to lower Canadian prestige or to sacrifice Canadian autonomy."

These are the words of Hon. C. J. Doherty, who was with Mr. Borden in London and has returned home. They are significant words, for they indicate that the position taken by Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the question of Canadian autonomy is no longer to be sneered at and denounced by Conservatives, but is now a part of Conservative policy.

Not only so, but Mr. Doherty boasts in an interview that Mr. Borden has made it clear that if Canada is to share in imperial defence she must be admitted to participate in the control of Imperial policy, and must have a voice in the councils of the Empire.

Canada awaits with much interest the return of Mr. Borden, and his declaration of policy with regard to the navy. The plan of one Imperial navy does not commend itself to either Canada or Australia.

In a letter to Mr. Borden, written on Nov. 30, 1909, Sir Charles Tupper commended him for "regarding the question as more important than any mere party issue," and for holding to the course adopted at the preceding session of parliament.

"I did not believe then, and I do not believe now, in taxation without representation. The demand that will soon be made by some that Canada should contribute to the Imperial navy in proportion to population, I regard as preposterous and dangerous. I read with pleasure the resolution passed unanimously by the House of Commons which pledged parliament to proceed vigorously with the construction of the Canadian navy."

"I cannot understand the demand for improvements from taxation works out to the detriment and British government has determined that it was not the best mode of maintaining the security of the Empire, and arranged with Canada and Australia (the latter of whom had offered one or two Dreadnoughts) for the construction of local navies to keep open the trade routes in time of war."

Whatever may have occurred since the end of the year 1909 to create an emergency, calling for special action, there is no cause whatever for an abandonment of the principle of local navies. Nor does Canada have any hurriedly digested scheme of Imperial federation. The suggestion that she should send a few men to London in some sort of representative capacity, and forthwith abandon the natural aspirations of her people to build and man a navy of their own, would not receive a very patient hearing. Canadians are ready to do their full duty, but would not take kindly to dictation in the matter. The Halifax Recorder speaks in advance of the action of the Liberal party in Canada in relation to the efforts of the Tories to take the navy out of politics.

"If Mr. Borden and his associates bring back to this country with them secret and undesirable information from the secret and authoritative sources in Britain, information that leaves no room for doubt that the empire is in vast and immediate peril, then there can be no question of party in the necessity of immediate and unanimous voting of men, money, ships, anything to avert the danger. It would not then be Mr. Borden's policy, or Sir Wilfrid Laurier's policy, or anyone's policy, but national action to meet a national crisis, for which the nation, as a whole, and no party or party leader would gain the credit, if credit there be in defending its own existence. Otherwise it is childish and craven, and an impertinence of the Tory leaders or those to ask the Liberals to forego in advance all right to criticize. While Liberals owe every duty to the nation and the Empire, and are prepared and have been prepared to pay it, they owe nothing to Mr. Borden and his associates but placing them on the opposition benches at the earliest possible moment; and the country's good demands the same."

BREEDING THE UNFIT. A writer in the Review of Reviews, discussing the question of emigration, and of educating children in English schools to fit them for life in the overseas dominions, utters this despondent note:—"It does not, however, that emigration will ever be a cure for unemployment, although it may be a palliative. Unfortunately a very large proportion of our unemployed are unemployable, and we should have no right to saddle the overseas dominions with the failures for which we are responsible. Until we find some means of eliminating the unfit from our population we shall always be faced with unemployment of some sort or other."

Dr. Tredgold, in the Quarterly Review, depicts the retrogression of the people of England as an indubitable fact, and submits a mass of evidence to show that while the birth rate among the most capable, talented and intellectual classes has rapidly declined there is an increasing birth rate of defectives. Then he says:—"Sufficient has been said to show that the decline in the birth rate is not uniform throughout the community, but that it is practically confined to the best elements; and that the worst elements, the pauper, the thriftless, and, in fact the whole parasitic class of the nation, are continuing to propagate with unabated and unrestricted vigor." Dr. Tredgold adds this very significant statement:—"The whole tendency of modern sentiment and present-day civilization is not so much to aid the fit as to favor the survival and propagation of the unfit. It is not alone in England that this grave question is being seriously discussed. In Science for September Prof. Chas. B. Davenport refers to the conditions in the United States, and almost repeats from the British standpoint. We quote:—"Of late years the attention of all who have at heart the welfare of mankind in this country has been attracted by two main facts: First, the reduction of the birth rate in the more progressive and effective part of our population to half or less than half of what it was formerly, and the great increase in the number of inmates of institutions. Indeed, the proportion of our population that receives state aid care has nearly doubled in the ten years from 1890 to 1900, and shows an increase much larger than that of the population from 1890 to 1910. This increasing care of the defectives is a heavy burden. One seventh of the income of the state of New York goes to maintain and enlarge the state institutions for insane and other defectives—in some recent years the proportion has risen to one fifth, and it tends to increase. In view of these facts the inquiry has naturally been raised: What is the cause of this increase and what is the way to stop it? And the answer has come back from the students of heredity, carrying with it overwhelming conviction: the defectives are bred, and the way to stop the rising cost of their care is to stop breeding them. We are brought to our present pass by the care we have taken to protect, rear and let breed, the worse elements, while discouraging the reproduction of the better."

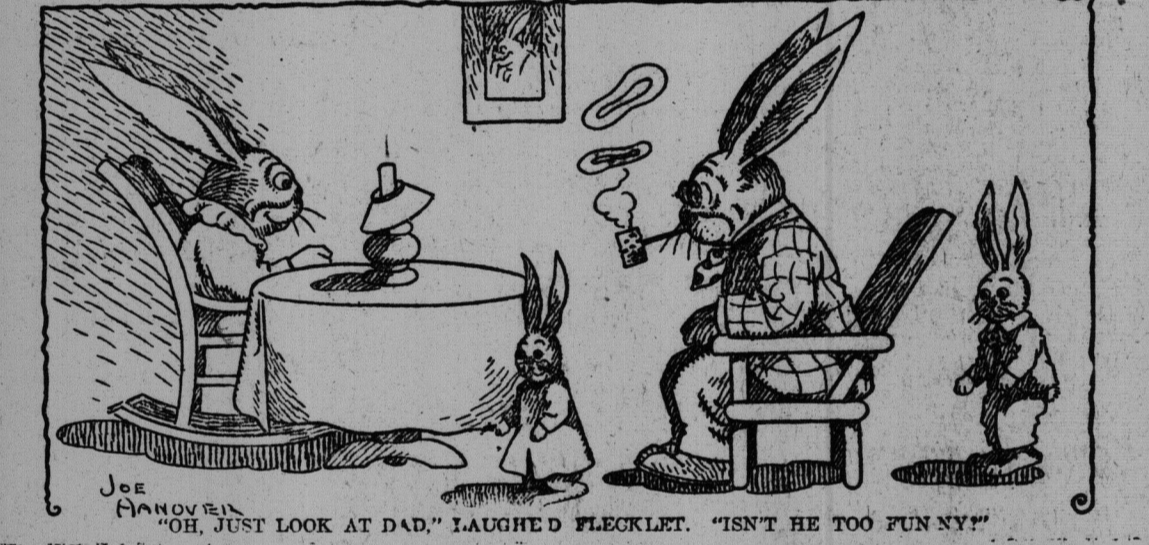

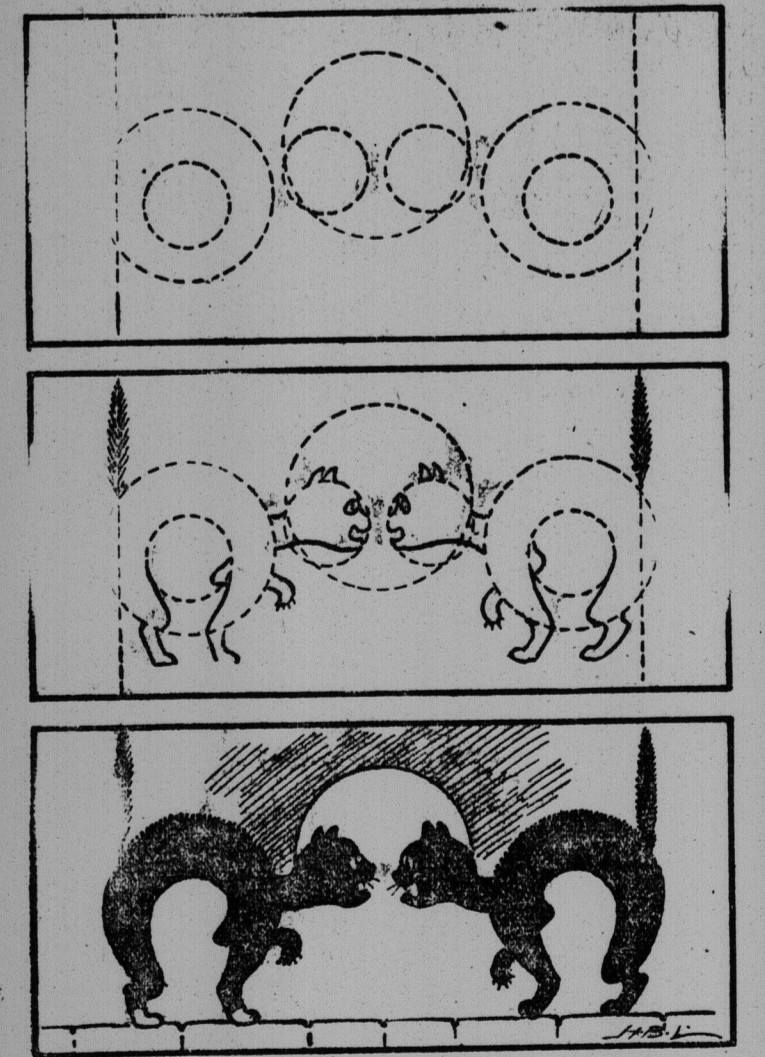

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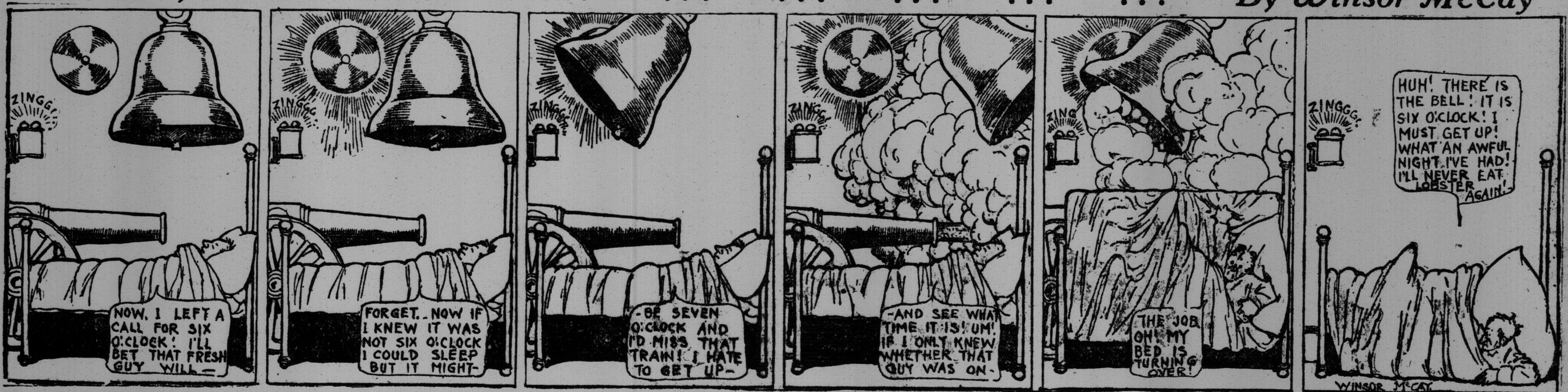
