7. That \$40 be the maximum allowance for funeral expenses.

STANDING REGULATIONS OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

This Fund shallsbe called the Sustentation Fund of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.

The object of the Fund is to relieve those ministers within the bounds of the Toronto Conference whose salary is inadequate to their support.

All ministers, whether laboring on circuits or missions, whose salaries are lower than the following amounts shall have their claims considered in connection with this Fund, viz., married ministers, \$500; single ordained ministers, \$300, and probationers, \$250; the amounts to embrace salary only.

The Fund shall be maintained by annual collections and subscriptions to be taken up in all our congregations in every circuit and mission throughout the Conference. Each minister and preacher shall bring the matter fairly before his people, and do his utmost to secure liberal contributions to this Fund. In case there are any delinquent circuits, the Chairman of the District, accompanied when possible by a layman, shall visit such circuits, and shall urge on the people as he may think best, a more liberal and generous support of their ministers. No minister or probationer who has not taken up the collection shall be entitled to any claim on the Fund. Every circuit claiming from this Fund must show that it has paid for ministerial support an average of \$3 per member for all members over sixteen years of age, and every mission that it has paid an average of \$2 in order to give them a legitimate claim on the Fund.

The Fund shall be under the management of a committee composed of one minister and one layman from each District appointed by the Conference, who shall have authority to distribute the funds on hand during the session of the Conference to the several claimants, according to the amounts received from all sources for ministerial support during the year.

No claim shall be considered by the Committee that has not been recommended by the District Meeting where the minister resides, immediately preceding such distribution.

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A treasurer shall be appointed by the Conference, who shall take charge of all the moneys collected for, this Fund, to whom the Superintendents of circuits are requested to remit all collections and subscriptions immediately on receipt thereof, and who shall pay the amounts allotted to the claimants on the order of the Chairman and Secretary of the Committee.

The Committee recommend that the time of making the collections shall

not be later than the month of March.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee desire to express thanks to God for the growing sentiment in favor of prohibition throughout our Dominion, and believe that the Methodist Church would be recreant to the trust reposed in her if this question were not at all times a prominent feature in her work; and that while other important issues in the impending elections have overshadowed for the moment this all and ever-important question, it will certainly come again to the front, compelling the respectful notice of both Local and Dominion legislatures.

As an encouraging advance movement, we rejoice in the way in which some prominent politicians have been brought to judgment through the public press for the way in which they voted or failed to vote on this momentous question. We hope hereafter that no legislator will escape public rebuke, not only in the press, but at the polls, who shirks his duty

to God and his country on this issue.

Your Committee beg to submit the following propositions for your

favorable consideration and approval:

1. That this Conference request all its ministers to urge upon their congregations the question of Prohibition, and that on the 21st inst they will press on the voters to whom they minister the duty of electing only such men to Parliament as will vote for a prohibitory law.

2. That in view of the recent decision of the Privy Council as touching Local Option, we impress upon our ministers and people the imperative duty of introducing and bringing into operation the Local Option Act.

3. Your Committee rejoice that the leader of one of our political parties has publicly promised that in the event of his succeeding to power, he will cause a plebiscite of yea or nay to be taken on the question of Dominion Prohibition, and that if the answer be yea, the submission of a Dominion prohibitory law. As yet neither of the political parties have made prohibition a plank in their platform, but in view of this contingency, which cannot be far off, no matter which party is in power, we would urge upon our ministers and people the necessity of preparing the public mind in any way and every way for a last and, we trust, victorious struggle in this long and terrible war.

4. We lament, as citizens of a Christian commonwealth, the deplorable scenes enacted and exposed in the Parliament of our nation during the late all-night sittings, and believe had there been no liquor available there would have been little disorder, and we express our hope that the

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best men of all political parties will unite in stamping out every sem blance of a liquor bar within the precincts of the Parliament Buildings.

5. Your Committee recommend that pastors and superintendents take a deeper interest in securing the name of every scholar to a written

6. Your Committee advise the appointment of a Temperance Committee on every circuit by the Quarterly Board, to aid in circulating the pledge in the homes of our people, and in carrying out all kinds of systematic

efforts for prohibition. 7. That the Conference appoint a Standing Committee on Temperance whose duty it shall be to arouse, as far as possible, earnest and simul taneous action in every temperance contest within its bounds, and to secure and tabulate facts as to the enforcement of present laws or the plans in operation for aggressive legislation, such facts to be available at the ensuing Conference and to be placed at the service of its Temperance

In the matter of the memorial from the Toronto West District re the supplying of two copies of the Sunday School and Young People's Societies' schedules to each Superintendent of circuits and missions, your Committee recommend that the attention of the Book Steward be drawn to the wisdom of supplying two copies of each of the above-named schedules so that a duplicate copy may be retained on the circuit for reference.

In the matter of the memorial from Toronto West District re the keeping of district records, your Committee recommend that, whereas, it would seem there is in some cases a lack of attention to the proper preservation of district records, Conference call attention of Chairmen of districts to the disciplinary provisions for the keeping of such records, and would also recommend that these be in regular journal form, in a book provided for the purpose, so as to preserve the records in permanent

and consecutive order. In the matter of the memorial from the Toronto Central District re opposition to the Superannuation Fund, your Committee recommend that the fullest information regarding the Fund be given to our people, believing that the opposition to the Fund is due more largely to lack of information than antipathy to the Fund.

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District re mend that our people, to lack of In the matter of the memorial from the Prisoners' Aid Association re the appointment of a Standing Committee on Prison Reform to co-operate with the other organizations for this purpose, your Committee recommend that the President appoint such a committee.

In the matter of the memorial from Toronto West District re the omission from circuit schedules of a place to record the connexional collection for the General Epworth League Board, your Committee recommend that in schedules for the future there be a column for this purpose so that confusion in the records and possible loss to the treasury

may be avoided.

In the matter of the memorial from the Bay of Quinte Conference re the Horner movement, your Committee recommend that whilst we readily admit the right of any man or body of men to seek such favors from Parliament as he or they may desire, yet this Toronto Conference enters its vigorous protest against the action now proposed by R. C. Horner through his solicitors, asking Parliament to give its sanction to the organization of a religious body holding the name "Wesleyan Methodist Connexion," which name one of the former Methodist bodies bore and by their own act has been incorporated in the Methodist Church.

# REPORT OF MISSIONARY COMMITTEE.

1. Your Committee desire most earnestly to call the attention of the Conference to the strange omission of a missionary night from the official programme of the Conference services. Second only in importance to the meeting for the reception of the young men into the ministry, was the missionary anniversary considered for many years. Missionary officials and men from the field thrilled and enthused large audiences, cheered the devoted brethren of the Conference, and sent them back to their fields of toil with new incentives for their work and fresh inspiration for their We recommend that in future a night be set apart for this

2. In reference to the memorial from the Barrie District regarding the important object. collection of moneys for benevolent objects, apart from the various claims of our Church, your Committee is strongly of the opinion that the many worthy claims of our own Church should ever have the first consideration

3. Your Committee desire most sincerely in this report on missions to of our people. put on record their profound sorrow and regret at the sad demise of the Rev. John Shaw, Assistant Secretary at the Mission Rooms, beloved and honored by all.

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4. Your Committee regret that the request of this Conference as presented to the missionary authorities last year, viz.: "That in the years in which a deficit may arise in the missionary funds, such deficit be borne equally, pro rata by the missionaries on foreign as well as on the domestic fields," instead of which the appropriations on the domestic missions which had already been reduced to seventy (70) per cent were still further reduced to the low figure of sixty-six and two-thirds (66%) per cent., while on the other fields no such policy of retrenchment was enforced.

5. In reference to the important resolution introduced to the Conference by Dr. Maclaren, your Committee hope the matter will attract the attention of all parties concerned, and that some system or plan will be adopted by which the desired results will be secured. We would suggest, where practicable, there be a return to the circuit system, or the doubling of small missions, and on some of the older fields an incorporation of

weak missions, Indian or white, into contiguous strong circuits.

6. We view with unbounded pleasure and gratitude to God the recent uprising among our young people, especially in our colleges, and the latest outcome of this movement, "The Students' Missionary Campaign," and would express to the workers in this endeavor our sincerest sympathy and

pledge our heartiest support.

7. In reference to the matter referred to by the Rev. Dr. Carman, in his admirable opening address, your Committee would commend most heartily his suggestions in reference to prompt action being taken in connection with the deplorable state of affairs among the whites and Indians in the western part of our Dominion, and believe that it is exceedingly desirable that official authority be given to the Chairmen of the Districts or others who may be appointed the right in such emergencies to speak as the voice and with the authority of the Church.

## REPORT OF SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee feel the great importance to our national well-being and to the prosperity of the cause of our blessed Lord, of the faithful and sacred observance of the Christian day of rest. We have given careful and prayerful thought to the subject committed to us, and beg to ask you to consider some matters which call for a strong and decided attitude by We believe that we and other Christian churches have us as a Church. it in our power largely to mould public opinion, and to create and increase a sacred reverence for the Lord's Day, and thus to secure the highest prosperity of our country by teaching the religious, social and economic advantages of obeying the Lord as to this great duty.

We are sad in heart to see the madness and folly of multitudes of young people who make the Day of God a day of foolish vanity. Cycling has grown to larger proportions than ever, and connected with it there are greater evils and dangers than ever. In the villages and places of resort near Toronto hundreds of wheels whizz along, and young men and maidens congregate and saunter; the hotel-keeper does a lively business,

and the sweetness and holy calm of the Day of God is broken. can we do to roll back the tide? We can acquit our consciences; we can proclaim God's truth; we can restrain and direct our children, and show our holy example. We can teach our boys and girls in our schools and in our homes that it is profane and God dishonoring thus to make the Holy Sabbath a day of dissipation, ungodly companionship and unhealthy excitement. In doing this, we utter not a word against the proper and Christian use of the bicycle.

We deplore the running of ferry boats on Sunday, as another way of making the Sabbath a day of amusement, excitement and pain, instead of rest and worship. We strongly condemn the running of railway trains on Sunday, as a great and growing evil. We would suggest the propriety of asking the General Conference Committee on Civil Rights to memorial.

ize the Legislature to remedy this state of affairs.

The people of Toronto may soon be called on to take a vote on Sunday street cars. We sincerely hope that the noble stand taken by our people in the former struggle will be more than maintained in the coming one.

We draw attention to the habit of Sunday visiting as a profanation of the Lord's Day. The sanctity and usefulness of the Sabbath are lost when

spent in visiting and worldly and vain conversation.

We are glad that so many parents take their children with them to the Sunday morning service. We sincerely exhort all the heads of families

to adopt this as a settled custom.

We deplore the fact that not a few of our people violate the day by reading secular papers instead of books and papers spiritually helpful—a s d loss to themselves, their families and their Church. We believe that only by religious sanctions and teachings can the Sabbath be preserved, and therefore we finally recommend that all our ministers preach at least one sermon during the year in every congregation on this vital topic.

# SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:

1. In looking over the returns from the year's work, your Committee feel cause for devout gratitude to the Head of the Church for the success of this important department of our Methodism.

We are delighted to report that 2,853 scholars have united with the Church during the year, a gratifying increase over last year of 758.

Our Home Department is steadily growing in interest, and now 518 Bible students are enrolled who cannot attend the regular sessions of the

2. We are devoutly grateful for, and much encouraged by, the growing school. temperance sentiment in our schools, and we learn with pleasure that 16,928 of our scholars have taken the total abstinence pledge, an increase over last year of 5,428.

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3. Your Committee note with much satisfaction that \$3,472.19 has been contributed by this department for missions. We would suggest, however, that if some system of weekly offerings could be established, it would not only be a grand educator for future offerings, but would largely augment the missionary income.

4. We would like to emphasize the report of last year in the matter of learning catechism, and urge that persistent effort be made to introduce

catechism study into all our Sabbath Schools.

Your Committee desire to impress upon all our officers the importance of the Sabbath School Aid and Extension Fund, and urge that, if possible, a large increase in these returns be secured, not only for the assistance of needy schools, but in consideration of our agent, a part of whose salary must be paid from this Fund, and that the returns for this object be promptly paid in at district meeting.

5. Your Committee regret that they have again to complain of errors in the financial returns, which they think arise from the law not having been observed. Discipline says, that moneys raised on circuit should be paid over to financial secretaries, and by them remitted promptly to the respective treasurers. If this mode were observed, errors would not be

so likely to occur.

6. Your Committee would earnestly entreat that in future the disciplinary regulations respecting district returns shall be faithfully observed, and thus make such returns harmonize with the treasurer's report. the present year, the treasurer will go over the books in the secretary's office, and see what moneys have been sent direct to him, and endeavor, if possible, to secure the correct balance sheet for publication in the Minutes of Conference.

7. Your Committee recommend that in view of the importance of Sabbath School work, ministers and Sabbath School superintendents be advised to do their utmost to secure more efficiency in the persons selected to act as teachers. Our young people are under superior culture during the week, and we should endeavor to have teachers who are not only persons

of piety, but of as good literary qualifications as can be secured.

8. Your Committee would also recommend that increased attention be given to the children of our Sabbath School by way of preaching directly to them, as well as using all other practical means to win them to Christ; and we express the hope that our ministers will frequently visit the schools, and, where possible, form children's classes.

9. Your Committee desire to emphasize the General Secretary's report with reference to the most vigorous efforts being made to keep our schools open in the winter as well as summer months of the year, and also, wherever possible, the superintendent of the school, or some other efficient person, shall conduct regular weekly teachers' meetings for the study of the lesson and to consider methods of work.

This we consider a matter of very great importance, and would recommend pastors and Leaguers to give special attention to this department of work. It is also of great importance that the obligations of the pledge be kept clearly before the societies. These require faithful attendance upon the class-meeting and other means of grace, and cheerful cooperation with the

We would strongly urgo the members of our Church to not attend Church in her work. places of public resort where questionable amusements are carried on; also, that great care be taken to prevent all objectionable features in such entertainments as may be given by our churches.

We deplore a tendency to discourage preaching by the laity. We are of opinion that large resources of usefulness lie here, and would recommend our laymen to consecrate their best thought and talents to this work, and

our ministers to utilize the same. The neglect of Sabbath observance by reason of the use of the bicycle demands serious attention. We would urge our people, while enjoying recreation in this way, to guard carefully the sanctity of the Sabbath, and to observe their accustomed attendance at both the Sabbath and week-

We would strongly recommend our ministers to keep constantly before

the people the exceptional merits of our publications. Our review of the work convinces us that where the Christian Guardian, Methodist Magazine and Review, and our Sunday School papers are most read greatest success is achieved. We have reason to believe that the use of unauthorized Sunday School literature has been injurious.

Your Committee regard it of importance that leaders' books be put into the hands of all leaders, and that greater care be taken by leaders and pastors in visiting and inquiring after absent members.

In view of the many removals recorded during the year, your Committee would note the great importance of removal certificates, and would urge upon all concerned the use of the same.

The success of the past year is both a cause for thankfulness and an incentive to renewed devotion to our holy work. In no way may we look for continued advance but by deepest consecration to the spiritual interest of our people.

# REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS CONCERNING COLLEGES.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF VICTORIA UNIVERSITY TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCES OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.

The Board of Regents have much pleasure in presenting to the Annual Conferences, and through them to the Church over which they preside, a brief report of the important work which has been committed to their The interest of this work centres, of course, in its financial and educational aspects, both of which have been the subject of careful con-

sideration and no little anxiety.

The estimates of income and expenditure made last year had anticipated a deficiency of \$8,000 on the year's work, the income being estimated at over \$24,000, and expenditure at over \$32,000. The treasurers, Geo. A. Cox, Esq., and Rev. Dr. Potts, were able to report that this had been reduced below \$6,000, partly by increase in fees due to a larger attendance of students and partly by a special Income Fund contributed by friends at the solicitation of Dr. Potts, intended to cover the annual deficiency for the next five years. Every item of expenditure had been carefully guarded during the year, and in this way the accounts were kept \$500 below the estimates. The annual deficiency is due entirely to the fact that the necessary endowment has not yet been reached. original estimate for the endowment was \$400,000, producing \$24,000 a The productive endowment is about \$260,000, yielding less than \$14,000 annual income. The munificent bequest of the late Mr. Massey will go far to meet the difficulty thus far experienced. The total expenditure for the year is reported at \$33,023.82. The income has reached \$27,112.62.

The report of the educational work of the year should give encourage ment to all the friends of the Institution. The attendance of students has again advanced, the net registration for the year being 253, divided as follows: Arts, 227; theology, 128; less registered in both faculties, 102; net total, 253. The strength of the staff has not been changed, numbering eleven professors and lecturers in arts, and six in theology, three

taking work in both faculties.

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The students of Victoria have secured very creditable results in the examinations of the year, obtaining their full share of the honors, scholar hips and other prizes of the University. The largest prize in the gilt of the University, the Exhibition Scholarship of \$750 a year for two years after graduation, to be used in study in Europe, has been won this year by a Victoria man, Mr. A. M. Scott.

A special feature of the work of the year has been increased attention to the subjects of the curriculum which give a Christian character to our This important matter is attracting the attention of our most thoughtful Christian men, and the question is anxiously asked, How shall we make our education truly Christian while yet unsectarian? The provisions of the Federation Act secure the following elements of religious knowledge as a part of the curriculum in Arts: The Evidences of Natural and Revealed Religion, Biblical Literature, Church History, the Greek Testament, and Christian Ethics. The department of Biblical Literature includes the English Bible, Biblical History and Introduction. The work is placed in the third and fourth years of the course. Of the sixty-eight Victoria students enrolled in those years, sixty are taking these subjects as part of their curriculum.

The report of the Faculty of Theology shows a remarkable advance in the educational status of our rising ministry. Of twenty-nine students of Victoria this year presented for ordination, no less than nineteen are graduates in Arts, three being also graduates in Divinity. This is a result probably not surpassed in the religious and educational history of

We commend to your loyal support and prayerful interest this importhe Continent. tant work of the Church, believing that the highest Christian intelligence is more than ever necessary to the upbuilding of the kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

# WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

To the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church.

The undersigned respectfully submit the following brief report of the last year's work and of the present position of the Institution.

Number of students in Arts, full course, 8 (others as partial students take more or less work in the University); in Divinity leading to the Licentiate's Degree, 24; for the Degree of B.D., 21; for the Conference Total enrolled, 71.

Rev. Principal Shaw, D.D., LL.D., lectures in Systematic Theology, Course, 18. Greek Testament and Church Polity; Rev. J. C. Antliff, M.A. (Edin.), D.D., in Apologetics, Hebrew and Homiletics; Rev. Psof. Richardson, B.A., B.D., Acting Registrar, in Greek and Latin, and Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., B.D., Bursar, in Church History and English. Rev. Prof. Patton, B.D., is still pursuing a Post-Graduate Course in Oriental Literature, in

The College is prepared to afford students facilities for meeting the Leiden, Holland. Conference requirements, in the new course for probationers, or for pursuing the three years' course leading to licentiate's standing, or the University Course in Arts in McGill, or the higher course in Divinity leading to curricula, etc., may be obtained from the Acting Registrar.

The Endowment Fund is now \$75,000, current expenditure about \$6,500, total debt on current account (only liability) is \$4,000. The Boarding Department covers its need with the income of about \$4,000. The need is urgent for enlargement of buildings for increased accommodation in dormitories, lecture rooms and convocation hall. It is probable that this need will be met from the generous bequest of the late H. A.

Massey, Esq., of Toronto, for the "Douglas Memorial Hall."

The effort of the Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., Bursar, to further increase the Endowment Fund, is being continued, and all its proceeds are sacredly placed in new investments. In the meantime the Institution is conducted with rigid economy in finances, and with regard to thoroughness and efficiency in educational work.

#### ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE.

To the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church.

Never since the foundation of the Ontario Ladies' College twenty-two years ago, have the Directors been able to present a report which is so gratifying as the present one. This Institution was founded in the faith that it would grow and develop and meet the ever-increasing need of the higher education of the young women of this country. And this faith has been fulfilled. At the very outset, the buildings commanded our admiration, but now their extent and their beauty far surpass anything of the kind in Canada. What grand halls, what spacious parlots, what charming bedrooms, what a beautiful chapel with its new large pipe organ, and what a dining room! It helps digestion to sit in it, so full of light with rows of windows on both sides, with tinted walls and maple floor and tables nicely spread. One does not know how delightful a ladies' college can be until he has been to Whithy. Here the carpenter and the painter and the upholsterer and other skilful hands have finished their work. You look upon the college by day from without, you enter and inspect the building within, everything pleases you—the wide, verdant lawns, the gothic pillers and gables, the striking breadth of wall where the new "Francis Hall" joins the old "Trafalgar Castle" and makes an unbroken harmony of architecture, the kitchen, the laundry, the steam boilers, the dynamo engine room. You look at it by day and are greatly pleased. But you behold it by night and you are charmed. Imagine you see four hundred incandescent lights suspended on artistic fixings shining through scores of windows and filling corridors and parlors and dormitories and lavatories with their softened beams, and you have a delightful vision.

There is a bright future before this College. It has great blessings in store for the young women of this country. And the purpose of the

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directors is to continue to supply it with all the equipment necessary to meet the highest ideal of education for young ladies. No branch of instruction will be overlooked. The steady aim of the Institution will ever be to send forth from its classes cultured and Christian women.

The various subjects of study, such as English, modern languages, mathematics, classics, music, painting, election, etc., receive careful attention. The course of study begins in primary work, and extends all the way up to the end of the second year in the provincial University.

The teachers all have a high standing of efficiency in their several departments, and the examinations of the pupils have been most creditable to the quality of their instruction. This year, as last year, four of the pupils have taken the first and second year's examinations in the provincial University, while every medallist of the College during the last four years has had a two years' standing in the highest school of learning among us.

An instructive course of lectures has been continued once a week through the year, when the leading professors of Toronto and of Victoria universities have given papers on subjects of great interest.

For the last session, the attendance has been larger than ever before, while the increased room for accommodating pupils, together with so many home comforts in the shape of heating, lighting, plumbing, etc., encourages the hope that next year will surpass all previous records in point of attendance.

We call upon the friends of the higher education of young women to forward the cause of religion and of culture by giving the Ontario Ladies' College their earnest support, and to communicate freely with the Principal, Rev. J. J. Hare, Ph.D., whose untiring industry and enthusiastic devotion has given to this College the present proud position among the colleges of the Dominion.

## THE WESLEYAN LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

To the President and Members of the Conference.

Dear Fathers and Brethren,—One of the most striking sentences in Tertullian's Apology reads, "We are but of yesterday and by to-day are grown up, and overspread your empire; your cities, forts, towns, camps, palace, senate, all swarm with Christians." It is with something of the same pardonable pride that we recall the fact that our Church, one of the youngest, has given to this country the first university, the first ladies' collège, the first religious journal, and the first publishing house. These facts are the more noticeable when put side by side with the notion hardly yet abandoned, that Methodism is more likely to emphasize the emotional than the intellectual. Buckle, in his "History of Civilization in England," wrote in 1857: "Since the death of their great leaders, they have not produced one man of original genius, and since the time of Adam Clarke they have not had among them even a single scholar who has

enjoyed a European reputation." Buckle would hardly write that to-day. But if he did, we would modestly suggest that the chief function of the Church is not to produce men of original genius, but rather to sanctify and ennoble all genius. Neither would the possession of men of European reputation be a satisfactory guaranty that we were in the true succession. Church organizations have had men of original genius and world-wide reputation, and still have been utterly powerless to melt and mould society into diviner forms.

Nevertheless we freely and promptly admit that a system that awakes not the dormant intellect and secures not more rational conceptions of God and His relations to us could hardly claim the stamp divine. Here we have no apology to offer for our Church. She needs none. Illiteracy is almost unknown among us. No Church on this continent has done more to advance higher education on a Christian basis than the Methodist. Canadian Methodism has an enviable record on this score. Victoria leads in the university line, and the Wesleyan Ladies' College of Hamilton

was the first chartered ladies' college in Canada.

The first record on our register is dated July 6th, 1860. The ministerial members of the Board were Drs. Ryerson, Rice, Wood, Douglas, Neltes, Stinson, Rose, and Richard Jones. All in their prime then; all in the necrology of the Church to-day. No more historic names can be furnished by any Church in the Dominion. Among the lay members of the Board were Edward Jackson, Dennis Moore, Edward Gurney, Dr. J. W. Rosebrugh, Joseph Lister, and George Roach. Dr. Rosebrugh and George Roach are the only surviving members of the original Board, and they are active members of the Board still.

We are pleased to be able to report a good year's work. Every department of the regular course is in charge of university graduates, and kept fully abreast of the times in efficiency. In music and art the names of Fairclough and Martin stand in the very front rank. Professor Baumann and Mrs. Martin Murphy have more than a provincial reputation violin and vocal culture. Elocution, physical culture, commercial studies and all other subjects taught in colleges will be found here, and in charge of thoroughly competent instructors. The year has been marked by great harmony; our students give us no trouble. We are also thankful to be able to say that serious sickness is unknown among us.

We need hardly refer to finances, as this Institution has never either solicited or received aid from the Church in any form. It has not merely been self-sustaining; its first President, Edward Jackson, endowed the first chair endowed in Victoria College, and his successor, Dennis Moore, supported a chair in that Institution for several years till his death Victoria and others of our colleges owe not a little to the Wesleyan. But while costing the Church nothing, we cheerfully offer to your daughters every advantage that any other institution can give, and on terms equally favorable.

This college is strictly non-sectarian, but positively Christian, and we think that its influence in the homes of our country has been in the highest degree healthful. No lady can secure our diploma without giving at least one bell each day for a year to the historic study of the Bible, and an equal time to Moral Science and Christian Evidences. Whatever else graduation might imply, it seems strange that colleges in Christian lands,

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and under Christian control, should ignore the subjects that lie at the basis of Christian civilization. We are satisfied that no part of our curriculum will tell more on the future of our students than the subjects referred to. We are proud of the work done in the Wesleyan, and proud of the record of our students. We never felt more hopeful or cheerful in our work than at present, and we pledge you our heartiest co-operation in the glorious work of making this world brighter and better.

REPORT OF ALMA LADIES' COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS, ONT.

To the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.

Dear Fathers and Brethern,—The school year now drawing to a close has brought us peculiar experiences of sorrow and of joy. For the first time since our College opening, nearly fifteen years ago, death has invaded the circle of our college family, taking from our midst our venerable and erudite Professor of German, the Rev. John Schulte, Ph.D., D.D., one of the ripest scholars and noblest characters of our country. The vacancy in the staff occasioned by his decease has been filled by the appointment of Miss E. A. Hill, B.A., of Toronto University.

The year has brought us a fine class of earnest, intellectual and devoted students, of whom about one hundred have been boarders in the Institution. The Methodist students constitute about one-half of our enrolment. The other half is made up from the various Christian churches, including several Roman Catholics. Twenty-five students from the United States have been enrolled this year. Our graduating class will number eighteen, as follows: in the Literary course, 7, Music, 3, Fine Art, 2, Elocution, 5, Commercial, 1. The health of the students has been very good, and the discipline of the school satisfactory, whilst the various religious services give evidence of an encouraging degree of religious interest.

The Faculty is full and thoroughly efficient, and the various departments were never in better condition for effective work. The donation of the late Dr. Gould, of Colborne, Ont., and the liberal bequest of \$10,000 by the late Hart A. Massey, Esq., of Toronto, give great encouragement and cheer to the Board of Management.

The agency for the Relief Fund under the vigorous efforts of Rev. J. P. Rice is showing good results, and the returns, while not as large as could be desired, are still encouraging. The full sum now subscribed to the Relief Fund amounts to \$24,000, of which \$12,000 remains to be collected.

The special needs of the school are:

1. A speedy relief from the financial burdens resting upon it.

2. A heartier co-operation and more active sympathy on the part of Methodist ministers and laity in making its great advantages and moderate rates better known to the people at large.

### REPORT OF THE DEACONESS HOME AND TRAINING SCHOOL.

The Board of Management of the Toronto Methodist Deaconess Home and Training School, in presenting its second annual report, desires to express devout gratitude to God for His blessing upon the work of the year; and also thankfully to record increased interest and liberality on the part of the churches in supporting this important movement.

The year was begun with six deaconesses in training. Two have since been received, and three have withdrawn from the work; so that the present staff consists of Miss Thompson, the Superintendent, and five deaconesses in training, one of whom (Miss Nablo) is to remain for another year in training as a nurse in the Asbury Hospital, Minneapolis,

Two deaconesses have been prevented by illness from completing their course in the Training School. One has passed a very satisfactory examination, as has also a young lady who has taken advantage of the

privileges granted to outsiders.

The Board cannot speak too strongly of its appreciation of the faithful and devoted labors of the deaconesses, who to the utmost, yea, and beyond their strength, have been in labors abundant, ministering to the sick and poor, caring for and instructing the children, and winning souls to Christ.

It is a pleasure also to speak in the highest terms of the valuable and efficient services rendered by the Superintendent, Miss Thompson.

Two candidates of the Woman's Missionary Society, and one other who is preparing for mission work and is now in training as a nurse in Grace Hospital, have resided for certain periods in the Home during the year and taken part in its work. Three thousand eight hundred and forty calls have been made, 1,408 garments, 370 baskets of food, and 2,622 papers and tracts have been distributed.

The course of lectures in the Training School has been ably sustained by the Rev. Drs. Galbraith, Parker and Wallace, Rev. Messrs. Chown, Chambers and Odery, and also Miss Macdonald and Miss Thompson; to all of whom the Board gratefully acknowledges its indebtedness.

The annual meeting was held in the Central Methodist Church, March The Board was fortunate in securing the presence of Mrs. Meyer. of Chicago, whose able and earnest addresses in the churches and at a reception given to her in the Home did much to deepen and intensify the interest felt in the work.

The Deaconess Aid Society, which has undertaken the furnishing and support of the Home, has done its part in the most generous and substantial manner, having in addition to provisions, etc., donated, expended the sum of \$1,128.75.

An Emergency Fund, under the direction of the Superintendent, has provided medicine and relief for many in distress, the sum expended being

The Treasurer reports an income from subscriptions, etc., of \$407.14, and an expenditure for rent, etc., of \$407.04, leaving a balance on hand of 10 cents.

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The Board would most earnestly commend the work to the continued sympathy and prayerful consideration of the Conference and of our people, believing that its support and extension will be the means under God of great good.

That while the Methodist Church does not identify itself with any political party or assume to dictate to its members how they shall vote in political elections, yet, as a Conference composed of laymen and ministers we deem it our duty at the present juncture to reaffirm and place on record our uncompromising opposition to every attempt of the Federal or any government or parliament, no matter by what party it may be made or whether by concession or force, to restore Separate schools in the young Province of Manitoba contrary to the repeatedly expressed judgment of an overwhelming majority of its people.

2. Furthermore, we desire to declare that, in our judgment, any public policy, carried by means of coercive, hierarchical influence, would be a violation of the spirit and principles of the system of free representative government under which it is our privilege to live, and which it is the

duty of all patriotic citizens to maintain and defend.

There have been received on trial as members of the Church during the year 3,971, which, after making up for the large excess of removals by letter over the number received by letter, deaths and removals from other causes, leaves a net increase in the membership of 744.

There has been raised for circuit purposes outside of the support of the

ministry, \$203,603. Your Committee regrets to have to report a decrease in many of the The standing of the funds is as follows. Missionary connexional funds. increase is \$102. Superannuation decrease from circuits, \$1,815.53, but this is more than made up by the increased giving of the ministers, so that there is a net increase of some \$800; Educational, \$296.78; Con tingent, \$69.20; General Conference, \$112.85; Union Church Relief, \$45.30; Sustentation, \$14.15; Woman's Missionary, \$262.45.

During the year there have been six new churches built at an aggregate

cost of \$21,000.

There are 522 churches and other preaching places in the Conference. There are 419 Sunday Schools attended by 43,054 scholars, 2,853 of whom have united with the Church during the year. In our Sunday

Schools there are 5,012 teachers.

On account of the extreme difficulty experienced by your Committee in their work through incomplete returns from circuits, we recommend that the Statistical Committee in future be instructed to report to Conference the names of delinquent circuits and superintendents, and, except where satisfactory explanations are given, such delinquents be admonished from the Chair of the Conference.

All has been done by your Committee that was possible to carry out the wise and equitable arrangement of last Conference for the entertainment of this Conference.

We have been very much handicapped in our work by the failure or lateness of notification by those desiring billets; but, notwithstanding

this, we expresse cation.

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this, we have been able to provide a home for every delegate who expressed a desire for a billet, or of whose coming we received any notification.

We commend the faithfulness of some chairmen and financial secretaries in collecting and sending the billet fee provided for by the resolution of last Conference. We would also mention, as worthy of imitation, the action of some delegates in personally sending their billet fee, and notice of desire for billet.

We heartily appreciate the warm hospitality of those members of the city congregations who have so kindly opened their homes to the members

of Conference.

Your Committee would recommend the continuance of the arrangement made by last Conference for the next year, as the most equitable and satisfactory plan of entertainment, with this amendment, that those who enjoy free homes be required to pay the billet fee of one dollar. We would urge that a stronger emphasis be laid on the duties of chairmen and financial secretaries, in this matter, and that the special attention of all delegates be called to the necessity and justice of paying the billet fee whether in free homes or not.

The balance on hand will be paid over to the Treasurer of the Sustentation Fund.

Whereas, it has been demonstrated that the hospitable Methodists of Toronto are willing to entertain members of the Conference; and whereas, it is wise and necessary to make some just arrangement to meet the expense of providing entertainment for those who may not be billeted;

Resolved,—That an Entertainment Committee be appointed, composed of three laymen from each of the Toronto districts, to be named by the President, and a corresponding number of ministers to be elected by the Methodist Preachers' Meeting, whose duty it shall be to billet the members of the Conference who request a billet; that each member of the Conference requesting a billet, or who may enjoy the privilege of a free home, whether provided by the Billeting Committee or not, excepting those entertaining delegates, be required to pay to the Financial Secretary at the May District Meeting, one dollar, who shall report to the Secretary of the Billeting Committee the names of those paying such amount, and of those who desire a billet. The Financial Secretary of each district shall pay over to the Treasurer of the Billeting Committee all such money received by him, and any balance of such fund left over after the payment of the necessary expenses of the Committee, shall be paid over to the Treasurer of the Sustentation Fund. Any delegate failing to notify the Financial Secretary at the District Meeting, shall notify the Secretary of the Billeting Committee one week before the opening of Conference, and pay to him directly the billet fee, and all Chairmen of Districts are urged to see that these arrangements are carefully carried out.

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# REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to submit the following port:

4. Reviewing the year, we recognize with thenksgiving the rapid progress made by the Epworth League. The total reported number of Leagues is 268, with a membership of about 127,000, showing an increase of 52 Leagues, and 1,700 members over last year. Inasmuch as many societies organize without securing charters and enrolment at the central office, we would urge that wherever Leagues are formed, organization be promptly reported to the General Secretary.

2. We are pleased to notice that the income has been sufficient, through the careful economy of the able General Secretary, to pay the expenses of the central office. Inasmuch, however, as additional assistance has been required and engaged to attend to growing business, which must mean additional expense; and whereas, many Leagues have neglected to forward the annual collection for the general fund, we would urge upon all pastors and Epworth League presidents the necessity of taking up and forwarding said collection to financial secretaries early in the Conference year, and that these collections be registered in schedules, a suitable blank space being prepared for the same.

3. We cannot but recognize that the indefatigable labors of the General Secretary have resulted in very much better organization throughout the Conference, that the District gatherings which he has attended have been greatly blessed as a result of his able addresses, and have proved to be

very helpful to organization.

4. Our young people more closely recognize the fundamental purpose of the League to be that of a practical, spiritual organization, whose chief aim is to "Lift up" lost souls and promote intelligent, practical, Christ like life. We recognize with regret, however, that in some places the class meetings and general prayer-meetings are not as fully attended by our Leaguers as a united Church would require, and we would urge upon all pastors and Epworth League presidents to unite in impressing upon the members of the Leagues the fact that nothing can take the place of the class-meeting in promoting strong, connexional, spiritual life.

5. Your Committee express satisfaction in the spirit of intense interest which has developed in the Missionary Department. We cannot but see the hand of Providence in the Students' Campaign Movement, and while we regret that the young energy among us cannot find a place to work in our Church, we heartily favor the spirit of our young men which by consecration and self-sacrifice would hasten Christ's kingdom in the We would urge, however, the Leagues to see that ther moneys go through the channels of our Church as much as possible.

6. We are pleased to notice that the Literary Department has already grown to be a source of great interest and power in the League. We highly commend the Reading Course which has been established, and are hopeful that this may be the means of strengthening the intellectual powers of all our young people; and wherever practicable we would urge the pastors to form a Circle.

7. We have recognized the excellent work done by our gifted Secretary in the Epworth League Department of the Christian Guardian, and fee pid pro-Leagues se of 52 societies

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that our young people should aid in every way possible to increase the subscribers and readers. We would recommend Leagues to establish clubs by which a certain number of papers could be in every League.

In the above statement, which covers the period since the last General Conference, you will notice the expenses have amounted to \$490.88, which is unusually large, arising mostly out of the action of the General Conference changing the treasurer against the recommendation of the

Embarrassed Trusts Committee, who had all the facts before it, and the inability of the Committee appointed to find anyone who would undertake to perform the duties and do the work for nothing.

Several special meetings of the Committee were held, and at last the former treasurer was prevailed upon to undertake the task. This he has

endeavored to do under increasing difficulty.

The General Conference of 1894 urged upon the Committee the relief of "St. Lawrence Camp-ground Association," which has been done, and the Trust wound up, at an outlay on the part of the Fund of \$5,916.47, and the payment or cancellation of about an equal amount on the part of those more immediately concerned. You will also notice the collections for 1895 were much below the average, amounting to only \$3,976.00. This, all will admit, is miserably small for so large a membership, and

ought to be doubled at least.

Your Treasurer acknowledges with many thanks the efficient aid of many members of the Committee, during the last year, in arranging and settling many difficult matters that required adjustment, in connection with the various trusts involved. And now that we have got to the bottom of the last trust that can legitimately come on the Fund, let us make more strenuous efforts than ever to "close it out" by largely increasing the collections, keeping down expenses and interest, and bringing everything to bear on a speedy extinguishment of all the liabilities, so we may turn our attention from dead to living issues, and find something more pleasant, if not more necessary.

### ALBERT COLLEGE.

To the Members of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.

DEAR BRETHREN,-We are able, under the blessing of a kind Providence, to report another year of prosperity at Albert College. Over 200 students have been enrolled. The year may be fairly said to mark a new epoch, a decided advance, in the history and work of the Institution. The improvements of the former building, which were begun in the summer of 1895, are now fully completed, and are the great delight of every friend of the College. The most modern and improved baths have been placed throughout the former building, and it has been devoted entirely to residence, thereby considerably increasing the accommodation. "Massey Hall," named after the late H. A. Massey, Esq., whose gift of \$10,000 made its erection possible, is a beautiful building of brick and Ohio sandstone. It provides a chapel seating gover 500, seven class-rooms and a It is finished in natural wood, ash and oak, with bronze hardware and cathedral glass. The equipments throughout are of the most substantial kind.

The gymnasium is a large two-story brick building, with gallery, and is provided with shower-baths, lavatory and every convenience. The expense of fitting it up with apparatus, costing several hundred dollars, h Institutio

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dollars, has been entirely borne by the present and ex-students of the Institution.

Albert College, with its splendid buildings and its large staff of honor graduates and specialists, can now fully claim a first place among collegiate and similar institutions in the Province. The College has always been highly successful in the preparation of candidates for university and departmental examinations, but the record of successful candidates of 1895 surpassed that of any previous year. Out of eleven candidates for Senior Matriculation, ten were successful; out of three candidates for Senior Leaving Teachers' Certificates, all were successful. This is a magnificent record, and at once reflects the highest credit upon the teaching staff, and stamps the work done as unsurpassed. A special matriculation examination is held just previous to the annual District Meeting.

The departments of Music, Elocution and Fine Arts have maintained

their efficiency and have been largely patronized.

The Business School has been greatly improved. The chapel of the former building, a room  $50 \times 50$ , has been fitted up with banking offices, merchants' emporiums; and lectures upon Commercial Law and other subjects have been appointed, and the College is now able to offer attractive courses in this department. (a) Book-keeping; (b) Shorthand and Type-writing; (c) Practical English. Alle graduates of the Business School receive the regular diploma from the Senate of the College.

During the year Dr. F. J. Livingstone, the chosen representative of the Missionant Society in the foreign field, has entered upon his work in

Africa

The Missionary societies, the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A., have been

most active in their operations.

We desire to thank the ministry and laity of the Methodist Church for their hearty co-operation with us in the work of the College, and we rejoice greatly that the present year has been one of such marked success. We hope to ever merit your confidence and support.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL AND EPWORTH LEAGUE DEPARTMENT, METHODIST CHURCH.

To the President and Members of the Toronto Conference.

DEAR BRETHREN,—I regret that I shall not have the privilege of attending the sessions of your Conference this year, on account of absence in the West. I desire, however, to place before you some information concerning the work of my department during the past year.

Since June, 1895, I have travelled 21,000 miles through New Bruns wick, Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, the North-West Territories and British Columbia. I have attended over fifty League and Sunday School Conventions, have taken part in a number of anniversaries in various places, and have delivered 336 public addresses.

The progress of the League during the year has been very rapid. It is impossible to state with any degree of accuracy the growth that has been made, inasmuch as many societies have been organized without enrolment at the central office, and have not secured charters. I would recommend that wherever Leagues are formed, application should be made for forms, and organization reported to the General Secretary. A leaflet on "How to organize an Epworth League," will be sent free on

application. The last General Conference provided that a collection should be taken up annually in all our Leagues for the General Epworth League Fund. Up to the 1st of May the sum of \$760 has been contributed by 470 Leagues. Over 800 societies have not yet been heard from. It is to be hoped that when Financial Secretaries have made their returns the number of contributing Leagues will be greatly increased.

We have managed by very careful economy to pay the expenses of the central office, without incurring any indebtedness. It has, however, been found absolutely necessary to secure office assistance to attend to correspo and incr that the early in

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enses of the , however, attend to correspondence and other details; so that the fund must be sustained and increased. Pastors and Epworth League presidents will kindly see that the collection for the General Epworth League Fund is taken up early in the autumn and fowarded to the Financial Secretaries.

I may be permitted to mention some of the leading features of the

work during the past year.

1. We have secured better organization. Conference Conventions have been held in the Nova Scotia, Montreal, Bay of Quinte, Toronto, Hamilton, London and British Columbia Conferences, and nearly all the districts in These district gatherings the central Conferences have been organized. have proved very profitable and helpful. I trust that districts not yet organized will soon fall into line.

2. Another striking feature of League work is the clearer recognition on the part of our young people of the serious object of the League. is becoming more and more felt that the League is intended to be a practical and spiritual organization with definite religious objects in view. Pastors are almost unanimous in their testimony that the League is a

great source of strength to the Church.

3. The departments of the League are being worked more completely than ever before. The Missionary Department has received special attention, and a spirit of intense interest has been developed in the missionary work of our Church. The Literary Department is being made a source of great interest and power to the League.

Our Reading Course has commended itself to the young people, and a very satisfactory commencement has been made. About four hundred sets of books have been sold during the past year, and a number of Reading Circles have been organized. I would most earnestly recommend that pastors use their influence in the formation of these Reading Circles wherever practicable.

4. Many places are still without any young people's society. Let our

motto this year be, "An Epworth League in every Church."

In regard to our Sunday School work I have a few suggestions to make: (1) Our Sunday Schools should be kept open all the year wherever When the day school is kept open in the winter it surely practicable. ought to be possible to carry on the Sunday School.

(2) Regular weekly teachers' meetings should be held for the study of the lessons, and to consider methods of work. It is a cause for regret that so many of our Sunday Schools report having no teachers' meeting.

(3) The Home Department of the Sunday School has been gaining ground during the past-year very rapidly. It seems to be equally adapted to town, city and country. It should be a part of every school organiza-

(4) I would most earnestly urge our schools to take our own Sunday School papers and periodicals. They are as good and as cheap as any that can be secured, and the benefits of having them in the hands of our scholars can scarcely be estimated.

(5) Our Sunday School Aid and Extension Fund has done good work in aiding poor schools, and in establishing new ones in remote and destitute neighborhoods. During the past year or two its operations have been somewhat crippled by a debt of about \$2,500. I expect this will be

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reduced by the sum of \$500 this year, and hope that it may be entirely extinguished before next General Conference. The schools should take up a full collection annually for this Fund, endeavoring to make some increase on previous contributions.

I am doing the best I can to help poor schools and respond to all applications, but am determined to keep the expenditure within the income.

During the coming year I shall hold myself ready, as far as health and strength will permit, to serve the Leagues and Sunday Schools of our Church.

Praying for a year of great spiritual prosperity in this department of our work, I remain,

St. John, M.P.P., seconded by Mr. Sturgeon Stewart, Ph.D., that with a view of securing greater system, order and expedition in the transaction of the business of Conference, a committee be appointed at this Conference to prepare a programme of the business of the next Conference in so far as the same can be arranged in advance, and that the same be duly published.—Carried.

2. That the recommendation of the laymen, which was laid on the table at the session of last evening (Tuesday), referring to the constitution and appointment of the Nominating Committee by the District Meeting, is hereby reaffirmed, and the Conference is requested to now take the matter

from the table for discussion.

3. The laymen of the Toronto Conference recommend that in future the Chairmen of Districts nominate, at the May District Meetings, two members, one clerical and one lay, who shall constitute the Nominating Committee, to nominate the Standing Committees of the succeeding Conference, and that the President be requested to call the said Committee to meet at least one day previous to the meeting of the Conference.

4. That the attention of the Superintendents of Circuits and classleaders be drawn to the importance of the faithful observance of the provisions of our Discipline, which require that a leaders' meeting shall be held every quarter, to the end that a close relation shall be maintained, and the most particular information possible obtained concerning the entire membership of the circuit, thus avoiding the discrepancies which are so often noticed as existing between the membership reported by our ministers and the membership discoverable by his successor on the same field. 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### OBITUARIES.

JOHN SHAW, D.D.

John Shaw came of a good stock, both his parents being devoted members of the Methodist Church, of which his father was class-leader and local preacher; and he himself, like Samuel, was from his birth lent unto the Lord. Though he always regarded himself as an Irishman, having a genuine love for the land of his fathers, he was born at Three Rivers, Province of Quebec, April 29th, 1830, shortly after the arrival of his parents in Canada. A few years after, the family removed to Goderich where John was brought up. His father was among the pioneer settlers in that region, and had to take part, even in his boyhood, in clearing the land and in working the farm. He thus early learned what were the peculiar hardships of the backwoodsman, a branch of knowledge which played no unimportant part in preparing him for his life-work. Like the Methodist preachers of an earlier day, he was of the people, he was at home among them, he sympathized with them, and like the Master, though not in form yet in the same spirit, he was prepared to give his life for them.

Like Timothy, from a child he knew "the holy scriptures which" were "able to make" him "wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus." He early learned from both the precept and example of his parents, as well as from the godly instruction of the wayworn itinerants who found a resting place in their hospitable home, to fear God and work righteousness. The exact date and circumstances of his conversion are not material. To the reality of that gracious change, the whole of his life during about half a century, bore indubitable testimony. Soon after becoming a member of the Church he became a local preacher; and after exercising his gifts in that capacity for a few years, he was induced to set about preparing himself for the ministry. Indeed it is probable that from the beginning of his religious life he had this before him; and though the opportunities for acquiring an education in the region of the country in which he lived were small, he made the best of them, supplementing the advantages of the schools in the neighborhood by such private tuition as was within his reach. And finally he succeeded in spending some time at In 1851 he was received on trial for the ministry, and Victoria College. in 1855 he was received into full connection and ordained.

In the meantime, at Strathroy, Malahide, and Crowland, the fields on which he had labored during his novitiate, he had given full proof of his ministry. It was on the first-named of these circuits that he met with Miss Isabella Boulton, the estimable lady who in 1857 became his wife. As the fruit of this happy union, he has left behind him six children, two

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sons and four daughters, one, Jennie (Mrs. Sherwood), having gone

before him. Brother Shaw served the Church faithfully in every position in which he was placed. As a junior preacher, as the superintendent of a circuit, as the chairman of a district, as president of the Conference, as the assistant secretary of the Missionary Society (the last position in which he efficiently served the Church), as an active and earnest promoter of the temperance reform, he discharged his duties in a most exemplary and Whether the position he filled for the time being satisfactory manner. was high or low, he always acted upon the principle that whatever is worth doing at all, is worth doing well. He was faithful in little, as well as in great things, giving minute and careful attention to the details of whatever he had in hand. The soundness of his judgment made him a valuable counsellor, and there were few to whom his brethren turned with greater confidence for advice in times of trial and perplexity. He was a sound theologian, and a wise and pradent administrator of the discipline of our Church. He was a good, rather than a great preacher, aiming constantly in his ministrations at leading sinners to Christ, and strengthening the faith of believers. He was a kind and diligent pastor, caring for the flock over which the Chief Shepherd had made him overseer as one who should give account. Above all he was "a good man, full of the Holy Ghost and of faith."

His death was fearfully sudden. He may be said to have been struck down in a moment, for though he lived for a few days, he never fully recovered his consciousness after he received the fatal shock which was the occasion of his death. Crossing Yonge Street, one of the busy thoroughfares of Toronto, on his bicycle, he was struck by an electric car, on the afternoon of November 15, 1895, and on December 3rd entered into rest, being in the sixty-sixth year of his age and the forty-fifth of his

ministry.

#### JAMES GRAHAM

Was born in Carrick-ma Cross, County of Cavan, Ireland, October 26th, 1826. When about eighteen years of age his father came to Canada, and settled in the township of West Gwillimbury, County of Simcoe.

Mr. Graham's religious life began at the early age of sixteen. Through the teaching of the Church of England, supplemented and emphasized by the fervid exhortations of certain Primitive Wesleyan ministers, he was led to a decided personal consecration of himself to the service of God. With growing years, however, and the development of an intensely inquisitive intellect, he was drawn into questionings, to which, amid his environments, his youthful mind discovered but little that was satisfactory; and perhaps it is not wonderful that for a time he ceased his public profession of faith, and began to challenge the teachings of Christianity. But God, who honors the intellect He has created, and who comprehends the weaknesses of our humanity, did not forsake him, nor take His Holy Spirit from him; and, no doubt, recognizing the sincerity of his heart, gently led him back to himself.

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The place of his conversion was an old-time camp-meeting, to which he had gone under a strong mental protest, as it seemed to him a strange incongruity to hold religious services in the woods. His conscientious prejudice led him to an open and earnest controversy with those who justified such wilderness methods. The truth that commended itself savingly to his judgment and conscience was presented in a sermon by the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, from 2 Peter i. 16: "For we have not followed cunningly devised fables, when we made known unto you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but were eye-witnesses of his majesty." He could not shake off the Word applied by the Holy Spirit, and he at once sought and found Christ as his Saviour. Thus, like Paul, James Graham heard the voice of the Master, which bid him preach the faith he had been led to oppose.

This event occurred in 1858. The following year he entered on his probation; and in 1863 was ordained in the city of Quebec, to the sacred office of the ministry. Relating his experience on that occasion, and referring to what took place at the camp-meeting five years be-

fore, he appropriated those beautiful lines of the poet

"I woke, the dungeon flamed with light, My chains fell off, my heart was free, I rose, went forth, and followed thee."

James Graham was endowed with remarkable powers of reasoning. His intellectual activity led him into the study of great problems in science and philosophy, while his tendency to analyze thought, and to present it in harmony with true logical processes, rendered his preaching most instructive.

His powers as a Conference debater are well known. His perception of a subject was clear and his grasp strong, and his positions honestly maintained. When James Graham took the floor he compelled attention. Many instances of his clever repartee are fondly remembered by his friends; and his genial, hearty acceptance of decisions honestly arrived at, even when they were contrary to his judgment, only emphasized the more his loyalty to his brethren and respect for their judgment.

Faithful to the teachings of Methodism and to the great truths of the Bible, James Graham could not do other than take a pronounced and definite position on the great temperance reform, though, perhaps, more than once he was made to suffer for his fearless and outspoken attitude, in the days when temperance and prohibition were not as popular as now, and when to be loyal to temperance principles in the pulpit required more

courage than it does now.

At the Conference of 1863, Mr. Graham was appointed to Davenport, and during the year served as assistant editor of the Christian Guardian. In 1867 he was married to Emma, daughter of the late Rev. Wellington Jeffers, D.D., who survives him with five children, one of whom, Rev. John Wellington Graham, is now an ordained minister. His stations included Baltimore, Canton, Clinton, Goderich, London (Queen's Avenue), Seaforth, Dundas, Windsor, Exeter, Ridgetown and Strathroy, in several of which districts he filled the office of Chairman.

At the session of London Conference, held in London, in 1888, he was elected President, and filled the office most acceptably. He was also a member of every General Conference, until he retired from the active work.

About two years ago, owing to failing health, Mr. Graham felt constrained to seek a superannuated relation, when he removed to Toronto, hoping that in the rest and quiet of retirement he might regain health

and strength. But it was not to be!

He was called to the rest eternal! On April 13th, 1896, in his own comfortable home, surrounded by all his loved ones, he gently passed away. Many ministerial brethren gathered to pay the last tribute of respect to their brother, and at the funeral service held in the Yonge Street Methodist Church, Toronto, life-long friends testified, in terms of affection and respect, to the ability, fidelity and zeal of the departed.

The following extract, taken from Chancellor Burwash's address, may fitly close this brief memoir: "In the presence of death how wonderful is our Christian faith! It penetrates not only to a life beyond the grave, but even to the resurrection of the body itself. 'For I would not have you be ignorant, brethren, concerning them which are asleep, that ye sorrow not, even as others which have no hope.' When Paul was writing these words of comfort it is said that Quintilian, the Roman philosopher, on the streets of Rome, tore his hair and cursed the gods who had taken his children from him. But if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also that sleep in Jesus will God-bring with him. In this blessed faith Brother Graham died. He was a man of clear, definite, strong faith. That which he apprehended was to him a living reality, and he found it sufficient in death as in life. Our brethren, even as of old, die well.

## JOHN SMILEY, M.A.,

Was born in Urnay, County of Donegal, Ireland, on January 30 1840, and with his parents came to this country and settled in the city of Toronto, in the spring of 1846. He made the best use of the limited educational advantages offered him at the time, and by spending his evenings in a course of home studies, he prepared himself for college, entering the University of Toronto in 1861. He was early in life brought under religious influences, and while still in the days of his youth, was brought into the definite experience of saving grace. And being convinced that he was called to preach-the Gospel, he served the Church for a time as local preacher, and in 1865, the year in which he graduated at the His first appointment University, he was taken into the ministry. was on the Cooksville Circuit. The third year of his probation he spent with the late Dr. Freshman, in the German work on the Preston Circuit, preaching first through an interpreter and subsequently in the German language. In 1868, he took his degree of M.A., and in the following year was received into full connection with the Conference and ordained. As a single man he travelled on the St. Thomas, Lucan and Ailsa Craig city cuits. On August 13th, 1872, he was united in marriage to Charlette Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the late Mr. William Smith Burrage, of

As lsa Craig cir to Charlotte Burrage, of Montreal. He continued in regular circuit work until 1881, in which year, at Durham, the entire family was stricken down with diphtheria. Death removed one dear boy, and our brother was left a perfect wreck, diphtheritic paralysis rendering him helpless for some months. Heresumed work, but in the following fall he broke down again, and during the winter became seriously ill. For six years after this illness he was laid aside from active service. Anxious to be engaged again in the work. in 1888 he requested to be stationed on a circuit, and was sent to Severn Bridge, where he labored three years, which was followed by three years at Burk's Falls. Then the last year was spent at Lambton Mills. Before many months, however, he found he was not equal to the work, but persisted in it until spring, when from an attack of hæmorrhage of the lungs, he was obliged to desist. By the direction of his doctor, he left the city in July last for the northern part of the country, and took up his residence again at Burk's Falls, where he remained until January 20th, when he returned to his home in Toronto, despairing of finding health again. To a friend on the train while on his return, he expressed the sincere hope that the doctors were not mistaken this time, and that his release was near at hand. His family soon saw he was not to be long with them, and endeavored to make the remaining weeks as full of comfort as possible. After repeated attacks of hemorrhage, and with his family gathered around him, and after commending them all to God in prayer for the last time, he passed peacefully away on Thursday, February 6th, with a strong and clear hope to be forever with the Lord. Our brother lived a life of simple child-like trust in Christ; he possessed an unselfish spirit, and was kind and obliging to those around him. appointments were all kept with the greatest fidelity.

In his pulpit and platform addresses he was original and fearless, and in the discussion of subjects in our connexional paper, and at district meetings, could secure attention by a quaintness and freshness peculiarly his own. He was a man of considerable literary attainment and taxte. He kept abreast of the times in his reading, and many a racy article and poetic effusion of much merit from his pen adorned the newspapers of the localities in which he labored, while not a few found their way into many prominent weekly papers and magazines. He spent much of the time during the last few months of his life at Burk's Falls in editorial work, and had the hope, before the worst had come, that if obliged to be permanently superannuated, he might be useful in some journalistic work. But his work on earth is done, and the rest has been entered upon. He has left an aged mother, a wife, and five children to mourn their loss.

#### SYLVESTER L. KERR

Was born in the township of Whitby in the year 1823, and died in the city of Toronto, June 1st, 1896, in the seventy-fourth year of his age. The date of his conversion to God we have not been able to ascertain. In the year 1846 he entered the Christian ministry in the late Methodist Episcopal Church, and spent some thirty-two or thirty-three years in the active work. For the last fourteen or fifteen years he had lived in retire-

ment, a part of the time holding a supernumerary relation, and a part of

it on the list of superannuates. During these years of retirement he rendered much valuable, service to the Church by way of preaching and otherwise, when asked by his pastor to do so. On the 17th of May last he preached in the Simpson Avenue Methodist Church, Toronto, and some who heard him said they never heard him preach better.

His nephew, Rev. J. McD. Kerr, says: "I was with him on Friday afternoon, May 26th. He was then quite smart and very cheerful. We talked freely of the work of the Lord, and he seemed very mellow in spirit

and responded heartily during prayer."

The summons calling our brother to his heavenly home came suddenly, and, at the time, was quite unexpected; but it found him ready-his lamp trimmed, his vessel full of oil and his light shining. His end was peace

ful, without a struggle or a groan.

Brother Kerr was a good preacher, practical and earnest; and his ministry was honored of God by some very gracious and fruitful revivals The following are some of the circuits on which his active ministry was spent: Dumfries, St. David's, Cambro, Bothwell, London, Meaford, Collingwood, Goderich, Oakwood, Oakville, Dresden, Thamesville and

### ROBERT BOYLE, D.D.,

Was an Irishman of the Irish, belonging, as his name indicates, to a fine old Celtic family; and though he came to this country when but a boy, he never lost the characteristics of his race. The warm heart, the lively imagination, and the nimble wit which he inherited from his ancestors continued with him to the end of life. And these, refined by considerable culture and sanctified by the grace of God, were among the chief factors in his success as a minister of the Gospel. He had, moreover, a native dignity, gravity and self-respect which gave weight to his influence, and secured for him the respect of all with whom he came in contact. reverence for sacred things, which is one of the most striking characteristics of his race, was one of the most prominent features in his character. He was habitually impressed with the sentiment that holiness becometh the house of the Lord forever, and that they should be especially clean who bear the vessels of the Lord. It may be, indeed, that these views, at times, especially when he was in poor health, became somewhat morbid and excessive. Though a man of great purity of life, devout spiritual, and earnest in his devotion to God, he was often the subject of deep depression, and a painful sense of defect and shortcoming.

He was born in the County Tipperary, Ireland, of Roman Catholic parents, in 1825. His early religious instruction was in the faith of his fathers. But, in his boyhood, he came under the influence of the Rev. William Cather, Wesleyan minister, through whose ministry he was brought to a saving knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus. This event changed the current of his whole life. It was doubtless the cause of his coming to

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this country; and his conversion, with the accompanying consciousness of a call to the work of bringing others to the possession of like precious faith with himself, turned his attention toward those intellectual pursuits by which his faculties were developed and trained for future usefulness. At the age of nineteen he began to preach. Though he never had any doubts respecting his divine call to the ministry, he had much misgiving concerning his ability to meet the requirements of an office so sacred and responsible. He had a very high ideal of the ministerial office and its responsibilities, and regretted that his own circumstances and the exigencies of the time made it necessary for him to enter upon it without more ample preparation. But, possessing natural gifts of a high order, with industry and perseverance in the pursuit of knowledge and self-culture, he soon became a workman that needed not to be ashamed, and far outshone, both in the quality of his ministry and the measure of his success, many whose educational advantages had been far superior to his own.

He excelled especially as a preacher. The pulpit was the throne of his It was here that the qualities both of his mind and heart were most effectively brought into play. He had many of those qualities which go to make a great preacher-sound judgment in the selection of his theme's and the arrangement of his matter, sufficient imagination to enable him to speak to the eye as well as to the ear of his hearers, an intensity of feeling which seldom failed to touch the hearts of his audiences, and, withal, a certain quaintness of expression which often gave an indescribable charm to his utterances. His aim, however, was to be a good, rather than a great preacher. He had a passion for soul-saving, and unless sinners were awakened and converted, and believers were comforted and edified, he found no comfort in his performances.

The estimation in which Bro. Boyle was held by his brethren, by the people among whom he exercised his ministry, and indeed by all who knew him, was unmistakably evinced in the offices which he was from time time, by the suffrages of his brethren, called to fill; in the fact that the congregations whom he once served were ever anxious to obtain his services again; and, finally, by the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity, which was conferred upon him by Victoria University a few years ago.

"To err is human," and no doubt Dr. Boyle had his infirmities, if not his faults. So highly amorganized being as he was, one who was in fact a bundle of nerves, especially when suffering from bad health, must have at times suffered sorely from irritability, and if now and again, in spite of all the self-restraint which grace had given him, this infirmity became so apparent as to become a source of trial to others as well as to himself, we should not be surprised. But, if this was the case, it has long since been forgotten by those who knew him best, and who remember now only the saintliness of his character, and the eminent service which, by the grace of God, he was enabled to render to his Church and to the world. He rests from his labors, but his works do follow him. He has disappeared from among men, but his memory is as ointment poured forth.

## WILLIAM CRAWFORD SANDERSON

Was born in the town of Berth, August 24th, 1870, where his father, Rev. J. E. Sanderson, M.A., was then stationed, and died at his father's

residence, Brampton, March 2nd, 1896. At the age of sixteen he came to Toronto, and entered as clerk our Under the ministry of the late Rev. Dr. D. G. Methodist Book Room. Sutherland, while at Elm Street Church, he was converted; and, consecrating himself to Christ, he entered the ministry of our Church in

As a probationer he travelled the Malton, Angus and Newtonbrook circuits, and the brethren under whose guidance he labored have given testimony to his sweet spirit, and the diligence with which he did his

While at Angus the second time, he was called to his reward, and the hearty manner in which that circuit has honored his memory speaks as plainly as possible of the merit of his work, both as a probationer and as a superintendent. He spent two years at the Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, an institution very dear to his heart, for he had received there, under inspiration from her godly men, a truer spirit of

consecration to the work of the ministry.

After his ordination in 1893, he was very happily married to Ella M Campbell, and they made their first home at Emsdale, on the Brace bridge District. He who does the work required and endures hardship as a good soldier of Christ Jesus on our back missions, needs not only joy and peace in heart and home, but must be of iron constitution. Bro. Sanderson felt the strain, but after two years of rich experience and richer reward, he was relieved and sent to Angus. He had just gotten nicely settled to work on his new charge, when he contracted a cold in Toronto, while in attendance at the Epworth League Convention. He did not reach his own home, but died at his father's residence before his precious wife and child could reach him. Only they who die in the Lord, and have Him in them, can meet and conquer such grief. He was a good preacher and a faithful pastor, and has left us the true heritage of a blameless name upon our records and in the memory of our people, and has committed to our love and care his young wife and infant daughter.

### ROBERT NORTON HILL

Was the son of Thomas Hill, a worthy man and a useful local preacher. He was born in Leeds, Ontario, August 2nd, 1826. In 1850 he was united in marriage to Caroline White, granddaughter of Captain White, a U. E. Loyalist of Elizabethtown, and five years afterwards he entered the ministry in the New-Connexion Methodist Church. For fifteen years he labored acceptably and successfully in the ministry of that body, filling successively the following stations, viz.: North Gore, Cavan, Crosby, Oxford Mills, Simcoe and Schomberg. In 1870 he went to Muskoka and took up land on Peninsula Lake, taking charge at the same time of Mount Vernon Mission, where he exercised his ministry during the next five

The work which he did here was, in the strictest sense, pioneer In many a new settlement he was the first of any denomination to minister the Word of Life to the scattered settlers. His journeys were long, and his hardships were great, travelling sometimes by canoe, and sometimes on foot through trails and blazed paths in the woods. He would often go twenty and thirty miles on a Sunday, to preach in the settlers' shanties and in the rude log school-houses the Gospel to the poor. The Word preached by him was with power; and many have blessed memories of those delightful services.

The Methodist Church has had no minister more loyal to its doctrine or its policy than Brother Hill. And though in 1875 he took a supernumerary relation, he lost none of his love for the soul saving work; and he continued to preach every Sunday up to the time of his death. Faithful in the discharge of all his domestic duties, as a husband and a father he was most exemplary; and the beneficent influence which he exerted in his home, is seen in the Christian character of his children. His conduct as a citizen and a neighbor, secured for him the respect of those who knew him best. He was held in the highest esteem among his neighbors. He was honored by the Government in being appointed as a Justice of the Peace; and he was on more than one occasion strongly urged by his fellow-citizens to accept nomination as a candidate for legislative honors; and probably, had his life been spared, he would have been a candidate at the approaching parliamentary elections.

Brother Hill's last days were saddened by the sudden death of a beloved The last public religious act of his life was the reading of the Scripture lesson at this son's funeral; and in the brief space of ten days afterward, he was laid beside him in the grave. The memorial service which was appointed for the son, was the memorial service for the father also. His death was not only peaceful, but triumphant. His faith did not fail As the shadows were gathering around him, he took in the final trial. his sorrowing wife by the hand, and said: "I love the Lord with all my heart, all my soul, and all my strength," and thus he passed away, to be

forever with the Lord.

- (8) Who are the Laymen elected by the several Districts to this Conference?
- (9) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Conference Missionary Committee?
- (10) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Sabbath School Committee?
- (11) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Epworth League Committee?
- (12) What representatives have been elected by the District Meetings to the Stationing Committee?
- (13) What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the year?

Second. To classify and arrange the memorials and resolutions from the several districts in such a manner that when presented to Conference they may be readily and intelligently referred to an appropriate committee or acted upon by the Conference as it may direct.

Third. Having selected a suitable secretary, shall through him be prepared to report to the Conference at the call of the Chair; the report to be read from the platform, and in such a manner that the pleasure of the Conference may be ascertained on every item presented.

Ruling by the President of the Toronto Conference re the right of a lawyer or "professional counsel" to appear as the representative of a church member in our church courts, having a special bearing on the case of Bro. W. E. Southgate now before the Conference:

"In this case I rule in harmony with the ruling already given by the Rev. Dr. Galbraith, Chairman of the Toronto Central District, that paragraph 208 on page 113 of our Discipline, precludes legal or professional counsel from such representation. "ALEXANDER LANGFORD.

Southgate's local preaching license had lapsed before the date of the membership certificate, tendered by him to Bro. Locke (the validity of which certificate, per se, extends to the 15th of next October, nevertheless); therefore be it resolved, that on neither specification is the charge of mal-administration sustained against the Rev. J. H. JOHN HUNT, Locke.

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#### PASTORAL ADDRESS.

### ADDRESS OF THE MINISTERS OF THE TORONTO CON-FERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH TO THE MEMBERS OF THE SOCIETIES UNDER THEIR CHARGE.,

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHRIN, -We gladly avail ourselves of the opportunity afforded us by our meeting together in our Annual Conference to address to you such words of fraternal greeting and pastoral counsel as the occasion seems to us to require. We rejoice with you in the greatness of the blessings which a beneficent Providence has given us so richly to enjoy. Even our temporal mercies call for devout thanksgiving. The lines have fallen to us in pleasant places, and we have a goodly heritage. It is not a little thing to live in these closing years of the nineteenth century, and to have come into the possession of all the advantages which the thought and labor, the conflicts and triumphs of the wise and the good in all the ages which preceded it have secured, and we have scarcely less cause for thankfulness in the character of the country in which our lot is cast. We live in a land of peace and plenty, in which the supremacy of law-is everywhere felt and acknowledged, and where as large, if not a larger, measure of civil and religious liberty is enjoyed as in any other country under the sun-a land of churches, and of schools and colleges, where all the arts of civilized life flourish, and where all its privileges and blessings are enjoyed to an extent that they are scarcely enjoyed in any other part of the world.

These things, brethren, have not come to us by chance, but by the purpose and providence of God. He has appointed our time and fixed the bounds of our habitation. And to Him, first of all, our thanksgiving is due. But God works by means, and there is no reason why the subordinate agents and instrumentalities by which these results have been brought about should be overlooked or forgotten. The part played by our own denominational fathers, and by the form of Christianity given us to preach and to propagate, it especially behooves us to remember. Canada was not at the beginning of the century what it is now that it is approaching its close. And what it is to-day, humanly speaking it could never have been but for the labors of the Methodist preachers of those early years, and the cheerful, hearty, and unselfish co-operation of the people among whom they labored. They exist among us only as a fast fading memory, but their record is on high. They labored, and we have entered into their labors, and their memory ought to be to us an instruc-

tion and an inspiration.

It is not, however, with the men so much as with the means and methods which they employed, the truth preached by them, and the spirit in

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which their work was prosecuted that we are chiefly concerned. The standards of Methodist doctrine were then what they are to-day. They had not anything, in this respect, which we have not. Indeed in some respects—many respects—we both as preachers and people stand on high vantage ground when compared with our fathers. And we would not insinuate that there is any ground for asking why the former times were better than these. Neither ministers nor people were as well educated then as they are now, and neither possessed the facilities which we do now for the study of the Holy Scriptures, and the complete mastery of the grand doctrinal system which as a people we believe and teach. Even the children in our day have a more complete mastery of the English language than many of their religious teachers had in those early days. If our preaching, so far as form and expression is concerned, is not better than that of our comparatively rude forefathers, it certainly should be.

Then the Church, in those early days of Methodism in this country, was not nearly so highly organized as it is at present. It may be, indeed, that there was more spontaneity in the activity of the Methodists in the work of soul-saving than there is now, for then it was said that "they were all at it and always at it," but so far as organization is concerned, they were far behind us of the present generation. In almost every respect our position is greatly to be preferred to that of our fathers. We could not go back to their position if we would; we would not if we could. It is in no pessimistic spirit that we look backward to the past, or that we would affectionately exhort you to do so. We have no sympathy with that sort of conservatism which has been compared with a cyclops with but one eye, and that at the back of his head. We greatly prefer the living present to the dead past; and we look for greater things in the

future than belong to either the past or the present.

But with all their disabilities, with all their defects, our fathers were successful. May it not be that these very disabilities and defects led them to feel the more deeply their utter dependence upon God, and had the effect of driving them continually to the primal source of all spiritual power? They knew what it was to dwell in the secret place of the Most High, and to abide under the shadow of the Almighty. They learned the secret of that which distinguishes Christianity from all other religions, the enthronement of God in the heart, the indwelling of the Holy Spirit as the source of spiritual illumination and power. It was this which made these comparatively rude and uncultured men mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds. They lived and labored in alliance with God; and this it was that made the word preached by them "quick and powerful," living and irresistable, "sharper than any two-edged swand, piercing to the dividing asunder of the joints and marrow, and a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart." And thus it came to pass that, as in the apostolic times, when these people prophesied, spake or prayed under the influence and power of the Holy Spirit, whether in the log cabin of the backwoodsman, in the rude log school-house, or in the forest, "and there came in one unbelieving or unlearned, he (was) reproved of all, he (was) judged of all; the secrets of his heart (were) made manifest, and so he 'fell' down on his face and worshipped God, declaring that God was among (them) indeed."

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It was this vital spiritual Christianity, this religion of the heart, that had more to do in making Canada what it is to-day, than all other causes put together. It was it that laid the foundation of all that is purest and best in our civilization, which we believe, taking it all in all, to be the best in the world. Those primitive evangelists, of which we speak, had no thought of revolutionizing society, and yet, by the blessing of Gid, they did it. They believed that the people to whom they preached, and among whom they lived had souls; that these souls were destined to exist forever, either in bliss ineffable or in misery inconceivable, and that which of these was to be its destiny was to be determined here and now by the reception or the rejection of Christ. And believing this, they concentrated all their energy upon the salvation of souls. But in the promotion of the purely spiritual interests of men they contributed most effectually toward their physical, intellectual, and social well-being. The same grace that sanctified the individual man sanctified all his relations. Into whatsoever fountain this salt was put, the waters were cleansed; and thus all the springs of life were made pure. Each individual convert was a lamp lighted and put upon the lamp-stand, and became the means of giving light to the whole dwelling; and the little society was as a city set upon a hill that could not be hid.

Now, brethren, what this religion has done in the past it is capable of doing again; and if, with its imperfect organization, and its defective machinery, it did so much in those by-gone days, what may we not expect from it, working with such complete organization and perfected machinery as we have to-day? What, for example, may we not hope for from the Epworth League, and from our other admirable young people's societies, if each of the members of these organizations is the subject of a sound scriptural conversion, and has a definite, blessed, and triumphant religious experience, and if they all have their energies concentrated upon bringing all the young people within their reach to the possession of a like precious faith with themselves. Considerable importance, no doubt, attaches to the social work to which so much of the energies of Christian people are directed at present, and far be it from us to say one word in depreciation of it; but in comparison with the purely spiritual work of the Church, it is but as the chaff to the wheat. We hear a great deal said in our day, of the salvation of men in contradistinction from the salvation of souls; and sometimes this distinction is spoken of in such a way as to imply the exaltation of the former at the expense of the latter; but the salvation of the soul is the soul of salvation. And any means that may be devised for the permanent elevation of the individual man, or for the radical cure of the ills of society, call it by whatever name we may, whether reformation or salvation, that does not take its beginning at this point is sure to prove a delusion and a snare.

If, then, we are to see the history of early Methodism, or of all that was most characteristic and divine in it repeated, and that, too, on a scale commensurate with the present greatness of our Church, the perfection of its organization and the completeness of its machinery, and with the wants of the country and of the world, we must obey the prophetic exhortation addressed to Israel five and twenty centuries ago; we must 'stand in the way and see; inquire for the old paths, where is the good way, and walk in it." More concentrated attention must be given to the soul, and to all that pertains to its salvation. The supernatural, the

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divine, element in our holy religion must be made more prominent. The work of the Holy Spirit in the process of conversion must be more distinctly recognized. The new birth, as the beginning of a truly religious and Christian life, must be more strenuously insisted on than ever before. Important at all times, this is superlatively important at present. Whatever may be said of the beneficent characteristics and peculiar advantages of the age in which we live, the fact must not be overlooked or forgotten that it has its evil and dangerous tendencies, and the most effectual defence against these is not so much intellectual as spiritual.

The progress of materialistic science has brought with it its perils. And though we have already witnessed the dawning of a brighter day, the rationalistic spirit is still abroad. Men have been able to account for so much that is taking place in the world, by what are called the laws and forces of nature, that the very existence of the supernatural, the divine, in terrestrial affairs, is quietly ignored, if it is not positively denied. There is danger of God being shut out from the affairs of the world, so far as the thoughts of men are concerned. And this evil spirit of the time is even making itself felt in what the Church has held from the beginning to be, in a peculiar sense, the sphere of the supernatural, the sphere of spiritual, or what we, as Methodists, have been accustomed to call it, of experimental religion. A mere change of purpose is too often taken as the equivalent of a change of heart; and mere reformation is dignified with the name of conversion.

Brethren, it was not so in the days of our fathers. They entered the kingdom of God by the straight gate of repentance toward God, and faith toward the Lord Jesus Christ, issuing, not only in a change in the soul's relation to God, but also in a change of nature. They clung with the most dogged tenacity to the doctrine that without regeneration no man can see the kingdom of God. In other words, they held that in order to enter that gracious state, it is indispensable to be "born of the Spirit," born from above," "born again, not of corruptible seed but of incorruptible, by the word of God that liveth and abideth forever." They not only held theoretically, or, as a matter of speculative or dogmatic belief, but they demonstrated by their lives and conversation that, "If any man be in Christ he is a new creature; old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new."

Brethren, the longer we have lingered about the cross, and the closer the sympathy into which we have come with the illustrious sufferer who gave himself as an offering and sacrifice for our sins, the more profoundly we have meditated upon the nature and destiny of the human soul, and the more vividly we have endeavored to realize to ourselves the myriad forms of evil which are conspiring for its ruin, the more imperatively do we feel ourselves to be called upon to preach these truths with all possible fidelity and earnestness; and what it is our duty to preach, we need scarcely remind you it is your duty not only to hear, but to ponder and to lay to heart. It is only by the combined effort of the pulpit and the pew, that that mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit is to be secured, which is the grand desideratum of the Church and of the world. baptism of the Spirit is as much needed to-day as it was on the day of Pentecost; and, blessed be God, it is just as certainly for us, if we will but wait for it aright, as it was for the hundred and twenty in the upper room at Jerusalem.
