in United States. Reciprocity with the United States in he matter of gold coinage is the latest outcome of negotiations between Ottawa and Washington. Five and ten dollar gold pieces are to be coined at the Ottawa branch of the Royal Mint, of the same weight and fineness as the five and ten dollar gold coins issued by

the United States. At present American gold coins are legal tender in Canada, and must be accepted in payment of public and private debts. While there is no coresponding provision in the American statute it is understood that an exccutive order will be issued requiring all sub-treasuries, national banks and other fiscal agencies of the United States government to receive the new Canadian coins at par.
