

Secretary, it will be seen that our Order is still flourishing. The returns for New Brunswick shows an increase of 1,500 over last year; the total membership being at the present time 13,000. From Nova Scotia the number estimated is about 12,000; from Ontario, 2,300; from P. E. Island, the returns show a total of 2,000; Newfoundland, 290; Bermuda, 52; Quebec, one Lodge, 35; and New Zealand, 30; number of members in Juvenile Lodges, 1,900. It will be a source of gratification to the members of this M. W. G. Lodge to know that union and harmony exist among the brethren in New Brunswick. Men of talent and good standing in society seem to think themselves proof against its allurements; but, alas! how often do we find them tempted beyond what they are able to bear. WOODSTOCK, August 1870.

On motion, the Report was referred to Bros. Todd, Falconer, Savage, and D. C. Fraser, as a Committee to report thereon.

Report of M. W. G. Secretary was then read, as follows:

Most Worthy Grand Chief, Officers, and Members—Another year has passed away since last we met. Those who were present at that Session will recollect that the year, now ended, was commenced with some misgivings and apprehensions. I must confess that I accepted office with a feeling of great re-

prehensions. I must confess that I accepted of the sponsibility.

No M. W. G. Lodge Report had either been prepared or published for the year 1868; and no accounts or papers were handed us, by which we could really ascertain our position or standing for the year 1869, or how the different Provinces and Colonies stood financially with this M. W. G. Lodge. I found matters, on a close inspection, worse than the most desponding had anticipated. The M. W. G. Lodge had no stock in its possession, or at least the M. W. G. Secretary had neglected to send any to Provinces that were actually destitute, or to his successor in office. I found that not even the Passwords had been sent to some Provinces for term after term, and I was without information as to whom I should send them.

I have never yet received, from my predecessor in office, the books and accounts by which alone I can ascertain the indebtedness of, or the amounts due to, this M. W. G. Lodge.

I make no comment whatever on such an unsound state of affairs, and am grieved to have to give you this information; but it is due to you. Sisters and Brothers, to myself, and all concerned, that it be here given openly.

You will see by these statements that it will be impossible for me to give you any statement of the position of this M. W. G. Lodge in its accounts with the different W. G. Lodges or M. W. G. D. C. Templars, as I have never had the

books or papers necessary to ascertain what balances were due, at the commencement of my official year. I should suppose, however, that there must be large amounts due this M. W. G. Lodge previous to April, 1869, but in whose

hands I am unable to say

My accounts with some of the Provinces, so far as their indebtedness to this
Lodge is concerned for capitation tax, is founded on the most accurate information I can obtain, but not in all cases on actual Returns.

M. W. G. LODGE REPORT, 1868.

This Report should have been published by my predecessor. On my accepting office, I was requested to attend to it, and have since been blamed for not doing so. I will simply state that, until last week, I have never been able to get any of the Minutes of the Session of 1868, held at Toronto; that as yet I have none of the Accounts, &c., and what I have, is in such a condition that I am doubtful if it will be possible to publish a reliable report from them. I will, however, do all that I can with the papers in my possession.

CHARTERS.

In accordance with resolutions of M. W. G. Lodge (see Report of M. W. G. Lodge for 1869, pp. 15), I commenced, without an hour's delay, the work of gathering in the illegal Charters that had been issued in Nova Scotia, and in providing for the issue of legal ones in their place. After many vexatious delays and disappointments in the matter, legal Charters were at length distributed; and I am happy to be able to state, tended materially to allay the feelings of dissatisfaction and indignation that were largely prevalent throughout the Primary Lodges in Nova Scotia, against the "higher grades of Lodges." This matter entailed an expense of nearly Two Hundred Dollars on funds of M. W. Grand Lodge. It trust that a like expense, under similar circumstances, may never again occur. may never again occur.

I found several of the Provinces actually out of stook. During the year I have endeavoured, as far as possible, to have all orders promptly filled. A large quantity has been applied for, and there is considerable on hand.

STATE OF THE ORDER.

During the year great progress has been made in nearly every Province and Colony where our organization has been established. The membership, as nearly as I can ascertain, is 29,657, which would be an increase of 8,029 over last

I believe that, at the present time, the entire Order of British Templars is in a peaceful and prosperous condition.

FINANCES.

At the commencement of the year, there was a considerable number of debts to pay, but no funds to meet them. I am glad to be able to inform you, that, some of our old debts, all the stock printed during the year, and the current expenses for the same period, amounting to \$666.01\$, have been paid; and that there is now in hands of your Secretary, \$305.66\$.

I should here remark that the accounts of M. W. G. Lodge, are made up for capitation tax, from April, 1869, to April, 1870; for stock, from September, 1869, to September, 1870.

As I before remarked, owing to my never having had possession of any accounts or books by which I could learn the condition of affairs between this M. W. G. Lodge, and subordinate Grand Lodges; M. W. G. Deputy C. Templars, or even its own former officers, I have not charged any balances in my books or accounts previous to April, 1869, though I feel certain there must be a large amount due this M. W. G. Lodge. Even in the accounts for this year, I have been compelled, in a few instances, to assume the amounts due for capita tax, but I feel quite certain that that amount is not over-estimated.

The reason why I have not done this is, that I have not had any books &c., by which I could ascertain what amounts really ought to be paid on account of this M. W. G. Lodge.

I may also state that I have made every exertion, to be as economical of the funds of this M. W. G. Lodge, as possible. M. W. G. Secretary, in account with M. W. G. Lodge, will be in Appendix.

CORRESPONDENCE.

During the past year, 256 letters have been received at this office, and I have written 298 I have also had to mail some 1000 Reports, and about 600 Circulars. The Circulars were distributed chiefly in Nova Scotia, and referred, principally, to the "Charter Question," &c.

PROGRESS.

This has already been partly given under "State of the Order," in which I stated the increase for the year, to be about 8029 in Primary, and 500 in Juvenile Lodges.

Your committee believing the proverb, "as the twig is bent the tree is inclined," and also the one oft quoted, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it," earnestly recommend more persevering efforts to be put forth by Primary Lodges for the extension of this important branch of our Order; believing that if the evils of intemperance were taught them, and the claims of total abstinence inculcated, and instilled into their winds more road would result in the future, than by the movement were taught them, and the claims of total abstance incurated, and instituct into their minds, more good would result in the future, than by the movement among the adult classes of the community. If all the young were forcibly impressed with the moral, intellectual, and physical advantage to be derived from total abstinence, in contradistinction to the immorality, mental imbedility, and physical evil consequent upon the use of alcohol, we believe that, they having physical evil consequent upon the use of alcohol, we believe that, they having no desire for it, never using it; and it being certain there never would have been a drunkard had there never been a moderate drinker, hereby much good would be accomplished. We would also suggest the propriety of inculcating Temperance principles in Sabbath Schools, and by ministers of the gospel.

Committee on Appeals presented their Report as follows: Most Worthy Grand Chief :-

We your Committee on Appeals beg leave to make the following Report, having examined the different papers laid before us :-

(1) T. Bleakney vs. Grand Lodge of N. B.—Bro. Bleakney not performing the duties of his office to the satisfaction of the Lodge, a successor to him was appointed by said Lodge, but the Executive refused to commission him. The matter was brought before the W. G. Lodge, and decided in favour of Brother Bleakney, retaining him in office until constitutionally removed.

We are of opinion that the W. G. Lodge should be sustained.

(2) Bro. Yerxa vs. G. L. of N. B.—Bro. Yerxa was expelled by Lodge No. 233, for violation of Art. 3rd; for using profane and objectionable language in open Lodge, and for neglect of duties as P. D. He appealed to the County Lodge, and from that to the W. G. Lodge. They sustained the Primary Lodge. We are of opinion that the decision of W. G. Lodge should be sustained, and the appeal dismissed.

(3) Bro. C. S. Connolly vs. W. G. Lodge, N. B.—Bro. Samuel Keys joined No. 224 while a member of No. 153. He was afterwards expelled from No. 153 for non-payment of dues. While visiting said Lodge (No. 153) he was requested to to leave the Hall, but was allowed to remain by vote of the Lodge. Bro. Connolly appealed from decision of Primary Lodge to the County Lodge, and thence to the W. G. Lodge. The decision of the Primary Lodge was sustained.

We recommend that the decision of W. G. Lodge be sustained.

(4) Primary Lodge No. 249 vs. W. G. Lodge, N. R.—Bro. George Goldropt made a written application for withdrawal from No. 249. Bro. DeBlois objected to the granting thereof, inasmuch as he had a charge to prefer against the Brother on the next night of meeting. The W. C. T. received the objection, and the Lodge sustained him. He appealed to W. G. Lodge, and the decision of the Primary Lodge was reversed.

We are of opinion that the W. G. Lodge be sustained.

(5) Bro. O. Smith appealed from the decision of Sunbury County Lodge. Lodge No. 170 decided to allow persons who had withdrawn from the Order, and were in possession of the Degrees, on becoming members of the Lodge again, to retain all Degrees previously obtained, free of charges, on being reobligated. The W. G. Lodge reversed the decision of Sunbury Co. Lodge. We recommend that the action of W. G. Lodge be sustained.

(6) Appeal of W. S. Smith from decision of Scabury Co. Lodge was not decided by W. G. Lodge, inasmuch as the documents relating to the case were iusufficient.

Your Committee cannot recommend any decision, as the proper papers are not before them.

(7) Bro. John S. McGee, of No. 192, vs. W. G. L. of N. B.—Bro. A. D. Stevenson was nominated as a W. G. Lodge representative from 192, in his absence, contrary to the Bye-Laws of said Lodge. On the fact being made known, his name was dropped and another appointed. The said Bro. A. D. Stevenson obtained credentials from the W. C. T. and Sec. of his Lodge, and attended the W. G. Lodge The W. G. Lodge received him, and ruled that he was entitled to a seat therein.

We recommend that the decision of W. G. Lodge be reversed and the appeal sustained. The documents laid before us clearly show that he was not the representative of the Lodge, and that his credentials were signed without the

solicitation of the Lodge.

(8) Rev. S. C. Moore vs. W. G. Lodge of N. B.—Certain resolutions submitted to the W. G. Lodge of N. B. were, after some discussion, (on motion, duly seconded) handed over to a Special Committee to report thereon. Bro. Moore appeals from the action of W. G. Lodge, on the ground that the Lodge had no power to submit a resolution to a Committee.

Your Committee recommend that the action of W. G. Lodge be sustained.

In a community where the public sentiment permits the habitual use and sale of alcohol, the true friends of mankind look to the young, sittle uncontaminated, as the future warriors for truth and right. But in the young, interest must be awakened before conviction, and interest in our Primary Lodges is the main spring of our whole organization. Let it be our first object then, to use every means of interest, amusement, and education, to secure the adhesion of our present members and the admiration of the community. The Lodge room should never be closed, except on the Sabbath. Its papers and books, its lectures, singing-schools, lyceums, readings, gymnasiums, &c., should afford its members no pretext for idle time and dangerous companionship; and, at the same time, render loss of membership no trifling punishment to the transgressor. Until we take such means in hand, loss of standing or membership has no terror to the young and thoughtless, while the luke-warm will grow cold and careless of their duties. We, therefore, urge this matter on your most serious consideration. The noble river, by whose banks you gather, flows through fertile lands to the sea, whose changing tides by turns lash the rock-bound shores of New Brunswick, the ledges of Nova Scotia, and the yellow dunes and sand-stone cliffs of our Island home. But from sea and river God's sun gathers the rain-clouds, and the winds waft them, scattering life, wealth, and beauty over many lands; nor are we the poorer, though others receive the rain gathered around

No. 1 is from a Committee of "Avalon" Lodge, Newfoundland, setting forth several matters of which it complains, stating that Correspondence, Passwords, &c., from this M. W. G. Lodge, have been unnecessarily delayed, and asking that a reduction of the copitation tax be made in their case, until they are under proper Templar government: and that authority be given to some suitable brother, whom they may recommend, to act as M. Your Committee learn with pleasure that in the W. G. Lodge of New Brunswick, decisive and practical action was taken on this important subject, and that a standing Committee of seven was appointed at the Session of July, 1870, to act in behalf of that Province in carrying out this object.

Your Committee recommend that a special Committee of twelve be appointed by this M. W. G. Lodge—seven of whom shall be chosen from the Nova Scotia Representatives, and five from those of P. E. Island, now present, or of good standing in those Provinces, who shall act in concert with the Committee already appointed by the W. G. Lodge of New Brunswick, in effecting the early formation of a "Union Temperance Convention" for the Maritime Provinces.

Being \$1,603.96 charged against Primary Lodges for capitation and stock; \$972.73 credited to them as paid, and leaving amount due of \$831.58. The M. W. G. Secretary has charged the M. W. G. Treasurer with payments amounting to \$180.71, and credited that Officer with a like sum.

Your Committee find that the Capitation Account, commenced April, 1869, and closed April, 1870; while the Stock Account commenced Septembert 1st, 1869, and closed August 25th, 1870—leaving the amount of capitation tax due for five months, by the W. G. Lodges within your jurisdiction, as yet unaccounted for.

The M. W. G. Secretary, has in his charges against the several Provinces, necessarily assumed certain amounts due upon data of former returns; and your Committee hold the opinion, that legally each W. G. Lodge should be held accountable for the whole per capita tax of the membership returned by the Lodges under their several jurisdictions.

The M. W. G. Financier has submitted a Report based upon the accounts of the M. W. G. Secretary, which agree in substance with the items therein recorded.

The accounts of the M. W. G. Treasurer, snow amount received from the Secretary, \$180.71; from Ontario, per P. H. Stewart, \$176.00; in all, \$356.71. In his Report, this Officer stated, that his receipts from the M. W. G. Secretary, were \$346.71; so that there is an apparent discrepancy between his account and that of the Secretary; but in his account there is an item, as stated, of \$176.00, received from Ontario, which, taking into consideration an error of \$10.00 in the addition of his account on each side, accounts for the difference.

Your Committee recommend for adoption, the suggestion of the M. W. G. Treasurer—That proper blank orders, receipts, &c., be obtained for the use of the Officers.

Your Committee beg to state, that as the Financial operations of this body, involve not only a large amount of money, but also extended accounts, minutes in detail, &c., a perfect system of keeping the accounts, and a thorough and complete audit of the same, are absolutely necessary. There is not time during the short interval occurring during the Session of this M. W. G. Lodge for such an audit, which, in justice to the Subordinate Lodges and individual members who contribute to its total, should embrace a careful scrutiny and comparison of all the vouchers, data, and details of the receipts and disbursements.

Your Committee would respectfully recommend, that there should be a Standing Committee of Finance and Audit appointed; that such Committees should meet annually—a sufficient number of days previous to the general meeting—to audit the Accounts; and that some practical means should at once be adopted to ensure such returns from the W. G. Lodges, as will enable the Financial Officers of this M. W. G. Lodge to close their accounts and submit them to the Committee within the period named.

Your Committee would likewise suggest, that either a Finance and Audit Committee now appointed on the recommendation above, or a Special Committee appointed for the purpose, be charged with the duty of considering the propriety of adopting some simple and uniform system of keeping the accounts of the Lodge, and of obtaining the necessary books, papers, forms, &c., for that purpose.

Meantime we suggest, that the M. W. G. Secretary be instructed to import a sufficient number of copies to supply each W. G. S. with what he may require, in order that it may be used by our Lodges as soon as possible. beg leave to report:

ARTICLE 11TH.—County Lodge Constitution. Amended by having the words, "and Juvenile," struck out in fourth and seventh lines, and the fellowing added to the Article—"County Lodges shall have power to exact dues from Juvenile Lodges, if they think proper to impose them."

ARTICLE 14TH.—County Lodge Constitution. Amended by striking out "none but" in the second line, and adding after "meetings" in last line—
"And shall enroll their name as required by the higher grades of Lodges."

"And shall enroll their name as required by the higher grades of Lodges."

Article 15th.—County Lodge Constitution. Amended by inserting after word "Lodge," in second line, from top of page 28th—"Provided always that upon the application of seven or more members of an extinct Lodge to the County Lodge, for the restoration of such Lodge to fellowship, accompanied with satisfactory evidence that a fair opportunity has been given to all that were members in good standing at the time the Lodge ceased working, to unite in such application, they may be restored to fellowship in said Lodge, together with the Charter and effects of said Lodge, taken possession of by the County Lodge;" and also after word "Ritual," in third line of the Article insert "books, funds, &c.," and after "Lodge," in first line, insert "is suspended."

*ARTICLE 4TH.—County Lodge Constitution. Amended by inserting after word "County," in seventh line—"Who have taken the first Degree."

ARTICLE 5TR, SECTION 1st.—Primary Lodge Constitution. Amended by inserting after "declared," in twelfth line—"Rut no member shall mention a person proposed for membership, to any one, except a member of the Lodge, until after the decision has been given, and not even then, if the candidate has been rejected."

ARTICLE 5TH, SECTION SED.—Primary Lodge Constitution. Amended by inserting after "him," in last line—"A member suspended for non-payment of dues, may be reinstated by paying the dues standing against him at the time of his suspension."

ARTICLE 5TH, SECTION 7TH.—Primary Lodge Constitution. Amended by adding after "admitted," in last line—"And applicants for a Charter who do not appear within three months after the organization of the Lodge, shall be subject to the same regulations as new candidates."

ARTICLE 6TH, SECTION 5TH.—Primary Lodge Constitution. Amended by striking out "absenting himself or," in first line, and inserting after "installation," in second line—at the time provided for in Section 4, of this Article, or "absenting himself," and striking out "after one week's notice" in fourth line.

ARTICLE STH, SECTION SRD.—Primary Lodge Constitution. Amended by striking out "the Provincial Deputy shall," fourth line, and inserting in its place, "Any Degree member may"; and inserting after "names," fifth line, "with the receipts."

ARTICLE STH, SECTION 18r.—Primary Lodge Constitution. After words "Sixteen years of age," insert "and upwards;" also after "when eighteen," insert "and upwards."

ARTICLE 167H, SECTION 47H.—Primary Lodge Constitution. Place at the commencement of the Section, these words:—"Any member against whom a charge of violation of obligation has been brought in open Lodge, shall be notified thereof by the Secretary; and, if after a receipt of such notice, the accused member, within seven days, shall not appear at the Lodge and plead to the charge, or demand an investigation thereof." Then read on from "The charges &c.," to end of the Section.

The June Session of County Lodges is to be considered the Annual Session; and all Sections opposed to this are to be made in conformity.

Lodge, be appointed, whose duty it shall be to consider, and report, such changes as they may deem expedient, in the Rituals, Odes, and Ceremonies of our Order, at the next Annual Session of this Body.

Bros. S. Watts, Savage, Porter, and C. W. Hall, were appointed as standing Committee for the above-named purpose.
