

STRATHCONA AND KING EDWARD HORSE AND **ROYAL CANADIAN DRAGOONS LEAVE FOR FRANCE**

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, May 5.—Word was received here that the Strathcona Horse, the Royal Ganadian Dragoons and the King Edward Horse have crossed over to France under the command of Brigadier General Seely and will form a fourth brigade for the Canadian Infantry. The men in those cav-alry units were most easer to join the Infantry in the trenches and their method is everywhere most highly commended. General Seelys com-ment includes about 1,800 men, 600 in each unit. The Strathcom Horse tommanded by Col. A. C. MacDonnell and came from the West. Tajor D. S. MacKie is second in command. The, Royal Canadian Dragoons are from Toronto and St. John's and are under Col.Nelles, with major James Emsley second in command. Both these corps belonged to the permanent force. Ottawa, May 7.—That the heaviest and saddest part of Canada's toll in the great battles around Ypres is yet to be told in the casualty lists being issued from the Militia Department is officially stated. Since the names of the Canadians who suffered in the engagements have been coming through from the Record Office in London, the main casualties announced, aside, of course, from those of the officers, have been wounded, although a few names of the men killed in action and missing have been issued. It is expected here that the Record Office will complete the lists of wounded shortly, and that the killed in action and mission, will be

of wounded shortly, and that the killed in action and missing will be-gin to come through in greater numbers. Great care is being taken in compiling the lists of killed in action and missing, and no names will be sent out until absolute certainty exists of the accuracy of the information received from France.

In fighting such as is going on in France it is some times difficult to speedily obtain the names of the killed, owing to the trenches of the belligerents being so close together and the danger of attempting sorties to bring in bodies. The list comprises

Japan's Terms Must **Be** Accepted Before Sunday Night at 6 P.M.

Tokio Despatch Says Ultimatum Has Been Sent to China-Further Concessions Which Latter is Willing to Make Not Acceptable to Japan.

Tokie, May 6, 4.30 p. m.—Official announcement was made here this afternoon that Japan had sent an ultimatum to China. It is understood that the Japanese ultimatum demands acceptance by China of the Jap-anese demands within a time limit, which expires at 6 p. m. on Sunday, May 9.

The Kokumin Shimbun states that in its ultimate lates that China must accept unconditionally the Japanese demands. The newspaper says, in an extra edition, that this was decided upon by the Imperial Council.

MIKADI SANCTIONS IT.





AUSTRO-GERMAN ARMY OF QUARTER OF MILLION FAILS IN ATTEN BREAK THE RUSSIAN LINE

Most Cruel Fighting Of The War in East In **Progress Near Cracow**

Report From Vienna Admits Heavy Loss in Attempts to Break Through Russian Centre at Gorlice -- Teutonic Armies Forced to Retreat -- Hurled Army of Quarter Million Men Against Line.

Geneva, May 6.—The Tribune De Geneve has received a despatch from Vienna, saying that the desperate effort of an Austro-German army of 250,000 men to break through the Russian centre at Gorilce has failed. The losses have been heavy, and the Austro-German forces were compelled to retreat to the west of Neu Sandeo. German troops continue to arrive at Cracow, and the fighting near there is said to be the most cruel of the war. The Vienna telegram relates also that an Austrian army corps, un-der Archduke Eugene, arrived yesterday at Noravitza, ten miles from the Serbian front.
