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RECIPROcity HAS BIG MAJORITY IN TEST VOTE

Root Amendment Bowled Out in the
Senate After Short Debate
Opponents Didn't Ask for a Roll Call—Senator Penrose, in Charge of Bill, Now Confident That It Will Pass and That Congress Will Adjourn by August 1—Wool and Free List Bills Likely to be Disposed of, Too

Washington, June 26.—The Canadian reciprocity bill emerged from its first ordeal in the senate tonight unscathed. The Root amendment, proposing a modification of the wool and free list paper section of the agreement, was defeated after seven hours of debate, by an overwhelming vote. Senator LaFollette announced in a speech, opposing the Root amendment, that he would give to the senate a chance to pass on general tariff amendments for free paper, free lumber and lumber products, and for reductions in many other schedules.

Pearson is prominent socially. His father, General A. J. Pearson, was at one time commander of the troops of the state. Both men were held in default of \$15,000 bail each.

Port Arthur, Tex., June 26.—An explosion which occurred aboard the oil barge "Gulf" in the harbor here today caused the death of one man and the destruction by fire of property valued at \$200,000. The explosion was felt for many miles.

LIVERPOOL DOCK WORKERS JOIN SEAMEN'S STRIKE

London, June 26.—Another shipping strike was launched today. The union workers on the docks at Liverpool generally, obeyed the order to strike against the forty-six firms in the shipping federation. The shipping interest in Hull, Goole, Grangemouth and Clyde found themselves in a similar plight, the union men refusing to handle goods from federation ships. Negotiations between employers and employees have ceased for the time being at least.

DARTMOUTH HOTEL GUTTED BY FIRE

Halifax, June 26.—(Special)—Fire tonight partially destroyed the Handley House, a hotel in Dartmouth across the harbor from Halifax. Most of the damage was from water. The insurance amount to \$25,000 in the Acadia and Halifax companies.

Big Balloon Burned.

Hannover, N. B., June 26.—The dirigible balloon "Parade V," while undergoing repairs today caught fire and was destroyed. No one was injured. The "Parade V" recently had been making passenger trips out of Berlin. On April 2 last, the airship made a perilous descent at Halberstadt, during a storm. The crew were compelled to rip the envelope and make a rough landing.
