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# FIRST DAY.

#### TOWN HALL, BRACEBRIDGE,

#### Максн 14th, 1900.

The Right Worshipful the Provincial Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West was convened this day in its fortyfirst annual session.

Right Worshipful Companion D. M. Jermyn, Grand Master, took the chair at the hour of three o'clock in the afternoon, Right Worshipful Companion John McMillan, Deputy Grand Master, in the Deputy chair.

The R.W. the Grand Master appointed Companion W. J. Whaley Inside Herald, and Companion James Clarke Outside Herald.

The Companions present were then tested in the Royal Scarlet Order by R.W. Companion S. Caswell, Grand Director of Ceremonies, and W. Companions W.m. Cook, County Master, North Grey; W.m. White, Past County Master, South Perth, and F. H. Haldenby, County Master, West Bruce,

The R.W. the Deputy Grand Master having reported all present to be members in good standing in the Royal Scarlet Order, the R.W. the Deputy Grand Chaplain, Companion Rév. William Walsh, read the opening prayer and a portion of Scripture, after which the R.W. the Grand Master declared the Grand Chapter open for the transaction of business.

The Grand Secretary laid on the table the printed minutes of the session of 1899 and the correspondence coming through his office for the year.

Moved by R. W. Companion W. J. Parkhill, P.G.M., seconded by R.W. Companion Wm. Nicholson, P.G.M., and

(1) Resolved,—That the minutes of the last Annual Meeting, in printed form, now presented, be considered as read and confirmed by this Grand Chapter.

#### COMMITTEE TO STRIKE STANDING COMMITTEES.

Moved by R. W. Companion W. J. Parkhill, P.G.M., seconded by R.W. Companion W. M. Lockhart, P.G.M., and

(2) Resolved, -- That the R.W. the Grand Master appoint the Committee to strike the Standing Committees.

The R.W. the Grand Master then appointed the following as such. Committee, viz.: R.W. Companions John McMillan, D.G.M.; W. M. Lockhart, P.G.M., and W. Companions Marshall Thompson, C.M., Essex; James A. Hutton, C.M., Wentworth, and John Scarlett, C.M., South Huron.

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#### ROYAL SCARLET LECTURE.

R.W. Companion R. H. Watson, G.L., and W. Companion Thomas Haw, D.D.M., West Toronto, repeated the Lecture of the Royal Scarlet Degree.

A petition was read from the Royal Scarlet Chapter of West Toronto, praying that direct representation be granted to Royal Scarlet Chapters in the same manner and to the same extent as is at present enjoyed by the Primary Lodges; and that there be added to the ritual a form for the installation of officers in Scarlet Chapters.

Moved by R.W. Companion William Nicholson, P.G.M., seconded by R.W. Companion W. J. Parkhill, P.G.M., and

(3) Resolved,—That the petition from the Royal Scarlet Chapter of West Toronto be received and referred to the Committee on Petitions and Appeals.

#### REDUCED TO ORANGE DEGREE.

Moved by W. Companion William Young, C.M., South Muskoka, seconded by W. Companion W. J. McCausland, Proxy 585, Toronto, and

(4) Resolved,-That this Grand Chapter be now reduced to the Orange Degree.

The R.W. the Grand Master then declared the Grand Chapter reduced accordingly, and the Tylers were so instructed.

#### GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

The R.W. Grand Master then delivered his Annual Address as follows :

#### To the Right Worshipful Orange Grand Lodge of Ontario West :

DEAR BRETIREN, —After another year I am delighted to again meet you and welcome you to the beautiful town of Bracebridge, situate in a comparatively newly-formed district of our fair Province. Let us hope for a pleasant and beneficial Grand Lodge meeting, such as has been our experience in past years.

I have been highly pleased with the work of my office during the past year. My relationship with the different Grand Lodge officers has been most cordial, and we have with great pleasure marked the steady progress our Order is making. I am sure it was a great delight to every Orangeman in our jurisdiction to witness the magnificent celebrations held on the Twelfth of July last. Year by year the enthusiasm seems to be growing not only with the brethren but with the best people of the land, which is a clear proof to me that as our aims and objects are more clearly understood the more widely will our influence extend.

The correspondence of my office increased materially during the past year. Many of the brethron throughout the jurisdiction have consulted me in reference to constitutional questions and matters affecting the welfare of the Association. I have granted a large number of dispensations for conferring the Purple and Blue Degrees without awaiting the probationary period. I am still of the opinion that a reforming of those Degrees might be beenficial to the working of the Order, and I am in hopes that this matter will be dealt with at the meeting of the Imperial Grand Council next July. The work of the Imperial Grand Council, as I understand it, is to create a uniformity of the work throughout the world, and the Degree work should first engage that body's attention.

#### ORGANIZATION.

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In compliance with the resolution of this Grand Lodge, passed as our last meeting, your Committee, composed of R.W. Bros. Clarke, Leet and myself, met a committee of the Orange Mutual Executive on the 15th August last, in the Grand Secretary's office in Toronto, and arranged that the Orange Mutual Executive should engage organizers to work throughout this jurisdiction, this Grand Lodge to pay for work done, as follows : For each new member brought into a Primary Lodge, 50c., and for each new lodge instituted, with not less than fifteen members, \$25.00. These sums were to be paid out by our Grand Treasurer after proper proofs from the Primary lodges and the Orange Mutual Executive. Just what the results have been I am unable to state, owing to the absence of a report from the Executive of the Orange Mutual. I may state, however, that the arrangement has not proved as satisfactory as desired, and on the 31st of January last another meeting of the joint committee was held, and a new arrangement entered into, which it is considered will result more satisfactorily. By the new arrangement W. Bro. Thos. A. Duff, W.M. of Ionic L.O.L. 1693, Toronto, was engaged at a salary of \$100.00 per month, to be borne equally by the Orange Mutual and this R.W. Grand Lodge, your Committee retaining the right to direct the work and to terminate the engagement at pleasure. I have every reason to believe that Bro. Duff will exert himself faithfully in the work, and that good results may be looked for. Should this R.W. Grand Lodge approve of the last arrangement, the work will be continued so long as your committee deem it in the interests of the Association.

#### OUR FRATERNAL DEAD.

We are again called upon to chronicle the death of a number of our brethren who have been called during the past year to meet their final reward. Notable among those who were called away was our esteemed R.W. Past Grand Master, Major Bennett. By his kind geniality he endeared himself to his brethren. His life was wrapped up in Orangeism, and his motto was:

> "Stand by your brother's side, man, And bid him clasp your hand; To him be just and yield him trust. That you from him demand. Be simply wise with soul and eyes, To trust and still be true— Doing to those we love, man, What we would have them do."

The year has been marked with peace in relation to anything sectarian, save two incidents, which I deem it my duty to refer to. The first is the presence of Monsignor Falconio, the Papal Ablegate, who, it appears, is present with us at the request of some members of the Government of Canada, if not, indeed, the Government. His presence in Canada marks the subjection of Governments and political partie to

the influence of Rome. The action of the present Dominion Government on the Manitoba School question, it appears, had to be followed by some concession to Rome, and thus the Pope was requested to send one who might in future be consulted as to all proposed legislation affecting the Roman Catholic religion. We, therefore, see introduced into Canada the thin edge of a wedge which other nations have struggled for centuries to abolish. In Italy the temporal power of the Pope had to be destroyed before the nation could become enlightened and progressive, and what was so long the bane of Italy is now being introduced into Canada. As Orangemen we hold that all creeds and individuals should stand equal before the law, and that the Parliaments of Canada should legislate for the people of this Dominion, regardless of any paricular form of religion ; that the principle of equal rights to all and pecial privileges to noise should at all times prevail.

The second incident which I wish to notice is the downfall of the Greenway Government in the Province of Manitoba. Different phases of the cause which led to the overthrow of Mr. Greenway have been set forth, but it must be evident to every well-informed person that the action of the Greenway Government on the school law had as much, if not more, to do with that defeat than any other question. That the Government of that Province should first pass a law declaring for nonsectarian Public schools, and receive the plaudits of all Protestantism for so doing, and that so soon as political capital could be made by reversing or changing the haw they did so, must in my humble judgment have disgusted every Orangeman or fair-minded man in that young Province. I am, therefore, fully pursuaded that had Mr. Greenway continued his National school system, unimpared by obnoxious amendments, he would to-day be enjoying the confidence of a majority of the people of Manitoba.

#### THE WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA.

In my address of a year ago I referred to the war between our cousins in the United States of America and Spain. The citizens of the United States living in Cuba, a colony of Spain, as well as the subjects of Spain, had been wrongfully and cruelly treated, and the Government of the United States had from time to time requested Spain to so amend her laws as to remove the grievance; but Spain lent a deaf ear to these pleadings, and the result was war. In that struggle the once mighty nation of Spain was defeated and humbled. The British Empire, recog-nizing the righteousness of the United States' cause, nobly stood by her kinsmen and insisted that no interference by other powers should take place. That the result of that war will be much to the advantage of the people of Cuba and the Philippines no one will deny. In like manner our Empire is to-day engaged in a struggle with a people who, after the most patient pleadings by the British Government, refused to grant the rights of citizenship to those living in the Transvaal ; but on the other hand levied enormous taxes on the Outlanders and used the moneys thus collected for the purpose of fortifying, purchasing arms and ammunition in order to make war upon our nation. That Great Britain has

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au. has had just and sufficient reason to defend her subjects in the Transvaal we think no well-informed, fair-minded person will doubt ; and I am pleased to witness the unanimity of British sentiment on this great undertaking --the defence of British honor and prestige. It was not Britain that declared war, but Kruger and the Boers. She is therefore acting on the defensive, and as she is the pioneer of that form of civilization which has in its conception a form of civil and religious liberty, of justice and mercy, most essential to the progress of the world, 4 am sure she justly merits the sympathy of all her subjects throughout the Empire as well as of our kinsmen of the United States, who, with a common lineage, language, literature and laws, have themselves embarked on an enlightened foreign policy. That Britain's colonies are thoroughly loyal has been fully demonstrated by their readiness to assist in the present struggle. Neither men nor money have been withheld by Her Majesty's colonial subjects in order to show their devotion to the Empire, which presents the beautiful picture of a united Anglo-Saxon brotherhood encircling the world.

> We are building ever day In a good or evil way, And the structure as it grows, Will our inmost self disclose.

Build it well, whate'er you do ; Build it straight, and strong, and true, Build it clean, and high, and broad ; Build it for the eye of God.

As Orangemen we are proud that our noble Order is one of Britain's strongest bulwarks, for every pledge we take and every principle we inculcate has for its object the unification of the glorious Empire, the spread of Christianity and true liberty, which will continue to be the birthright of every British subject. Let us pray for a speedy termination of the conflict, but may that termination only come with victory to the people who are right, and who are pledgod but to truth, to liberty and to law, whom no favor sways and no fear can awe. May it be that the words of the Bard of Avon shall ever prove true :

What stronger breastplate than a heart sustained ;

Thrice armed is he that hath his quarrel just ;

And he but naked, though locked up in steel, Whose conscience with injustice is corrupt."

The loyalty of the colonies to the Mother Land has been received with great satisfaction by Her Gracious Majesty and the Imperial ( ernment. I am pleased that Canada sent her contingents. Altho the Government hesitated, and would have placed us in an undesirable light before our kinsmen and the world, yet the warmth of British loyalty which has always been so strong in our Canadian hearts, bursting forth with unquenching sounds, forced those who would be disloyal to resign to the will of Her Majesty's loyal subjects.

That there are many Orangemen among the contingents gone from our Dominion is needless for me to mention. For Orangemen are always ready if need be to offer their lives in defonding the honor and glory of the Empire. All honor to those sons of Canada who have gone to South Africa 1 All honor to the fathers and mothers and wives who have permitted their loved ones to depart from them 1 To those of our land who have lost a loved one we extend our deepest sympathy, and our prayer is that the Great Builder of nations may be their Solace and Comfort ; and while there must necessarily be loss of life where danger is so great, yet we have to rejoice at the brilliant conduct of our Canadian soldiers in forcing the surrender of General Cronje, and in every other engagement in which they took part. Great has been the glory brough home to us by their heroic deeds, and Canada to-day occupies in the British Empire

In no part of the British Empire was the news of the relief of Ladysmith received with greater warmth and enthusiasm than in Canada. Every village, town and eity throughout our vast Dominion fittingly celebrated the climax of General Buller's mighty effortto relieve our brethren from the dire position which they had so long occupied.

While we rejoice at the loyalty of the great majority of our people to our Queen and nation, we cannot but realize that there are in our land those calling themselves British subjects who are thoroughly disloyal and who wish for the destruction of Hor Majesty's Empire. Let us be thankful these are but a small minority to whom we can properly apply the words of Sir Walter Scott:

> "Living to forfeit fair renown; And, doubly dying, shall go down To the vile dust from which he sprang Unwept, unhonored, and unsung."

I am pleased at the generous contributions of our Canadian citizens to the Patriotic Fund, and feel sure the Orange Brotherhood are doing, their share in promoting this laudable object—the future comfort of those who may suffer the loss of a dear one on the far off fields of .dark South Africa.

#### THE SENTINEL.

I should be sorry to close my address without referring to the good work of The Sentinel, the organ of the Orangemen of Canada. I trust the brethren will increase their support of the journal which so justly merits our assistance.

In conclusion, brethren, let me again wish for a pleasant and harmonious meeting, such as will reflect credit upon us and be beneficial to our glorious Association. May our every word and act be tempered with prudence and brotherly love, for without these virtues our Association cannot attain the high standard which its founders intended.

#### GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The R.W. Grand Secretary presented his Annual Report as follows :

To the R.W. Grand Master and Members of the Provincial Orange Grand Lodge of Outario West:

BRETHREN, -It is with feelings of pleasure that I again meet you in Grand Lodge assembled.

We meet to-day in the prosperous town of Bracebridge—the County Town of the County of Muskoka, so well and favorably known for its beautiful lakes and picturesque scenery—and I have no doubt whatever that our assembling here on this occasion will have a marked effect in building up the Association, not only in this prosperous town but in the surrounding counties.

In reviewing the events of the past year I think we have cause for much thankfulness. Divine Providence has blessed us with a bountiful harvest; and it is to be hoped that the return of prosperity to our country will be the means of augmenting the ranks of our Order, by bringing back some of our brethren who, from financial embarrassments, have not been able to pay their just dues and demands.

The annual County and District Lodge meetings have been largely attended, and the increased interest taken in the work, and the enthusisam manifested, show that love for the Opange Order still exists in the hearts of the Protestants of this great Province. This is very encouraging and should lead to greater endeavors for the advancement of our Order.

I shall only occupy your attention for a short time, detailing as briefly as possible that which refers to the affairs of my office.

I have great pleasure in reporting the opening of eight new Primary Lodges, and the reorganization of two dormant Lodges, an increase of five over last year. Also, that application has been received for the formation of a new District Lodge in East Algoma, to be known as the District of Bruce Mines. A petition will be submitted for your approval for the formation of a new County Lodge, embracing all the isolated lodges in the District of Thunday Bay.

#### The Warrants issued have been as follows :

No. 164, at Thessalon, County of East Algoma. No. 843, at Walkerville, County of Essex. No. 866, at Thompson, County of Essex Algoma. No. 931, at Thornloe, County of Nipissing. No. 1371, at McLennan, County of Nipissing. No. 1709, at Sturgeon Falls, County of Nipissing. No. 1722, at Blenheim, County of South Kent. No. 1723, at Dyer's Bay, County of North Bruce. No. 287, resuscitated in the County of Brant. Several numbers have been reported dormant.

The annual returns from the County Lodges are coming in very slowly, there being eight not yet received. t

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From the reports so far received there have been admitted to membership by initiation, 1,192; by certificate, 453; by reinstatement, 337; while the loss by death is 143, and by expulsion 31. The net increase is therefore about 1,800.

The reports from the County Lodges should be in the hands of the Grand Secretary at least two weeks prior to the date fixed for holding the annual meeting of the Grand Lodge, so as to enable that officer to prepare a detailed statement of the standing of the Order in the several counties. As it is at present, it is utterly imposible—owing to the short time given—to submit anything like a correct estimate of the membership of the Association. In a number of instances the returns have to be referred back for correction.

Your Grand Secretary has still to complain of the very lax method adopted by the District Lodges in confirming the reports of the Primary Lodges without enquiring as to whether they are correct or not.

I have as yet only one appeal to lay before the members of this Grand Lodge, with the evidence and letters accompanying the same.

It would be well for this Grand Lodge to pass a peremptory order that all evidence taken in Primary Lodges on trials when expulsion takes place be forwarded to the R. W. Grand Lodge so that the Committee on Suspensions and Expulsions may intelligently judge whether the same has a right to be confirmed.

During the past year death has been busy in our ranks. One by one the pioneers of the Association vacate their earthly seats to take their places, we trust, on the right hand of the Grand Master in heaven. We shall particularly miss from amongst us our late R. W. Bro. Major James Bennett, Past Grand Master of this R. W. Grand Lodge and Past Vice-President of the Triennial Council. Our deceased brother was never ashamed of his Protestant principles and never gave an uncertain sound on Orangeism. He died in harness. His familiar face and kindly words of cheer will be no longer with us. His example is worthy our

imitation. It would be fitting for this R.W. Grand Lodge to express by resolution its sympathy with the family of the deceased. A long list of loyal brethren who have served the Association in various capacities, and who have passed to their reward, will be found in the annual reports.

While peace and prosperity reign within the borders of our fair Dominion, the Mother Land is engaged in an eventful war on the arid plains of South Africa. It is unnecessary for me to reiterate the causes which led up to that war. Suffice it to say that at the call of duty, volunteers from every colony and dependency of the British Empire responded nobly, and, standing shoulder to shoulder, showed to the world at large a united front in defence of British honor and prestige. All honor to our Canadian contingents who have gone to South Africa to fight the battles of Queen and country, and who have shown by their perseverance and pluck that they are not afraid to venture life and limb in defence of the British Empire. As was to be expected, many members of our Association have joined the ranks of those who have gone to the front, and it would be a fitting tribute to their bravery and loyalty if immediately at the close of this meeting a special circular was prepared and sent to every lodge in the jurisdiction asking for the names of members and the sons of members of our Association who have left their homes and families to uphold the honor and integrity of the Empire in South Africa, and that the roll of honor be published in the printed reports of this Grand Lodge.

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In accordance with the usual custom the reports of the last Grand Lodge session were sent to the County, District and Primary Lodges or April 17th—just five weeks after the close of the meeting. The Annual was sent to the County Masters and Masters of isolated lodges on June Srd. Blank forms for Primary Lodge returns were sent out in November; for the District Lodges, in December, and for the Ctunty Lodges in January. Nowithstanding this fact, a number of the reports have only eached your Grand Sceretary within the last few days.

The usual arrangements have been made with the Railway Companies for reduced rates to the delegates attending this meeting.

Important legislation affecting representation to the M. W. Grand Lodge of British Amèrica will be considered by that body at the annual meeting to be held in the City of London on the last Tuesday in May.

The Imperial Grand Orange Council will hold its next session for the first time in its history in the Great Republic to the south of us. The meeting will be held in the City of New York on July 25th, 1900, at which meeting I hope this R. W. Grand Lodge will be represented. Therefore it will be necessary to take such steps at this meeting as you think best to send one or more delegates to represent this R. W. Grand Lodge. Each Grand Lodge or governing body is éutified to send seven representatives.

I cannot conclude without bearing testimony to the efficient manner in which THE SENTINEL, the organ of the Association, has been conducted. It has been the means of reviving the interest in the cause in

many sections, and I am pleased to learn that its circulation is rapidly extending throughout the Dominion. I strongly urge the Masters of all lodges to make it a portion of their duty to secure subscriptions for and in every way further the interests of the paper.

Brethren, I trust that the delegates attending this Grand Lodge will return to their homes determined to exert their influence by visiting regularly lodges already established, and by establishing new lodges when this can be done without injury to those already established.

Hoping that your deliberations may be conducted in peace and harmony, and that they may be conducive to the walfare of our beloved Order, and to the best interests of our common country, Fraternally yours, WILLIAM LEE,

#### GRAND TREASURER'S REPORT.

R.W. Bro. E. F. Clarke, Grand Treasurer, presented his Annual Report as follows :

#### To the Right Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Orange Grand Lodge of Ontario West:

R.W. SIR AND BRETHREN, -I beg to submit for your consideration the usual financial statement of receipts and expenditures of your Grand Treasurer's office for the year ending February 28th, 1900.

Attached hereto are schedules and vouchers giving in detail the amounts received and disbursed, as well as the amounts owing by Primary Lodges in the jurisdiction of your Grand Lodge.

The balance to the credit of the Grand Lodge at the date of last audit was \$1,524.56. The receipts from Grand Lodge dues up to February 28th were \$2,237.15, and the interest on bank balances \$20,85, making the total receipts for the year, including balance from last year, \$3,782.56. I have disbursed during the same period \$1,837.43, and have a balance to the credit of the Grand Lodge on February 28, 1900. of \$1,945.13, as follows :

The arrears outstanding at the date of the closing of the books were \$764.10.

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The usual notices to County Masters and to Primary Lodges, with statement of arrears, were sent out from my office during the year.

I would specially note the increase in amount received from Grand Lodge dues, viz., \$345.85 over last year. This is very gratifying, as it indicates an addition to the membership. Although the amount of arrears outstanding is \$158.00 less than last year, it is mainly due to the larger portion being wiped out, owing to lodges becoming dormant.

I append the report and certificate of the Grand Lodge Auditors, testifying to the correctness of the accounts. Also a statement in detail of the expenditure recommended by the Committee on Finance, and adopted at a previous meeting of the Grand Lodge.

### ADDRESS OF WELCOME FROM TOWN COUNCIL OF BRACEBRIDGE.

GENTLEMEN,—It gives me very great pleasure, as Mayor of Bracebridge, to meet you on this occasion and to extend to you a cordial welcome to this town.

We take it as quite a compliment that out of all the attractive cities and towns of Ontario your distinguished society should have selected Bracebridge as your meeting place, and I trust that your stay here will be so pleasant that this will not be the last time you may honor us with your presence. 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and the La not so ing gold Porhaps, gentlemen, as this may be the first time some of you have visited Muskoka, a few words as to the histery of the town may not be amiss.

It is now very little more than thirty years since the first house was erected in Bracebridge. The first settlers crossed the river Muskoka, at the head of the falls, by means of logs or trees thrown across the river, where now stands a substantial iron bridge.

At that time wild animals were very numerous here ; those bearing fur being hunted and trapped very eagerly for their skins, which found a ready market at the Hudson's Bay trading post, situate at the mouth of the river.

So little was thought of the country then that it was supposed that when the fur should be exhausted the country would be abandoned, but upon the disappearance of the fur industry our pine timber begai to bu wanted, and the lumberman arrived and grew and multiplied until for many years he practically dominated the country.

Hundreds of thousands of feet of choice pine timber for many years floated annually down the Muskoka River and on to the Georgian Bay, and so exclusively did lumbering engross the attention of the district that it was a common saying that when the pine disappeared there would be nothing left to support the town and the grass would grow in our streets.

In fact many people left Bracebridge in this belief; but the pine disappeared, our big lumbering companies departed and still our town did not go down; on the contravit is continued to flourish, and our hemlock came next into demand. Large tanneries were erected on the banks of the river and more money than ever was put into circulation. A railroad found its way into the town and away across the continent to Vancouver. We found ourselves on the highroad to the great North-West.

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Our beautiful Muskoka lakes were discovered ; people from all parts of Canada and the United States began to flock here in the summer for their health in ever increasing numbers, until at last we realize that we have the most popular and beautiful health resort in North America, attracting thousands more than we can yet accomodate.

Now we also see that we have facilities in our wonderful water privileges, with which Bracebridge is surrounded, to become a great manufacturing centre, and we feel assured that our future is safe beyond a peradventure.

Our country, meanwhile, has been progressing until we have a large and thrifty farm population scattered over our whole district.

Latterly our very rocks seemed determined to show that they are not so bad as they look, for numerous discoveries have been made showing gold, copper, iron and zinc to be found therein ; so that, gentlemen,

you find yourselves among a very happy and contented people in this Muskoka of ours and in Bracebridge its county seat.

In welcoming this ancient and honorable Society of Orangemen I bear in mind your origin, your efforts in the past in the cause of freedom and your tolerance always towards others, no matter how widely sundered from you in civil or religious thought.

If I am correct, and I think I am, Orangemen stand for free thought, an open Bible, equal rights, British connection, with all that that implies, and British fair play to every man, no matter what his race, religion or color, and high over all "The flag that for a thousand years has braved the battle and the breeze."

I want no higher ideal than this, and I honor the men who in storm or calm, through good report and ill report, have, since 1690 asked no more for themselves than they were willing to give all others.

Among all the fraternal societies of our land, and their name is legion, I know of none who set themselves so high an ideal, who stand so staadfastly for Queen and country; for the land of our birth and the land of our adoption, and in saying this I merely pay you Orangemen the meed of respect that is your dee.

I trust you will find your stay among us so agreeable that this may not be the last time we shall have the pleasure of greeting you here, and in that hope and on behalf of our town I cordially extend to you, gentlemen, the right hand of welcome to Bracebridge.

the British Arms, and would vie with the Empire in tributes to the achievements of our gallant soldiers among whom there were none braver than Canada's sons. May Britain ever lead the van of civilization, for where her standard flies liberty has her home and race and creed are never known.

### GRAND AUDITORS' REPORT.

This report was presented and read by W. Bro. John Hewitt, P.C.M., Toronto, as follows:

To the R.W. Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Orange Grand Lodge of Ontario West:

R.W. SIR AND BRETHREN, --Your Auditors would respectfully report that they have examined minutely and in detail the Grand Treasurer's books, vouchers, etc., in account with this Grand Lodge, and are glad to report the following :

The amount of dues received from Primary Lodges by your Grand Treasurer for the Orange year that closed on February 28th, 1900, was  $8_2,23.1.5$  with accrued interest on balances of 82.0.5, making the amount received from all sources \$2,258. This amount, with the balance from 1899, made the sum at the disposal of this Grand Lodge \$3,782.56 for the Orange year just closed, showing the handsome increase of \$386.01.

The arrears account is 3764.10, being a decrease of \$158.00 on this year's business. This pleasing result, we regret to say, was largely arrived at by writing off old arrears as not collectable.

• We would again emphasize the necessity for the continued energy and diligence of County and District Masters among the Primary Lodges of their respective jurisdictions so that the arrears account may be reduced to the smallest possible proportions, which will be the best guarantee for the healthy growth of the Order.

The expenditure of this Grand Lodge for the year ending February 28th, 1900, has been \$1,837.43, or \$33.31 less than last year.

The Grand Lodge has not been unmindful of the needs of worthy works of love, donating \$100.00 to the True Blue Orphanage, £10 to the Dr. Kane Memorial Fund, and \$25.00 towards the relief of Bro. Torrance, of Galt.

This year has been a healthy one in the finances of this Grand Lodge, showing the handsome increase in its income of \$348.05. This result ought to stimulate the Grand odge to press onward its propagandic work, not only with the view of enhancing the interests of the Orange Order, but

with the broader view of promoting the integrity and stability of our beloved country on the basis of loyalty to the Grown and justice and equality to all citizens of our laud.

Your Auditors feel that the work of organization should be pressed to the remotest limits of our land and to the extent of our ability, feeling assured that in doing so we are laying deep and sure foundations of a united, progressive and liberty-loving Empire.

Your Auditors again wish to bear cheerful testimony to the methodical exactness with which the work of the Treasurer's office is done. Every needed information is promptly furnished, and we can only say, in conclusion, the system of bookkeeping in use in the Treasurer's office is most suitable for the work to be done.

# REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CHARGE.

This report was presented and read by W. Bro. Beattie Nesbitt, D.M., Vaughan, as follows:

To the R.W. the Grand Master and Members of the Grand Orange Lodge of Untario West:

R.W. SIE AND BRETHEEN, —The special committee, to whom was referred the charges preferred by W. Bro. Richard Thompson against W. Bro. George Evans and D. McMurphy, Past Masters of L.O.L. No. 1689, Rat Portage, for certain alleged violations of the Constitution, beg

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to report that they have carefully considered the documentary evidence adduced in support of the allegations and the defence offered on behalf of the brethren implicated. We have also perused the mass of correspondence submitted by the Grand Secretary on the subject. We have also had haid before us the verbal statements of the complainant, the defendants not being present, though acknowledging due notice of the hearing of the charges.

We find that, substantially, the alleged instances of irregularities maintained in the charges by W. Bro. Thompson have been established. These have in a measure been cured or nullified either by dispensation of the M. W. the Grand Master of British America, or by the action of the R. W. the Grand Master of Datario West, in setting aside the proceedings for the formation of a County Lodge. That this system of irregular methods was carried on by the brethren charged is further evidenced by a letter from the present Worthy Master of Lo. L. 1689. A strict adherence to the Constitution must be insisted upon in all lodges, and the actions of W. Bros. Evans and McMurphy in ignoring the plain requirements of the regulations cannot on any ground be supported. We are unable to conclude, however, from the facts presented to us that the acts of these brethren wore wilful or perverse. We have the assurance of W. Bro. Thompson that he has, in preparing the charges, been actuated solely from a sense of duty, with a deire to encourage regularity of procedure in the lodges, and entirely without personal feeling towards the brethren concerned. With that assurance we believe that the object will be attained by a simple finding upon the facts, and that such finding will operate as an efficient deterrent for the future. We therefore recommend no action by this R. W. Grand Lodge.

We sincerely trust that the differences of all parties will now disappear, and that they will all unite in promoting the general interest of the Association, which will result in the near future in establishing a healthy County Lodge in New Ontario.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CORRESPONDENCE.

This report was presented and read by R.W. Bro. J. H. Scott, J.D.G.M.:

#### To the R.W. the Grand Master and Members of the Provincial Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West:

R. W. SIR AND BRETHREN,—The Committee on Correspondence have had under careful review the able, poetic and patricic address of the R.W. the Grand Master, delivered at the opening of this annual meeting. From the R.W. brother's well recognized love for British institutions, his respect for the flag of the Empire and his thorough sincerity and enthusiasm in advocating the aims and principles of the Orange Institution, the sentiments which he has presented to the Grand Lodge were of the character naturally expected by every representative in attendance at this gathering. The warmth and earnestness of his remarks have not, however, been received with formal approval, but have met with the most heary response from the brethere.

That the work of the Grand Master's office has been carried on with promptness and ability goes without saying. The Committee are assured that in the exercise of the Grand Master's discretion in the matter of dispensations he has been guided solely by a desire to promote the best interests of the brotherhood.

The Committee would especially draw the attention of the brethrem to that important branch of the Order—the Orange Mutual Benefit Fund, the annual statement of which has been distributed by the Secretary, Bro. J. S. Leighton, shows that over \$24,000 has been paid out to the widows and orphans of deceased Orangemen, and this without a single extra assessment. We believe that the Orange Mutual is practically the only one of the fraternal organizations which mut all their obligations last year without an extra assessment. In view of the above it is extremely gratifying to find the fund showing a balance of over \$5,000 at the end of the year.

In this connection the question of organization, to which the Grand Master has referred, should receive consideration. The Committee feel that in view of the excellent work now being done by W. Bro. Duff it would be advisable to continue the present arrangement between the Committee of this Grand Lodge and the executive of the Benefit Fund until the next annual meeting of this Grand Lodge. In the opinion of the Committee may work to be effective should be continuous, and they recommend accordingly.

The references of the R.W. the Grand Master to the presence in this country of a Papal ablegate, and to the reasons which, in his judgment, largely contributed to the defeat of the Greenway Government in Manitoba, are not only evidences of his keenness of perception, but also, we are bound to say, reflect the general concensus of opinion among the members of this Grand Lodge.

The Committee recommend that a special memorial page in the proceedings of this meeting be appropriated in honor of the late R.W. Bro. Major James Bennett, P.G.M., and that the deaths of such others of the brethren throughout the jurisdiction as are reported be specially recognized in distinct type.

The patriotic allusions to the present war in South Africa are most graphically rendered and appeal with great force, more especially to the members of this loyal Institution. The spontaneous outburst of sym-pathy so practically expressed by the Colonies towards the Motherland during the last few months has demonstrated as no other factor has ever done the feasibility of a scheme of Imperial Federation. The operations in South Africa have been an object lesson to the nations of the world in exhibiting the unity and strength of the British Empire, and the effect, is in fully believed, will be momentous and far reaching. As a Provin-cial organization we feel intense interest in the part which Canada has assumed as a most important aid in defence of British integrity, and while we deplore and condemn the disloyal sentiment of a portion of this Dominion and their feeble attempts to discountenance and discourage the helping hand of Canada to maintain the supremacy of the Motherland, we are glad to know that the overwhelming opinion of Canadians is at all times at the back of Her Most Gracious Majesty and the Imperial Government. In the present juncture it is the unanimous view of this Committee and, we feel assured, of this Grand Lodge as well, that this country should not quibble over the quantity of our assistance, but that, as has been well said, all our men and all our treasure should be at Her Majesty's disposal. We join in the Grand Master's prayer for a speedy determination of this conflict, and that such conclusion will result in the establishment of a united British South Africa. which, it is needless to say, will forever secure to the inhabitants of that great country, no matter of what color, race or sect, those blessings which form the object of this Association's existence, viz., civil, religious and political rights and privileges.

The response to His Excellency the Governor-General's appeal for contributions to the Canadian Patriotic Fund has been most generous and satisfactory, and we have no doubt that this Grand Lodge will in this regard show itself worthy of the occassion.

The Committee have with pleasure perused the careful and complete report of the indefatigable Grand Secretary. It is needless to say that the duties of R.W. Bro. Lee have been performed in the most painstaking and capable manner, and his unvarying courtesy and thorough knowledge of every detail connected with the jurisdiction, which render his services most valuable to the members of this Grand Lodge.

The steady progress of the Order and the substantial increase in membership during the year is most gratifying and should give an impetus to greater effort and more concerted action in forwarding the Association's interests. In this connection the Committee believe that a large field for action is presented in the cases of brethren who have from time to time been suspended for non-payment of dues. The Committee think that every effort should be made in the various private lodges to induce these brethren to reaffiliate, and that every encouragement for this purpose should be offered in the way of remission of arrears.

The Committee cordially endorse the certificates of character which the Grand Master and Grand Secretary have given THE SENTINEL, the official organ of the Orange Order. Its fearlessness as an exponent of Orange and Protestant thought entitles it to the unanimous support of the membership of this Grand Lodge.
