# SAINT DAVID'S CHURCH.

## MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING.

LECTURE ROOM, St. John, N. B., Jan. 19, 1898.

Meeting called in pursuance of a notice posted in the vestibule of this church for the past four weeks, signed by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, in terms of the Act of the General Assembly of New Brunswick incorporating the church, and in further pursuance of the constitution of the congregation in consequence of the same notice read from the pulpit last Lord's Day by the minister, the Rev. Dr. Bruce, both morning and evening, calling the meeting for 7.30 this evening.

The meeting being convened, and being constituted by praise, reading of Scripture and prayer by the minister.

Dr. Bruce in the chair.

The objects of the meeting having been stated by the chairman, and the Secretary of the Trustees not being present, through absence from the city, on motion of Mr. Wm. J. Fraser, Mr. John Willet was asked to act as Secretary.

Mr. Wm. J. Fraser submits the Report of the Trustees with the Financial Statement, and the same having been, on motion, considered paragraph by paragraph, was finally adopted as a whole.

Mr. Sommerville gave notice of motion of a resolution to be moved at the annual meeting one year-hence, as follows:

Resolved, That a member of this congregation be appointed, at the annual meeting each year, to be the Treasurer of St. David's Church, whose duty it will be to receive all monies contributed for any and every purpose, and to give receipts therefor, also to disburse the funds as he may be directed by the organizations existing in the church, and raising money in the name of St. David's Church; further

Resolved, That the Treasurer shall not hold any other office during his term.

On motion, Resolved, That we proceed with the election of Trustees for the present year, and that the number thereof be nine.

Mr. McIntyre moved that a vote of thanks be tendered to the Trustees for the past year for the manner in which they have managed the affairs of thechurch.

After nominating a number of gentlemen for the office of Trustee the nomination was closed.

LECTURE ROOM, St. DAVID'S CHURCH, January 26th, 1898.

#### TRUSTEES' REPORT.

Your Trustees deeply regret that they have this year to report the death of one of their number, Mr. Wm. Robb, a most diligent and efficient Trustee, a man of high Christian character, and one who impressed all, that he regarded work intrusted to him as a positive duty to be faithfully performed. It is not possible to give adequate expression to the loss sustained by our Church in the death of this good man.

It is gratifying to report that the weekly contributions have been regularly paid during the year, and the congregation is commended for the manifest improvement in this regard, which has enabled your Trustees to discharge maturing obligations promptly. It is needful to emphasize the importance of constant attention on the part of those who support Gospel Ordinances in this place, that the revenues be sustained and increased. This may easily be done, by a slight increase from many now contributing. There are at the present time 155 contributors registered, averaging 45 cents weekly, it should average 50 cents.

Early in the year repairs were commenced on the Church Building, which were estimated to cost two hundred and fifty dollars, but on examination the brick work was found to be in a very dangerous condition, and it was clearly seen that a larger expenditure was necessary. of the congregation was called last August, at which your Trustees submitted a report of the work then in progress, and estimated the cost to be about \$800 and upwards. Ways and means were then asked for, and a resolution was passed empowering the Trustees to borrow the funds on the available margin of the existing mortgage.

In addition to the repairs to the Church Building, the Lecture room in which we are met has been renovated, together with the adjoining rooms, at a cost of \$136.65, which is an extra expenditure this year.

The Insurance premuims matured during the year, and \$182.16 has been paid, insuring the Church property for \$24,000, until A. D. 1900, and the Pipe Organ for \$1,800.

It is a matter of regret that we have been called upon this year to expend so largely on capital account. If it were not for this fact a greatly improved statement of indebtedness could have been submitted. The church has a property adjoining which this year provides \$242.50 for payment of interest.

Your Trustees have already urged the claims of increased and regular weekly contributions, yet they earnestly commend the necessity of supporting the effort to wipe out the Floating Debt, and also to remember the Interest and Debt Fund. These accounts are not as generally supported, as they should be, and all that is needed is something on the part of every one. Your Trustees recommend that the quarterly collections on account of the Floating Debt be continued during the present year.

#### REPORT OF SESSION.

The year which has just closed has been written in the history of the congregation with an experience similar to that of other years, but it has not been wanting in events which call for some special reference by the Session.

The Session again call upon the congregation to unite with them in acknowledgment of the goodness of our Heavenly Father and of the mercy he has revealed to us.

The Session express their sympathy with those who have been called upon to endure sorrow, trial and bereavement.

During the year, twelve have been removed by death, some of them from the older and more prominent members of the congregation.

The Session would place on record here, as they have already done in the tribute to his memory expressed in their resolution, a statement of their sense of loss, almost of personal bereavement, in the death of Mr. Robert Cruikshank, one of the oldest and most highly esteemed members of the Session. Mr. Cruikshank's death has created a blank in the Session and congregation, as well as in the community, which time will hardly fill.

Another of the best known and prominent of its members, and an old and well tried member of the Board of Trustees, was removed, by the death of Mr. Wm. Robb. Others almost as well known have been taken from us.

The Session pray that the blessing of God may attend the congregation during the year.

## The Teachers and Officers of St. David's Sabbath School.

DEAR BRETHREN,—In submitting my report for 1897 I have again to report a diminished average attendance, which compared with the previous year shows a falling off of eight, but the last quarter shows an encouraging attendance compared with the corresponding quarter of 1896, which, no doubt, is in a great measure due to Rally Day, and in this connection I desire to call attention to the indefatigable exertions of our Secretary, both in bringing into being and making it a success.

The teachers have been faithful to their trust, but during the summer months some were absent, and they were indeed greatly missed: The interest and attendance at the monthly prayer meetings of the teachers have even exceeded the previous year: rich blessings must follow such general and earnest prayers; in this respect we look for rich ingatherings in 1898, and may God grant unto us greater realizations than we can ask or expect.

In 1896 we had but two accessions to the Church from the School, and in 1897 we note a similar number only.

There were two scholars removed by death during the year. Nellie Patterson, a scholar in the class now taught by Miss Shaw, was the first, and the second was Murray McFarlane, a bright and happy lad in Mrs. Reid's class, who met his death in such a tragic manner without a moments warning; even outside of his own class his happy face and winning ways are missed by many in the school.

We need more workers, there are several classes without a teacher, and principally among them I name the Primary Class, for Miss Cameron, who for many years has laboured so earnestly and with such love for the work, has through ill health been compelled to resign this class, now the size of the class, and the adoption by the School of the Grading System, will require for this department at least three teachers. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth labourers into His harvest."

The adoption by the School of the Grading System will not necessitate such great changes in our classes as were at first supposed, as on examinations we find that most of them are composed of scholars of equal grade; a few changes will however be necessary, and where a change is made we hope both teachers and scholars will consent gracefully.

#### SECRETARY'S REPORT.

In submitting this, the twelfth annual report, we feel we have very much to be thankful for, and that the blessing of our Heavenly Father has been ours.

Nine regular meetings have been held, with a total attendance of 59, average 6. Largest number at any meeting 8, smallest 4. Sixteen visits were reported to Public Hospital, nine less than last year. Most interesting reports have been brought to the meetings every month, by two of our number, of visits to the Seaman's Mission. The study of the Bible has been both enjoyable and helpful to those who attended, some of the subjects being "Prayer, and " Helps and Hindrances to a Christian Life." At those meetings poems and extracts bearing on the subject have been read by members. The visiting of strangers in the church has also been kept up. It was decided to use the money on hand at the close of last year in buying new blinds for the vestry and a new Book of Praise for the pulpit. A large amount of work was done by the Association, with the help of other ladies in the congregation, in preparing a box of clothing and bedding for the sufferers by the Windsør fire. A collection was taken at both services on the first Sunday in November, which came to \$29. That amount, with two dollars given to the Association, was spent for material, which was made into such things as were most needed by the afflicted people. A number of garments, both new and old, were also donated by members of the congregation, which, with those made by the ladies, were valued at one hundred dollars. A letter has been received by Dr. Bruce, from Mr. Dickey, Presbyterian minister of Windsor, conveying thanks to St. David's Church.

Every effort has been made by our President to enlarge the membership. Cards of invitation were supplied, and several members called upon ladies in the congregation and urged them to join. A large number received the invitation favorably, but few additional were made to the membership however. One hundred copies of the Constitution were printed, and some of those were sent out. Four new and two former members joined during the year. We trust the Report of 1898 will have better things to tell
