Certification of Students.

1. Young men desiring to enter upon study with a view to the Ministry are required to make application to some Presbytery of the Church ; which, being satisfied regarding their moral and religious character, their motives, and their general fitness to study for the Ministry, will certify them to the Board of Examiners. This regulation applies to entrants upon the Preparatory Course, as well as to students, who having taken their Literary Course in the University of Toronto or elsewhere, seek to enter College as Students of Theology.*

2. According to the law of the General Assembly, Students are required, each Summer, after entering College, to appear before the Presbytery within whose bounds they are labouring or residing, and to render a written Exercise on a subject prescribed to them ; on which, they will be certified to the College Senate for the subsequent year.

3. The Board of Examiners will meet in the College on Thursday, the 8th of October, at 9 o'clock a.m., when Students entering Theology are required to appear and furnish the evidence of standing referred to under the head *Theological Curriculum*.

* All Arts' Students, in order to be eligible for work in the Home Mission Field require to be approved by a Presbytery as candidates for the Ministry.

Theological Curriculum.

Students entering upon the course of Divinity shall present a Presbyterian Certificate, together with the evidence of having obtained the degree of B.A. at the University of Toronto; or at McGill College, Montreal; or at Queen's College, Kingston; or at Victoria College, Cobourg; or at one of the National Universities of Great Britain or Ireland, or other University recognized by the Senate; or, instead of said degree, a certificate of having satisfactorily passed the final examination in the Preparatory Course in Knox College; or of having completed a three years' curriculum in some approved College, and having passed the examinations connected therewith; but in all cases Students must either present evidence of having attended, at least one Session, a class in Hebrew, or undergo an elementary examination in that language.

Only by permission of the General Assembly can any Student who has not fulfilled these conditions be admitted to Theology.

The Theological Course extends over three Sessions, of six months each.

The *Elocution Class* is attended by the Students of all the Theological Years, and is open to all who have the Ministry in view.

Students of the First Year are required to prepare a Homily; of the Second Year, a Lecture and a Greek Critical Exercise; and of the Third Year, a Sermon and a Hebrew Critical Exercise.

Examination at Close of Session.

In addition to such examinations as may be held by the Professors during the Session, there is a general examination of the Classes at its close, and, if the examination is sustained, the Senate certifies Students to their Presbyteries accordingly.

The Senate gives a general certificate to Students who have completed their Theological Course, in order to their being taken by Presbyteries on preliminary trials for license. A Diploma from the College is also given.

Degree of Bachelor of Divinity,

By the following Act, passed in 1881, by the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, Knox College was invested with the power of conferring Degrees in Divinity :

AN ACT TO AMEND THE ACT TO INCORPORATE KNOX COLLEGE.

Whereas Knox College, by its petition, represents that the said College is an Institution for the Theological Education of Students for the Ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and has been incorporated for that purpose by chapter sixty-nine of the statutes of the then Province of Canada, passed in the Session held in the twenty-second year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria ; that since the foundation of the said College between three and four hundred students have received in it their Theological Education ; that nearly all the Students of said College have received the greater part of their literary education at University College, Toronto ; that the Students of Knox College will, to a great extent, seek their education in Arts at said University College ; that neither the University of Toronto nor said Knox College has power to confer Degrees in Divinity, and the said Students are thus precluded from obtaining such degrees from the institutions where they have received their literary and theological education ; that the said College has a staff of Professors and Tutors, and a valuable theological library, and has erected large and expensive buildings in Toronto, in proximity to said University College, for the purpose of affording a thorough education to the said Students for the Ministry of said Presbyterian

Church; and that the said Knox College is already partially endowed, and is constantly receiving further sums towards completing said endowment; and whereas the said Knox College has prayed that, in order to promote a higher standard of theological learning, and to prevent its Students from being compelled to resort to other colleges for degrees in Divinity, power may be granted to it to confer such degrees; and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of said petition:

Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:—

1. The Senate of Knox College shall have power to confer the degrees of Bachelor of Divinity and Doctor of Divinity upon graduates in Arts of such Universities as the said Senate shall recognize for that purpose, as well as upon such students of the said College as are now taking the regular course of study therein, or have, before passing of this Act, completed the said course, and are now ordained Ministers of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, subject, however, in either case, to such regulations as to examination or otherwise as may, from time to time, be prescribed by by-law of the said Senate.

2. The said Senate shall also have power to confer the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity, and may make by-laws and regulations touching any matter or thing pertaining to the conditions on which said degree may be conferred.

The Senate of Knox College, having thus the power of conferring Degrees in Divinity, has adopted the following

REGULATIONS

respecting the degree of Bachelor of Divinity (B.D.):

1. Candidates for the degree of B.D. must be graduates in Arts of some approved University; but Students who have already completed the literary course in Knox College, and are now in the Ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and also students who are now (1881) taking the regular course in Knox College, may become candidates.
2. Candidates must have completed a course of Theological study in this College, or in some Theological School approved by the Senate.
3. The degree of B.D. cannot be conferred earlier than one year after the completion of the ordinary Theological Course.
4. The subjects of examination shall be arranged in two departments, as follows:

FIRST DEPARTMENT.

- (1) *Latin*—Augustini, de Doctrina Christiana, Lib. I.
- (2) *Greek*—Gospel of Luke and Epistle to Romans.
- (3) *Hebrew*—Genesis, chs. 1-5 (inclusive); Psalms 2, 8, 19, 45, 72, 110.
- (4) *Apologetics*—Rawlinson's Historical Evidences; Farrar's Critical History of Free Thoughts; Flint's Anti-theistic Theories.
- (5) *Church History and Church Government*—Killen's Ancient Church.
- (6) *Systematic Theology*—Westminster Confession of Faith, with Dr. A. A. Hodge's Commentary thereon; Lee on Inspiration.
- (7) *Textual Criticism and Canon*—Scrivener's Introduction to the Criticism of the New Testament; Westcott's History of the New Testament Canon.

SECOND DEPARTMENT.

- (1) *Greek*—Justin Martyr, Apol. I.
- (2) *Hebrew and Chaldee*—Isaiah, chs. 1-6; Daniel, chs. 3-5.
- (3) *Church History*—Fisher's Reformation.
- (4) *Systematic Theology*—Turretini, Tom. II.; Locut, Decimus Quartus Quaest, I., II., X.—XIV.; Cunningham's Historical Theology, Vol. I.
- (5) *Exegetics*—Fairbairn's Hermeneutics; Ellicott on Galatians.
- (6) *Homiletics and Pastoral Theology*—Shedd's Homiletics and Van Oosterzee's Practical Theology.

5. Candidates may take, at one examination, the whole of the work in both departments, but not earlier than the month of March after the completion of the ordinary Theological Course.
6. The examinations in the two departments may be taken at different times. In this case the examination in the First Department shall not usually be taken earlier than the month of March next following the completion of the ordinary Theological Course; but students who shall have averaged not less than sixty per cent. of the maximum number of marks in the examinations of the second year shall be allowed to take this examination at the close of their ordinary course. The examination in the Second Department cannot be taken earlier than the March following, and cannot be deferred beyond three years from the date of the first examination.
8. Candidates are required to communicate their names, together with attestation of their qualifications, as specified in the foregoing regulations, to the Secretary of the Senate, at least two months before the day appointed for the examination.
8. The fee for the Degree of B.D. shall be ten dollars (\$10), to be paid to the Secretary, Rev. Dr. Reid, previous to conferring the Degree.

Preparatory Course.

I.—UNIVERSITY COURSE.

The General Assembly recommends Students for the Ministry to take a full course in some approved College, and to obtain a degree of B.A. before entering on their Theological studies.

For the guidance of Students wishing to take the Course in University College, Toronto, the following particulars respecting that Institution are here given:—

The Course in the University extends over four years of two Terms each, the first Term from the 1st October to the 22nd December; the second Term from 4th January to 31st May.

The ordinary Annual Examinations for Matriculation (both Pass and Honor) will commence on the 22nd of June.

Supplemental Examinations for Matriculation will be held in the latter part of September, at which those who were rejected at the June Examinations, as well as new candidates, may offer.

Seven Scholarships—three of \$120, two of \$100, one of \$80, one of \$60—are connected with the Junior Matriculation Examination. Three Scholarships of \$120 are connected with the Senior Matriculation Examination, which is held also in September.

Seven Scholarships—two of \$130, four of \$100, one of \$50—are offered for competition among the Undergraduates of the first year. Nine Scholarships—two of \$150, three of \$120, two of \$100, one of \$75, and one of \$50—are offered in the second year. Eight Scholarships—five of \$150, one of \$120, and two of \$100—are offered in the third year.

Ancient Geography—Greece, Italy and Asia Minor; Modern Geography—North America and Europe.

French—A Paper on Grammar; Translation from English into French prose; Emile de Bonnechose, Lazare Hoche.

German—A Paper on Grammar; Schiller, Belagerung von Antwerpen; Der Taucher, der Kampf mit dem Drachen.

Honor Examination.

Classics—Demosthenes, Aphobus, I., II.; Homer, Odyssey, B. IX.; Livy, B. IX., cap. 1-19; Horace, Odes, B. I.; Ovid, Fasti, v. 440-end. Translation from a Latin and a Greek author, not specified; a paper on Greek Grammar, to which special importance will be attached.

Mathematics—Plane Trigonometry (Solution of Triangles); Algebra to the end of the Binomial Theorem; Euclid Bb. IV., VI., and Definitions of V.

English—Coriolanus.

French—Lamartine, Christophe Colomb; Translation from easy French author not specified; Translation from English into French prose.

German—Schiller, Wilhelm Tell, Acts III. and IV.

History and Geography—English History under the houses of Tudor and Stuart; Geography of British Empire, including the Colonies.

Scholarships for University Students offered by Board of Examiners.

To encourage Students to take a University Course, a limited number of Scholarships is offered for competition to Undergraduates of the University of Toronto who are prosecuting their studies with a view to the Ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. In order to hold any of these Scholarships, it is necessary to give attendance on the

Lectures of the year in University College. The following Scholarships are offered for 1885-'86, viz. :—

I. For Students who have passed successfully their Matriculation Examination :

II. For Students entering on the Second Year of their Course :

2. Alexander, 2nd Scholarship..... 40

These Scholarships are tenable for one year only, but the scholars for one year may compete for the Scholarships of the succeeding year. A Student holding a University Scholarship may compete for these, but in the event of being successful, he will receive only the third part of the Scholarship, the remainder being awarded to the Student not holding any other Scholarship who would be next entitled to it. The Board will not award these Scholarships unless a certain standard of excellence is reached.

All Students holding these Scholarships must sign a declaration that it is their intention to enter the Ministry

in the Presbyterian Church in Canada. *Persons intending to compete for them are requested to intimate their purpose to the REV. J. LAING, D.D., Dundas, before the 8th of September.*

II.—KNOX COLLEGE COURSE.

Classical tuition is provided in Knox College for such Students as are unable to take a full University Course, or in whose case it is thought that the Curriculum of the University may with advantage be modified.

Students availing themselves of this tuition are required to give three years' attendance on certain classes (as indicated below) in University College, and to pass the terminal examination in these classes.

Tuition is free in Knox College, but Students must pay the ordinary class-fees in University College.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

Entrants on the Preparatory Course, Knox College, will be examined in the following subjects:—

Latin—Grammar; and Cæsar, *Bellum Britannicum*, B. G., B. IV., chs. 20-36; B. V., chs. 8-23).

Greek—Grammar; and Xenophon, *Anabasis*, B. I., chs. 1-5.

English—Geography; Grammar; History of England; Arithmetic;

Euclid, first book; Algebra, first four rules.

N.B.—It is absolutely necessary that Students applying for admission shall pass a fair examination in the above subjects.

Students desirous of entering the Second Year of the Literary Course will be required to pass an examination in the following subjects, in addition to those prescribed for entrants on the First Year:—

Latin—Virgil, B. II.; Cicero, Pro Archia.

Greek—Iliad, B. VI.; Xenophon, Anabasis, B. I., chs. 6-10.

Mathematics—Euclid, Books I., II., III.; and Algebra, to Simple Equations (inclusive).

English—Composition, Orthographical, Etymological, and Rhetorical Forms of the Language (Fowler's English Literature, Parts III., IV. and VII.).

N.B.—An actual attendance of *three* Sessions is required in the Preparatory Course, unless in case of very exceptional attainments on the part of those entering. A really creditable examination on the above subjects must therefore be passed before any candidate can get the standing of a Second Year's Student on first appearing. Without special permission of the General Assembly no Student can enter Theology with less than two years' attendance in the Preparatory Course.

These examinations will be held in Knox College on Thursday, 8th October, at 10 o'clock am.

Those intending to appear for Examination will intimate their purpose to the Chairman of the Board of Examiners, the REV. J. LAING, D.D., of Dundas, on or before the first day of October.

Library.

The College Library is extensive and valuable, and additions are being constantly made to it. The Church owes the deepest gratitude to the late Dr. Burns for the great zeal with which he collected, in Britain and America, the many valuable works which are the basis of this Library.

The Library is divided into two departments—*Ordinary* and *Consulting*. The books in the Ordinary Department are issued to the Students under such rules as usually govern libraries of this kind. The Consulting Department contains Standard Works, especially Commentaries, which Students require frequently to refer to: these books must not be taken from the room in which they are kept.

Each Student in the Theological Course pays, at his annual enrolment, two dollars towards the maintenance of the Library; and each Student in the Preparatory Course one dollar.

Mr. R. C. TIBB, B.A., is Librarian for the ensuing Session.

Reading Room.

The Reading Room is in connection with the Students Metaphysical and Literary Society and the Students' Missionary Society. It is supplied with several of the leading Theological and Literary Quarterlies and Monthlies, and with a large number of newspapers, religious and general.

Students' Metaphysical and Literary Society.

The object of the Society is sufficiently indicated by its designation. Attention is given by its members to the composition of Essays, and to Elocution, as well as to the discussion of important questions. Membership is voluntary, but most of the Students seek connection with the Society. Mr. JOHN MCKAY, B.A., is President of the Society for 1885-6.

Students' Missionary Society.

All the Students connected with the College are members of this Society.

The object of the Society is to supply the means of grace in the more neglected portions of Canada. It sends Missionaries chiefly to those points which the regular organization of the Church is least able to overtake. The funds necessary for carrying on the work are supplied by contributions obtained by its members from the fields in which they labour during summer, and by contributions from congregations and individuals throughout the Church who are pleased to aid in the work of the Society. Twenty-one Missionaries are employed by the Society for the present summer.

During winter the attention of the Society is chiefly directed to Mission work in Toronto, and to work of religious instruction in the prisons, asylums, and charitable institutions of the city.

Residence of Students.

The College is very commodious, and it is believed that the occupancy of it much increases educational facilities, as well as greatly promotes the comfort of the Students.

The Residence is under the control of the Senate, and the Regulations under which the Boarding Establishment is conducted, have been very carefully considered by the Board of Management.

Students are provided with furnished rooms. The rate of board is three dollars per week, all charges for attend-

ance, etc., included. Where it is preferred, Students are allowed to reside in the College on payment to the Steward of seventy-five cents per week, and to find board elsewhere. All applications for rooms must be made to the Principal before the commencement of the Session, and rooms are assigned in the order in which applications are received; academic seniority, however, entitles Students to a preference in the choice of rooms. Students can retain their rooms from one Session to another, irrespective of the rule as to seniority, by giving notice before the beginning of the Session that they wish to do so.*

Students in their Theological Course, and Students preparing for their Theological Course, whether in Knox College, in the University of Toronto, or in some other Educational Institution in Toronto, are entitled to reside in the College.

Ministers or Probationers of the Church who may be temporarily resident in Toronto, may, if any rooms are not occupied by Students, be admitted to board; but their residence, if longer than a week, must be sanctioned by the Principal.

Occupants of rooms are responsible for injury to furniture, etc. Smoking is not allowed in the building.

There are many important details of the system adopted which cannot be here given, but which are provided for in the agreement entered into with Mr. James Fullarton, the Steward.

A perspective view of the College, taken from the architect's design appears on the cover of the Calendar.

* Rooms will be allocated for the Session on Thursday, 8th October, at 3 p.m., when all applicants for rooms require either to be present, or to be represented.

Parties intending to benefit the College, and whose estate consists of mortgage securities, must bear in mind that a will containing bequests for charitable uses of such property must be made six months prior to the death of the testator.

FORM OF DEVISE OF REALTY.

NOTE.—Intending testators are particularly requested to notice, that a will containing a devise of real estate must be made six months prior to the death of the person making the will, otherwise the devise is inoperative.

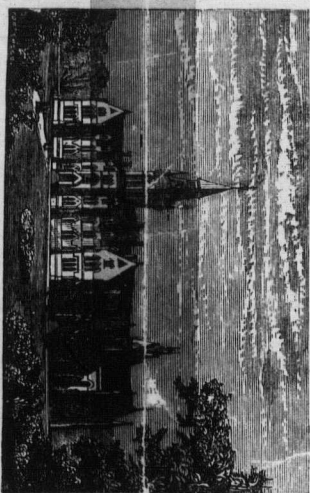
