OTTAWA, March 28.
CAUCUS OF NEW BRUNSWICK REPRESENTATIVES ON THE RAILWAY ROUTE.

Mr. Fisher took the lead in bringing the members together. Botsford, Wilnot, Steeves, O'Neill and Dever, of the Senate, and Fisher, Connell, Bolton, Gray, Ryan, Ferris, Wallace, Burpee, and Costigan, M. P.'s, constituted the meeting. As a member of the Government, Mr. Tilley was, of course, absent for prudential reasons. Botsford was moved to the Chair. Fisher spoke at length against the Northern line. He said it was mainly advocated in Quebec in the interest of a couple of French Counties, and the local partisans from the Gulf Counties of New Brunswick. That line would be so prejudicial to the Dominion that he believed we would be better without a Railroad than to have to maintain it. He advocated the Kewick Valley line, with outlet at Apolonia and early connections with Fredericton and Woodville; this could be soon connected with the Gulf Counties and the best Dominion line would be best for N. B. and N. S. and Quebec. Connell spoke even more strongly, saying that the adoption of a North Shore line would give vitality to a movement for the repeal of the Union.

Hon. Mr. Gray made a long eloquent and characteristic speech. He condemned the Northern line as high military grounds and because it implied the use of other lines of road for the use of which exact taxes might be asked. A national road like this should be entirely owned by the Dominion. This principle carried out would involve a purchase to which the Grand Trunk would not be averse, but Mr. Gray is in favor of doing the thing handsomely. He censured the advocates of a Frontier line for raising an issue between it and the Northern line. He was not averse to a Central line, but he believed a great opportunity had been lost (this was a decidedly Mitchell-like idea) "by not securing the Northern-Central." This Mr. Mitchell had offered in good faith; it ought to have been accepted, but it could not now be obtained. He gave Connell a castigation and concluded. The childish simplicity of Mr. Gray's ideas is a matter of general remark, as even a "political infant" must know that the votes which will carry the Northern line, if he carried, will never agree to such an engineering and commercial absurdity as a "Northern-Central." The offer of it is pronounced to be what is called "a sprat to catch a whale."

Mr. Bolton took a decided stand against a Northern route on the ground of its being circuitous and costly, and had on commercial grounds—his denial that the frontier men provoke the contest, the Northern men were the aggressors. He was willing the precise line accepted should be based on the complete information soon expected, but he hoped that information would be honestly got and used. If such information were got as a sham or subterfuge designed to sustain a foregone conclusion the Government would find that such a feeling of indignation would be excited among the majority of the people of New Brunswick as would almost equal that now felt in Nova Scotia. Bolton, catching at Gray's hint about owning the entire road, asked: Did the Government actually propose to buy out the Grand Trunk from Quebec to River du Loup?

After Bolton came Botsford. He expressed him strongly in favor of a Frontier line on economic and commercial grounds. Steeves, who was reported to hold a different opinion took a similar view. He looked upon the choice of a Northern line as being fraught with political and financial disaster. Dever's speech is described as one of the most sensible delivered, and his manner calm and dignified. He deprecated extreme sectional views as regards either a Frontier or Northern line. He stated distinctly that the adoption of the Major Robinson line would excite such a feeling of indignation in St. John and the greater part of the Province as would not be easily allayed. But I must "hasten to a conclusion." The result of the caucus was

RESOLUTIONS AND THE SESSION OF THE HON. J. H. GRAY, Q. C.

Resolutions were moved by Bolton of this tenor: That in the opinion of this meeting the adoption of a North Shore route for the Inter-colonial Railroad would be productive of the strongest dissatisfaction to the great majority of the people of New Brunswick, involving as it would an expenditure that no considerations national or commercial could warrant.

That a Committee of five be appointed to prepare a memorial to the Privy Council conveying this opinion.

Gray again took high ground. He protested that a resolution of this kind would be unjust to N. B., and left the meeting in high indignation, to the great sorrow and mortification of the other members of the caucus who felt that their united efforts would be more weakened by the action of a professed friend and representative of Saint John than by an open enemy. Can it be possible that Gray represents the sentiments of the thousands of St. John memorialists? Were these the views he expressed in your City when advocating Confederation? Did he thus discuss on the hustings? These are questions I have heard asked and answered very emphatically by gentlemen who feel keenly in this matter. The resolution passed unanimously (Gray, absent) and Bolton, Fisher, Botsford, Ryan, and Steeves were nominated a Committee to prepare a memorial on the subject. Possibly I may be able to get you a copy of it. The caucus matters are only talked of confidentially and will not be made public until the memorial is placed before the Council.

COMMUNICATIONS.

To the Editor of the Standard.

Sir:—When I last addressed you on the Grammar School question, I had no idea of so soon returning to it, but the recent conduct of the Board of Directors, compelled me to write again, and lay a statement of the case before the public. The present incumbent's term having nearly expired, the Board advertised for a teacher. The notice appeared in one St. John paper, and in the "Courier,"—the local paper being passed by for reasons not hard to guess. The notice appeared on March 9th, and the applications were required to be handed in by the 23rd of the same month. Four applied for the situation, one from St. George, one from St. John, one from the North Shore, and one from England. The Board met last Monday, and after a farcical examination of the credentials of each, accepted the young Oxonian, R. V. Messers Ross and Key voting for W. A. Smith, A. M.

In view of the above decision, I would ask, very well afforded to be rejected by the above Board. The objection, that he was brought up here, and acquainted with all the young people, over whom he would consequently wield no influence, is hardly worth noticing, considering the class of boys attending said school. Besides, if in order to be respected, a teacher must be a stranger, our clerics, magistrates, and other public men ought to be the same. Poor encouragement for smart young men. Did the Board believe that a man utterly unacquainted with our manners and customs, and looking at everything from an Oxonian standpoint, would be preferable to one of our own people? Was Mr. Partridge chosen because his qualifications were better than those of the others, or was it because he was prepared to act as Curate of All Saints' Church—which? Did not one of the members remind the Board that he went to school to choose a teacher, not a curate—Did it ever occur to the Board whether a man who has to prepare sermons for the Sabbath, who has to close his school every Wednesday afternoon, and on certain Sunday-days, can honestly discharge the duties of a teacher? Was not the appointment of Mr. Partridge a foregone conclusion; was it not determined upon long ago; was not the advertising for a teacher, examination of credentials, &c., a mere farce; and is it true that he is now on his way across the Atlantic?

Mr. Partridge, the Board has gone a little too far; public opinion has been aroused, and the end is not far distant. Whatever party may predominate in St. Andrews, it is well to remember that the school belongs to the COUNTY. Such things will not be tolerated, monopolies must cease, we have the power to sweep them away, and in self-defence we must use it. And if a man, fresh from the hotbed of Ritualistic hummeries, is thrust upon us by taking advantage of a law that in spirit and design belongs to the age of intolerance, then it will come the duty of every Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist to keep their children from said school, until they are permitted to have a voice in the selection of the teacher.

The election in St. John on Saturday last, resulted in the choice of J. W. Codlip, Esq., a thorough repealer—who boldly came out on that ticket, and was permitted to walk the course without opposition. Many supported Mr. Codlip not because he was in favor of repeal, but on other grounds. The lesson however may lead to a more liberal policy on the part of the Government at Ottawa, towards the Maritime Provinces. The splendid opportunity of forming a great nation will not, we trust, be marred by extravagance or excessive taxation. Such a course will result in defeating the British American Act.

During the past month several letters were published in these columns, reflecting upon the sectarian character of the Board of Directors of the Charlotte County Grammar School, and the injustice to other denominations of the Act

which constitutes the Rector of this Parish President of the Board, replies to these letters were also inserted; we abstained from expressing any opinion at the time, but the letter of our correspondent "Public Opinion" in this days issue, calls for some remarks from us as a public journalist, and we shall treat the matter on public grounds alone.

If the allegations set forth by our correspondents are correct, and indeed the recent decision appears to confirm them, we unhesitatingly concur in their views, which are a reflex of public opinion, that the act should be so amended as to secure a representation of the different denominations at the Board, with the power of electing their President. The school is a County institution, and receives an annual grant from the Province Treasury, which is raised from the pockets of the people, without regard to sect; and while there are natives of the Province, graduates of the University who can produce good testimonials and possess the necessary qualifications for Teachers, they have stronger claims than applicants from the Mother Country. At the recent meeting of the Directors to elect a Master for the C. C. Grammar School, there were two applicants, natives of the Province, and graduates of the University, with testimonials of character and educational endowments; one of them a teacher at St. George, who it is reported was considered for being elected, but was not even balloted for; the other a native of this place, who has been absent for a few years, teaching in another part of the Province, who received only two votes; the objection to him being that it was supposed he would have no control over the pupils, and might not scorn the respect due to him as Master. The public view such an objection as a cloak to cover the real design of whoever uttered it.

The public generally, who are largely interested in the school, wish to be informed how any one in England could receive the advertisement and apply for the situation in four or five days, the time specified in the notice. It is generally believed that the affair was all arranged some months before the notice was published; and the decision warrants the belief. Another reason for arriving at this conclusion is, that report says the person elected is to assist the Rector occasionally in the discharge of his ministerial duties; here appears to be the secret of the choice. This it is admitted will not be tolerated by the public; and the Directors may find that they have made a great mistake, and perhaps unwittingly cast a reflection upon the highest educational institution of the Province—the University.

TELEGRAPH NEWS.
Ottawa, April 3.

The senate has adjourned over the Easter holidays to 14th inst. The House was engaged the most of yesterday in a dry debate on Penitentiary bill. It afterwards considered in committee of the whole Mr. Rose's Dominion notes bill. Mr. Rose amended the bill so as to make the whole amount of notes to be dealt with eight instead of thirteen millions of dollars. Bill respecting Extradition Treaty with United States was read a third time and passed, with an amendment by Chamberlain providing for a delay of seven days, within which a prisoner may appeal to Judges of Superior Court before being extradited. On motion for 2nd reading of bill for organization Department of Marine and Fisheries, a debate arose and is still progressing, relative to the general position of the Departmental organization.

Civil Service Resolutions are ordered for Tuesday next.

London, April 2.
Weekly returns of the Bank of England shows deficiency £334,000 sterling. In House of Commons this evening debate on Irish Church continued till late hour.

New York, April 3.
Gold 138 and 138 1/2.

Political news unimportant. Council 93 and 93 1/2. At Liverpool—Corn 41s. Other articles unchanged. Bullion in the Bank of France has decreased seventeen million francs.

A division will take place to night in the House of Commons on the Irish Church question. The result is looked for with great interest. The course of the Ministry is unknown.

Gold 138.
At 2 1/2 this morning the debate ended, and a division took place on Lord Stanley's amendment to postpone the consideration of Gladstone's resolution till next Parliament.

Six hundred members voted and the Government was defeated by sixty majority. The announcement was greeted by wild cheers of the Liberals. On going into committee, which motion was carried by a majority of 56 in the Committee.

Mr. Gladstone moved his first resolution, and that the Committee progress. The Prime Minister, Princess of Wales and Princess of Teck and others, members of the Royal family, staid in the Royal Gallery during the entire debate.

New York, April 2.
The case of Allen McDonald, held at Ottawa under demand of the United States for extradition, came up on Tuesday. The Attorney General said the Government would give full consideration of the whole case before any action was taken.

There have been no remarkable developments so far in the Presidential Impeachment case. It progresses slowly.

New York, April 3.
Advices from Monte Video announce that the President, Gen. Flores, had been murdered in that City. He had recently returned from the seat of war on the Rio Parana for the purpose of resigning the dictatorial power which he seized about a year ago.

A Richmond despatch says the trial of Jeff Davis has been postponed till May 2nd.

FOREWARNED AND FOREARMED.

The Government are determined that no Fenian band of marauders shall catch them "napping," and have therefore given orders for the immediate brigading of the Regular and Volunteer troops and for the carrying out of other measures with a view of enabling our army of defence to take the field in very short notice. The Regular and Volunteer troops in the two Provinces of Ontario and Quebec are to be formed into seven brigades, one at Quebec, two at Montreal, one at Prescott, one at Toronto, one at Hamilton and London. Each of these brigades will consist of 1,350 volunteers in addition to the regulars, and will be commanded by a Brigadier General of H. M. service.

There is nothing in this movement on the part of our authorities to excite alarm or destroy confidence, but exactly the contrary. To be ready to defend ourselves renders it highly probable that we shall never be attacked, and if the Fenians should be foolish enough again to attempt the invasion of Canada, it is certain that they will meet with such a reception as will make them eschew visiting the Dominion for all time to come.—[Hamilton Spectator.]

SAD ACCIDENT.—Yesterday afternoon while one of the seamen on S. S. Acadia was in attendance on the winch driven by the dynamo engine, his left hand was caught in the machinery and severely torn. Dr. Bunting, who was sent for, decided to amputate the small finger and a portion of the hand consisting, the patient being placed under the influence of ether while the operation was executed. The sailor was subsequently sent to the Marine Hospital, he will probably remain until the steamer returns to this port. The operation having been so skillfully conducted by Dr. Bunting, it is hoped that the sailor will not be required to lose more of the disabled hand than has already been taken.—[Telegraph.]
