



Washington Will Have a Novelty in the Convention Line.

Mothers From All Over the Country Will Meet to Discuss Nursery Science-How the Project Originated-Some of Those Interested.

The mothers of the nation are to gather in Washington and talk on subjects more or less connected with the nursery. Not all the mothers, of course, will be there, but a sufficient number of representative mothers to make a good showing. They will be present as delegates to the first national congress of mothers, which is to be held in the banquet hall of the Arlangton hotel. The sessions are to last three days, beginning on Feb. 17.

As this is the first time American moth ers have ever held a congress, it is not possible to predict how many of them will be there or just what they will do. It is known, however, that well known women and a few men will read papers and make addresses. The topics will take a wide range, and the discussions will cover almost every subject connected with child-hood and motherhood, from how to influence the development of character in children to the best method of punishing bad little boys who smoke cigarettes and make

The idea of holding the congress was first presented by Mrs. Theodore W. Birney at the mothers' meeting at Chautauqua in the summer of 1895. The project was enthusiastically received. All the women present thought it would be a fine thing to have a national association of mothers and hold a national congress. So Mrs. Birney was encouraged to go ahead and

work up the organization.

Mrs. Birney is a wealthy woman who lives in a fine mansion in Chevy Chase, one of the most fashionable suburbs of Washington. She has been prominent in other enterprises of a similar nature and is not unknown among the ranks of phi-lanthropists. No less than nine children call her mother, and she is the ruler of an ideal home. She is not one of those old fashioned mothers who bury themselves under their family cares and live in a world bounded by their front door steps. Mrs. Birney is one of the new mothers who rides a bleycle and tries to find as much pleasure in life as her sons and daughters

The first woman to help the scheme along in any material way was Miss Emma Morton, the sister of the secretary of agriculture. Technically Miss Morton is not a mother at all, but a spinster. She has, however, acted as mother for many years to the motherless children of her brother, and she is deeply interested in all things pertaining to the rearing of children. She introduced Mrs. Birney to Mrs. Phœbe Hearst, who is noted for her many philanthropies, and who personally supports 19 free kindergartens.

By these three women the greater part of the work of forming the present or-ganization of mothers has been done,



A Newly-Invented Telephone for Locating Internal Diseases.

One of the latest inventions in the world of medical science is the phonenloscope, an instrument which is a development of the stethoscope, but much more delicate. The phonendoscope, which is the invention of Dr. Bianchi, of Paris, onsists of a hollow box, about as big as a large-sized watch, furnished with two vibrating membranes. On one side a short staff, terminating with a button,

serves to put the box in contact with the body of the patient, the button being pressed firmly on the surface just over the organ to be examined. On the opposite side flexible tubes are attached, which convey the sounds from the box to the ears of the operator, or operators, for several persons may listen to the sounds at the same time.

The following description is given in a London paper by one who saw the instrument tested in a Parisian hospital:-"A man stripped to the waist stood in the center of a circle of doctors, each of whom held his ears to a pair of flexible tubes connected with a small round box of black rubber which was pressed against the patient's breast. A pair of tubes was also handed to me, and I was

asked to listen. While we all listened intently Prof. Bianchi gently rubbed his fingers upon the man's skin over the spot where the heart is usually located. Immediately we heard a murmuring sound, and the circle of doctors expressed satisfaction with grunted exclamations and nods. Suddenwhile the professor continued drawing his fingers in larger and larger circles across the man's breast, the sound ceased. 'Ah! there is no longer the heart there,' said the professor. 'We have touched the end of it.' Whereupon he dabbed a blue pencil mark upon the skin

to indicate the point where his finger had arrived when the sound stopped. The patient twisted his eyes downward and stared wonderingly at the mark. "Prof. Bianchi resumed his rubbing, while the doctors and I stuffed the tubes once more into our ears. As long as the ofessor's finger was over the heart we neard the murmuring sound, but the in-

stant the finger passed beyond the boundaries of the hidden organ there was a dead silence in the tube. And at every essation of the sound the pencil, followed by the strained eyes of the patient, made its mark on the skin. This operation was continued for several minutes, at the expiration of which there appeared, clearly drawn in blue upon the man's breast, the outlines of a misshapen heart, strangely shifted from its right position. But I was glad, for the patient's sake. to hear the doctors say that it was not a very bad heart, after all. "Next the same method was employed

to outline the position and shape of the lungs, the liver, the stomach, and other organs, and, at the end of half an hour, the body, front and back alike, was covered with an intricate series of outline pictures showing his internal structure and condition. Any defect in the form or position of an organ and the existence of diseased places in the lungs was indicated at once by the sound or absence of sound in the tubes. The practiced ear, I was told, could detect a difference in the quality of the sound given by different organs of the body, but to me they nearly all sounded alike, except when the patient was caused to swallow a little water a change in the sound given forth from the stomach was clearly perceptible.' Prof. Bianchi asserted-and a number of members of the Clinical Society of Practitioners of France and the Syndicate of Physicians of Paris and the department of the Seine, who assisted at the experiments, corroborated his asserion—that it would be easy by this process not only to discover general disease, but to locate any foreign body lodged in any of the organs or tissues, as well as to determine the existence and extent of cancerous or similar internal growth.

He has not only educated himself by his own efforts, but has paid his own way during two trips through Europe, and now has as brilliant financial prospects as though his sight was perfect. Mr. Hamilton is a son of Rev. James Hamilton of Grand Rapids and was born in that state about 24 years ago. When 8 years old, he lost his sight through an accident. He fell and stuck the points of a pair of shears in one eye, the other becom ing affected soon after, leaving him totally blind. At the age of 10 years he entered the Michigan School For the Blind at Lansing, and remained there until he was graduated in the literary course. During this time he also learned the trade of piane tuning, and it has been mainly by money

After being graduated he went to Europe all alone, making his way about without difficulty and being received everywhere with great kindness and consideration. He spent some time both in France and Germany, studying the languages of those countries, so that he is now able to speak them with fluency. On his return to the United States he entered Albion college, and from there went to Ann Arbon

In the summer of 1895 Mr. Hamilton was married, and he and his bride spent the rest of the year in Italy and Greece. In the latter country especially he excited much curiosity and interest, for blind men in Greece know no other way of getting a living than by begging, and a blind man who supported himself in the way Mr. Hamilton does and who was so highly cultivated aroused the surprise and admiration of the Greeks. Numerous members of the nobility entertained Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton, and finally they were sent for by the queen, who asked Mr. Hamilton many questions and treated him with much kindness. The queen was especially interested in learning about what was done for the blind in America, and at once began making arrangements for the estab-lishing of a school for the blind in Athens. If her intentions are carried out, Mr. Hamilton will probably be given charge of the institution and will take up his residence in Athens.




