# BLACK SEA CREWS KILL ADMIRALS? TROOPS REFUSE TO FIRE UPON MOB

Sections of Army and Navy Join the Revolt, Only Cossacks Remaining Faithful---A Clash With the Students at St. Petersburg.

Odessa, Oct. 30 .- Persistent rumors are in circulation here today that the Black Sea fleet mutinied on arriving at Samsun, on the coast of Asia Minor, killed Admirals Birlieff and Chouknin, and saled back to Sevastopol, after holsting the revolutionary flag. It is impossible to verify the rumors. The authorities are confiscating all political te'egrams.

#### Troops Join the Revolt.

St. Petersburg Oct. 30.-12:55 p.m.-The city continues outwardly calm, but there is the most intense excitement beneath the surface. The strike committee continues to refrain the people from violence, this being considered the best way to obtain the ends ir. view. The committee believe that the longer an open collision, which would force a show of hands, can be avoided, the better for their chances. The army, they say, is being gradually won over to the people's cause. Only the Cossacks and the Emperor Nich-olas Swiss Guard are absolutely faithful to the existing regime. The Ismalovsky Regiment, which was reported to be disaffected during the troubles of last winter, is now reported to have refused to do guard duty, and to be confined to barracks, surrounded by Cossacks. #### Revolt Situation at a Glance.

The Czar remains practically a prisoner at Peterhof. Apparently he cannot make up his mind what to do, now favoring the granting of widest freedom to the people, and again swinging to the extreme reactionary policies. The revolution meanwhile is spreading by leaps and bounds, and even the army is disaffected. Several regiments at St. Petersburg are held in barracks surrounded by Cossacks, as it is feared they may join the revolutionists. At Lodz the troops, when ordered to volley into the crowds, discharged their weapons in the air. Only the Cossacks remain absolutely faithful to the Emperor. In a clash with a mob in Odessa, they killed and wounded many of the populace. Intense excitement prevails at Warsaw and Moscow, but so far the strike leaders have succeeded in preventing their followers from precipitating a general conflict. Wild rumors come from the interior and the Caucasus of plundering
