Allied Financial Experts Admit Impossibility of Germany Being Able To Pay Enormous Indemnities During Next Two Years-Payments Imposed Will Be Made On Rising Scale Yearly.

Paris, March 31 .- The probability that important final decisions will be taken this week by the peace conference conferees is pointed out by the French press today. Dwelling upon the French claims the newspapers reiterate their arguments that these are just and legitimate and absolutely necessary for the safety of France, and likewise of the world. The Echo de Paris claims to know that in order to assure the security of the French frontier it will be made obligatory upon Germany to destroy her forts on the right bank of the Rhine, with the Allies occupying the left bank until the war indemnity is paid. Regarding the in-demnities, the experts, the newspaper continues, have admitted the impossibility of Germany's paying enormous amounts during the next two years. The newspaper says it understands that the payments required will be on a rising scale yearly, each of the Allies to receive its share

In the matter of education, while great progress is being made, the rank and file of the people are illiterate. In morals the country is rotten to the core, one main source of the corruption being the priesthood itself. The church is resolutely opposed to freedom of worship, and is reported by Professor Monte Verde, of the University of Uraguay, as preferring clubs of infidels to Protestant churches. It is equally opposed to civil marriage, and as a result there are whole towns in certain districts where there is not nor has there ever been a marriage. A large proportion of the children are illegitimate. And as to religion Brazil has no longer any faith; statesmen, lawyers, physicians, army and navy officials have, almost to a man, turned to infidelity. Porto Rico is a Roman Catholic country without religion; only satire would call Central America Christian. No wonder that Dr. Speer is a witness who must be discredited at all costs. But Dr. Speer quotes a vast mass of evidence from the tongue and pen of priests, authors, travelers, professors and representatives of the American Government, and only in the case of these forged letters has his testimony been shaken.



One-Time Publisher of Evening Herald Died On Saturday in His 80th Year-Was Seventy Years in London.

"Yes, Dad said there were bears galore here when he first came here over 70 years ago, and there was one little road made of logs, now Dundas street. He called it a corduroy road," said F. H. Dawson, referring to his father, Wilberforce Dawson, who died in his 80th year, late on Saturday.

When a young man he entered the printing business, and he and his brother, the late Col. M. C.
